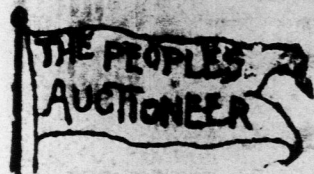

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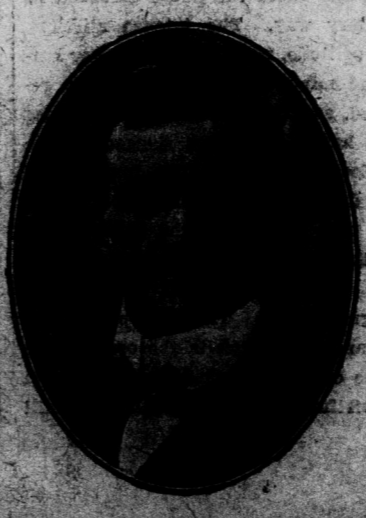

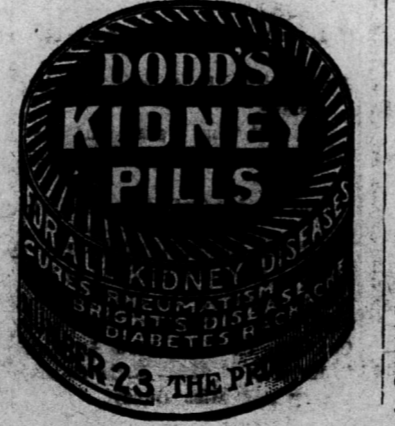
It's Just Her Way.

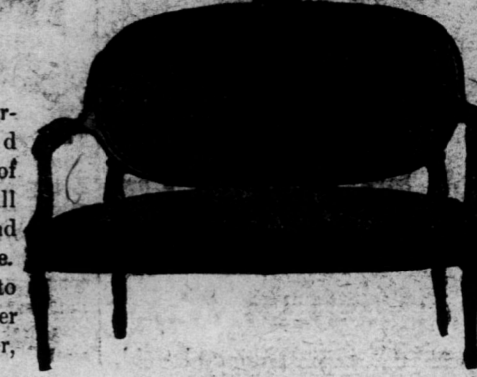

The Orange Bay Letter.

We direct the attention of our readers to a letter of a correspondent, who writes over the nom de plume Wedge. This correspondent expresses clearly and forcibly what is felt generally about the notorious Orange Bay letter in which the Hon. Donald Morrison, shortly after he became Attorney General, made the suggestion to Mr. Strong, who was endeavouring to sell certain property at Orange Bay that a good deal of timber could be obtained from the adjoining Crown Lands. The writer also deals with the action of the Governor in condoning Mr. Morrison's offence. The letter is by no means belated or untimely. It is absolutely necessary for the good government of the Colony that Mr. Morrison, the Government and the Governor shall receive a lesson on the effect of outraging public opinion that they will never forget. Furthermore, it should not be forgotten that by the precedents of the past, a vacancy on the bench of the Supreme Court is usually filled by the Attorney General, if that official so wishes.

It is currently reported that a retirement of a judge, through ill-health, is already under the consideration of the Government, and it would be a most glaring outrage on public opinion if such a precedent is followed in this case, after the revelations which have been made recently.

Two thousand Mongolian troops occupied the city of Taoran, Manchuria, and began looting houses and stores, according to a Chinese report received here. A detachment of Chinese troops from Mukden, with a number of guns, attacked them during the night of August 20th. Fighting was still proceeding on the 21st. The impeachment of President Yuan Shi Kai and the Chinese Cabinet is still under discussion in the Chinese National Assembly. The members, however, are inclined to await the arrival here of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the Provisional President, from Tientsin.

Venice Rejoices Again.

VENICE was buzzing recently with excitement over the inauguration, of the rebuilt Campanile by the King of Italy.

Only those who witnessed the consternation, the pall of gloom, that fell upon the city when, on July 14, 1902, the mighty tower collapsed, burying among its debris the shattered fragments of Sansovino's precious Loggetta, and miraculously, it was thought - depositing the crowning gilt bronze angel at the very porch of St. Mark's, can fully appreciate what the accomplished reconstruction of the tower, in every minute detail like its perished predecessor, must mean to the Venetians," writes Mr. P. G. Kennedy in the Observer.

"The task was one of prodigious difficulty, for the old Campanile was by no means a sound structure. Reconstruction Extraordinary. "And yet the new Campanile had to be ensured against any possibility of a similar catastrophe whilst retaining an exact semblance to its vanished precursor. The same ten tons of bronze had to be suspended in the open loggia to toll the hours across the lagoon. The same weighty double roof of masonry and copper, conical inside and pyramidal outside, and crowned by the heavy revolving bronze angel, had to be supported by the shaft.

"The most delicate task of all was the reconstruction of Sansovino's Loggetta, with all its exquisite sculptured details in marble and in bronze. Looking now upon the richly decorated colonnade, with its statues and carvings, multi-coloured marble, and relief capitals, one can hardly realise what endless labour, what ingenuity, what artistic skill, what mechanical dexterity were needed to raise this architectural gem from a chaotic heap of ruins. The marvellous gates of Antonio Gai, a supreme triumph of eighteenth-century Italian craftsmanship in a ship, horribly bent and twisted and battered by the collapse of the Campanile, now show scarcely a trace of the damage.

"The equally badly injured bronze figures of Apollo, Mercury, Minerva and Peace in the niches between the pilasters have been restored with the greatest skill. But, most wonderful of all, Sansovino's masterpiece, the famous terra cotta group of the Madonna with the Infant Saviour and St. John, smashed into 1,600 fragments, that had to be collected in the heap of dust and broken stone and brick, has been pieced together, all but the irrevocably lost head of the Virgin! Imagine the patience, the endless labour, that must have been entailed by the building up, piece by piece, of this monumental jig-saw puzzle.

"Three of the original African marble columns had to serve for the re-composing of two - the one made of thirteen fragments, the other of thirty-two, the remaining pieces being utilised for shaping two smaller columns for the niche of the Madonna.

A Ten Years' Task. "Thus the Campanile stands to-day, ten years after its collapse, a triumph of persevering labour, its erstwhile beauty unimpaired, an exact replica of the ill-fated structure, though as yet without the patina of age - an exact replica as regards general outline, details, dimensions, and all that appertains to outward appearance, though the construction is more solid and scientific, and though the brick shell encloses now - a passenger lift! - a concession made by the worshippers of the old to the requirements of the twentieth century.

"The whole gigantic structure, upon which a well-officered army of workers was employed, with brief interruptions, for ten years, was erected at a total cost, including all material, of 2,200,000 lire (£38,000), of which £16,000 went towards the rebuilding of the dainty Loggetta."

Mission Ship From Labrador.

The Mission ship Harmony, Capt. Jackson, reached port last evening from Northern Labrador, with a full cargo of codfish, oil and trout, consigned to Messrs. C. F. Bennett & Co.

The Harmony left London on July 10th for Macovic and arrived after a passage of nine days. From there she proceeded to Hamilton Inlet and different places on the northern part of the Labrador Coast collecting her cargo. Capt. Jackson reports the fishery on the whole excellent. Up to a fortnight ago the weather was very adverse, fog being continuous, but now it has brightened up and conditions are favourable for curing fish. When the Harmony left a week ago for St. John's a great many "floaters" were coming south apparently well fished. All along the northern section of the coast the fishery promises to be one of the best on record.

Aged Man Stricken.

Yesterday afternoon Thomas Rahall, 92 years of age, was seized with a dizziness and collapsed near the Mechanical Hall. He was picked up in an unconscious state by Messrs. Peckham and Morrissey, placed aboard of a cab and driven to his home where restoratives were given him by a doctor who was summoned. Although stricken so suddenly, Mr. Rahall was enjoying the best of health. He is much improved to-day and is in hopes of reaching the century mark.

Danger to Shipping.

Captain Clarke of the Stephano reports that on Wednesday afternoon, about 200 miles west of Cape Race and on the western edge of St. Pierre-Banks he passed the spar of a schooner. It was twenty feet above the surface of the water and stood perpendicular. The steamer passed close by the spar and could see the iron band around which a portion of canvas was also attached. Both captain and officers of the Red Cross boat believe it to be a menace to navigation as it is right in the track of shipping.

Pleading for the Toiler.

"Then," says Mrs. Tucker, "take tea. Well, on a pound of tea that costs fifty cents, we are paying no less, mind you, than sixteen and a half cents duty, or in other words 33 per cent. 

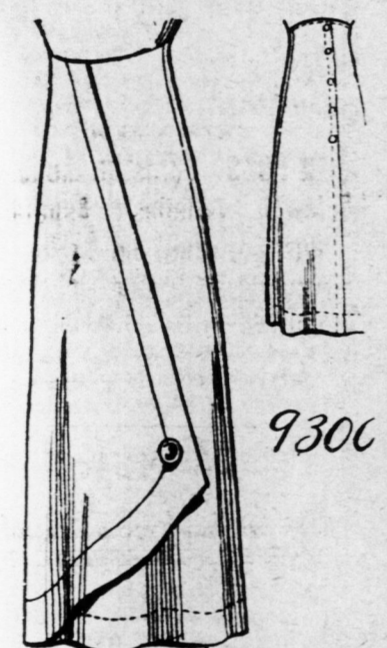

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On Making Complaints.

The other day in a restaurant I saw a young girl haughtily summon the waitress and tell her to take back an order of ice cream in which, according to the customer, there was a taste of salt.

The waitress inquired if the customer would like something in its place; and being told with some asperity that she had no time to try again, meekly bore away the ice cream and changed the charge on the customer's slip.

After the waitress had disappeared, I heard the girl say to her companion: "It wasn't very salty, but it didn't taste the way I thought it would, and there was a little salt in one corner, so I thought that would be a good way to get rid of it."

I wonder who was blamed for the salt in that ice cream? Somebody was, of course. Complaints like that aren't usually left in mid-air. The restaurant lost ten cents by that girl's decree, and some one was probably held responsible for that loss.

When a customer of a shop or a patron of some public utility launches a complaint into the air and receives the assurance of some obsequious clerk that the matter shall be attended to, she feels a sense of relief at having vented her righteous indignation. But I don't believe she visualizes to herself the fact that some real concrete person is going to receive a sharp rebuke or perhaps even more than that as a result of her complaint.

The girl who used a speck of salt as

a pretext for getting rid of some cream that she did not fancy is an exaggerated example of the complaint. There are not many like her—I hope. But there are a great many people who are always ready to complain of the goods of service they receive, on any legitimate ground. "Clothed in a little brief authority," I always think when I see any such persons enjoying the opportunity to be domineering and supercilious to some clerk whose business it is to receive complaints.

Some employers make allowances for such cranks and receive their complaints with a big grain of salt, but the more common tendency is to take the side of the customer against the employee. A certain successful clothing house deliberately tells its clerks to remember that "the customer is always right." Pleasant for the customer? Yes. But think of the attitude toward employees, which is the inevitable complement. And although few employers go quite so far as to make that a stated rule, in the majority of cases the customer undoubtedly gets the benefit of the doubt in any matter of complaint.

So go easy on such complaints. Think twice before you make them. There are times when you owe it to yourself, to common justice and to future sufferers to protest. But more often the righteous indignation which you fancy you feel is simply ruffled pride, passing annoyance or a desire to exercise your power as the master or mistress of the public servant.

Give yourself a chance to cool down first and then if you think you ought to make a complaint, do so.

But you probably won't.

Household Notes.

Grass stains can be removed by tartaric acid or cream of tartar dissolved in boiling water. Apply while spot is fresh, then wash.

To remove the odor of onions from knives, hold them under running cold water, then dry and polish. Hot water tends to set the odor.

Soak silk stockings in borax water and then wash quickly in soapy water that is lukewarm. Squeeze out of two final rinsing waters.

To keep flies from milk, form a ring of stout wire a little larger than the rim of jug or pan, and over this stretch some butter muslin or net.

When pouring bluing into a tub, tie a cloth over the bottle and let the bluing strain through it. This prevents streaks and spots on the cloth.

To remove perspiration stains, mix a tablespoonful of rectified alcohol with the same of ether and a sixth of the quantity of liquid ammonia and apply.

Pennyroyal oil is a sure destroyer of fleas and other insects. Spray the oil over the animal possessed of the

fleas or over the place where the insects are bothersome.

Starch for thin black lawn is made with two quarts of water for half an hour. Cool and strain. It will not cleanse and stiffen.

To clean vinegar cruets, rinse the cruets with clear water. Put in baking soda and fill cruet with warm water. Let stand a while, pour out and shake vigorously.

To clean velvet ribbon, use a soft toothbrush and some naphtha. Dip the brush into the naphtha and when it has become thoroughly saturated, rub briskly over the velvet surface.

Take out grease or paint spots with pure alcohol. The alcohol evaporates and the stain with it. If this does not remove it, use a paste of alcohol and white soap, then rinse in alcohol.

Clean straw hats by going over them with damp cornmeal working it into the straw, and leaving it on for some hours. Then brush out the meal and wash with peroxide of hydrogen.

If you wish to keep the transparency of a lingerie frock after washing, rinse it in a gallon and a half of water in which a little lump of gum arabic has been dissolved. When ironed it will look like new.

To clean oil paintings, wipe off the dust with a soft cloth, then dip a silk sponge in lukewarm water, rub on a little fine white soap which has no free alkali in it, and go over the painting quickly and gently. Rinse thoroughly and dry with the cloth.

Corsets can be successfully laundered. Spread them smoothly over a wooden table or board and fasten with thumb tacks. Then with a stout nail brush and some white soap and warm water scrub each section carefully. Rinse in warm water and dry quickly.

Knitted shawls of soft wool can be washed by putting them into a strong suds of white soap, lukewarm, and squeezing them softly through the hands. A little ammonia can be added to the water and spread in the sun.

Wash pale, tan-colored linens, pongees, cotton and India cliks in bay water if you would preserve the color. Put a handful of bay in the water and boil till the water is a pale clear brown. Strain and cool till lukewarm and add a teaspoon of good white soap.

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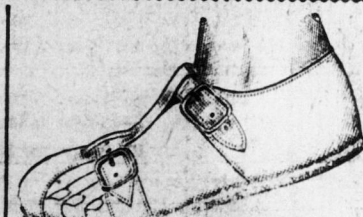
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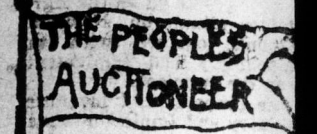
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
