LONDON, Nov. 25.—A Calcutta dispatch says: Rain-making experiments have been made at Bezwada, in the Madras Presidency, where a scarcity of water is having very serious effects upon the crops. The result, however, was not encouraging. Twenty bags, each containing ten pounds of roburite, a high explosive, were exploded on the hills of Bezwada at an altitude of 600 feet. The concursions caused by the explosions were terrific, but not a drop of rain fell, and the experimenters gave up their task as an utter failure. Private experiments to produce rain have been made in the Presidency before. A short time ago a quantity of dynamite was exploded on the hills about Madras, with the result that smart showers were produced over an area of four or five miles square.



THEY BO NOT WANT FAIR LISTS. The general public is not interested in legal technicalities regarding the Dominion Franchise Act, such as have been resorted to, time and again, to prevent properly qualified persons from exercising the franchise. What they desire is that every qualified man shall have the right to vote. Consequently the law should be so plain that no ordinary elector could err in its interpretation. There should be no ambiguity in its provisions; no sharp practice resorted to in order to prevent a good citizen exercising the right to vote. In striking off names of men not entitled

to be on the list, the same rule should hold good. Justice should be the one thing aimed at. While the measure is inforce, there should be no unfair advantage given to any party, or to any individual, but every person should have an equal chance of having his name on the list, or of defending it when objection is raised.

It has been maintained by some, when a voter whose name is on the list has been notified that he will be called on to defend t on the ground that he is "not qualified," that this broad explanation is not sufficient, and that each man should be fully notified of the ground on which his vote is attacked. One newspaper defender of the act tells us that the words "not qualified," which, by the way, were used in this city without question when the lists were last revised, are merely put on the notice to compel a voter to appear at court, and have the whole question of his right to vote left to a "fishing examination." This may appear to be a very plausible explanation but the ADVERTISER is informed by those best able to say that so far as the Liberals are concerned there is absolutely no ground for the statement. They have exercised great care in avoiding attack upon any name on the list that appeared to have a right to be there. 

Bartram's residence the water has forced a passage through the breakwater and is pouring in at a lively gate. The westendof Beech street is submerged, and a few of the inmates have the pleasure of hearing the waves lapping against the sides of their houses with a musical cadence. Another break occurred on the north branch near Collins' ice-house, but the influx did not alarm anybody. Part of Saunby's dam, near the Oxford street bridge has given way, but as the water below was almost on a level with that above no great harm was done.

WHY THE ARC LIGHT HISSES. Also Why It Goes Out Occasionally—The Intensity of its Heat.

Did you ever see an electric lamp upside down? Now and then a careless or ignorant lineman manages to invert one, and the effect is curious. An inverted arc lamp looks like any other until it is lighted, then it gives forth a singular sickly gleam that proclaims its inversion. Arc lamps are ordinarily so arranged that the current enters by the way of the upper carbon, skips to the lower, and so escapes. As everybody knows, the step from the upper to the lower carbon produces the spark, or arc. The effect of the current passing from the upper to the lower carbon is to produce a little cavity in the end of the upper carbon. When the current moves in this fashion the rays of light are thrown downward, and thus the region below the lamp is illuminated. When the wires are so coupled that the entrept runs from the lower to the upper carbon, the cavity is formed in the lower carbon, and the rays of light are thrown upward into the air instead of downward to the ground. The davelopment of the parlons stick for arc lamps has been a matter of years, and the ideal thing has not yet ocen reached. The sticks now in use are undo of yulverized coke mixed with one or another glutinous substances, in some instances molasses. The reddish color of the surface comes from a thin electroplating of copper. This gives the stick conductivity. The upper stick as now made lasts about eight hours; the lower stick nearly twice as long. Many lamps are supplied with two upper sticks, and when one is exhausted an automatic contrivance brings the other into play. The matter of "teeding" the upper stick has not yet been brought to perfection, and the most annoying pecularities of the arc light come from defects in the action of the feeding apparatus. That augry, spluttering hiss often comes from the fact that the upper carbon has slid so far down as to rest upon the end of the lower carbon. The hissing goes on until enough of the upper carbon is burned away to leave space for the arc.
