Important Labor Law Passed by New York State.

Striking Miners Resort to Serious Acts of Viclence-Labor Notes.

STRIKERS WHO STRUCK.

SPRING VALLEY, 111., May 23 .- About 200 striking coal miners marched to the works near here this morning and drove the men from the mines. They met with resistance and a battle with clubs and stones ensued. The strikers banked the fires and nailed up the entrance to the mines. A force of 50 deputies charged on the strikers and captured one of the ringleaders. The mob followed the deputies to the jail, and after breaking down the door liberated their follow-striker.

ST. PAUL, Mine., May 23 .- The delegates to the convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers elected officers this morning. Grand Chief Arthur holds over. A. B. Youngson, of Meadville, Pa., was re-elected assistant grand chief engineer; T. S. Ingraham, first grand engineer or recorder; C. H. Salmons, of Aurora, Ill., second grand engineer. By virtue of his office Mr. Salmons becomes editor of the Brotherhood Journal. CANADIANS SHUT OUT.

Buffalo, May 23.-A bill has been signed by the Governor which makes it a misdemeanor for any municipality in this State, or any contractor doing business for any city, village, town, county or the State, to employ other than citizens of the United States in such work. The bill seens to have got through both branches of the Legislature without much publicity, but it is one of the most important in character which the State has ever had placed on its statute book. It not only affects a very large number of Canadians, but will necessarily deprive of employment many thousands of Poles, Italians and Hun-

So quietly has this legislation been carried that not a city official here has as yet seen a copy of the bill.

The G. T. R. Company Win. WINDSOR, May 23.—This morning Judge Herne, of Windsor, handed down the decision it the case of the appeal of the Grand Trunk Railway against the assessment placed on their property in Windsor. Commissioner Black raised their assessment, and the Court of Revision ratified his action. The case was appealed, and Judge Horne, of Windsor, and Judge Bell, of Chatham, heard the evidence. Their decision reduces the amount by \$125,000. The matter has been in dispute for some time and is one of the greatest importance as the rate for the city could not be struck till it was settled. It is considered a big victory for the railroad company.

Welshmen Want Disestablishment. LONDON,, May 22. - The South of Wales Liberal Federation has resolved to ask the Government to pledge themselves to pass the Welsh Disestablishment Bill either this session or the next one. An amendment expressing dissatisfaction with the Government was rejected.

Poor Show at Aldershot. Lendon, May 23 .- The London World, referring to the review at Aldershot, says of the 10,060 men present not half could go alroad to-morrow if their services were required, and that the Duke of Connaught's division, which is supposed to contain the pick of the first army corps, was little

The French Cabinet Crisis. Paris, May 23.—The Ministerial crisis Carnot to-day received collectively the formal resignations of the Cabinet, which they declined to retract. The President pressed Gen. Mercier to remain at the head of the Ministry of War, and in a conditional way he assented.

The Critical Vote.

London, May 23.—The critical division on the budget is expected to be made in the House of Commons this evening. The Standard predicts that the Government's majority will not exceed eight, adding that unless the anti-Parnellites come out in full force the Ministers will be defeated. The Ministerialists are confident of a majority

Parnellites Against the Government. DUBLIN, May 23 .- A convention of the Parnellite party was held here yesterday under the presidency of John J. Clancy. In his opening address Mr. Clancy said the Parnellites would continue to vote against the Government for the rest of the session. LONDON, May 23.—Dispatches smuggled across the Servian frontier tell of a reign of terror in Belgrade and throughout Servia. The expression of political opinion either in the press, orally, in public or private, is positively prohibited, and wholesale arrests are of almost hourly occurrence. The persons thus far arrested include many Radical deputies, who are charged with conspiring to overthrow the King and put Prince Karageorgevitch on the throne. London, May 23 .- Prof. Romanes died suddenly to-day. George J. Romanes, F. R. S., LL.D., was born in Kingston, Canada, May 20, 1848, his father being the late Rev. Prof. Romanes, M.A., LL.D. He spent his boyhood in England, France, Germany and Italy. 





Strong Declaration in Favor of Sir Oliver.

Why the Distinguished Educationist Desires Success to Ontario's Grand Old Man.

A Telling Arraignment of the False Charges Circulated.

TORONTO, May 23 .- Principal Grant, of Queen's University, Kingston, who has been in the city attending the meeting of the Presbyterian Foreign Missionary Society, discussed the principal issues of the Provincial campaign with a press representative, and gave many strong reasons why the Government of Sir Oliver

Mowat should be sustained. "Have you any objection to expressing your opinion as to the probable result of he general election?" he was asked.

"I cannot predict," said Dr. Grant in reply; "but I have no objection to say what seems to me the issues on which our people should make up their minds before voting. The vote is a very sacred trust, and the man who sells or otherwise dishonors it is a poor creature, like Esau. I am always willing to speak out what is in me when asked on behalf of the public, for a free country requires free speech as the best antidote to secret organizations, local or sectarian appeals, the clamor of faddists or the selfishness of individuals."

"What are, in your opinion, the most important issues before us, so far as Ontario is concerned ?"

"The one point that our people everywhere must settle is this: Can we get administrators who are determined that the commandment, 'Thou shalt not steal' must be observed? Till that is settled, it is useless to talk about anything else. Provincial rights, school questions, tariff reform, British connection, canals, cables, railways
—what is the use of discussing these if we sink into being a !nation of thieves? That is what we must become if we tolerate stealing in high places, for what is done at the top is sure to permeate to the bottom." Dr. Grant referred at length to the revelations of corruption that have been made

since 1891, and continued: "As we think of the saturnalia that must have existed for a long time before such a state of public morals could become possible, we are forced to ask what might have happened to the richest Province in the Dominion, if any easy-going politician had had charge of its strong box? What plunder there was for a gang! We have timber limits worth tens of millions; we could stand a debt of twenty or thirty millions as easily as Quebec. A politician of easy virtue would have lavished these millions on heelers and hangers on, who, in return, would be enthusiastically voting him a god. Does not this thought throw some light on what we have escaped, and on what we owe to the man who has been in charge of our strong box for 22 years? Assuredly, the revelations have had that effect upon me. Our money is still ours, and our honor is sate. Thank God for it. and also let us keep our powder dry-that is, keep a good servant at his post. A man who will not read this lesson will not read anything. In one word, Ontario cannot

afford to dismiss Sir Oliver Mowat." Principal Grant referred to minor differences in regard to the respective party platforms, and expressed his satisfaction that Sir Oliver was so staunch a supporter of British connection. He continued: "Mr. Mowat was always loyal, but in the last two or three years he has taken a decided public stand that has cost him some followers, and that in my opinion should win for him twice as many. His acceptance of honor from the Queen-and it is clear to me as a rule politicians should neither seek nor refuse such honors-his Niagara speech, his dismissal of an official who defied him on a point of duty involved in his office to the crown, these things should not be forgotten. When D'Alton Mc-Carthy said, 'Though Sir Oliver Mowat has lost Elgin Myers, he has gained Mr. McCarthy,' a good many added individually, 'and me, too.' In one word, those men who are in favor of British connection cannot afford to dismiss Sir Oliver Mowat."

"Is there any other reason?" "Yes, but let me again say that the first is enough for all sensible men. One more may be added. There can be no doubt that Sir Oliver Mowat stands now for the fair treatment of minorities, and that is the only way to make possible a united Canadian people. Mr. Davies demanded to know if these guilty scrutineers had been prosecuted, but was unable to get the information.

Sir John Thompson admitted that the punishment meted out to the convicted personators was inadequate. They should have been imprisoned. As to the scrutineers, he admitted also that they should have been punished first, as theirs was a very grave offense.

Mr. Davies called on the Government to see that the scrutineers were prosecuted. The House adjourned at 6 o'clock until

### "A CLASS IN GEOMETRY."

By actual experiment our students learn the laws of physics, chemistry and biology, and not only readily acquire the facts, but enjoy the process. Starting with some fields measured by paces and then drawn to scale, it was easily shown that square lots require less fencing than others of the same area, but different form. ### ONTARIO'S STATESMEN.

Sir Oliver Mowat's Chief Lieutenant.

Creditable Record of Hon, A. S. Hardy, Commissioner of Crown Lands.

Hon. Arthur Sturgis Hardy, Q.C. M.P.P., the accomplished Crown Lands Commissioner, will visit London with Sir Oliver Mowat and Hon. Mr. Harcourt and address the great mass meeting in the Princess Rink. He is, perhaps, taking into consideration his wonderful diversified talents, the ablest and most efficient member of Mr. Mowat's Government, with the single exception of the illustrious Premier himself. Mr. Hardy is a son of Russell Hardy and Juletta (nee Sturgis) Hardy, who both came of U. E. Loyalist stock, and were born in Canada. Mr. Russell Hardy was a flourishing and successful farmer during the earlier part of his life in the county of Brant, but subsequently he abandoned that honorable vocation and became a merchant in the town of Brantford. Arthur S. Hardy, the subject of this sketch, was born at Mount Pleasant in the county of Brant, on the 14th of December, 1837, and received the first elements of his education at the Mount Pleasant Academy, then taught by Rev. W. W. Nelles; at a later period he attended the Grammar School at Brantford. and completed his literary education at the Rockwood Academy near Guelph. Having finished his preparatory studies, and it is said by those who knew him then, with high credit to his masters and himself, he commenced the reading of law with his uncle, Mr. H. A. Hardy, at Brantford, -One year ago, Mr. Meredith denounced whence he went to Toronto, and entered the office of Mr. Harrison and Mr. F. Hodgins, LL.B., Q.C., the former subsequently becoming chief justice of Ontario. After passing his examinations in law with high credit at the Easter term in 1865, Mr. Hardy commenced the practice of law at Brantford, and with great success, having as his chief competitor in the profession Mr. E. B. Wood, afterwards chief justice of Manitoba. Mr. Wood was a formidable opponent to encounter, but Mr. Hardy. with that marvelous energy and fearless boldness characteristic of the man won caused by electric wires. many victories over his elder, more experienced and equally energetic rival.

On Mr. Wood's becoming a member of Sandfield Macdonald's Government in 1867. Mr. Hardy entered the political field in opposition to him, not as a candidate for political honors, but as a campaign orator. Mr. Wood was successful, and represented West Brant in the Local Legislature till after the overthrow of the Sandfield Macdonald Government; but on the prohibition of dual representation Mr. Wood retired from the Local Legislature and continued Commons, and Mr. Hardy was elected in 1873 to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. Wood's resignation in the Local Legisla-Mr. Hardy's ancestors at an early became Liberals of the Baldwin true to them, and heartily espoused cause of Liberalism. general election of 1875 Mr. Hardy was returned by acclamation for the same constituency he had previously represented. Soon after his entrance upon political life it became evident that Mr. Hardy was destined to become a leader and a bright star in the Local House and in the Liberal powerful speaker, unsurpassed for force and vigor in debate and never embarrassed by any unexpected assault from the premeditate efforts of a wily opponent.

Premier Mowat, ever quick to detect superior merit and high ability, soon saw that Mr. Hardy would be a most valuable acquisition to his Cabinet, and in March. 1877, he tendered him the office of Provinpealing to his constituents, he was returned by acclamation again, and he has continued to be returned for the same constituency at every recurring general election from that time to the present, to find with it than the manufacturers, and bis opponents, by money and the selection of the most popular men in the Conservative party, as candidates, he has become so firmly rooted in the effections of the people he has represented so long that he has generally been returned by acclamation or by increasing majorities, no matter by whom he has been opposed. 

### THE FOURTH FIRE

That Had Started in Dr. Talmage's Tabernacle.

The First Three Received Little Notice -All Caused by Electric Wires.

NEW YORK. May 23 .- The fire which a week ago destroyed the Brooklyn Tabernacle was the fourth in the building since its erection. Trustee and ex-Treasurer John Wood gave this information to a re-

The fire was not the first, but the fourth one in that building. The three previous fires all started from the electrical resistance box, or converter, through which the motor wires ran from the starting box at the right of the organ desk to the motor in the organ pit.

"The first fire started before the Tabernacle was open two months. There was a lot of loose pieces of lumber around the resistance box, which was placed on the platform where the organ trackers were. The box burned out and set fire to this trash. It was extinguished, I think, by Sexton Dey, and no material damage was

"The second fire was caused by Organist Browne turning on quickly the full force of the current, which should be turned on by degrees, at the starting box, hy the organ keyboard. The resistance box was instantly burned out, and with it the wire away out into the starting box. The fire flew out there, and, if I am not mistaken, Mr. Browne burned his fingers at the time.

"The third fire was almost in the same place where Sexton Dey claims the last one started-on that platform, and right near the resistance box."

When asked whether he had any idea that the fire was the work of an incendiary, Mr. Wood said:

"Not a particle. It started as the others did, in the electrical resistance box. don't remember the dates of the fires I speak of, but they occurred, and were looked upon as matters of no moment at the time.

### A GALT MAN MURDERED.

Shot Dead in a Quarrel Over a Dog. A Galt dispatch says: David Caldwell, formerly with R. S. Strong, druggist of this town, was murdered on the 26th of April at Island Park ranch, Idaho.

About ten years ago the young man took possession of the ranch, which lies on the main trail to Yellowstone Park in the Beaver canyon, close to the Snake River. It would seem that for a time he had boarded with a Mr. and Mrs. Osborne and carried on the business of a taxidermist with considerable profit. Some few months ago Mrs. Osborno was desirous of learning the business, and David very willingly, taught her the art. The alleged cause of the crime is said to

be a desire on the part of the Osbornes to get possessson of the lucrative business he had worked up for himself. On the day in question Mr. Osborne, who had been away for some time, returned home and found fault with the manner in which he had treated his dog during his absence. According to his statement the deceased used insulting words and a quarrel ensued. He further states that Mr. Caldwell drew a revolver and accidentally shot himself, but from the position of the wound over the left eye it is considered sure that the weapon was handled by a second party. Neighbors are also said to have heard Mr. Osborne confess to having murdered him. Though the deed was committed fully four weeks ago, deceased was not buried until Saturday last, he having been allowed to remain in the

Deceased was 34 years of age. His brother Robert is in Utah and John in Manitoba. His other brother, William, with his mother, resides at the Galt the new Fire Kindler.

### PATRIOTIC LORD ABERDEEN.

The Governor-General on the Duty of Canadians.

Co-Operation All Nationalities and All Croeds Req nired Here.

OTTAWA, May 23 .- At a meeting of the Canadian Royal Society yesterday, the president read an address to Lord Aberdeen, in the course of which the following paragraph occurred:

"Ever since your Excellency and the Countess of Aberdeen have come into this country, Canadians have had many evidences of the lively interest which your Excellencies take in every subject affecting not merely the material advantages of the Dominion, but the culture and education of the people at large. It is with deep interest that the Royal Society has noted the ability and energy with which her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen is identifying herself with a national movement, which must tend to make the women of Canada far more important factors than they are now in the social and intellectual life of this new country."

Lord Aberdeen's reply contained the following statesmanlike remarks: "There is one point in the constitution and character of the society which I cannot help thinking would in itself commend it to the grateful approval of all intelligent Canadians. I refer to the opportunity and incentive which it affords to harmonious cooperation between different branches and races of our community in the matter of promoting not only literature, art and science, but indirectly a community of interest and good feeling. (Applause.) It must be evident that when one section of the community shows respect and courtesy and consideration towards another section, they show respect to themselves and also to their country. It is obvious also that any deficiency in this respect is inconsistent with true patriotism and with the dictates not only of courtesy and duty, but of common sense -(applause)-and the community et large must be grateful for the example in the carrying out of this necessary principle which is afforded by your society. I say 'necessary,' because obviously any parmanent want of co-operation, harmony and sympathy as regards the affairs of the country at large would be fatal to its true progress and happiness." (Applause.)

### A LION IN MITTENS.

Sandow's Wrestle With the King of Beasts Was a Fake.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 23 .- The wrestling match between Sandow and the lion, Commodore, last night was unsatisfactory, the beast refusing to attack. He lay crouched on the floor of the arena, from which he was aroused only when Col. Boone lashed him with the whip. His mouth was confined in a heavy steel muzzle and his paws were incased in mittens. Sandow did as he pleased with him. The audience shouted "fake," and "he's dosed," and hissed.

HOPPED OUT.

Millions of Baby Grasshoppers Killed by the Snowstorm in Michigan.

WILLIAMSBURG, Mich., May 25 .- Last year great armies of grasshoppers infested the Grand Traverse region and in same localties the crops were destroyed. This army deposited their eggs and for two weeks they have been hatching out. Millions of them have been noticed, but since the storm, search has been made and not a sign of a grasshopper can be found, for the cold rain and snow has destroyed them.





Richmond street again brought the wheelmen up to King and for a full mile King was held until Adelaide street was reached. The return was made via Dundas street, part of the band imperilling their necks and their difficult notes on the top of an open street car.
