On Tuesday morning the young lady left her apartment to go to the breakfast room slightly in advance of her father, and, upon reaching the room occupied by the lieutenant, the door was suddenly thrown open, and he sprang into the passageway, seized the girl around the waist, dragged he tenant, the door was suddenly thrown open, and he sprang into the passageway, seized the girl around the waist, dragged her into his room, placed a pistol against her temple and blew out her brains. Then, turning the weapon upon himself, he fired again and fell dead beside her. CHICAGO STRIEE COLLAPED.

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—At noon to-day the collapse of every rail road strike in the city occurred, and work in the stock yards began in earnest. The Chicago and Alton switchmen recognized their mistake, and went back to work as a result of a conference between General Manager Campbell, Grand Master Sween y. Vice-Grand Master Downey and a committee of the strikers. The men agree to become members of the Switchmen's Union to be hereafter governed by its rule and by the advice of its chief, to reirain from trying to dictate to the company in the matter of hiring or promoting men, but with the right to appeal to the officers of the company for redress of grievances, the latter agreeing to hear such complaints in a spirit of fairness. The switchmen at the stock yards held a meeting during the morning, and declared the atrike of, to go into effect at 1 o'clock. The lake Shore strike is, virtually settled, 47 of the men having signed the agreement to do work as ordered. This leaves about twenty whose places are being filled. These men will not be taken back. The road is moving freight without inconvenience.

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



We are apt to forget that in the century of the Antonines 26 legions, or 80,000 men, sufficed to maintain the peace of an empire whose territories (without any considerable aggregate increase of population) are now bristling with standing armies exceeding 4,000,000, exclusive of marines and reserves.



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

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SUNDAY AFTERNOON.

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Jeaus and the Twelve were walking in the way, when this young man came ranning toward them. When he reached them he kneeled at the feet of Jesus; he addressed him in the words of reverent allegiance. "Good Master," said, he, "what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" The Master looked kindly at him, yet we may well imagine with that piercing insight which no concealments, conscious or unconscious, could ever escape. He sought to measure the meaning, the real, heart-felt meaning, of the reverent words. "Why callest thou me good?" said he; "there is none good but one—God." Words of mere form were always repulsive to the absolute sincerity of Christ. He would have none of them: never used them; would not endure them from others. "Good-by." What do you mean by good-by? Do you really pray, God be with you? "Your obedient servant." What do you mean by obedient servant. Do you really put yourself at my service? Somewhat thus, if I read aright, Christ seeks to know the true meaning of the reverend words of the young man. It is no rebuke; it is inquisition. And the young man has no answer. His reverent works will not stand the acid of this searching; they are not pure gold. Christ does not press the inquiry. He leaves it to be pressed by the young man's own conscience. He leaves it, let me add, for us to press, each for himself upon his own conscience.

There is a moment's pause; then Christ, getting no answer to his question, gives answer to the question asked of him. "Keep the commandments." Curious answer, was it not? What becomes of the doctrine of justification by faith? What becomes of all our diatribes against morality as payment for eternal life? What of Paul's declaration, "By the deeds of the law shall no flesh be justified in his sight?" This was always Christ's way; he met men on their own ground, and compelled their own conscience to condemn them. As Socrates compelled his disciples to argue out philosophic truth for themselves, so Christ compelled his inquirers to ascertain moral truth for themselves. His method was the Socratic method applied to morals. There was a strange inconsistency in this young man's question, What shall I do to inherit eternal life? Inheritances are not earned by services. They are gifts, not wages. The great King does not sell eternal life, he give it. But Christ did not point out this inconsistency. He did not argue, as a modern divine would have done, the insufficiency of morality to save. He threw the man back on his own conscience. "Keep the commandments," he said. And truly this is right. If any man will keep the commandments, it is enough. If a man has no sin to answer for, he needs no Saviour. He that has justified himself needs no justifier. The acquitted need not ask pardon.
