HOW CAMEBON WAS "DOWNED"

Mr M. C. Cameron was defeated in West Huron by a very narrow majority. The constituency was getry mandered in 1832, but Mr Cameron managed to save his seat in the election of that year. Last week the seat was bought from under him. From Saturday till Tuesday the constituency awarmed with boodlers, including scores of men who had never been seen before. These bribers must have been sent in by the order of Sir John Macdonald, who has good reason to want to keep Mr Cameron out of the House of Commons. The ex-member for West Huron is in the ha-bit of calling a spade a spade, and he has an ugly fashien of proving his statements in the presence of the men he accuses, How the Tories do hate him ! There are men in Hamilton who used to be Reformers, men who profess to be Christians, who voted contidence in Sir John Macdonald last week. If asked why they dil so, they will say they wanted to preserve the National Policy of protection.
