MANY DOGS ARE BEING DESTROYED

Beast Which Bit the Youth Died of Rabies After Being Chained Up.

The mad dog scare in the Township of North Dorchester is assuming serious proportions, and stringent orders have been issued to tie up all dogs for a period of six months.

In addition, William Johnston, of Thamesford, son of Mr. R. Johnston, the man whose dog ran amuck a few days ago, has been sent to Toronto to undergo treatment for rabies.

The dog, which has been under observation for some time, has since died of rabies. The head has been sent to Ottawa for analysis. Four dogs the supposed mad dog, ran away from their homes, and no trace of them can be found. A number of other dogs have been destroyed.

Many Dogs Bitten.

Some months ago a dog went mad in the vicinity of Belmont, and ran almost through the township. Several dogs were bitten, and many cattle had to be destroyed, as they showed symptoms of rabies.

About ten days ago a dog belonging to a farmer named Johnston, went mad, and raced through the northern part of the township. In the village of Dorchester the dog engaged in a fight with a number of other dogs. Getting free it raced to its home near Thamesford, where it was capof rabies. Yesterday it died, all evidences showing that the animal was

suffering from the dread disease.

The dog was placed under quarantine last Thursday by Dominion Inspector Dr. Perdue, of Toronto, who after examining it pronounced it an oncoming attack of rabies. The head of the animal was sent yesterday morning at once to the Biological Laboratory at Ottawa by Dr. Shaw, V.S., of this place. The result of the diagnosis will be awaited with interest by the community. A son of Mr. Johnston has been near to Toronto to take the Pasteur cure.

It has been learned that the Johnson dog was bitten some five weeks ago by a strange acting dog from the north, which

Several dogs have been bitten in Dorchester, and nearly all have been destroyed. Some live stock of Mr. Johnson's, and neighbors were also bitten. [Canadian Press.] Montreal, Aug. 13.—The Allan Line office here this morning received a further message from Captain E. Cook, of the Corsican, which collided with an iceberg in the Straits of Belle Isle yesterday, in which he gives more

were at once reversed. However, a collision occurred, though the impact was slight, as the Corsican was travelling very slowly when she strusk.

The Corsican, her master said, was slightly damaged above the water line, but would be able to proceed to Liverpool, her destination, without assistance. No one was injured in the collision.

Montreal, Aug. 12.-Word came to Montreal tonight from Captain E. Cook, f the Allan liner Corsican, that his vessel struck an iceberg this afternoon in the vicinity of Belle Isle. The Corsican was proceeding slowly, and the damage, which is reported as slight, is above the water line. The vessel will proceed on her voyage to Liverpool. The message from Captain Cook, which came

"Corsican struck an iceberg this afternoon at 4 o'clock while going very slow. Stem injured above waterline, and ship is making no

water. Will proceed on voyage." Earlier reports that the Lake Champlain and the Scandinavian were proeeding to the assistance of the injured vessel are without confirmation. The signal service report shows that the Scandinavian was some 300 miles away at the time of the accident. The position of the Lake Champlain is not defin-

The exact position of the Corsican when she struck is not stated, but the accident is thought to have occurred some hundred miles east of Belle Isle, judging by the latest reports from the signal service. The signal service report from Belle Isle shows dense fog prevailing, and this is probably the cause of the collision with the berg, and also accounts for the fact that the vessel was proceeding slowly. The Corsican carried 25 first-class, 62 second-class, and 200 steerage passengers, and sailed from Montreal for Lingerpool last Friday.

INFERNAL MACHINE SENT TO A GIRL

North Carolinan Was Enraged When His Love Was Spurned.

MISTAKE MADE IN BILLING

Goes to Wrong Placs and Blows Up the Express

Greensboro, N. C., Aug. 13 .- Startling disclosures indicating that the infernal machine which exploded in the High Point office of the Southern Express Company Saturday, was destined for a High Point society girl, followed rigid investigation of the mystery today by United States District Attorney A. E. Holton and Police Chief Ridge.

Revelations said to have been made by this woman to the authorities have caused the police to search for a man who lived at Thomasville, N. C., who is said to have good business and social

connections. The inquiry, the authorities assert, has established the fact that the infernal nachine which seriously wounded W. M. Brisbee, the express company manager, and his cashier, Alton Morton, when it exploded in the office, was sent from bomasville.

Until an arrest is made officials decline to reveal names of persons concerned in the case, though they state that it has been positively ascertained that the package concealing the deadly machine was intended for a High Point girl rather than for Postmaster Charles Hoover, of Thomasville.

Astronomer Predicts Storms That Will Sweep Across Continent This Month.

[Canadian Press.]
Santa Cruz, Aug. 12.—That the invisible agency connecting the heavens and earth is electro-magnetism is announced by Rev. J. S. Ricard, in charge of the observatory at Santa Clara College, who recently made public a method of forecasting the weather from sun spots.

Father Ricard also gives out a list of dates of disturbances for the Pacific coast up to the end of the first week of States and plunge into the Atlantic

"A new feature of our forecasting," the statement continues, "Is that even though a solar storm vanishes entirely from sight and no telescone in existence can reach it, yet, by following its attenuated and dying traces right around the parallels of solar latitude and applying our rule—a very simple arithmetic formulae—the same results are obtained as when a spot in the full vigor of life crosses the invisible hemisphere.

Bruce Ate Candy.

The police say that Bruce admitted taking the chocolates to his wife, and said he had bought them at S. W Shotters, 244 York street. Bruce also told one of the detectives that he had caten one of the candies himself. Shotter, when questioned did not recall having seld the candies to Bruce, but explained that his store was a busy place on Saturday, and unless he had some particular reason to remem-ber the purchase he would not be able to throw any light on the transaction. The police intend to have Shotter taken to the cells to see Bruce The hospital authorities, who are willing to talk, say they believe Rose Zeipe died of strychnine poisoning, as the symptoms strongly pointed to that.



Consternation has been caused among British tariff reformers by the British Government's decision to withdraw from the Brussels sugar favorite projects.

Prior to 1903 the continental counexports of beet sugar, thus enabling ing so costly that its merchant marine the British people to buy sugar more was sacrificed. cheaply than her neighbors, to the advantage of her great jam and other sugar-using industries. The West Indian planters who grew cane sugar complained that the continental bounty system was driving them out of the British and other markets. Mr. Chamberlain went to their aid by proposing to close British ports to European sugar, except from those countries which agreed to drop the bounty system. This was the arrangement made at the Brussels convention, to which all the sugar-growing countries assented but Russia. It was hailed by British tariff reformers as a stroke of empire-building, because terval

t gained the good-will of the West Indian planters, who had no longer to face bounty-fed competition.

The first result of the convention was a retaliatory duty upon India tea by Russia; the East Indies had to suffer for the profit of the West Indies. Sugar prices naturally rose in Great Britain; the other countries of Europe had ceased paying a part of the 'cost of the Englishman's sugar, and the Russian supply was cut off, In 1907, under pressure of high prices, Russia was allowed to export 200,000 tons a year westward to relieve the market. Last year the sugar crop was bad everywhere except in Russia, which had a surplus of 700,000 tons locked up. Thus the British people paid famine prices for a staple article of food and the British indus-

tries using sugar were gravely handicapped. To crown all, the sugar production of the West Indies, instead of being stimulated, fell off 7.6 per cent. Of the 1,500,000 tons imported by Great Britain yearly only 250,000 came from the West Indies. MORLEY AND MONTAIGNE

By Special Arrangement With the Winnipeg Telegram.]

The announcement that a new edition of Montaigne's Essays will soon be published enables me to seize the occasion to draw a comparison between the celebrated Frenchman of the 16th century and Lord John Morley of the present age, The ruling passion in the lives of both these men was the pursuit of letters; the reading and making of books gave them keener joy than any other occupation. Lord Morley, however, has never allowed his love of books to divorce him from public affairs; as journalist and politician he has spent nearly the whole of a long life in the arena, and his fame as a statesman is as secure as his reputation as a biographer and man of letters. There must have been many times in his public life when Lord Morley sighed for the soft cushions of his each of his colleagues in turn on all library and hours of leisure devoted

he was constantly trying to keep out of public office. He liked to travel, to see strange faces, to study the human being everywhere, but he wanted to avoid all responsibility. He lived in a ferocious age, when France was torn between the struggles of the Catholics and the Huguenots. Montaigne abhorred fanaticism and religious intolerance, and he as he would to keep out of party strife, he found it well nigh impossible. At the early age of 38, he resigned his judgeship in Bordeaux and settled down to a studious life in his chateau. There he rum maged all the ancient writers and ransacked current literature and his own experiences in the search for material for his essays. These were so intimate, so wise, so delightful, that when the first edition was published at Bordeaux it was an instant success. Their fame soon spread abroad throughout the civilized world, and Montaigne became one of the best-known men of his time.

But fame brought its inconveniences While Montaigne was in Italy on his travels, he heard that the proud citizens of Bordeaux had elected him, their distirguished son, as mayor. It was very annoying, for a mayor in those stormy times was liable to be murdered either by one faction or another. Montaigne four months before he arrived in Bor- sible for them. deaux. During his administration he carefully sat on the fence, doing his best to offend neither party. He succeeded time of pestilence. In later years the essayist was obliged by royal commandto attend the court at various times, but he still tried to render himself inoffensive to both parties. The consequence was that he saved his own skin, a very difficult thing to do in his age, but when we compare his career with that of Morley we must give the modern bookman the palm.

Montaigne should have been a monk; perhaps he might have been, if he had had the necessary religious impulse. He loved solitariness; he hated the turmoil of the world. He felt at home only when all alone up in his kingdom in the spacious library in Is castle tower. There he loved to dwell, having a good time had a great deal of artistic instinct with his mind. There by means of the Latin sentences on the beams of the ceilng, by paintings on the walls, and by his great silent company of books, he used to good society, who took her an age in which he had been so unfortunate as to be born. 

You eat more butter on toast than you do on ordinary bread; have you ever noticed that? And butter, of course, is fattening. Just before I went to bed I had a glass of malted milk or milk with an egg beaten up in it. When I was playing I ate a little heartier supper and kept a bottle of milk in my dressing room to drink between times. I had always been very much af-

BRESNAHAN HIT BY MURPHY

Cub Owner Says That St. Louis Will Not Try to Win

Games.

WORLD TOUR BLAMED

Bresnahan Is To Accompany Giants and Murphy Sees the Dark Plot

Chicago, Aug. 12.—In a statement issued today, Charles W. Murphy, president of the Chicago club in the National League, charged that the New York team would not win the National League pennant "without undue assist ance from other teams."

The statement was issued in regard to a dispatch sent from New York Saturday, which stated that Roger Bresnahan, manager of the St. Louis club in the National League, was interested in a world's tour planned for the New York club providing the the New York club providing the Giants won the championship. In his statement Murphy said in part:
"I am surprised to see Bresnahan's

name connected with such an enter-prise. It looked at first like a simple and harmless plan to pick up a little easy money, and so far as I know. there had been no opposition to it.
"But when they incorporate, becom ing a stock-selling probability, and use the name of such men as Bresnahan—manager of a team that can help us or hurt us a whole lot in the present pennant race—the matter takes an entirely different aspect.

"As a matter of fact, the Giants haven't won the race, and I don't think they will win it—without undue assistance from other teams. "I want to see the Cardinals play the game against the Giants, and play it right up to the hilt. I can hardly believe that Bresnahan would allow himself to be drawn into a financial scheme whose success might depend entirely on his own team losing and rival team winning. It is contrary

to all traditions of baseball.
"The race in the National League nust be run out strictly on its merits. Not even a suspicion can be permitted o creep into the situation right now."



Fighting occurred around Tenencino early in the day, and the six hundred federals coffeed the receist. The latter titel concentrated their efforts on the smaller garrison of Rurales at Ixtapa. 

Perhaps no class in China is more enthusiastic over the work already ac-

complished by President Yuan Kai than are the foreigners, and this is particularly true of those in the big cities. Commercial firms in Shanghai, centres announce an increase in trade above all former times, and in many instances a determination to increase the output of their houses or works. In a certain sense an industrial boom, as Americans would call it, has taken hold of the larger centres of commercial and industrial life. This, following so soon after the chaos and bewilderment of the revolution, is considered to afford good evidence of the strength of Yuan as head of the nation. All parties, including the followers of Dr. Wu and Dr. Sun, agree that the president is the ablest man China has produced since the ascendency of Viceroy Li Hung Chang, and so far as the executive is concerned the country is far stronger and more stable than it has been at any

time within half a century.
One of the strangest evidences of the awakening of China is the popularity of the regular army, which is growing rapidly in almost every province, under aid given by both the national and provincial governments. In times gone by it was almost impos-sible to get recruits for either the army or the navy, and it is well known that during the Chinese-Japanese war hundreds, if not thousands, of men, both old and young, had their heads chopped off because they refused to enlist.

Conditions are so changed that one finds it difficult to believe that the same race is in question. As a matter of fact, the recruiting offices are overrun with applications, so much so that the Government has not been able to furnish either arms or uniforms fast enough. Nothing that is obsolete in rifles will now be accepted by the ministry of war, and only the best of materials are being used for equip-

'It is the most remarkable thing I ever heard of," said Col. Fusada, who is an officer on the retired list in the Japanese army, "this awakening of the dragon. And it may prove to be a real dragon, too, if the spirit of the present is carried to its logical full-

"Everywhere these peace-loving pe ple are talking about the army a

the navy, and what an immense force China will be in another ten years. And they are right. China will be the Germany of Asia, as Japan is now the Great Britain, if the spirit of military progress that has been awakened comes to full fruition.
