Every time the juvenile court sits there are a number of girls before the stipendiary who are leading doubtful lives, and when these girls in the infancy of their life of vice are looked after by a proper person, one emin to undertake looking after them and keeping them within the meaning the act, their moral welfare will be greatly benefited.

Should Have Training Mr. Chadwick continued:

"A woman such as would be requir-

ed should have considerable training and be able to deal with the particular problem which the city girl presents. The services of such a person could be secured for \$75 per month, and she could look after a number of girls with whom the department is unable to keep in touch and look efter them." The commissioners decided to ask

Mr. Chadwick to name a suitable person, and the matter would be referred to council for consideration.

B. C. BECOMING SANER

There is an indication that the people of British Columbia, who in late years have become famous for rejecting Liberal candidates and jumping upon Liberal policies, are becoming saner. The indications are not very decided or convincing at all, but the most apparent and pronounced s the demand of some Vancouver and Victoria business men for some lowering of the high tariff bars. British Columbia has voted as though no tariff wall would be just satisfactory which did not reach up high enough to keep out everything but the sunshine. British Columbia has been described as a very high tariff province. When writers refer to the West as favorable to lower tariff, British Columbia is not included, at all, at all.

But the business men of Vancouver and Victoria see that there are possibilities in shipbuilding n British Columbia. They have the iron, the timber and all the raw material necessary but they are not doing the business.

They believe that the cause of it all is the high tariff which keeps out machinery and that sort of thing. They recognize that they cannot get well under way in the shipbuilding business as long as the tariff remains as it is at the present time. They are asking that the government remove the restrictions upon shipbuilding machinery and give them a chance to build ships. They are beginning to realize that a protective tariff instead of encouraging manufacturing in a solid reasonable manner is really preventing manufacturing.

THE COLONIAL NAVIES

The naval question is causing an amount of difficulties in the different British colonies and Canada is not alone in having its troubles in settling this important matter.

Australia is bent upon having an Australian navy. It has been making a direct contribution for some years and is far from satisfied with the results. The suggestion is that Australia should have control of the navy in time of peace but should be a part of the British navy in time of war. But a writer in The London Times calls attention to the fact that there is still a danger. "What is not realized is that the precense of such an (Australian) leet," he says, "may in themselves produce war, and that, if the Empire as a whole has no voice in the movement of the fleets, it cannot accept responsibility for consequences, which these movements may entail. In other words, the Empire,
