The Sun Building Fire.

We have been through the fire. Since we last visited our readers The COLCHESTER SUN has received a severe scolding. On Thursday evening of last week, at about seven o'clock, after the Sun had been regularly mailed to all its patrons, and the principal business of the week being apparently well and properly done, we were sitting quietly and contentedly in our sanctum, writing an article for their next issue, when the dreadful cry of "fire" reached our ears. On proceeding to the street to learn the cause, in less time than it takes to write it we were soon painfully aware of the fact that the roof of our own dwelling house was on fire. We were not, however, going to trouble our readers with a full description of the scene which followed, sufficient to say that subsequent information has proved conclusively that a spark from a chimney ignited the roof in the rear, through which the fire passed into the attic and furring, and was probably burning behind the plastered walls for an hour or two before it finally reached the front where it was discovered.

The firemen were promptly on hand and worked earnestly and well to subdue the fire, but owing to a stoppage in the water-pipes caused by the frost of last winter, there was no force to the streams, and the building was damaged, as appeared to the extent of \$1500.00. It was insured to the amount of \$1000 in the North British and Mercantile Ins. Co., and from the prompt and satisfactory manner in which the local agents of the Co., Messrs. Longworth & Layton, are settling, we expect shortly to acknowledge a cheque for that amount.

In the matter of furniture we do not fare so well, as some of the best was stored in the attic rooms from which nothing was saved, and by an oversight, a clause that existed in a former policy—the risk being transferred—preventing us on furniture, was left out of the later policy. But we do not fret over it, as we have enough left to make us comfortable.

The destruction to flat and jobbing papers, books, types, is very considerable and will for some time to come cause us considerable inconvenience, and we may here say that this is the cause of our diminutive appearance on this occasion, but if the "Citizens Insurance Company of Canada," which office this portion of our establishment is insured, will do us justice, we hope soon again to appear with all our canvases spread.

We desire to return our sincere thanks to the friends and citizens of Truro for their indefatigable exertions in saving our property, and to the many friends who have shown such a large measure of kindness and sympathy towards us. We have not space now to enumerate the many kind letters we have received, but those who have sent them may rest assured that their kindness is duly appreciated.

ECONOMY ITEMS.

Our veteran ship builder Robert Lewis, Esq., has commenced work at his ship, the largest that has ever been built in this County, and which in the Province, being 235 feet long and her other dimensions in proportion, her frames are rapidly going up and she will soon be a monster pile of timber mechanically constructed and arranged. In a previous number of your paper it was noticed that Conductor McKenzie saw had suffered some damage during the winter from ice. In contrast to that, A. K. Macdonald passed through the winter safely and is supposed now to be quite so healthy, you numerous readers will please overlook and send a dissent from the great to the small.

The farmers are as busy as leavers not scattering the piles of manure mud that they quite enjoyed in the winter, ploughing it in, and then planting the ground with potatoes.

Miller & Co. intend starting their mill in a few days, they have a large quantity of logs, hauled about two miles up the stream from their mill. C. E. Cotton & Co. have enlarged the interior of their store, and stocked it with a large quantity of salable goods, trade has commenced to flow in their direction and they do not doubt but they will do a good business this season.

Councillor T. F. McKenzie left for Boston on Friday morning last.

Promotion on the I. C. R.

Some important changes in the staff of the Government Railways were made on Saturday. The changes were occasioned by the resignation of Luther B. Archibald, Esq., Superintendent of the P. E. Island Railway, Mr. Archibald having accepted a position—the Superintendent of a division—the Halifax—on the Pacific Railway. The vacancy thus made was filled by the appointment of James Coleman, Esq., Superintendent of the Halifax and St. John's division; Mr. J. J. Williams, Traffic Auditor, succeeding Mr. Coleman, Mr. Joseph R. Brown, Chief Clerk to the Chief Superintendent, taking the office vacated by Mr. Williams, and Mr. Thomas Evans, second clerk in the Chief's office, succeeding Mr. Brown.

We congratulate Mr. Archibald on his well deserved promotion. The press generally speak highly of him, the only exception so far as we know is the *Charlottetown News*, which accuses him of being "a narrow minded sectarian bigot." The words are as ridiculous, as applied to L. B. A., who is so ventures to assert, never in his life, encountered feelings towards any man, or any party, which he could only express in the brain of the editor, who, as the words are so foolishly applied, plainly shows, as attested by selfish motives, owing to that fact that some advertising paragraphs had been withdrawn from the columns of the *News*.

In like manner we only know of one paper that has a word to say against Mr. James Coleman, and we are of the opinion that the assertions of that paper regarding the qualifications of any railway man will have little weight with the public. Mr. Coleman has managed the business of this part of the I. C. R. with quite as much credit to himself, as usually falls to the lot of Division Superintendents.

He was very weak but restored to normal and eventually sank rapidly and died a few minutes ago about 3 p. m.
