New Flying Record

Dayton, O., April 17-Climaxing a day of superior flying. Lieut. John A. MacReady and Oakley Kelly landed the Fokker monoplane T-2 at 9.43 o'clock to-night, established a new world's record for sustained flying. They were in the air 36 hours, 5 minutes and 20 seconds. In addition nine other records were made.

Carrying a deadweight of 2, 422 pounds, a navy biplane piloted by Lieut. Rutledge Irvine, Washington, D. C., gained an altitude of 11,300 feet over McCook Field this afternoon. This is the highest altitude ever gained by a single motored ship, carrying this much weight.

19th Of April A Day Of Anniversaries

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 9-If any day of the American year were to be called Anniversary Day, the 19th of April probably would be the choice. More events of importance to the United States have occurred on this date than on any other. The birth of Roger Sherman (1721) and the speech of Edmund Burke against taxing the colonies (1774) were pre Revolutionary events Made By Aviators which came on April 19.

"It was by the village clock" 48 years ago this morning when Paul Revere galloped into Lexington to rouse the Minute Men for the first fighting of the Revolution.

Seventy-five years later, on the 19th of April 1850 there was a more peaceful meeting of the United States and England in the signing of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty for the joint occupancy of the proposed canal across Central

In the war between the States. as in the Revolution, April 19 saw the first shedding of blood the attack on the Sixth Massachusetts Infantry in the streets of Baltimore in 1861.

On April 19, 1917, the first American shot was fired in the World War, the naval crew of the merchantman Mongolia directing it against a German submarine. One year later, on April 19, 1918, THIS WEEK the first important American engagement of the war occurred at Seichebrey.







Liverpool, April 1-Imports for the past month were moderate, the consumption fairly steady and there is no material alteration in Stocks which although light are apparently sufficient for the time being. Values generally are firmer.

New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Spruce Pine Deals, &c .- The Liners to Liverpool and Manchester brought forward 1.440 Standards. With de liveries rather more than double this quantity stocks are down to 8.040 Standards, compared with 5,640 Standards at the end of March last year. On the whole there was an improved tone in the market and values steady throughout with a tendency to harden. A small amount of forward business was arranged, but owing to good American demand Shippers' prices are firmer. Pine Deals-The stock is practically ex-

Birch- Logs-About 9,000 cubic feet came forward, all to Liverpool. The demand was rather slow, but stocks are within moderate com pass. Canada led the world in 1922 in the export of raw furs to the United States. The total fur catch for that year was over 4,009,000 petts, valued at \$16,000,000. While the general price of furs shows a downward trend, the total catch shows a remarkable increase.

Four of the Canadian Pacific "Empress" liners, the Britain, the France, the Scotland and the India, are to load grain at Quebec during the 1923 season, and new berths have been provided for these vessels near the grain conveyors, at a cost of \$300,000.

When she was alighting from a street car in Vancouver, Mrs. Rose McLaren received injuries which prevented her from concentrating and temporarily did away with her earning power as a spiritualist or psychic roader. She was awarded \$1,250 against the railway company.

The addition of the 17,000-ton "Montlaurier" to the Canadian Pacific "Mono Class" fleet marks an important development. Not only is she the largest one-class-cabin ship sailing to and from Canadian ports, but she is the largest in her class on the Atlantic. Her length is 613 feet and breadth 68 feet. Because of her size she will sail to and from Quebec. size she will sail to and from Quebec.

Approximately 8,000 tons of silver ore are waiting shipment from the Keno Hill, Yukon, mines. This quantity represents the winter haul. Another 2,000 tons may be moved this summer, making the total silver shipments ten thousand tons for 1923. Such an output is worth about \$2,000,000, high grade ore running from \$200 to \$300 per ton.

portation to my knowledge," said C. E. Stockdill, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, recently, "was the movement of the grain crop of 1922."

From Sept. 1 to Nov. 31, a period of 91 days, the Canadian Pacific Railway loaded and shipped an average of 1,265 cars per day. This reage of 1,265 cars per day. This requiring the dispatching of a train every 45 minutes during that entire period, carrying more than 1,000,000 bushels daily. This movement exceeded even that of the bumper crop year of 1915.

One of the many instances of the splendid work carried out at the Liverpool docks is afforded by the Canadian Pacific liner "Metagama." On a recent arrival at that port she started the discharge of her cargo and coaling at 6 o'clock in the morning. Allowing for the usual dinner hour, she took on board in her side bunkers 1,000 tons of coal, which was completed by 2.45 the same afternoon. At the same time she discharged 1,700 tons of cargo, the greater part of which consisted of package freight, completing this operation by 7.15 the same evening.


