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

Timely Reflections on the Present Native Outbreak.

From the New Age. The Matabele rising presents to us

a new phase of the problem of the races in South Africa. Hitherto those who have thoughtfully studied that problem have hugged the comforting belief that the South African native knows when he is beaten. Speaking of the Matabeles in July last Dr. Jameson himself said that "the best of them is that when you have once licked them they recognize the fact and give you no more trouble. Already we are using the Ma-tabele as police; and good men they are. We have 180 in our service now who will replace whites, and be under the control, of course, of white offi-We find them to be absolutely cers. loyal, and quick to obey orders and maintain discipline, and I hope, before two more years have gone by, we shall have a Matabele police force of fully 1,000." Again, Lieut.-Col. 




