200 Casualties Are Reported in Clash at Iron Works.

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 10.-A general strike has been declared throughout Argentine Republic at midnight.

Reports early tonight show that there have been more than 200 casualties as a result of the disorders incident to the general strike. Disorders were reported today from virtually every part of the city, but the most serious fighting was at the Vasena Iron Works, where troops and strikers clashed.

Eighty Thousand Troops Are At Disposal of Government-Liebknecht's Followers Continue To Offer Strongest Resistance To Measures Adopted To Restore Order,

GOVT. TROOPS ORDERED TO SHOOT TO KILL. Berlin, Thursday, Jan. 9, 5:30 p.m.—(By the Associated Press). The Government forces are in complete control of that section of the inner city between the Brandenburg gate and Friederichstrasse. It has issued an order prohibiting all processions.

The Government has scored a decided victory in the capture of police headquarters, which has been one of the Spartacan strongholds. The building was taken by the Fusilier Guards after a short,

The Government forces took the building with few casualties. Eichshorn, the Spartacan police chief, escaped, but many of his supporters were made prisoner.

In issuing its order against processions, the Government gave 83.25; warning that its troops have orders to fire without waiting for the Spartacans to begin, and to shoot to kill.

The Spartacans apparently are losing hope. They failed to summon a mass meeting of their supporters today, and the streets are almost deserted. The streets of Berlin today were without even the usual small groups of disputants. The correspondent is informed that the Berlin regiment of mounted sharpshooters is supporting the Government enthusiastically, and that other troops in the city also are loyal.

Berlin and the Spartacus element is gradually tosing ground, though still showing great determination, according to the latest news from the German capital. Fighting raged through Tuesday night and up to noon Wednesday in various parts of the city, and there were a number of casualties.



Every season is kind to them and not one is capable of depriving the trees of beauty. The thing for which the road was made will never be fergotten, never lose in grandeur, its pathos will never e diminished nor its magnificence dimmed because all these will be proclaimed in something that lives and grows.

"A memorial road is such an excellent idea, also, because all classes will reached. High and low, rich and poor, city bred and country folk will all raverse the road, and in some stage of the journey will think at least once of the work of sacrifice and love which is thus immortalized. The road might be a modest one leading to "God's acre" or it might be planned to finally become long highway reaching from town to town, even from province to province. Have

All sections of the Dominion have benefited—manufacturers of the country. urers of war material and army supplies in Ontario and Quebec, the shipbuilding industry in British Columbia and the Maritime Provinces, the producers of cheese, eggs and dairy products, largely from Ontario, Quebec and Prince Edward Island, of beef and pork from all the provinces, and the growers of wheat and other grains on the prairie lands of the West. Our exports have n consequence been very large and remunerative, and employment has been given to all the available labor in the country at abnormally high wages.

The trade figures for the twelve months ending with November show total orts of \$895,238,297, and exports of \$1,270,145,762, the total foreign trade being \$2,165,384,059. While these figures are \$375,000,000 less than in the preceding welve months, yet they represent an enormous advance upon pre-war figures.
