The report showed that the Sabbath schools within the bounds are in an efficient state. In the evening the time was chiefly taken up with discussing the Home Mission business and appointing delegates to the general assembly. dtf

THE LATE MR. JOHN GRANT. - On Sunday afternoon the remains of Mr. John Grant, late Express and Telegraph Agent in this town, were conveyed to their last resting place in the Union Cemetery. Mr. Grant left Guelph on the 13th of February for the South, in the hope that his health would be restored under the influence of a warmer climate. He reached Atlanta on the 27th in a very weak state. From that time he gradually grew worse, and on Sunday morning following breathed his last far away from home and friends. But he was not without friends in that city, for we find from the Atlanta Daily Sun of the 5th that at the Cannon House, where he died, the lady of the House and all belonging to it bestowed on him every care and attention necessary to his comfort, and he received the best medical aid the city could afford. On the Monday morning succeeding his death, his brother-in-law, Mr. James Middleton

of Mobile, was telegraphed for, and he at once proceeded to Atlanta, and brought the remains to Guelph, where they arrived on Saturday night. Mr. Middleton received every possible kindness from the Express Agent in that city and from the proprietor of the Hotel. The deceased was well known and highly esteemed in Guelph for his many excellent qualities. In the discharge of his duties he was every day brought in contact with the public, and in his intercourse with all was courteous, kind and obliging. THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES. Horrible Murders in Ohio. Extensive Cattle Stealing. The Bogus Geneva Watch Co's. The New York Frauds.

Dayton, O., March 11. - Four horrible murders were committed near this city on Saturday night. A woman named Mary Margueret, aged about 35 years, and three children, aged respectively 8 and 6 years and 6 months, are supposed to have been killed by her husband, Leonard Margueret, who is now in jail. The woman was found in bed naked, and apparently strangled, and the children were found on the bank of a creek some distance from the house, the two older being drowned, and the infant's head was crushed. dtf

Omaha, March 10. - The melting of the snow in the mountains has caused numerous washouts along the road. The Herald's special from Brownsville says that the recent report of the meeting of stock holders shows that two thousand cattle, valued at \$40,000, were seized and driven across the Rio Grande within thirty miles of Brownsville. Thieves are organized in Mexico, and nine-tenths of the population are Mexican bandits, who cross the River Roan and rob and murder at will. The feeling of the community is such that a retaliatory invasion of Mexico will probably soon take place if no change is made in affairs along the border. dtf

New York, March 11. - The Bogus Geneva Watch Co. is still doing an immense business notwithstanding the exposures made against it. It is said there is great consternation among the Ring officials because of Garvey's testimony that \$125,000 of the city's money was expended in altering the houses of outside parties. It is said that Ingersoll and others are ready to testify to the frauds on the city, and that Ingersoll is eager to testify, but that he will not be unless the prosecution unless he agrees to tell all he knows. It is well-known that Keyser, the Ring plumber, is also ready to establish the truth in regard to his accounts. dtf

CHANGING CLOTHING. (Hall's Journal of Health.) In the latitudes of New England and New York, going westward, the month of March is the most disagreeable of the whole year, with its changing temperature, its sleet and mud, its cold, raw, piercing, damp winds; and although not as cold as January and February, it is more prolific of dangerous diseases, greatly promoted by the hurry of the people for lighter clothing; but it would be better to wear the entire clothing through March, and even to the middle of April; and even then to the first week of May, to make no change in the outer clothing, nor any in the inner garments, except to have heavy woolen next the skin; for it is only for three hours embracing one o'clock in the afternoon that winter clothing is at all oppressive; while the very warmth of noonday makes the raw dampness of the morning and late afternoons specially felt. dtf

ALL CHANGES TO A LIGHTER AND COOLER GARMENT should be made at dressing in the morning, and if in any case the change leaves the body chilly, or soon after it is made the weather changes to be much cooler, by all means promptly, without half an hour's delay, resume the full winter dress. The old, the young, the invalid, in short all persons of feeble constitutions, of small vitality, should be especially careful to heed these suggestions; inattention to which gives rise to the very frequent announcements in the morning papers, in the early spring, "Died suddenly, yesterday, of pneumonia," - often, the very friends whom we meet in the street, or at church, within a week, apparently as well and as hearty as ever before. dtf

REFORM MEETING IN SOUTH BRUCE. A meeting of the South Bruce Reform Association was held on Friday at Riversdale. There was a larger attendance of delegates from the municipalities than has yet been at any Reform Convention in the riding. Mr. John Bruce, Walkerton, president of the association, occupied the chair until his successor was elected. The Chairman stated the objects of the meeting to be a more effective organization of the association, the election of a candidate for the Dominion Parliament. The election of officers was then proceeded with when the following gentlemen were appointed: - President, H. B. O'Connor, Riversdale; first vice-president, M. McPherson, Kincairdine; second vice-president, S. Noxon, Walkerton; secretary, John Millar, Riversdale; treasurer, Wm. Pringle, Culross township. On the motion of Mr. T. Roblin, seconded by Mr. Wm. Millar, it was agreed that there should be a Director for this Association selected from each of the municipalities, who with the officers shall constitute the executive committee. The following are the names of the directors: - Paul D. McInnes, Kincairdine village; Murdoch McLeod, Kincairdine township; Jas. Millar, Greenock township; A. Rae, Brant township; Allen McLean, Carrick township; James Gibson, Culross township; Malcolm Campbell, Kinloss township; David Henderson, Huron township; J. Craig, Walkerton. A constitution was adopted in harmony with the principles of Reform party of Ontario. After thorough organization, Mr. Malcolm McPherson moved, seconded by Mr. Jas. Gibson, that the Hon. Edward Blake should be the candidate for the South Riding of Bruce at the approaching election for the House of Commons. The motion was carried by acclamation and amid much enthusiasm. THE SHIPPING trade between the Clyde and New York, which is the most extensive of the various enterprises of the merchants on the west of Scotland, has recently increased enormously, and in the last six years has quadrupled. The Clyde steamers not only draw the Scottish emigration trade, but a considerable share of that from the north of Ireland; and of late almost the whole of the Norwegian, Danish and Swedish, and a large portion of the Danish emigrants to America pass through the Clyde by means of connecting lines of steamers from Leith and Granton. While in 1865 only 32 vessels, of 30,200 tons, arrived in the Clyde from New York, and about the same tonnage sailed thence, the number of vessels which arrived during the past year was 129, of 114,600 tons; and 117 ships of 124,700 tons sailed. dtf

THE NEW YORK World says that the present season, from January 1 to March 1, has been the driest one in many years. But little more than one-third of the usual amount of rain has fallen during these two months. The ground has fallen so low, and all the rain that has fallen has passed off directly into the streams. - None of it has soaked into the ground to supply the springs, which are now very low. The entire flow of the Croton River is now being brought into the city, and if the dry weather continues much longer resort will have to be had to the storage lakes in Putnam County for a supply of water for the city. dtf
