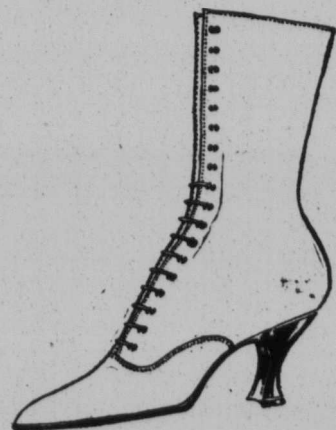

North'd West Wins Flag And Crest

The 1919 Victory Loan has come to a close and Northumberland has once again gone "over the top." Most of the parishes have won the Prince of Wales Honor Flag and in some cases are entitled to fly the Prince's Crest.

The parishes with their objectives and the amounts subscribed are as follows:

Northumberland West wins the Prince of Wales Honor Flag and one crest for passing the objective by 25%.

Blackville wins the Flag and three crests, Bilsfield, Derby and Nelson each win a Flag.

It was much more difficult to make the people realize the need of this loan, and the patriotic appeal was not so apparent as in former years. On account of this the County has occasion to feel proud of its record and the canvassers can congratulate themselves for their good work.

Regular Meeting Town Council

The Regular meeting of the Newcastle town council was held in the Police Court Room on Thursday, November 20th, 1919 at 8 o'clock p. m.

Present Mayor Doyle, Ald. Durick, Fish, Jeffrey, MacKay and Sargeant.

A communication from the Busy East Press Ltd. was read requesting the preparation of an article for free publication in the December number. It was moved by Ald. MacKay, seconded by Ald. Durick, and carried that the matter be left in the hands of the Chairman of the Publicity Committee to confer with the Secretary of The Board of Trade or any other person who might assist in the preparation of such article.

A communication from the Aero Club of Canada regarding the establishment of a municipal aerodrome was read, and it was moved by Ald. Fish, seconded by Ald. Sargeant, and carried that the Town Clerk be authorized to reply, saying that the Town is not in a position to consider the establishment of a municipal aerodrome but would be willing to render all assistance possible in the choice of a site or in any way it might be done.

The Public Works Committee recommended payment of the following bills which were passed and ordered paid.

The chairman of the Police Committee reported that Mr. George Mulse had been temporarily appointed night Policeman under the same conditions and at the same salary as his predecessor and recommended that the appointment be made permanent. Notice To Returned Soldiers

By Order-in-Council, dated October 16, 1919, no ex-members of the Canadian Naval or Military Forces shall be entitled to the benefits of re-training under the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishing, unless application for courses of retraining is made within three months from the 1st day of November, 1919, provided that where the date of retirement or discharge of any ex-member of the Canadian Naval or Military Forces is subsequent to the 1st November, 1919, provided also that where an ex-member of the Forces has been transferred or passed directly from the Department of Militia and Defence to the Department of the Naval Service to the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment for a continuation of treatment such ex-members of the Forces shall be allowed three months from the date of retirement or discharge or from the completion of such treatment in which to make application for the benefits of such re-training. Applications for re-training of soldiers eligible in New Brunswick, should be addressed to: "District Vocational Officer, D. S. C. R. at one of the following addresses, which ever is nearest to home of applicant:—Fredericton Hospital, Fredericton, N. B.; Merchants' Bank Building, Prince William Street, St. John; or 100 Queen Street, Moncton, N. B.

Want Exhibition For Newcastle

The annual meeting of Agricultural Society No. 122, was held last Friday afternoon in the Town hall. William M. Johnston, president of the society, was in the chair. The president, in his report, gave an account of the potato convention, held in Woodstock, when addresses were given as to the handling of this crop. It had been urged that farmers give more care to the selection of seed and greater attention to the growing of potatoes on account of the rivalry which would soon appear in the market. It had been pointed out that in Northern Ontario the farmers were going extensively into potato raising.

The report of the secretary-treasurer showed the society to be in a flourishing condition with a substantial balance in the bank.

The directors for the ensuing year were selected as follows: G. G. Stob-Pitch, J. D. Goodfellow, James Young, Charles Sargeant, H. Whitney, D. J. Doyle, George Lake, W. M. Johnston, M. The World's Greatest Carillon for Capital of United States

Washington, Nov. 14—Washington will have the greatest of all memorials to America's illustrious dead, if the plan of the Arts Club of Washington, to erect a national carillon is carried out; and apparently it will be, for the idea conceived by a Washington artist, J. Marion Shull, has the approval of many leaders in national affairs. Within a few years, therefore, a shaft of granite rising 300 feet is likely to grace a height overlooking the Potomac. In its tower will be the finest carillon the most expert bell-founders of the world can produce, the bells themselves cast from the remnants of shells which once screeched and thundered in the greatest of all wars. The structure will be of international as well as national significance. Each State will contribute a bell, suitably inscribed, as will the District of Columbia, the Philippines, Hawaii, Alaska, Cuba, and Porto Rico. Into the walls, through gifts from England, France, Belgium and Italy, and the new-born republics, will be incorporated various war souvenirs—blocks from the sacred churches and towers of France, Belgium and Italy which were tumbled in confusion by the ruthless hand of hate; and structural materials from the Marne, Liege, Louvain and Mons, Ypres and Verdun. Eventually the Powers will be permitted to give works of art signifying the deeper fraternity of the Allied people.

Tower Will Contain . . . Bells

It is the purpose of the directors of the movement that the carillon shall commemorate all the dead who fought side by side—a carillon which shall speak forth from year to year the nation's joys and sorrows; ring out the departing President and give greeting to the newly chosen chief; and do homage to the great who come to the seat of Government. Congress has been asked to make available 200,000 pounds of shell cases salvaged from the battlefields of Europe, from which the bells will be cast, and letters have been addressed to the ambassadors of the Allied nations indicating a willingness to accept quantities of like material as a gift of sentiment of their peoples. The masters, Joseph Denyn, of Malines, Belgium, has tendered his services to assure final success, while the world is at the service of the committee.

With the preliminary work completed, the committee will begin raising \$5,000,000 by public subscription, and members of the American Institute of Architects will compete for the honor of submitting the most acceptable design. The tower will contain fifty-four bells tuned chromatically, a greater number than in any other. The various States will raise the funds for their respective bells which will range in weight from one of a few pounds to one of ten tons. The State campaigns, in some instances, may be conducted by a committee appointed by the governor, and in others by inscription of the State's own choosing. For example:

In Commemoration of the Sons of MASSACHUSETTS Who Gave Their Lives That Freedom Might Not Perish From The Earth

Symbolize Genius of Mankind.

From time immemorial in all lands men have built towers for worship, honor or defence, and miles away these massive structures have stood out against the skyline as symbols of the genius and glory of the human race, while from their summits tidings of joy and of sorrow have been shouted to assembled multitudes. Everywhere bells in church towers have called people to worship for a thousand years. In addition, in many countries nearly every city has had its own municipal bell tower. In most cases these towers, whether ecclesiastical or civic, have been provided only with single bells which often have been inharmonious, but here and there in foreign lands at least, fine musical effects have been produced.

In the Low Countries bordering the North Sea, especially in Belgium and Holland, "tower music" has reached a high development. In Belgium, the carillon, composed of thirty or forty bells, has taken the place of chimes, with a marvelous improvement in the quality of the music. Chimes are composed of a few bells, are rung by swinging, and, being diatonic have a narrow musical range. The bells of a carillon are fixed and immovable, are rung by hammers, and are played automatically by hand on a keyboard, like an organ or piano. The bells of a carillon have a range of four octaves or more; and, consequently, have almost as many tones and half-tones as a piano.

tries is an honored profession, having its Bauers and Paderewskis, master bell players known everywhere. Those who have heard the music of the bells of Antwerp or Bruges, of Ghent or Louvain, drifting over a whole city and far into the quiet countryside of a summer evening, do not need to be told how wonderful it is when a master player is at the keyboard. For centuries the bell bowers of Belgium and Holland have stood for communal life and service, civil and religious liberty, individual and national freedom. In the old days they rang out the Duke of Alva and his minions, in Napoleonic days they were rallying points of civic liberty, and in every great crisis they have cheered and heartened tens of thousands.

The carillon of Ghent rang out in December 1814, at the signing of the treaty of peace between the United States and Great Britain, and but for the outbreak of the Great War in 1914, it would have celebrated one hundred years of peace for the two nations. As a result of the World War, many of the Belgian bell towers are now sorrowful ruins, but they called a brave people to the defence of their land. Some of the master bellmen, as history will record, played defiant music until the Germans were at the very gates of the city. Many of the bells were desecrated and their metal recast for purposes of war. Others were stolen. The latter will be returned. The ruined towers will be rebuilt, but meanwhile there is silence in the land. In our own country we have nothing to correspond to the Belgian and Dutch carillons. All our best towers have only fine chimes composed of a few bells.

Belgian Embassy Gives Advice.

It was this very fact that gave Mr. Shull the idea of a national carillon for America; and the publication of his idea in newspapers and magazines attracted general attention. This was in November 1918, when cities and towns the country over were planning memorials for their returning soldier boys. The Arts Club of Washington took up the plan, and what has come to be known as the National Peace Carillon Executive Committee composed of W. B. Westlake, Dr. Edwin F. Smith, Captain W. I. Chambers, U. S. N. and Mr. Sull, was formed.

The committee has worked out its plans and at last is ready to begin its public work. The members have consulted with national officials and with experts at home and abroad. Members of the two branches of Congress have agreed to sponsor the measures making it possible for the committee to secure the metal for the bells, while arrangements have been made with the Fine Arts Commission to select the site for the tower and approve its design. Perhaps the most troublesome question, has been the proper location for the tower. The French and Belgian embassies in Washington have urged the committee not to locate the tower in the centre of the city, asserting that this is the great mistake made by their home countries. The committee and the commission are inclined now to select a plot of land on Sixteenth street Heights near the centre of the population but still removed from the noise of the business section.

'Something the World Has Never Heard.'

One of the first men to write the committee was Joseph Denyn, who may give the first concert in Washington. "With my apologies for replying in French," he wrote, "I have the honor to advise you that I consider the firm of John Taylor & Company, bell founders, of Loughborough, England, the most capable to perfect the installation of the contemplated carillon. I think now that I should call your attention that it is necessary that the architect, before deciding definitely on the plan of the tower,

receive certain instructions from the bell master. You may depend upon my collaboration to assure final success."

Accepting the advice of M. Denyn, the committee communicated with the Loughborough concern, which replied that the carillon should be chromatic upwards from a largest bell of 22,400 pounds. "Your inquiry," he letter continues, "as to a scale of fifty-four bells just fits in with this, for it suggests at once the increasing of the scale of a carillon of forty-nine bells, similar to that which we are founding now for the City Hall of Rotterdam, by five lower semitones. The additional notes you propose would make the grandest carillon in the world. The musical effect would be something that the world has never heard before. The total weight of the fifty-four bells would be about 145,500 pounds, and the cost, including fittings framework, connections, clavier, delivered f. o. b., English port, would be about £20,000. Relative to the dimensions that the internal size be not less than thirty feet square by thirty feet high, the floor level of the bell chamber to be about 200 feet above the ground floor level.

"There are many important details in connection with this chamber which should be debated with the architect. Mr. E. D. Taylor was present at the consecration of the Queenstown Cathedral. (The Queenstown Cathedral was consecrated August 25 last. M. Nauwecaerts' magnificent playing displayed the beautiful round tone of the bells and the consummate perfection of the tuning. At Queenstown the ear is perfectly at rest as far as tone is concerned. The bells are in absolute accord in any key the

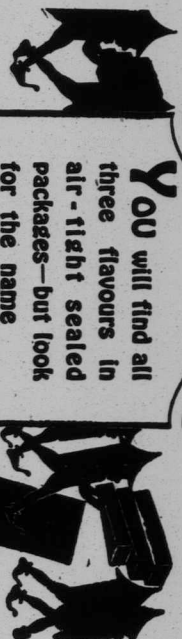

The World's Greatest Carillon for Capital of United States

player wishes to use, and the mind is at liberty to enjoy to the full the efforts of the artist at the keyboard."

Tuned to a single vibration. The installing of the carillon in Washington should be of great interest to musicians and music lovers of the country. If it could have a similar influence than making music uplift and educate, making music of the highest quality familiar to all within hearing distance.

Most of us have dimmes, some good, some bad, but real music of the bells should not be judged even by the best of dimmes, and certainly not by bad or indifferent ones which are hanging or dissonant.

Van der Streton says: "A fine carillon is as precious as a violin by Stradivarius." Moreover, the best of modern bells are now tuned with such a degree of accuracy as was not possible many years ago. In these days, methods of determining the exact number of vibrations produced have enabled the great bell founders to work with a certainty and precision that their predecessors dreamed of. The carillon at Queenstown is tuned like a modern piano and is chromatic throughout so that music may be played with equal facility in any key and with unlimited powers of modulation. The forty-two bells of the carillon are said to be tuned to the accuracy of a single vibration.

To Commemorate Heroes of Right.

The committee's desire to have the bells cast from metals salvaged from the battlefields was based originally on sentimental grounds. By study, they have found that their proposal is not new—that bells have been cast from cannon for centuries past. More than 200 years in 1710 to be exact, Emperor Joseph I, of Austria, had a great bell cast from Turkish cannon and placed in the tower of St. Stephen's at Vienna. This, known as the Emperor Bell, weighed seventeen tons. But the bell, although it symbolized a triumph of the Christian over the Turk, was also meant to glorify the emperor's military might. Again, in 1887, no less than twenty-two French guns were used to cast the "glorious," another great bell that was raised with much ceremony in its place in Cologne Cathedral, there to join the Emperor Bell in derision over defeated France. The carillon proposed for Washington has an entirely different purpose, namely, to commemorate the heroes of Allied lands who fought for right, not might.

TESTING SEEDS FOR FARMERS AND MERCHANTS

The Dominion Seed Branch with laboratories at Ottawa, Winnipeg and Calgary reported over 36,000 seed tests for the year ending June 30th. The growth of seed testing in Canada is indicated from the fact that only 5,775 samples were reported in 1909. The great bulk of the work in our seed laboratory may handle up to 200 samples per day. Only ten samples are tested free of charge for any farmer or seed merchant during the season. Over this number, the service is charged for at cost. Official seed testing is the basis of Government seed control, which in older European countries is rated as a leading Government service to Agriculture. Any country without an efficient system of seed control soon becomes the dumping ground for inferior seeds from other countries and low-grade homegrown seeds may be sold to unsuspecting farmers. Our system is frequently referred to in other countries as being the most practical and efficient. Its importance is now being better appreciated when it is required that imported seeds are not released from bond until they are approved at the seed laboratories, and when clover and grass seeds, as well as clover and grass seeds, are marketed on the basis of fixed quality seed grade standards.

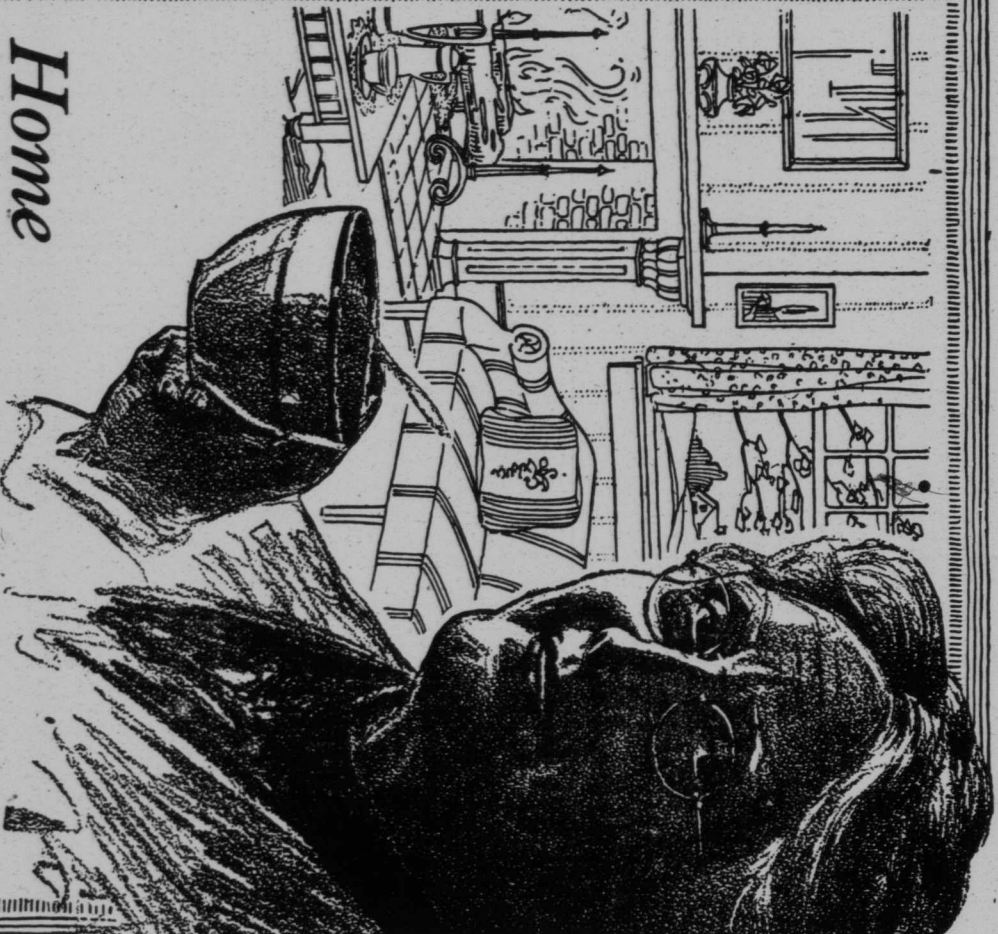

Although Fraser Saunders, Assistant Chief Liquor Inspector, was unable to catch the man who was carrying the "goods," he succeeded in capturing two suit cases containing eight gallons of whiskey from a man on the Maritime Express coming into Newcastle early Thursday morning.

The train was nearly Newcastle and was about to stop for water when the inspector noticed the man with two suit cases which appeared to be quite heavy, and which the owner was handling very carefully. He stepped over to the man and took hold of one of the suit cases. As soon as the man realized that an inspector was on the trail he dropped both suit cases and jumped off the train.

The inspector started after him, but was unable to catch him, and the man made a successful getaway, as it was just about daybreak, when it was impossible to notice in what direction he went.

While the man made a successful getaway yesterday morning, it is said that he did not escape identification and a warrant will be issued for his arrest.

Moncton Worried Over Gas Supply

Moncton, Nov. 18—A mass meeting of the pastors and official boards of the city churches together with the citizens was held tonight in the city hall and presided over by Judge Chandler. The recent finding of the New Brunswick Public Utilities Commission relative to the conservation of natural gas in so far as it effected schools and churches was under lengthy discussion. Two resolutions were finally adopted by the meeting. The first, after expressing concurrence with the Utilities Board in their efforts to conserve gas, called upon the board to so amend their order that the smaller churches and larger schools had already made preparations to use other fuels.

The second resolution expressed the belief that the present supply of natural gas was likely to be diminished and asked the Utilities Board to further prohibit the use of gas by manufacturers, and also to prohibit the domestic consumption in any places at present equipped with appliances for the use of coal and wood.

The meeting resulted from a smaller meeting of the church boards held one week ago, and was called by Mayor Price at the request of the first meeting. Mayor Price did not attend the meeting tonight.

Peace Treaty To Go Into Effect December 1st

Paris Nov. 20—While Supreme Council did not positively decide today to put the Peace Treaty with Germany into effect on December 1st, its members all agreed it would be desirable to do so. An effort will be made to have all preparations for the enforcement of the treaty completed by that date, and it will probably be put into effect very early in December, regardless of the failure of the United States to ratify the Treaty.

The American delegates declare themselves hopeful that a compromise will be arranged in the Senate, but the French and British peace delegates are apparently less optimistic and inclined to prepare to carry out the treaty without American co-operation. Suggestions that another treaty, more to the liking of the European Allies, be negotiated apparently are not seriously taken.

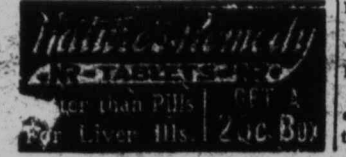

War Hero Now Gains 24 Pounds

The Canadian Poultry Situation

No branch of food production has suffered during the war to a greater extent than that of poultry and eggs. In many countries of Europe it has almost disappeared, while in others scarcity of feed and high prices and the closing of markets have compelled serious reductions of poultry flocks. The need thus created is regarded by Mr. W. A. Brown, chief of the Poultry Division of the federal Livestock Branch, as Canada's opportunity to pave the way for a permanent place in the export trade to Great Britain. Mr. Brown expressed this opinion at the first Canadian National Poultry Conference, held in Ottawa this year, the report of which has been published and is available at the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa. It was strongly urged at that conference that this is the time of co-operation. The provinces were recommended to co-operate with the Dominion as the great clearing house of operations calculated to promote the industry. The poultry industry was recommended as a means of soldiers' re-establishment by Mr. W. J. Black, Chairman of the Land Settlement Board. He expressed the hope that he would see a small flock of poultry about the homes of every returned soldier who becomes settled on the land.

A Courteous Hint.

F.W. Sumner Died Suddenly In St. John

F. W. Sumner Agent General for New Brunswick in Great Britain, died suddenly Thursday afternoon at the Royal Hotel shortly after three o'clock. The news spread quickly about the city, and was received with many expressions of surprise and grief.

Mr. Sumner arrived from Moncton on the noon train, accompanied by his wife, and his daughter, Mrs. McDouall. After lunch at the Royal Hotel he went to the rotunda and sat down in his chair there. Shortly before three o'clock, Mr. Murdock, an engineer of the Northern Electric, and Mr. Nesbitt, of the same company, noticed that Mr. Sumner appeared ill. He was at once taken to his room, and Dr. Addy was summoned by telephone. The doctor soon arrived, but in spite of all he could do, Mr. Sumner passed away at twenty minutes past three. Death was due to acute indigestion, complicated by heart trouble. Deceased had had several serious attacks of illness recently, and seven or eight years ago underwent an operation in Montreal.

When Mr. Sumner was taken ill messengers were sent out in search of his wife and daughter who had gone shopping, and they were found in a shop and hurried to the hotel. A meeting of the Board of Directors of the New Brunswick Telephone Company, which Mr. Sumner had come to St. John to attend, was in progress, and when the Board was notified by telephone of his sudden death it adjourned out of respect to his memory.

The remains were taken to Moncton on the late train Thursday night. Mr. Sumner was one of the best known business men of the province, and had also taken an active interest in its political life for many years. Some years ago he accepted the position of Agent General for New Brunswick in London, stipulating that he was to receive no salary for his work. While his large business interests frequently called him back to Canada, he spent most of the years in London, and as Agent General extended a hearty welcome to New Brunswick soldiers visiting London, as well as to business men and travellers. The work of his office during the war was arduous and important, for he made a point of keeping in touch with the wounded men of the province as far as possible and letting their relatives know how they were getting on. He was frequently called upon by people of the province to undertake special missions on behalf of their soldiers, and his work in this connection was much appreciated.

Besides conducting a large hardware business at Moncton, Mr. Sumner was identified with many important business enterprises. He was president of the Atlantic Underwear Co. Ltd., one of the thriving industries of Moncton; president of the New Brunswick Petroleum Co., president of the Kent Freestone Co.; president of the Kent Brunswick Wire Fence Co.; director of the Moncton Tramways, Electric and Gas Company; director of the New Brunswick Telephone Co.; director of the New Brunswick Gas and Oilfields Co. Ltd., and director of the Humphrey's Glass Co. Ltd.

Politically he was a Conservative, and in 1908 he was an unsuccessful candidate for the House of Commons

for Westmorland. He took a great interest in the municipal affairs of Moncton, and was mayor of that city for six terms. He was at one time president of the Moncton Hospital Commission, and when the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium was established he was appointed a commissioner of that institution. He was Honorary President of the Canadian Club of Moncton, and the Royal Automobile Club of London, England. He was also a prominent member of the A. F. and A. M. and in religion was a Baptist.

Mr. Sumner was born in Moncton in 1855, and was educated at the private school in Moncton, and the Model School, Truro, N. S. In 1879 he was married to Margaret T. McEwen, Moncton. He leaves one son, Roy who is in New York, and two daughters. The funeral was held in Moncton on Sunday at 2.30 p. m.

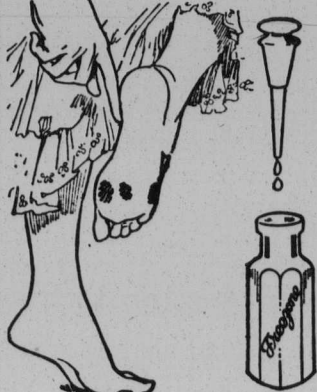

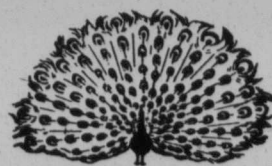

**U.S. Senate Failed
To Ratify Treaty**

Washington, D. C., Nov. 19—After
three ineffectual attempts to ratify
the Peace Treaty had failed the Sen-
ate late tonight gave up the attempt
and laid the treaty aside.

All compromise efforts to bring
ratification failed, the three resolu-
tions of ratification all going down
by overwhelming majorities. The
Republican leaders, apparently de-
spairing of bringing two-thirds of the
Senate together for any sort of ratifi-
cation, then put in a resolution to
declare the war at an end.

Two of the ratification votes were
taken on the resolution drafted by
the Republican majority, containing
reservations which President Wilson
had told Democratic Senators, in a
letter earlier in the day, would mean
nullification of the Treaty. On each
of the votes most of the Democratic
supporters voted against ratification.

Final Decision.
Republican Leader Lodge declared
today's voting constituted a final de-
cision on the Peace Treaty, unless
President Wilson circumvented the
Senate rule by withdrawing it and
then submitting it again to the Senate
in other quarters there was some dif-
ference of opinion, but sentiment
seemed to be that there was only a
slender chance that the treaty would
come up at the beginning of the next
session of Congress, being next month.
One effect of the Senate's failure to
ratify the Treaty will be the contin-
uation of various war time laws and
regulations at least until the new
session opens. Among these is the
War Time Prohibition Act.

The resolution presented tonight
to declare a state of peace will come
up at the beginning of the new ses-
sion, and is expected to start another
stubborn fight. The administration
is understood to be opposed to such
a method of legally ending the war
and in the background is a constitu-
tional question as to whether Con-
gress can do so by a resolution not
requiring the President's signature.

It was suggested tonight among
Democratic Senators that President
Wilson might be asked during the
recess to feel out the other powers as
to their attitude on reservations with
the idea of bringing the Treaty to
some sort of a ratification after Con-
gress reassembles.

Treaty Laid Aside.

The second vote on the majority's
ratification resolution was made pos-
sible by the mild reservationists who
voted with the Democrats to get the
measure before the Senate, and thus
give an opportunity for any eleventh
hour compromise proposition. Once
that should be accomplished, however,
the mild group held out against all
efforts of the Democrats, to put to
their substitutes reservations, so that
when the second vote was reached,
after several hours of sparring, the
situation was virtually unchanged.
The Treaty, which has been before
the Senate many weeks, is now laid
aside.

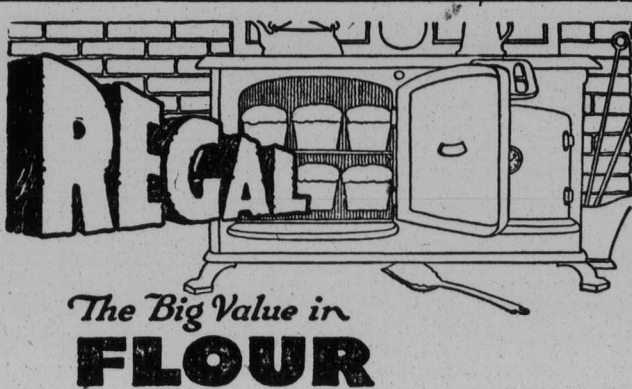
