Sinn Fein Cabinet Informs Government New Terms Unacceptable.

London, Dec. 5 .- The Irish peace negotiations have broken down, according to statements in responsible quarers today, and the Dail Eireann dele

gates are expected to return finally to Ireland Tuesday or Wednesday. The correspondence in connection with the negotiations will be made public by the government, it was stated, and Pre-mier Lloyd George is expected to make an explanatory statement. On the government's side, it was indi-

cated, the argument will be that the refusal of the Sinn Fein to accept allestance to the king made an agreement impossible, since that condition was inpossible, since that condition was, in addition, an essential preliminary to securing any assent from Ulster.

Opposed Consideration. The Sinn Fein, it is declared, refused even a conditional promise of allegiance contingent upon a settlement, the most it offered being to "recognize" the king is head of the commonwealth of free

rnment's latest terms satisfied the Sinn Fein delegates and the Dall Eireann cabinet, it is asserted, that they con-tained no advance on the terms of Mr. Lloyd George's original letter, which Lloyd George's original letter, when was formally rejected in July by Eamon De Valera in his speech to the Dail Parliament. Two months of negotiations with Downing street had not got the Irish any further, it was argued, and according to well-informed quarters, some of the delegates were opposed even to the consideration of the new proto the consideration of the new pro-posals by the Dail last Saturday. These delegates being satisfied that acceptance by the negotiators would not be indorsed by the Sinn Fein in Ireland.

Made Quick Decision. It did not take the Dail cabinet long to decide the issue, it appears. After a short discussion in which all the cabinet members rejected the government's proposals, Mr. De Valera turned to the delegates and said: "These are your in-structions; they are the instructions of ople of Ireland.

The opening of the fourth week of the Washington conference finds the delegates on the threshold of momentous decisions, and marking time while awaiting the words that will make these decisions possible.

The conference, it is declared, has now reached the second important stage in its deliberations. The first was the introduction of detinite propesals on a set of principles for guidance in dealing with the far eastern problem. This was followed by a consideration of details, a careful inspection of technical points by the experts, and an exchange of views in regard to the questions in volved.

Then came the stage at which the conference now finds itself, a stage

Hughes spoke first on the subject and outlined the work done so far by the Western Ontario Academy of Medicine and urged the appointing of a medical health officer to work in conjunction with the doctors of the city, so every child might be properly fitted for its coming fight in life. He outlined instances of children who

were slightly deaf and could not hear all that was said by the teacher, being classed as backward, whereas if prop-erly treated, they would be quite as bright as any other children. The same thing applied to the eyes of a child, and he advised that steps should be taken to remedy defective eyesight. Dr. G. A. Ramsay gave figures of in-

spections that were carried out in the schools of Toronto, and showed that it was absolutely necessary to have a health inspector for London if the children were to have a fair chance. Dr. W. J. Tillmann said that it was more important to have a medical offi-cer than it was to have dental inspectors, although he said that it was important to have the children's teeth attended to.
