Panama, Colombia, Nov. 4. - The revolution which occurred here yesterday and which resulted in the proclamation of the independence of the Isthmus of Panama, was not unexpected, Since Sunday last all kinds of rumors had been in circulation, but it was not until Tuesday night that the hour so long looked forward to by the inhab-Jose Arango and Frederico Boyd and other leaders of the popular movement were watched by the police. But the revolutionists fearlessly went in and out of their residences, issued their orders, and their plans were carried out. It was at first arranged that the revolution should take place at 2 a.m. on Wednesday, but when a telegram was received from Colon announcing that General Tovar, with , a detachment of 500 troops, had arrived there from Savanilla, on the cruiser Carthagena, some of the revolutionists discouraged, and it seemed likely that the movement would col-lapse. But the more determined leadof the revolutionists called on Dr. Amador and urged taking immediate action, while others advised postponing the uprising. TURKS WILL TRY TO DODGE REFORM

Diplomatists Fear Porte Will Cause Serious Trouble.

POWERS ARE FIRMLY INSISTENT

Constantinople, Nov. 5.-Diplomatists fear that Turkey intends to give the powers serious trouble in connection A Severe Brush With Natives of Old with the attempt to Christianize the Government of Macedonia. Some predict that if his majesty should yield the Moslem officials and influential private subjects of the Porte will lead a crusade against the Christians and massacre their foreign rulers. Such a catastrophe, however, is improbable, since the Sultan knows that it would mean irretrievable ruin for European Turkey. That the Porte can control the Moslem population of Macedonia when he really wishes admits of little doubt.



Chicago, Nov. 5.-Two severe electrical disturbances, one following the other so closely that in some parts of the country they seemed as one, have practically held up telephone and telegraph business in the United States, Canada and Mexico for more than 24 hours, and experts declare that similar disturbances may recur at frequent "I'll bet that bridegroom will be intervals.

The cause of the distrubance lies in some law of nature which is not yet known to scientists. It is definitely known that the aurora borealis and the aurora australis are in some way connected with the "storm," and the fact that scientists have found that the The papers got it 'Old Man's. aurora and sun spots are linked together by another unknown law is the basis of the assertion that the sun spots are the cause of the present disturbance.

Powerful currents swept in irregular waves from the north pole south through Canada, the United States and Mexico. The fact that the greatest disturbance was observed in Regina, in the Northwest Territory; Helena, Mont.; Denver and Trinidad, Col.; Las Vegas, N. M.; El Paso, Texas, and Guadalajara, Mexico, and that all of these cities are within a few miles of the 105th meridian seems to indicate that the course of the current was not so severe in Mexico as in Regina, where is reached its maximum. From the 105th meridian the current radiated east and west, and electrical machinery and instruments in every part of the country were more or less affected by it.

In Chicago telegraph and long distance telephone lines were seriously interfered with, and wireless telegraphy was almost impossible. From of the United States came reports of a brilliant display of the northern lights, and even in Chicago above the smoke of the city a faint red glow hung in the northern sky. ently blown by the wind. The disturbance first manifested itself about 1:30 in the morning, and it continued until late in the afternoon. The climax of the first "storm" came at 8:30 o'clock in the morning, and telegraph men in Chicago agree that it was the worst in years. Toward sunset the waves became less frequent, and in some parts of the country nearly ceased for a few hours. During the evening the second 'storm" began and it continued all night.





PRETTY NOVEMBER EVENT SOMETHING OF THE EARLY

Interesting Letter Written by Grandfather Campbell came in 1819, died Mr. D. G. Campbell, a Native of the Township.
