





# HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,

Thursday, 3d, February 1791.

HE Affembly having been prorogued to this day when House adjourned a fufficient number of members to compose a House not attending.

Adjourned until Saturday.

SATURDAY, 5th FEBRUARY, 1791.

The House being met pursuant to adjournment.

The Clerk of the Crown attended with a writ for the election A new member of a member for the county of Sunbury in the room of Richard returned for Kanderburgh,

Sunbury country, Vanderburgh; by the return of which it appears that James Glenie, Esquire, is duly elected.

And also with a writ for the election of a member for the city and county of Saint John in the room of Stanton Hazard, deceased; by the return of which it appears that Nehemiah Rogers, Esquire, is duly elected.

Ordered, That Major Murray and Mr. Hardy attend to see them qualified.—Who accordingly attended—and

Reported, That they had taken the usual oaths .-

Whereupon, they took their feats.

Message from His Excellency.

A message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requiring the attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

House attended His Excellency

Mr. Speaker, with the House attended accordingly, and being returned, reported that His Excellency was pleased to make the following speech to both Houses:

His Excellency's freech to both Houses.

"Gentlemen of the Council,
And Gentlemen of the Assembly,

"IIS MAJESTY's disallowance of the act passed in this province "For securing the Purchasers of Mort-" gaged Estates" having been signified to me by an order of His "MAJESTY in Council, I notified the same by proclamation on the 3d, of December last."

- "I have now further to inform you, that, by the same order in Council, His Majesty hath also been pleased to signify his Royal disallowance of the act," For regulating Elections of Representatives in General Assembly and for limiting the Duration of Assemblies in this Province."
- "As a law, providing for these important objects, is essential to the completion of our Colonial Constitution, I recommend the revisal of this last mentioned act to your consideration; being persuaded that a similar act, with such amendment as a review of the subject may suggest, would be fanctioned by the Royal approbation."
- "Copies shall be laid before you of the papers transmitted to "me on this occasion, together with some others respecting the act" For regulating Marriage and Divorce."
  - "Gentlemen of the Affembly,
- "An account of the warrants issued for payment of the sums granted in the last Session shall be laid before you.
  - The public roads must for some years, continue to be one great

- "great object of your attention nor can I doubt your zeal in providing for a service so essential to the progress of settlement · " and cultivation in this country.
- "It is also highly requisite that some provision be made for the 44 decent accommodation of the General Affembly and the Courts · " of Justice. I have therefore directed a plan for this purpose " to be prepared and submitted to your consideration.
  - "Gentlemen of the Council, " And Gentlemen of the Affembly,
- "I have received a letter from one of His MAJESTY's Princi-" pal Secretaries of State, announcing the death of His Royal "Highness the Duke of Cumberland; which melancholy event . " happened on the 18th day of September last, to the great " grief of their MAJESTIES and all the Royal Family.
- "The vigor and dispatch with which the necessary prepara-" tions for war have been made, on the part of Great Britain, " have enabled His MAJESTY to terminate the negotiations with " the Court of Spain in such manner as to secure inviolate the " national honor and preserve the bleffings of peace to his people, - " at a time when a bloody and expensive war seemed inevitable.
- " I am happy to congratulate you, Gentlemen, on this occa-" fion, and the more so, from a conviction that the inhabitants " of this province, who have shewn how highly they value their " birth-right as British subjects, will derive peculiar satisfaction . " from an event so interesting to the whole empire, and which " reflects, so true a lustre on His MAJESTY's administration."

- The public roads are so essential to the progress of settlement and cultivation in this country, that they must continue for some years to be one great object of our consideration.
- "We shall pay all due attention to the plan which your Excellency has directed to be prepared and laid before us, as the decent accommodation of the General Affembly and the Courts of Judice, are objects exceedingly definable.
- "We hear, with much regret, of the death of His Royal Histories the Duke of Cumberland and fincerely sympathize with their MAJESTIES and all the Royal Family in their great see grief on that melancholy occasion.
- " It gives us much fatisfaction to learn that the vigor and es dispatch with which the necessary preparations for war have been made on the part of Great Britain, have enabled His Majarry to terminate the negotiations with the Court of 55 Spain in fuch a manner as to fecure inviolate the national honor, preserve the bleffinge of peace to his people, and avoid the calamities attending a bloody and expensive war.
- "We are happy in returning your Excellency's congratulati-" one on this great event, in which, as British subjects we feel er ourselves deaply interested, convinced that the consequences of war would have been fenfibly felt by the inhabitants of this of province in E's present infant state.
- "The convision impressed on your Excellency's mind of " the just value we place on the constitutional blessings we derive from our birth right, affords us fincere pleasure, and we " shall always derive peculiar satisfaction from every event that " reflects lustre on His Majesty's administration."
