Innerse Defins of England and Males. In Mises.—Another coal mine explosion in Great Britain and eleven lives lost Science seems helpless to prevent these disasters in the bituminous mines of England and Wales. In America nearly all our accidents are the result of gross negligence and defiance of statute laws on the part of the companies; nearly all of them occur, too, among the authracite mines of Pennsylvania. Our bituminous coal is almost taken from near the surface of the ground, the "shaft" being often/merely a horizontal passage cut in the side of a mountain, with ramifications on the right and left. Even our antractic mines have in few cases extended deeper than 600 feet. In England and Wales, however, the shafts sometimes extend a distance of 3,000 feet—more than half a mile underground.
