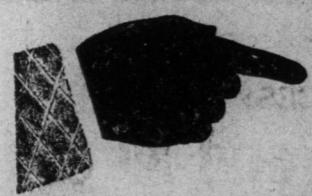

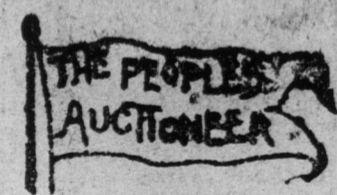

"IT'S MINE."

Once upon a time a very self-centered, cold-hearted, wicked old woman died and went straight to the place, call it what you will, to which people go. Now, in the midst of her suffering, this woman looked up and seeing an angel in Heaven. (I don't personally understand how the architecture of the place to which such people go would make that possible, but I am simply relating an old story as it was told to me), cried out to him and begged him to get her out somehow. Evidently the angel had a tender heart, for he told her he would see what he could do. Then he asked her if she had ever done any kind act. This was a poser for the self-centered old woman, but after racking her memory for a long time, she remembered triumphantly that she had once given away a carrot to some poor starving creature. At this the angel disappeared and came back a few minutes later with a huge carrot which he let down to the woman. "Take hold of it," he said to her, "and I will lift you out of it." The woman did so, and the carrot did not break, but by this time a crowd of other miserable creatures had gathered about her, and as they saw her being lifted up toward Heaven, they frantically seized hold of her skirts, hoping to be lifted up too. And they were. Up toward Heaven went the carrot, and the selfish old woman with a long train of miserable creatures clinging to her skirts and to each other. And the carrot did not break. But the old woman looked down, and seeing all the people who were clinging to her became frightened. "Let go," she cried, "it's mine." And as she spoke the carrot broke and she and all the rest tumbled back again into the darkness and the angel disappeared. Perhaps you have heard that story before. It's a very old tale. But I have recalled it to you to-day because a little incident recalled it to me. I heard a settlement worker ask a young woman who had had the benefit of a splendid education to devote an evening a week to teaching in a settlement house. She refused emphatically. "You know I can't bear those dirty foreigners," she said, "besides, I hate to teach. And then, I'm terribly busy. Get someone else." In refusing to share her splendid education with those who asked help to climb out of the darkness of ignorance, that girl was saying, "it's mine" just as plainly as if she had screamed it out. In refusing to share our particular blessing, whether it be money or leisure, talent or education, or any other good thing—with those who lack, we are saying "it's mine." We probably will not lose our treasure immediately as the woman of the fable did, but I thoroughly believe that we bring down upon ourselves some loss of power to enjoy, some sure deprivation either in this existence or in other existences to come.

Household Notes.

Stewed rhubarb has a well-known medical value, besides being a complexion beautifier, it is said to be valuable for rheumatic troubles. When using vinegar to remove paint stains from white goods, have it as well as the cloth with which it is rubbed on, as hot as possible. A little muriatic acid added to the rinsing water after a blue-and-white fiber is scrubbed with soap and water will help restore the color. Peaches are good baked. Take out the stone, fill the cavity with sugar, chopped nuts and raisins, and bake in the same way as an apple. Castile soap should be bought in quantities, and put away on the shelf to ripen. It may grow dark, but the older it gets the better it will be. To make butter scotch, mix four cupsful of brown sugar, two cupsful of butter and three tablespoonfuls of water and boil until crisp in water. For a tight, hoarse cough, where phlegm is not raised, take hot water often, as hot as can be sipped. It will nearly always give great relief. A delicious way to serve baked potatoes is to remove them from the skins, run through a vegetable press and mix with salt, pepper and butter. Keep all wide-mouthed bottles that come into the house. They are handy receptacles for keeping tacks, seeds, screws and other small things. Lettuce, watercress and all such things should be kept on ice or in ice water long enough before a meal to get them thoroughly chilled. To brighten the eyes, take occasional

ally, just before going to bed, the juice of half a lemon in a small tumbler of water without adding any sugar. If cabbage is soaked in cold salted water for an hour before cooking, it will have a most delicious flavor, and the odor will be less disagreeable. When pouring jelly or canned fruit into tumblers or glass jars, set the jars first on a damp cloth. This goes a long way toward preventing their breaking. In cleaning raisins, place them in a clean cloth, sprinkle with flour and shake well. You will find that this will clean them, and at the same time will remove all the stalks. When making pickles boil the vinegar, and when bottled, lay a small bag of mustard on the top of the pickle jars. This will prevent the vinegar from turning moldy. To prevent potatoes from becoming black when cooked, put them into cold water, and when brought to a boil, remove in a little lemon juice. They will keep a good color and be of good flavor. A small quantity of carbolic acid added to paste, mastic and ink will prevent mold. An ounce of the acid to a gallon of whitewash will keep cellars and dairies from the disagreeable odor which often taints milk and meat kept in such places. Vinegar will keep the hands white and smooth and prevent chapping when exposed to the cold air, after washing in hot and soapy water. Before drying the hands, rub them over with a teaspoonful of vinegar and the result will be satisfactory. To make a good chamomile sponge save all old, worn-out leathers, cut them into strips about one inch by six, double them and bore a small hole in the center. Run cord through this and when there are enough to make a good-sized hand sponge, secure the pieces with a strong band. This bunch makes a good window cleaner.

LONDON, April 30.

The Home Office to-day inaugurated a more active campaign to put an end to suffragette outrages. The headquarters of the women's union, where many of the outrages have been organized, have been occupied by the police, and all the active leaders taken into custody, including Mrs. Drummond, Mrs. Kenney, who were out on bail. They are arrested on a fresh charge of conspiracy with the Pankhursts to commit malicious damages. Over 1,000 policemen and detectives from Scotland Yard were engaged in the capture of the offices. They had scarcely taken possession when Mrs. Drummond, ignorant of what had happened, arrived. She was admitted, not realizing that she had voluntarily entered the lion's den, until she found herself under arrest and on her way to Bow Street, where she and the Kenney woman, who had been caught elsewhere with five other active officials of the organization, Kerr, Lake, Lennox, Barrett and Saunders, who were in charge of the offices at the time of the raid, were had been arrested. A large quantity of documents were seized, and several typists and other clerks were ordered to leave the premises, which were then closed, the police remaining on guard. The women are charged with a conspiracy contrary to the clauses of the Malicious Damages Act.

LONDON, April 30.

Austria's threat to take matters into her own hands and carry out the declared decision of the Powers, regarding the evacuation of Scutari, is regarded here as an attempt to bring pressure to bear on Britain, France and Russia, to induce them to accept the Austrian proposals at the Ambassadors' Conference in London to-morrow. The situation is critical, and the Conference may have to decide the fateful issue. The attitude of Russia is, perhaps, the gravest element in the situation, as it is more than doubtful if Russia has, so far, cooperated loyally with the other Powers. This is indicated in some measure by the fact that she took no active part in the blockade of Montenegrin ports, but delegated France to represent her. The crucial point is now reached. If the concert of the Powers breaks down under the stress of Russia's opposition to Austria, it is impossible to foretell the consequences. Austria is, meanwhile, making urgent representations to Italy to join in her campaign, but Italy, it seems, is still holding back. I must not be forgotten that King Nicholas is the father of the Queen of Italy.

WARSAW, April 30.

An extraordinary sensation has been caused by the arrest of Baron John Biebing, one of the wealthiest landlords of Lithuania, on the charge of murdering Prince Ladislas Dulic Lubeki, a close relative by marriage whose body was found pierced by two bullet wounds on April 22, in a parlour adjoining his residence at Tochin near Warsaw.

S. S. FLORIZEL.—The S. S. Florizel will resume the Red Cross Service on May 15th, sailing direct for New York. Capt. Smith goes in command.

Tragic Love Affair In Antwerp.

Antwerp, April 25.—A youth, eighteen years old, and a nineteen-year-old girl, are the principals in a shocking love tragedy enacted here to-day. Arm in arm they climbed to the clock gallery in the tower of Notre Dame Cathedral, and from a height of 180 feet, leaped into space, falling at the feet of passers-by.

Every bone in the bodies of the boy and his companion was broken. As they hurtled through the air several men and women who witnessed the sight, fainted.

According to the police the leap from the church tower was in accordance with a premeditated double suicide pact.

The tragedy occurred at a time when the glove market, in front of the north tower of the Cathedral, was thronged with pedestrians, a large number of whom stood transfixed, helpless witnesses of every phase of the drama.

That the act of the lovers was premeditated is shown by the fact that they had placed five letters, one addressed to the police commissary, and the others to various relatives, where they could be easily seen by visitors to the tower.

The letters showed that the youth was Ellis Waikew, and that his home was in this city. The girl has not yet been identified. The letters, it is declared, stated that the young couple had been driven to their dreadful deaths because of a love affair.

LONDON, To-day.
The British delegation, now on its way to the States for the celebration of the Anglo-American Peace Centenary may encounter some hostile demonstrations. Certain leaders of the extreme Irish and Labor movements are advising their American friends to express opposition to the British mission. Suffragette leaders are appealing to American women to denounce any friendly dealings between the two countries until England gives votes to women. The opponents of the Peace Mission predict its public appearance will provoke outbreaks such as occurred at the peace meeting at Carnegie Hall, on December 31st, in support of the ratification of arbitration treaties pending between the States, Britain and France. Because Lord West and other members of the delegation are connected with the Carnegie Peace Foundation, the Laborites call it a "Carnegie Mission." English Labor Unions will hold meetings as is their custom in Hyde Park. Representatives of German Unions will parade with them for the first time. Both English and German speakers intend to denounce the Carnegie Mission. Their ground is that the Mission is designed to foster an Anglo-American Alliance, alienate American sympathies from Germany, whereas they argue workers of all nationalities should stand together for their own interests. Benjamin Tillett, Secretary of the Dock, Wharf and Riverside General Workers Union of Britain and Ireland, will send a cablegram to Saml. Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labour asking him to oppose the British Delegation.

Objects to Biblical 70 Years.

Doctor Declares 100 years should be Average Age.
Dr. Frank Ellsworth Allard, professor of physical economics at the Boston University Medical School, believes that 100 years should be the average life of man. The old Biblical passage anent the life of man being three-score years and ten is put into our head at Sunday School, said Dr. Allard, and we later accept it as a matter of course. It is unfortunate that we have the limit of life in mind, we ought to live to be 100. All disease is a process of disintegration. "I believe that every disease of every name and nature begins primarily in the breaking of some of nature's laws. To my way of thinking we must look to sanitation for the solution of our health problems. "Insurance statistics show that among insured, lives of men between the ages of 45 and 55 the death rate is greater than ever before. They would live longer and accomplish more if they ate less, drank less, and indulged in daily periods of rest and recreation. "There are thousands of women—and not a few men—whose health is being sapped by the habits of idleness and gossip. These people are lazy, mentally and physically, and their viewpoint on life is purely personal and usually petty. Laziness gives rise to sluggish livers and unhealthy habits of introspection, which in turn breeds neurasthenia and imaginary ills, that become real so far as the sufferings of the patients are concerned. "Intemperance in the use of alco-

holic stimulants is perhaps the greatest curse of our age. The whole problem of drunkenness should be dealt with as a mental affliction a weakening of the will. "The old-line practitioner is bound to pass. The family doctor as we know him to-day is doomed to extinction. His place will be taken by the physician who will fulfill the real meaning of the word, which is "teacher." "I wonder," said Mrs. Flirty, "why those inquisitive people across the street are always looking into our windows?" "Maybe," suggested her husband, "it's to find out why you are always looking into theirs."

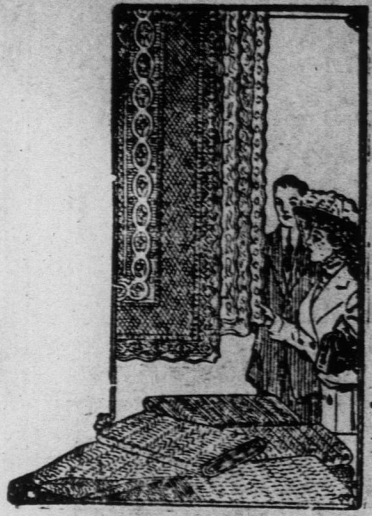

Top-Day's News.

MONTREAL, To-day.
In an impressive speech delivered before the Canadian Club, Col. Allen, Minister of Finance and Defence of the New Zealand Government, dealt with the broad issue of Imperial Defence, making more explicit reference to the movement in his own country in that direction. The speech was warmly received. To himself as a New Zealander, passing through Canada, said the speaker, it seemed strange Canadians should be divided into Easterners and Westerners. When national problems faced the country they would find distinctions between the two would have to be dropped. I am speaking on, went on, from an absolutely non-party point of view. It would be wrong for me to do otherwise. I do not know what is in your mind, I shall not try to make out, I am concerned with a much larger question. If one day you are asked to stand by us, can we, gentlemen of Canada, depend on you? I can give you and the Empire as a whole, this assurance that we shall be prepared to stand by the Empire. We have already taken one step in that direction. We shall be ready to do it again. If the Mother Country find it necessary to ask for further help, Colonel Allen went on to speak of the importance of preserving British supremacy in the Pacific and to protect the trade in that Ocean. We cannot alone, New Zealand and Australia, he said, protect the Pacific and the trade routes must be kept open, if the Empire is to stand. They are bonds of Empire. We are determined to do as possible to make necessary sacrifices to keep them open.

LONDON, To-day.
Sir Stuart Samuel (Liberal), was re-elected for the Whitechapel division of London by a majority of 166 over a Unionist. During his parliamentary career this year, Viscount Haldane, Lord Chancellor, Right Hon. Herbert Samuel, Postmaster General, and Sir J. A. Simon, Solicitor General, and twenty members of Parliament will visit Australia and Canada. As a result of the suggestion of the Emperor, an important international conference will be held in London in September to which all shipping interests at both ends of the Atlantic will deliberate on the questions pertaining to greater safety of life and property at sea with a view to the completion of uniform regulations.

LONDON, To-day.
There will be no issue of the official newspaper of the militants to-day. Not content with arresting two women editors, the police raided the printing office and carried off all galley types set up for to-day's number. The women say the raid of their offices was expected and assert that they had removed their valuable belongings to two empty houses, they had in reserve, in case they should be required.

HALIFAX, To-day.
The first election under the new civic system resulted in the return of R. V. Harris, W. F. O'Connor, M. Scanlon and C. R. Hoban as controllers.

NEW YORK, To-day.
Luther McCarthy, heavy-weight, in a ten-round bout.

Fish at Cape.
Messrs. W. and M. McDonald and J. W. Daley, of St. Joseph's, proceeded to Mail Bay yesterday where herring are very plentiful and proceeded to haul a sufficient quantity for bait after which they proceeded to the Cape. St. Mary's grounds to make a trial for codfish. They will be the first to do so this season and the opening of the Cape fishery is earlier this year than for many seasons past.

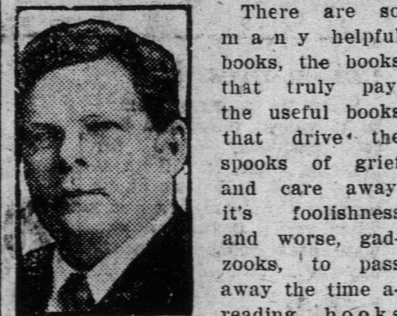

NEWCASTLE-ON-TYNE, Ap. 30.
A violent attack was made today by a party of anti-suffragettes on a shop and offices used as headquarters of the suffragettes here. Bricks were hurled through the windows, and all the desks in the place were broken open, while the suffragettes' literature and banners were destroyed.

WATERTOWN, April 30.
The earthquake shock felt throughout Northern New York State and Lower Canada, on Monday, was the most severe in this region since the Champlain earthquake in 1663, according to George Chadwick, Professor of Geology at St. Lawrence University, who declared that the disturbance may possibly be a forerunner of a much more serious and disastrous shock. Monday's earthquake he believed to be due to an actual slipping of the earth's crust along the great crack, known as Logan's line, which extends from the St. Lawrence Valley to Alabama. There is no question, he said, that we are entering on a period of great seismicographic disturbance. As far as our records go, there have been no earthquakes here as severe as that of Monday night, for nearly three centuries.

NEW YORK, April 30.
A Washington despatch says that Sir Cecil Arthur Spring-Rice, the new British Ambassador, made a formal call on the acting Secretary of State, John Bassett Moore. He rather startled precedents by calling at once, although his acquaintance with Professor Moore dates from the time he served in Washington as Secretary of the British Embassy.

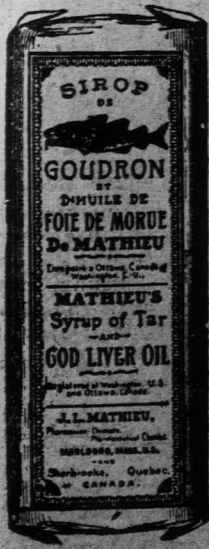

Neolithic Surgery.

The appearance of the first chapter of a history of cerebral surgery by the eminent French surgeon, M. Lucas-Champonniere, recalls the very famous discovery of a prehistoric skull in a dolmen of Lozeres in 1868—a skull that showed traces of having been opened by mechanical means and trepanned. The discovery was completed in 1873, when other skulls were found bearing the round bone excrescences where the skull had healed after trepanning. These discoveries were made at the time that the particular operation of trepanning had fallen into momentary disfavor. It was not until Ferrier's discoveries concerning the localization of brain functions and Lister's introduction of antiseptic surgery that trepanning rested on a firm scientific basis and found favor again. Nevertheless, it has been indisputable since those discoveries of the 'seventies that trepanning was practiced, and with frequency, in the neolithic age. The method and the purpose of the operation, however, have been much disputed.

Trepanning With a Flint.
Various methods have been suggested as those of the neolithic surgeon. Each of them naturally depended upon the use of a sharpened flint, which does not naturally suggest itself as the best instrument for such an operation. M. Broca held that it was performed by persistently cutting round the skull in a circle with a flint. M. Champonniere has shown lately by experiment that by boring holes at regular intervals the section could be made in 35 minutes. Equally various have been the purposes suggested. Some have supposed that it was a part of some religious rite and performed after death. Mr. Champonniere is, however, convinced that the operation was performed during life, was often successful and was performed for medical purposes.—Westminster Gazette.

Startled The Monarch.

On the first consignment of seditious powders to the capital of Delhi, the monarch became deeply interested in the accounts of the refreshing draught. A box was brought to the King in full court, and the interpreter explained to His Majesty how it should be used. Into a goblet he put the contents of the twelve blue papers, and, having added water, the King drank it off. This was the alkali, and the royal countenance expressed no signs of satisfaction. It was then explained that in the combination of the two powders lay the luxury, and the twelve white powders were quickly dissolved and as eagerly swallowed by His Majesty.

With a wild shriek that will be remembered while Delhi is numbered among the kingdoms, the monarch rose, staggered, exploded, and, in his full agonies, screamed, "Hold me down!" then, rushing from the throne, fell prostrate on the floor. There he lay during the long-continued effervescence of the compound, spurring like ten thousand pennyworth of Imperial pop, and believing himself the agonies of death—a melancholy and humiliating proof that kings are mortal.

Man Bottled Up 12 Days.

Boat Turned Turtle and He Was Sealed in Cabin.
One of the most extraordinary stories ever told of the sea is related by Captain Engelland, owner of the steel sailing-ship *Erandt*. He was at sea with three men on board, when a great gale came sweeping and tearing and screaming over the waves, and drove his vessel before it into the gathering blackness of night. The skipper stuck to the wheel all through the long hours of darkness, and the gale dying down to a snarling growl at 4 a.m., he relinquished his post and stepped down to his cabin for a change of clothes.

It was at this moment the real business of the day began. He had just got into dry underclothing, when the vessel quietly turned bottom upwards, and he found himself standing on the roof of the cabin, with the door over his head hermetically sealed by the ocean. Was ever a man in such straits before?
He climbed through the hold of the vessel, where he found raisins, condensed milk, prunes, rice, and, of course, a Teutonic sausage. Eating sparingly of this healthy fare, and hammering on the steel bottom of the boat to attract the attention of any ship that might happen to pass by, he spent 12 days in this strange manner before he was rescued. The wreck had to be towed to a mighty crane before a steel plate could be unloosened and the skipper be free to look once more on the blue sky.

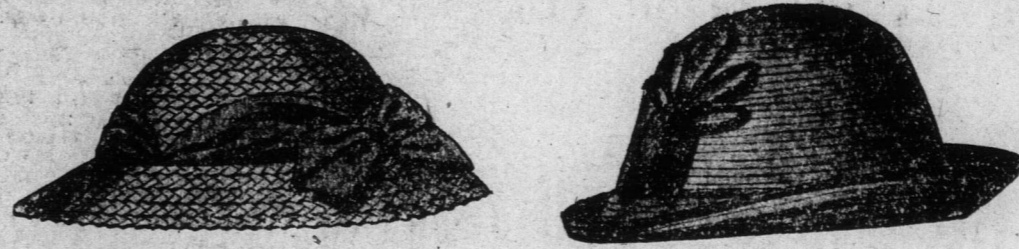

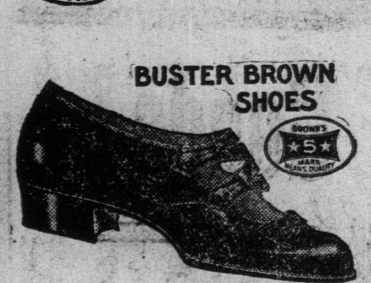

Japanese Police In Riots.

Hold People in Awe by Means of Iron Rods.

The police of Tokio have been going through a hot time during the recent riots, brought about by a Parliamentary crisis. Several lost their lives in battle with the mob, which fired the stations and razed them to the ground.

Ordinarily, the guardian of the peace in the land of earthquakes has rather a good time. He is dressed in black from head to foot, and sometimes armed with a staff like a short billiard-cue though usually he carries a more formidable weapon, which he handles with considerable dexterity. It is an iron rod about 2 feet long and at the end of the rod is a ring and a heavy lash. This knotted lash is calculated to restore order and command respect for the law and its representative, and it is amusing to observe how rapidly an unruly crowd will melt away on the approach of the Japanese policeman, with his lash ready for action.

The man with the rod has it almost all his own way, and offenders whom he decides to arrest generally follow him like lambs. The least indignity offered to a policeman, the slightest opposition to his demands, is summarily and severely punished; in fact, it is less risky to kill a citizen than offend one of these men.

He has one weakness; he is too prone to yield to argument when backed by a sufficient quantity of the current coin of the realm. If a burglar, when caught, will only consent to go "shares," he may rely upon escaping before the police station is reached. Traders find it advisable to remember this weakness; if they forget it, it is not at all unlikely that Robert will find a burglar on his own account, and the merchant's memory is refreshed by the unpleasant discovery that he has lost three or four times the amount of the tip required by the policeman.

The Assouan Dam, in Egypt, with its associated irrigation works, has cost the large sum of \$53,000,000; but it is estimated that, as a result of the expenditure, the value of adjacent land has increased more than \$1,000,000,000.

We understand that the Company operating the Sydney Mines is now delivering only 2,000 lbs. to the ton of coal instead of 2,240 lbs., and that it takes this method instead of raising the price, the dealers here consequently must either put the coal up to \$8.00 a ton or give only 2,000 lbs. to the ton, and we understand that they are doing the latter. REPORTER DETECTIVES.

Newspapermen Often Make Pretty Fair Sleuths—The Work of Following Criminal News on a Big London Daily Sometimes Results in Triumphs and Frequently in Disaster—Neither Time, Energy Nor Money Spared in Ferreting Out Truth About a Story.

Every great modern newspaper has its own staff of detectives, whose business it is to be ready at a moment's notice to investigate any crime that has attracted political interest. These men—who are engaged as reporters, and are known as "crime investigators"—have a wider experience than many detectives, and their enterprise in search for exclusive news is often responsible for queer incidents, says a London paper.

One of the earliest experiences of the writer taught him to temper pertinacity with discretion. He had reason to suppose that an old woman who lived in a back street might have some valuable information concerning a case he was engaged on. He knocked at the door—it was late at night—and the lady popped a dishevelled head out of the window above.

"I represent the —," said he. "The old woman put her hand to her ear. "Eh?" she said. "Speak up, I'm rather deaf."

Again the journalist, with as much suavity as circumstances would permit, stated his object at the top of his voice, adding that he was a reporter, the old woman said never a word, but closed the window with a bang, doggedly the man below plied the knocker. A moment later a deluge descended on him, and the woman, a bucket in her hand, contemplated his bedraggled retreat with a smile of vicious satisfaction.

Even this mishap, unpleasant as it was, paled before the experience of a colleague who, at the time of the search for Dr. Crippen, was detained one night, and left in a police cell for several hours, on suspicion of being the murderer. And, speaking of Dr. Crippen, it is interesting to recall that Scotland Yard first had its attention directed to the possibility of poison and its nature by a crime investigator.

When a crime investigator has once started on his quest he spares neither effort nor money to beat his competitors. Recently, during a trial of some consequence at a little country town boasting one small post office, two keen rivals on evening newspapers, whom we will call A. and B., were present.

Whoever was first in despatching the news would prevent the other from sending anything. A concocted a little plot, and bought a sensational novel before the case began. He tore out a dozen pages, and pasted them down on official telegraph forms.

"Hand that over the counter, and tell 'em there's more to come," he said to his messenger boy.

The solitary clerk began telegraphing the novel, and A. continued to send sections interspersed with the report of the case, while poor B.'s copy was kept aside till the first telegram had finished. At last the case came to an end. A. put the result on the wires, pasted down another chapter of the novel to be sent afterwards, and had the satisfaction of learning later that his paper was on sale with a full report before the rival journal got anything.

But B. treasured a determination of revenge, and his opportunity came the following week. There was a murderer mystery at a remote village and the nearest railway and telegraph office were seven miles away.

B. arrived a day before the inquest, and went to the only two motor garages in the town, and chartered for the following day all the cars they possessed. When A. arrived, the best vehicle he could find was a dingy brougham and a decrepit horse. This was absolutely useless for conveyance of messages, and this time he had the chagrin of seeing his rival sending off his account every ten minutes, while he had to wait till the whole thing was over.

In crime investigation the case is not always to the swift. I was delayed on one occasion, and arrived an hour or two after the majority of other newspaper men. Not a vehicle not so much as a bicycle, had been left to get to the village, several miles distant, where the tragedy occurred. Then an idea occurred to me. A brake with coroner's jury was about to set off, under the guidance of one of the chief police officers concerned. I called the driver aside, slipped five dollars in his hand, and became a member of the jury for the time being.

I had the satisfaction of seeing my colleagues being kept outside gates

by uniformed constables, while I was being told every fact about the case by the man most qualified to know. In a little time I abandoned the jury, as I was now inside the cordon and witnessed the finding of a gold watch that had been stolen from the victims.

But luck had not done with me yet. As I crossed a field I met two women, one weeping vehemently. I asked her if there was anything I could do.

"No," said the second woman. "She is upset. Her two sons have just been arrested for murder!"

My paper had a "scoop" on the arrest, which had been kept rigorously secret, the next day.

Back Door Farming
