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Bad Fire At Halifax

Does Damage Estimated at Quarter of a Million in Block on Water Street.

Good Fortune Only Saved the City From a Great Calamity.

Halifax, N. S., Sept. 15.—Planned by a gale blowing 52 miles per hour, a fire which broke out at the middle of a block on Water street, bounded by Seville and Prince streets, did \$250,000 damage before it was extinguished two and a half hours later.

The buildings destroyed and the firms burned out include A. C. Jones & Co., Wm. Robertson & Son (damaged only), G. F. Mitchell, Messrs. N. M. Smith, Dominion Coal Co., Hon. Wm. Ross, J. Egan and the various banks and offices of the Canadian Atlantic and Plant Steamship Company.
