



### Published by Authority.

Upon the recommendation of the Food Control Board, and under the provisions of the Food Control Act, 1917, and the War Measures Act, 1914-1916, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to approve the following Regulations regarding the sale of Sugar:-

1. The wholesale price of sugar when sold by the importer shall not exceed Twenty-seven and one-quarter cents per pound, when it is a cash

2. When sugar is sold by Jobbers the price shall not be in excess of Twenty-eight and one-quarter cents per pound, when it is a cash transac-

3. For the purpose of this Regulation, Twenty-five barrels or over shall constitute and be deemed a wholesale transaction, and must be taken delivery of at one time. Any less quantity than the above, sold in original package, shall constitute a jobbing transaction. A barrel shall be held to contain not less than three hundred

ounds. 4. From and after this date the retail price of white granulated sugar within the Municipal limits of the Town of St. John's shall not exceed thirty cents per pound, and in the outports thirty cents per pound, plus transportation, insurance and other

regular charges. 5. Any person who shall offer for sale, or shall sell any sugar at a greater price than that fixed in above Regulations, shall be guilty of a breach

6. All foregoing prices are for cash

7. No dealer shall refuse a tender of cash when a purchase is made. 8. Any person violating any of the provisions of these Regulations shall be guilty of an offence and liable upon summary conviction before a Magistrate or Justice of the Peace to a penalty not exceeding one thousand dollars, or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months, or to both fine and imprisonment. (One half of the fine shall be paid to the informer and the balance to the Food Control Board, for the benefit of the Domin-

9. No Sugar shall be imported into Newfoundland unless a permit to do so shall have been obtained beforehand from the Food Control Board. 10. These Regulations shall be, and come into effect on the First day of

11. The Regulations respecting Sugar, Flour and Molasses, published in the Royal Gazette on the eight of October, 1918, are hereby cancelled.







The Central News says it learns that as a result of direct negotiations between Persia and George Tchitcherin, Russian Soviet Foreign Minister, the latter has announced the readiness of the Bolsheviki to evacuate Persia under certain conditions.

NOUSE THAN THE REAL THING.

ST. JOHN, N.B., June 16.

On Monday, Police Magistrate Ritchie made a strong pronouncement in court against the sale of lemon extract, in view of so many cases of drunkenness from it coming before him. He said, "It is worse than Gin, Rum, Whiskey or any liquor. If everybody does his duty there will not be another ounce of lemon extract left in this town by midnight. I will give up my place here in order to make room to stock it all, if necessary."

#### POLES RE-TAKE KIEV.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 16.

Polish forces have re-taken Kiev, in a strong counter attack upon the Bolsheviki, according to a despatch received here to-day. The Poles inflicted heavy casualties on the Red armies.

#### RAN THE BLOCKADE.

FIUME, June 16.

A British tank steamer ran the blockade to-day, and landed a cargo of oil for Gabriele D'Annunzio, insurgent leader here.

Co. will not recognize their communications and are importing men from the ancient colony, reside and feed them aboard the companies boats, and yet do work that should be the perquisite of the men who are tax payers and residents of the town They are also indignant over the alleged action of Mayor Musgrave whom they contend is encouraging the Reid Nfld. Co. to bring in outside labor to the detriment and injury o wage earning 'Longshoremen.

### RECOGNIZED IRISH REPUBLIC. MONTREAL, June 16.

Amid a great demonstration the American Federation of Labor, in its convention here to-day, re-affirmed its stand for the recognition of the Irish Republic, and requested that military forces of occupation in Ireland be withdrawn, and that Irish people be accorded the right of selfetermination. The Federation authorized the continuation of organization campaign in Ireland and the Steel Industry Executive Council was instructed to call a conference of all International Unions concerned in organization work, for the purpose of getting their "full co-operation" in the campaign.

#### WILL NOT TAKE OATH.

LONDON, June 16.

The House of Commons has tabled the proposed amendments to the Irish Home Rule Bill, which were designed to prevent the setting up of a Republican Parliament in Ireland, by making it essential that all candidates take the oath of allegiance to Great Britain, in order to quality for office. The amendments also provided that under certain conditions, the British Viceroy in Ireland would be empowered to assume supreme legislative authority. Sinn Fein sympathizers declared the amendment bore out their prediction that the Government had a joker up its sleeve, adding that no Sinn Feiner would take the oath of allegiance.





### House of Assembly

The House met at 3.30 p.m. Petitions were presented by Hibbs for railways extension along the north side of Bonavista Bay; by Messrs. Sullivan, Bennett, Moore and Higgins from a large number of residents of Placentia and St. Mary's, Port-de-Grave, St. John's West, Fer ryland, Witless Bay and Fermeuse and St. John's East for modification of the Prohibition Act. In presenting the petitions the different, members pointed out that some steps should be taken to meet the views of the petitioners, who number so very many, Mr. Higgins asking would it not be wise for the Government to give consideration to the request fer a plebiscite. The petition is so largely supported that it should be met by an Act at the present session. Petitions for \$5,000 for improvements to the breakwater at Jerseyside, Placentia, were presented by Mr. Walsh, supported by Messrs. Sullivan and

The Prime Minister moved the House into Committee of the Whole to consider resolutions respecting certain concessions to the Dominion Co-Operative Building Association, Ltd. Those resolutions provide for payment of the Company, out of the public funds, during a period of twenty years, of any sum by which the nett earnings of the Company she" he less than 5 per cent. upon so much of the capital as shall be actually paid up in cash and engaged in the building of dwelling houses, and also for importation free of charge of all construction and building materials and machinery which are not manufactured in this Colony and for use by the Company in its business.

Sir M. P. Cashin asked how the money was to be raised. H looked upon the Bill as mere camouflage. It gave no enlightenment as to the amount to be borrowed. It was a waste of time to pass the present

The Prime Minister replied that some large firms were supporting the scheme by taking stock. The capital, it was expected, would be subscribed in a few months.

Mr. W. J. Higgins pointed out that the Bill did absolutely nothing. The Association requested concessions and free entry on materials, but that's no act on which the Government can take credit, as the same is done for any combination building anything from a hen house to a fox farm. It is obvious that nobody will put in capital unless sure of 5 per cent. It is just as well to say the Government is doing nothing to solve the allimportant housing problem.

Mr. Squires-I didn't say they were. Mr. Higgins-I'm glad you admit it. You promised great things but everyone is now disappointed. If the small investor is to be helped, 8 p.c. interest at best should be given.

Mr. J. R. Bennett was disappointed with the resolutions. The solving of the Housing Problem was promised in pre-election protestations, and had a prominent place in the Speech from the Throne, Messrs. Anderson, Jas McGrath and Gibbs were prime movers in the scheme, and went out of their way to misrepresent himself and others. Their communication to Mr. Halfyard on the housing question received no reply, but he (Mr. Bennett), as Colonial Secretary, asked Hon. Mr. Anderson to go into the matter with him, but heard nothing further from that gentleman.

Mr. Halfyard here explained that the day the letter was sent he was going on his shooting trip. Strange to say, Mr. Mews had falled to acknowledge it.




