Berlin, Feb. 6.-Several women were killed and many injured in a fight with Cossacks and police today at Rostoff, on the Don, according to a dispatch from St. Petersburg. A mob of 600 angry women stormed Northwest, and it is believed to be the Novikof's factory and forced the workmen to quit. The workmen were reluctant to join the strikers, but the women demolished the machinery, making it impossible for the men to return to work. The police were summoned, and after desperate fighting, in which the women used clubs and stones, the officers routed the women and pursued them, wounding a large number of them. 





Aldermen Vote 7 to 4 Against License Change SAVE 25 PER

The agitation for a reduction in the number of licenses in the city was given a quietus, for another year at least, at the meeting of the council last evening, when the petition of the temerance people, asking that ten licenses be cut off, was defeated on a vote of

The interest taken in the matter was shown by the large attendance of citizens. It has only been on rare occasions that the city hall has held such an immense gathering. All classes were represented. The temperance people were again out in force, while judging by the applause which greeted the remarks of Solicitor Haverson, of Toronto, representing the hotelkeepers, the latter and their friends were also equally well represented. Every seat vas taken long before Mayor Campbell took his place and called the council to order. Scores of men and women were content to stand at the ends of the hall, while not a few men, in their anxiety to near the question of reducion debated, perched in the windows

The Committee's Report. Number three committee's report was submitted by Ald. Matthews, the clause relating to the licenses, recommending that the number remain as at present-36. Ald. Matthews asked to be excused from moving the adoption of the clause, and this was done by Ald. Garratt, seconded by Ald. Saunders. In amendment, Ald. Wyatt moved that the prayer of the temperance people be granted, and a bylaw introduced limiting the number of hotel licenses to 26. Ald. Gerry seconded the amend-

The temperance deputation was headed by Rev. C. T. Scott, and Rev. D. S. Hamilton, of the Dundas Street Methodist and First Congregational Churches, respectively, while the hotelkeepers were represented by Mr. Hav-erson, the solicitor for the Ontario Licensed Victuallers' Association. Mr. Scott said he would not presume to come before the council again were it not for the fact that there is a vast feeling in the city in regard to the matter. He reminded the aldermen that he did not represent the total stainers or prohibitionists only. It had been suggested that any argument advanced might not change the opinions of any of the aldermen, but he felt that as the representatives of the people they were still open to conviction. The local situation, Mr. Scott said, had been canvassed, and it was the opinion of the temperance party that there THE CHIEF RANGER of the temperance party that there were fourteen licenses that might be cut off without detriment to the public. The petition simply asked for the removal of nine, which was so reasonable that it commended itself to the people of the city. There is today in Toronto one licensed hotel to about 1,-700 population, while in London there is one for every 1,200 people. If the petition is granted, and the reduction is made, London will have one hotel for every 1,600 people-and, said Mr. Scott, we certainly want London to stand as high in this regard as Toronto. Coatsworth, St. Catherines, Belleville, Kingston, and Hamilton were cited as places having more licenses, in proportion to population, than London. So far as accommodation was encerned, it seemed to be assumed by the temperance people that boarding houses could take the place of the hotels, but they were different altogether.

The Hotel Problem.

In reference to the hotel problem, Mr. Haverson said, at the present time it was impossible to run a hotel successfully without a bar. There was an amount of injustice in taking away the livelihood of these men without making compensation for the loss sustained by them. Mr. Scott would say the hotelkeepers were wicked men, but then, said Mr. Haverson, humorously, wicked men were entitled to a little extra consideration in this world that was so, since they vould have little shown to them in 'the next, Mr. Scott's arguments savored too much of burning the candle at both ends. The continued agitation for license reduction had caused the hotelmen to refrain from improving their premises as they would if they felt secure. Cut off ten licenses now, said Mr. Haverson, and the tem-

perance people will be back again next year asking for another reduction. He never saw one of the temperance mer yet who would be satisfied with anything short of prohibition. The license the temperance people wanted to ex-periment why did they not buy the ten places to be cut off and become honestly possessed of them without causing the hotel men to lose? Replying to Mr. Haverson, Mr. Scott said the illustrations used were not pertinent to the question. When the grand jury went out of its way at a recent court to recommend that a certain hotelkeeper, who had figured so disreputably in the courts, should lose his license, surely it was evidence that

there were some places that should be cut off. The indiscriminate traffic was what the temperance people were dealing with. London had not suffered by the reduction of licenses years ago-o if it had, these philanthropists represented by Mr. Haverson had not gone down in their pockets to relieve the situation. To Mr. Scott's idea, the saddest thing in connection with the matter was Mr. Haverson's preaching of the violate the law.
