Public Accounts Committee.

For the past week and more the doings of the Public Accounts Commuttee have attracted more attention than the debates in the Legislative Assembly. The Opposition have been revelling in what they are pleased to call astounding revela-tions, on the strength of which some of the more sanguine hoped to turn out the Government and seize the reigs of office themselves. They find, however, much to their chagrin, that the Government remains as strong as ever, and that these revelations, when fully explained, are not so formidable after all, though the Opposition leaders, backed by the

so formidable after all, though the Soposition leaders, backed by the Opposition press, are daily magnifying them into the largest proportions. Passing over such contemptible charges as have been brought against the Hon. Mr. McKellar in connection with the purchase of a card table and other equally insignificant transactions, we come to the chief one, which was last week the subject of enquiry before the Committee, namely, the granting of a half holiday to the Government employees at the Central Prison, to attend the nomination in Toronto at the time Mr. McKellar and asked for the half holiday, in support of his plea stating that it was customary for large employers of labour to allow their men to attend on such occasions. Mr. McKellar complied with the request, and at once wrote. low their men to attend on such occasions. Mr. McKellar complied

is open to question, and for our part we think it would have been better had it not been done, because we hold that a Government should stand altogether aloof from the slightest matters, and should shun even the appearance of evil. The Clerk was instructed to procure a new corporate scal for the use of the municipality. The Courcil then adjourned, to meet on Monday the 13th April.


