



Are Your Eyes Weak?

Clean-Up Day.

It must be highly gratifying to the City Council, and particularly to Councilor Coaker who suggested a Clean-Up Day, that citizens have so warmly endorsed the idea of a spring cleaning for the city, and that so many have signified their intention of taking a part in it either personally or by deputy. Much can be done by giving the city streets and drains a good scraping on Monday and by removing the refuse to a place where it can be destroyed. If that is done the city will have made a good start before the warm weather sets in, and then if householders, shopkeepers and business men generally cooperate heartily in future with the Council and the Health Authorities, we may keep the city clean. Yesterday we indicated one way in which this could be done daily with little trouble to individuals, but much benefit to the community. It will be remembered we suggested that all combustible refuse be burnt instead of being dumped on the streets or into receptacles on the streets. This would relieve the Sanitary Staff considerably and assist materially in keeping the city clean and tidy.

We again remind our readers that Monday is Clean-Up Day, and that the City Council is inviting the cooperation of citizens generally in the good work.

Magistrate's Mistake.

MAKES OFF WITH MINISTER'S VALISE.

When the Prospero was returning southward this week a clergyman and a magistrate embarked on her at a port in Notre Dame Bay. The former booked passage to St. John's and the latter to Fortune Harbor only. They were both given berths in the same stateroom and being intimate friends kept closely together on board. When Fortune Harbor was reached that night, the magistrate's trip ended, and he at once went on shore, taking, as he believed, his own valise. Now the valises of both distinguished passengers bore a striking similarity and evidently previously noticed by their owners, and hence when the magistrate grabbed the valise in the hurry of getting ashore at Fortune Harbor, there was no close scrutiny on the part of either himself or the clergyman as to whether he had the right valise or not. When, however, the Prospero berthed at Bowring's wharf in the city yesterday morning, and the cleric commenced to gather together his travelling paraphernalia, it struck him very forcibly that the valise he was handling and which he thought was his own was very much lighter in weight than when he brought it on board. Opening it he discovered to his amazement that instead of the valuable contents he had placed in his own there was nothing in the one he opened but a towel, a shaving mug and a few other things. The cleric received a shock at first, but on thinking over the affair and remembering who his fellow passenger was at the beginning of the voyage, he realized it was simply the Magistrate's mistake and consequently decided to make the best of it. He returned to the wharf, and indeed it was, for the cleric's valise contained many articles that he needed and also contained many valuable documents which were necessary for the transaction of certain business he intended completing here in time to go north again by the Prospero. The magistrate's mistake, however, places the cleric in a fix and will delay him a few weeks longer in St. John's, as it will take another week or so to effect the exchange of valises.

Schooner Total Wreck

The schr. Victoria, from Bonavista Bay with a load of lumber for Mr. Tilley, is now a total wreck at Kelligrews. The bottom is out of her. Her two anchors and a keel were out when the force of the wind burst her chains and she drove in at Tilley's stage. Besides the crew of five men there were four women on board. They all landed safely. The schooner was insured but the lumber was not. A gang of men is engaged to-day taking the lumber which was sent there by Monroe & Co.

SOLIGNUM. A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL. To test Solignum as a preservative for wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it. Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes. Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.
