Mrs. Turner's book of edifying verses for children was by no means the only one, though it was one of the best known. 



How to Treat an Animal That Has Gorged Itself-If Serious,

Get a Veternarian. Every winter many good farm and Every winter many good farm animals are lost and many more nearly lost through carelessness in the tieup, or the leaving of feed bins open. If a cow gets loose in the stable, she generally manages to find the bin where the feed grains are stored and just naturally gorges herself on the concentrated food. Don't blame the cow for eating. She knows not what trouble she is wading into by cverloading her paunch with mill chop or grain meal.

If it is known that an animal has gorged itself, and it can generally be determined by pression be determined by pressing the flank with the closed fist and noting if the indent of the hand remains for a short time, a drench should be given at once.
