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Eclipses, 1884.

In the year 1884 there will be three Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

I.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, March 26, 1884, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, March 26, 17h. 10m. 8s., Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $9^{\circ} 51'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $53^{\circ} 43'$ N.

Greatest Eclipse, March 26, 18h. 2m. 2s. Mag. (Sun's diam. = 1) 0.149, in Longitude $7^{\circ} 48'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $72^{\circ} 4'$ N.

Ends on the Earth generally, March 26, 18h. 53m. 5s., in Longitude $115^{\circ} 29'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $87^{\circ} 9'$ N.

II.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, April 9-10, 1884, invisible at Greenwich.

The first contact with the Shadow occurs at 91° from the Northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the East.

The last contact at 61° towards the West; in each case, for *direct* image.

III.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, April 25, 1884, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, April 25, 1h. 0m. 2s., Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $82^{\circ} 10'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $59^{\circ} 9'$ S.

Greatest Eclipse, April 25, 2h. 46m. 3s. Mag. (Sun's diam. = 1) 0.758, in Longitude $4^{\circ} 38'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $70^{\circ} 52'$ S.

Ends on the Earth generally, April 25, 1h. 32m. 5s., in Longitude $12^{\circ} 25'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $33^{\circ} 6'$ S.

IV.—A Total Eclipse of the Moon, October 4, 1884, visible at Greenwich.

The first contact with the Shadow occurs at 83° from the Northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the East.

The last contact, 118° towards the West; in each case, for *direct* image.

V.—A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, October 18, 1884, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, Oct. 18, 10h. 19m. 9s., Mean Time at Greenwich, in Longitude $131^{\circ} 56'$ E. of Greenwich, and Latitude $63^{\circ} 28'$ N.

Greatest Eclipse, Oct. 18, 12h. 17m. 9s., Mag. (Sun's diam. = 1) 0.642, in Longitude $130^{\circ} 3'$ W. of Greenwich, and Lat. $71^{\circ} 33'$ N.

Ends on the Earth generally, Oct. 18, 14h. 15m. 8s., in Longitude $134^{\circ} 21'$ W. of Greenwich, and Latitude $33^{\circ} 20'$ N.

NOTE.—The Tide Tables in the Calendar pages may be rendered applicable to various other places on the coast, by simply adding or subtracting, as the case may be, the difference between the times of High Water on the full and change of the Moon at St. John's, and the time of the Fall tide at any other harbor; for example, to find the time of High Water at any of the principal harbors of Conception Bay, add 45 minutes to the time at which it will be High Water at St. John's; for Placentia Bay add 2 hours; for St. Peter's, 1h. 50m.; for Ferolle, on the North West Coast, 4 hours, &c.—See table LVII of Norie's Epitome.

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5.—The moon's changes, first quarter, full, and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours—i.e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent upon the wind, as is noted in table.

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A Table

For telling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year, for ever.

This table is the result of many years' actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

5.—The moon's changes, first quarter, full, and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours—i.e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent upon the wind, as is noted in table.

4.—The space of this calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon.—These observations refer principally to the summer, though they affect spring and autumn nearly in the same ratio.

3.—The nearer to midday or noon the phases of the moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.

2.—The space of this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

1.—The nearer the times of the Moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following.

ALEXANDRIA VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, only daughter and heir to the late Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, fourth son of King George III. Her Majesty was born at Kensington Palace on the 24th May, 1819; baptized on the 24th June, 1819; ascended the Throne on the demise of her uncle, King William IV., 20th June, 1837; proclaimed 21st June, 1837; and crowned at Westminster on the 28th June, 1838. Her Majesty was married at St. James's Palace, on the 10th February, 1840, to her cousin, his late Royal Highness, Francis-Albert-Augustus-Charles-Emanuel, Duke of Saxe, Prince of Coburg and Gotha, who died at Windsor Castle on the 14th December, 1861. Alfred-Ernest-Albert, born 6th August, 1844; married 25th Feb., 1874, to her Imperial Highness, Alexandrovna, daughter of the late Czar of Russia.

Helena-Augusta-Victoria, born 25th May, 1846; married 5th July, 1866, to his Royal Highness, Prince Christian, of Schleswig Holstein-Sonderburg-Augustenburg.

Between Heart's Content, Grates Cove, New Perlican, Hant's Harbor, and Old Perlican, weekly, by Messenger.

Between Heart's Content, Random, and Smith's Sound, on Fridays, by boat.

Between Carbonar, Blackhead and Bay-de-Verds, bi-weekly, by messenger, calling at intermediate places.

Between New Perlican and Trinity, weekly, by boat.

Between Trinity and Bonavista, and between Trinity and King's Cove, weekly, by messenger.

Between King's Cove and Greenspond, fortnightly, by boat, touching at Salvage, Gooseberry, Cottell's Island, and Flat Islands.

Between St. John's, Bay-de-Verds, Catalina, King's Cove, Trinity, Bonavista, Greenspond, Fogo, Twillingate, Exploits, Sealbay, Little Bay, Little Bay Islands, Tilt Cove and Nipper's Harbor, by coastal steamer, fortnightly, on the Tuesday after the arrival of the steamer from Liverpool and Queenstown; and during winter months, overland, via Harbor Grace, Spaniard's Bay, Newharbor, Random, and Freshwater, fortnightly.

Between St. John's and Placentia, by wagon, on Wednesday and Friday, from the 15th of April to the 16th of November; weekly to the end of December, and fortnightly during January, February and March, and to middle of April.

Between Placentia and St. John's, by wagon, on Monday and Wednesday, from the 15th of April to the 15th of November; once a week to the end of December, and fortnightly in winter.

Between Salmonier and St. Mary's, by messenger, fortnightly.

Between Great and Little Placentia, by messenger, weekly.

Between Great Placentia, LaManche, Sound Island, Harbor Buffett, Red Island, Merasheen, and Burgeo, by boat.

Between Great Placentia and Burin, by boat, touching at Isle Valen, Paradise, Oderin, and Flat Islands.

Between Burin and Isle Valen, calling at Flat Islands, Oderin, and Paradise.

Between Burin and Garuish, by messenger, winter months only.

Between Little and Great St. Lawrence and Lamaline, by messenger.

Between Garuish and Harbor Breton, calling at English Harbor and St. Jacques, by boat.

Between St. Jacques and Bay L'Argent, calling at intermediate places, by boat.

Between Harbor Briton, Pushthrough, Rencontre, Rameo, Burnt Islands and Petites, by boat.

RATES OF POSTAGE.

Postage on letters addressed to the United States, the Dominion of Canada, the United Kingdom, and foreign Europe, is as follows:

For letters under $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., five cents, and five cents for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

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For Bermuda, West Indies, Brazil, Peru, and Uruguay, eight cents under $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. letters, and 8 cents for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

For East Indies and China, Japan and Java, ten cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. rate.

For Australian Colonies and South Africa, fifteen cents per rate. Newspapers three cents.

Local newspapers to United States, the Dominion, West Indies, Foreign Europe, and to England one cent.

Foreign Newspapers re-mailed for transmission to the Outports are charged one cent each, prepaid by stamp; two cents to other countries.

Newspapers over two ounces in weight are charged as Books.

INLAND POSTAGE.

For letters under $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. 3 cents.
under 1 oz. 6 cents.

Three cents for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., prepaid by stamps.

For book packets, pamphlets, magazines, and periodicals under 2 ozs., 1 cent; not exceeding three pounds in weight, transmitted by post within the Island, are charged 2 cents for every quarter pound of their weight, or fraction thereof.

Postage on letters for French Islands, St. Pierre and Miquelon—Five cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. rate, and registration five cents.

PARCEL POSTAGE

Parcels closed at the ends and sides, but not sealed or closed with gum, may be posted at any Post Office in Newfoundland for conveyance to any other Post Office or Way Office in the Island at a rate of postage subject to the following conditions:—

1. No letter or letters shall be concealed.

2. The parcel shall not contain any explosive substances, glass, liquid, or other matter likely to injure the ordinary contents of the mail, under penalty of forfeiture of the parcel.

3. The weight of the parcel should not exceed 3 lbs., nor the size exceed one foot, in length or breadth, or six inches in thickness. It must be so put up that the contents may be examined, to prevent letters or other communications being enclosed.

4. Parcels must be prepaid at the following rates:

Under $\frac{1}{2}$ lb 2 cents.

Over $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. and not exceeding $\frac{3}{4}$ lb 4 cents.

Over $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. and not exceeding 1 lb 6 cents;

and so on, adding 2 cents for every $\frac{1}{2}$ lb., or fraction thereof.

5. The parcel may be registered on payment of a fee of three cents in addition to the postage.

6. If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned unopened to the sender, on payment of an additional rate of 8 cents for the return conveyance.

7. The parcel should have the words "By Parcel Post" plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, including the name of the district in which the Post

Office is situated. The following is an example of the mode of address recommended:—

PROHIBITORY CLAUSES.

No written communication shall be enclosed in any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book parcel, or parcel for the Parcel Post; and no communication shall be written upon any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book package, or parcel.

No letter, or any writing, or any marks to serve the purpose of a letter, shall be written upon or enclosed in any newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper.

Prepaid books, pamphlets and magazines for Great Britain, Dominion of Canada, and United States, are charged the following rates when exceeding two ounces in weight:

For packet above 2 ozs., and not exceeding 4 ozs., 4 cents;
 not exceeding 8 ozs., 8 cents;
 Over 8 ozs., and not exceeding 1 lb., 16 cents;
 and so on, adding 4 cents for every additional 4 ozs., or fraction thereof, when the packet exceeds two ounces in weight.

Commercial papers, invoices, &c., are chargeable with 5 cents for the first rate of two ounces or fraction thereof, and four cents per four ounces or any fraction thereof over the first two ounces.

Books, trade patterns or samples, and all printed papers, other than newspapers, not exceeding two ounces in weight, are forwarded to the United Kingdom at the reduced rate of:

For a packet not exceeding 2 ozs..... 2 cents.

All parcels containing books, patterns, newspaper or printed matter of any kind, must be so put up that the contents may be easily withdrawn for examination; if sealed, such packets become liable to letter rate and will be charged accordingly.

Unpaid books for the United Kingdom or other countries, will not be forwarded.

Letters for officers serving in Her Majesty's service abroad are chargeable with the ordinary rates of postage.

The attention of the public is called to the fact that the General Postal Union Treaty positively prohibits the transmission in the Mails, of gold or silver money, jewels or precious articles, or any other article whatever liable to Customs' duties. Therefore, correspondence originating in Newfoundland, and addressed to any of the countries of the Postal Union, whether ordinary or registered, should not contain these interdicted articles.

Rules of Rating Letters by British Packet.

For all countries—under ½ oz., one rate; under 1 oz., two rates; under 1½ ozs., three rates; and so on, adding one rate for every ½ oz.

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Letters posted in Newfoundland for delivery at any place within the Island, are charged 3 cents for every $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., if prepaid, and 6 cents, unpaid.

REGISTRATION.

Any letters found to contain coin, as well as any having the word "Registered" written upon them, which may be posted in Newfoundland, will be forwarded to any part of the Colony, charged with a double registration fee. For United Kingdom, foreign countries and Dominion of Canada, they will not be forwarded upon any terms.

MONEY ORDER BRANCH.

Office hours—From 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Money Orders are now interchanged with the United Kingdom, Dominion of Canada, Prince Edward Island, and United States, at the following rates of commission:—

Scale for Inland Orders.—Orders up to \$10, 5 cents; from \$10 to \$20, 10 cents; from \$20 to \$30, 15 cents; from \$30 to \$40, 20 cents; from \$40 to \$50, 25 cents. Maximum amount of inland order, \$50.

Scale for United Kingdom.—Orders up to £2 stg., 9d. stg.; from £2 to £5, 1s. 6d.; from £5 to £7, 2s. 3d.; from £7 to £10, 3s. Maximum amount of Order on United Kingdom, £10.

Scale for Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island.—Orders up to £5 stg., 1s. stg.; from £5 to £10, 2s.; from £10 to £15, 3s.; from £15 to £20, 4s. Maximum amount of Order on the Provinces, £20.

Scale for United States.—Orders up to \$10, 10 cents; from \$10 to \$20, 20 cents; from \$20 to \$30, 30 cents; from \$30 to \$40, 40 cents; from \$40 to \$50, 50 cents.

No half-pence to be introduced in the Orders.

Business of Money Order Office closes one hour before closing the mails by steamer.

SYSTEM.

1. Money Orders are made out in forms supplied for the use of the Money Order offices.

2. Persons applying for Money Orders are recommended to use printed "Application Forms," printed for that purpose.

3. Place of Payment of Money Order may be changed in accordance with instructions provided therefor.

4. Alteration of payee's name may be effected by issue of a new Order and payment of commission thereon.

5. Applicants for Money Orders are expected to observe due care in the examination of the same, relative to filling and stamping; defect in Orders, when presented for payment, may cause difficulty and delay, for which the paying office is not to be held accountable.

6. Postmasters should be particularly careful to obtain from the person who presents a Money Order, whether the rightful owner or not, full information as to the Christian name, surname and address of the party who originally obtained it, unless such party be a firm, when the name of the firm will suffice. *The only exception to this rule is*—when an Order is presented through the Bank, in which case it will suffice that the Order, being properly signed, be also crossed with the Banker's name.

7. As, however, after once paying a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, the office will not be liable to any further claim, the public are strictly cautioned,—

1st—To take all means to prevent the loss of the Money Order.

2d—To be careful on taking out an Order, to state correctly the Christian as well as the surname of the person in whose favor it is drawn.

3rd—To see that the name of the person taking out the Money Order is correctly known to the person in whose favor it is drawn.

8. Payment of a Money Order must be obtained before the end of the sixth calendar month after that in which it was issued, otherwise a new Order will be necessary, for which a second commission will be charged; and if the Order be not paid before the twelfth calendar month after that in which it was issued, all claims to the money will be lost.

Neglect of the foregoing instructions will risk the loss of the money, besides leading to delay and trouble in obtaining payment.

The Money Order offices are:—General Post Office, St. John's; Post Offices at Bay Bulls, Bonavista, Brigus, Burgeo, Burin, Betts Cove, Bay of Islands, Bay Roberts, Channel, Carbonear, Ferryland, Fogo, Greenspond, Heart's Content, Harbor Briton, Harbor Grace, LaPoile, Littlebay, Placencia, Rose Blanche, Trepassey, Trinity, Twillingate.

9. Postmasters should recommend the use of Money Orders for the transmission of money, in preference to such transmission otherwise.

Suggestions to the Public.

Facility will be given to the Post Office in the discharge of its daily duties, and greater security afforded to the public, by careful attention to the following recommendations:—

Post all Letters, Newspapers, &c., as early as practicable, especially when sent in large bundles.

When a number of newspapers are addressed to the same office, put them up in one parcel.

When a number of circulars are posted, tie them up in a bundle, with the address all in one direction.

Address letters, papers, &c., in a legible and complete manner, always giving the name of the Post Office; and if there be more than one Post Office of that name, the name of the district in which situated. In case of letters going abroad, the name of the country, as well as of the town and city, should be given in full. Letters, for example, intended for London, England, if simply addressed "London," would be forwarded to London, Canada West, and thus be delayed.

Letters, papers, or parcels, for Outports, should have the name of the district, post or way office, distinctly written as part of the address. For instance, letters for Bonne Bay, French Shore, are sometimes sent to Bonne Bay, Fortune Bay District, being simply directed Bonne Bay. There are several settlements named Broad Cove, Littlebay, English Harbor, Blackhead, Balline, Caplinecove, Deer Island, Flat Islands, Fortune, Foxcove, Freshwater, Island Cove, Long Harbor, Burgeo, New Harbor, Salmoncove, Seal-

cove, Shipcove; and unless properly directed, are liable to go to the wrong office for delivery. The loss and inconvenience arising from imperfect directions are caused by the carelessness of the sender, and no blame can attach to the Post Office. Other places besides those named have settlements with corresponding appellation; hence the necessity of being particular in addressing all letters, &c.

See that every letter, newspaper or other packet sent by post, is securely folded and sealed. Every such packet has to be several times handled; and even when in the mail bag, is exposed to pressure and friction. Unless, therefore, the article be light and pliant, it should be enclosed in strong paper, linen, parchment, or other material which will not readily tear or break.

Fasten the covers of newspapers firmly, so as to prevent them from slipping out.

Fully pay postage on newspapers, otherwise you lose both papers and stamps, as such are not forwarded.

When dropping a letter or newspaper into a letter-box, always see that the packet falls into the box, and does not stick in its passage.

Never seal letters for the East and West Indies and other hot climates with wax. Such a practice is attended with much inconvenience, and frequently with serious injury, in consequence of the melting of the wax and the adhesion of the letters to each other. In all such cases use wafers or gum, and advise your correspondents in the country referred to, to do the same.

Never send money or other articles of value through the Post-office, except either by means of a money order or in a registered letter. "Any person who sends money or jewelery in an unregistered letter, not only runs the risk of losing his property, but exposes to temptation every one through whose hands his letter passes, and may be the means of ultimately bringing some clerk or letter-carrier to moral ruin." Carefully secure every letter or packet containing money or value, first with gum and afterwards with good sealing wax, on which mark the clear impression of a seal. This only applies to local correspondence, the forwarding of such articles to other countries being prohibited.

On posting a registered letter or packet, always obtain a receipt for the same at the office where posted.

When letters or newspapers are delayed and missing, at once communicate the fact to the Postmaster of the division in which is situated the Post office at which the delayed or missing letters were posted. In case of a missing letter enclosing value, state the exact contents, the exact address, and the office at which posted; the name of the person by whom posted, and the name of the person by whom received at the office. In the case of a delayed letter or paper, send the cover or wrapper in an entire state, in order that the place of delay may be ascertained by an examination of the post marks.

Trouble and loss occasionally arise out of the carelessness or dishonesty of parties employed in the Post Office service; yet instances are not wanting in which it has been shown to the satisfaction even of the complainants, that the fault at first attributed to the Post Office, in truth rested in other quarters. Theft by private hands, although very difficult of proof, has frequently been brought to light; and it is greatly to be desired, that those who suffer loss should in the first instance, and while the circumstances are fresh, endeavor to ascertain with the utmost precision all par-

ticalars respecting the despatch or receipt of the lost letters or papers, and lose no time in communicating the information to the Postmaster. Indeed, generally speaking, it is only by careful inquiry into minute details that the offender can be detected, whether he be a servant of a department or not.

The Post Office is a department which admits of constant improvement and expansion. The public, by sending to the Postmaster-General clear and correct information respecting faulty arrangements, may materially benefit the service. It must be remembered, however, that changes in machinery so extensive and intricate as that of the Post Office, must be made cautiously and with much previous consideration.

Time is generally required to carry out any material change in postal arrangements; for even when decided upon, old contracts requiring notice of termination may have to be got rid of, and tenders for new contracts invited by public advertisements, before the decision can take effect.

New Post Offices are established by the department wherever it is ascertained that a sufficient number of inhabitants can be accommodated, and a sufficient amount of postal revenue collected to warrant such a measure. When a new Post Office is required, a petition should be addressed to the Postmaster-General, signed by as many of the inhabitants as can conveniently subscribe the same. The petition should state the name of the settlement and district in which it desired the office should be established; the distance from the neighboring offices; whether at the site of the proposed Post Office there is a village; the number of mills, stores, taverns and houses thereat; the extent of the settlement to be served, and the probable cost of the mail, together with any other facts that may form any ground for the accommodation applied for.

The attention of Mariners is particularly called to the extreme uncertainty there is in the range of sounds. A signal that may not be heard under certain conditions of the atmosphere more than one or two miles, will under others reach twenty or more miles.

Light Dues.—One shilling per ton on all vessels entering any port or harbor of the colony, except coasting, sealing or fishing vessels; but not to be levied more than once in one year. Sealing and coasting vessels: sixpence per ton on registered vessels of 40 tons and upwards; fifteen shillings per ton on all vessels less than 40 tons.

The 19th of Victoria, cap. 5, sec. 5, enacts:—That no greater sum than 225 sterling shall be in any year levied for light dues on any steamer or vessel entering any port of this Colony; and no steamer plying between Europe and any port of North America, and entering any port of this Colony, as a port of call, shall be liable to pay any light dues or other port charges except pilotage.

Guillemot Head, Island of St. Peter's.—A White Flash Light. Elevation above high water, 64 metres (204 English feet). Distance at which the light is visible—18 miles. The light is hidden at the northward by the high land of St. Peter's.

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Light at the north entrance of St. Peter's.—Since the 1st October, 1862, the entrance of the harbor of St. Peter's, called South Channel, has been marked by two small fixed lights, one of which is a White Light, illuminating three-fourths of the horizon, and placed on the battery, and the other a red light, on the plain at the north of the town. The white light has an elevation of 11 metres, and is visible six miles. The red light is elevated nineteen metres, visible three miles distant. The line connecting these two lights indicates the middle Channel.

The position of the red light has also been so determined, that as soon as it is seen on the left of Cape Eagle, vessels coming from Colubder, in berthing into the Northeast entrance, will have nothing to fear from the shoals of Cape Rouge.

Light on the Southwest Point of the Island of Dogs, called Pointe a Leconte.—From the 1st August, 1874, a light has been exhibited on the Southwest Point of the Island of Dogs, at the place called Pointe a Leconte, at 100 metres (327 English feet) above the level of the sea. It will be seen in clear weather seven miles. The extent of the light is circumscribed in a sector of 163°, presenting two cones of light: one white, of 40°, will light the passage of the Southeast, so as to permit vessels, which maintain position within this cone to avoid at the right the shoal Bataille, and to the left the rock of Cape Noir and the rock Bertrand. The second cone is red, of 123°. It should be avoided by vessels entering by the Southeast passage, and will enable them, when they have quitted the white cone, to come to anchor in the roadstead, or in the Baracois, in following the line of the white light from Point aux Canons, and of the red light from the interior of the city.

A light house has been erected by the Government of Canada on the western side of Cape Ray, on the southwest coast of the Island of Newfoundland—latitude 47° 57' North, longitude 59° 18' West. A powerful flash white light is exhibited, making a complete revolution in two and one quarter minutes, and flashing every ten seconds; at a long distance, however, it has the appearance of a steady light. The light can probably be seen at a distance of twenty miles, in clear weather.

The tower is a wooden building, hexagonal in shape, forty-one feet high, and painted white. The keeper's dwelling, also of wood, stands at a little distance from the tower, and is also painted white.

The illuminating apparatus is Catoptric, and consists of twelve lamps and reflectors.

A fog whistle is in operation at Cape Ray. It will be blown in thick and foggy weather, and during snow storms for ten seconds in each minute, leaving an interval of fifty seconds between each blast. It can be heard from three to fifteen miles.

It shall not be lawful for any importer of dried fish to warehouse the same in any of the ports of this colony or its dependencies, without the payment of the duty heretofore imposed: and the provision of any Act of this colony with regard to the warehousing of goods on the first entry thereof, or to the allowance of drawbacks upon exportation, shall not in either case apply to or be construed to apply to such fish: Provided, that the section shall not apply to such fish of British catch and cure, unless otherwise declared by proclamation of the Governor, published in the *Royal Gazette*.

All yachts, sailing under warrant of the Lords of the Admiralty, or belonging to the Royal Yacht Club, shall be exempted, on view of the said warrant, from payment of all local duties whatsoever.

Board of Examiners

For granting Certificates to Masters and Mates in the Merchant Service.—Staff-Commander Robinson, R.N., examiner-in-chief. Assistant examiner—Edward English, late master in the Mercantile marine.

Harbor Master and Harbor Dues.

Harbor Master—Staff-Commander Robinson, R.N.

Harbor Dues—The following amounts, as harbor dues, shall be paid by vessels arriving at the port of St. John's, at the time of their being entered at the Custom-house, except ships of war and vessels engaged in the coasting trade and fishing, viz.:

Every vessel of sixty tons and upwards, and not more than one hundred tons, \$2.

Every vessel of more than one hundred tons, and not more than two hundred tons, \$3.

Every vessel of more than two hundred tons, and not more than three hundred tons, \$4.

Every vessel of more than three hundred tons, and not more than four hundred tons, \$5.

Every vessel of more than four hundred tons, \$6.

Provided, that no vessel shall be compelled to pay harbor dues more than once in every half-year, viz.: Once between the first day of January and thirtieth day of June, and once between the thirtieth day of June and first day of January.

Rules and Regulations

Made by the Governor in Council, for carrying out an Act respecting Certificates to Masters and Mates, 38 Victoria, Cap. 1, St. John's, Newfoundland.

GENERAL RULES.

1. All applicants for examination shall pay, previous to examination, to the Colonial Secretary, the following mentioned fees:—

For a certificate as master, ten dollars; for a certificate as mate, five dollars; and in the event of any applicant failing to procure his certificate of qualification on his first examination, he will be

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entitled to a second examination without payment of any additional fee; but if he fail to procure his certificate of qualification on such second examination, he shall pay the same fee previous to any subsequent examination as is hereby required to be paid previous to a first examination for the certificate he seeks to procure.

2. Testimonials of character, sobriety, experience, ability, and good conduct on board ship will be required of all applicants, and without producing them no person will be examined; and as such testimonials may require examination, it is desirable that they should be lodged as early as possible.

3. Services of seamen that are not verified by the production of a certificate of discharge, or a certificate from the shipping master at St. John's, or the assistant collector at Harbor Grace, stating that such seamen did serve in such vessel specified, and in the capacity, and for the period claimed, will not be accepted, unless the applicant produce satisfactory documentary evidence either from the master he sailed with or from the owners of the vessel he sailed in, stating the time he served in the vessel, and the capacity in which he served. Service as second mate in Newfoundland registered vessels will on no account be allowed to count as mate's service, unless the rating be conclusively shown to be applicable to the class of vessel. Whenever a man has been regularly promoted, on a vacancy in the course of the voyage, to the rank of master or mate, such promotion and its date must be verified by a certificate either from the master or the owner of the vessel, to enable him to receive credit for his service in a higher grade.

3 (a).—Candidates for the ordinary certificate of master, first mate, only mate, or second mate, will be required to prove that they have served at sea at least twelve months in a square-rigged sailing vessel.

In a case where an applicant for a certificate of master, first mate, only mate, or second mate, has only served in fore-and-aft rigged vessels, and is ignorant of the management of square-rigged vessels, he may obtain a certificate on which the words "fore-and-aft-rigged" vessel will be written: this certificate will not entitle the holder to act in a square-rigged vessel.

A candidate possessing a certificate for "fore-and-aft-rigged" vessels, and desiring to obtain an ordinary certificate of the same grade, must prove that he has served at sea at least twelve months in a square-rigged sailing vessel, and will be examined in navigation and seamanship. He will be required to pay half the usual fee.

4. Candidates for examination must give in their names to the examiners three days before the board meets.

5. Candidates will be required to appear at the examination-room punctually at the time appointed.

6. Candidates are prohibited from bringing into the examination-room books or papers of any kind.

7. In the event of any candidate being detected defacing, writing in, or blotting any book belonging to the examiners, the papers of such candidate will be detained until the book is replaced, but he will not be permitted to retain the damaged book.

8. In the event of any candidate being discovered copying from another, or affording assistance, he will subject himself to a failure.

9. No candidate will be permitted to work out his problem on a slate or waste paper.

10. No candidate will be permitted to leave the room until he has given up the paper on which he is engaged.

11. Candidates will be allowed to work out the various problems by the method and tables they have been accustomed to use, and will be allowed six hours to perform the work. At the expiration of the six hours, they will, if they have not finished, be declared to have failed, unless the examiners see fit to extend it.

12. Candidates will be expected to correct the declination and other elements of the nautical almanac by the "hourly differences," and will not be permitted to use inspection tables for that purpose. Every correction must appear on the paper of the candidates.

13. Candidates are expected to bring their answers to all problems within or not to exceed a margin of one mile from a correct result.

14. In finding the longitude by chronometer, the logarithms used in finding the hour angle should be taken out for seconds of arc.

15. In all other problems the logarithms to the nearest minute will be sufficiently correct for all grades except master.

15 (a). In every case the examination, whether for only mate, first mate, or master, is to commence with the problems for second mate.

15 (b). In all cases of failure the candidate must be re-examined *de novo*. If a candidate fails in *several* parts he will not be re-examined until after the lapse of six months, to give him time to gain experience. If he fails three times in *any* part, he will not be re-examined until after a lapse of three months from the date of the last failure.

15 (c). If an applicant is examined in one part and fails, but passes an examination of another part, he will receive a certificate accordingly, but no part of the fee will be refunded.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR CERTIFICATE AS SECOND MATE OF A COAST GUARD VESSEL.

16. A second mate must have voyaged four years, and must have been four years at sea.

In Navigation.—He must write, read, and understand the first five rules of arithmetic, and the use of logarithms. He must be able to work a day's work of a ship, including the bearings and distance of the port he is bound to, by meridian's method; to correct the sun's declination for time and find his latitude by meridian altitude of the sun; and work seven or eight problems of a like nature as may be put to him. He must understand the use of the sextant, and be able to observe with it and read off the arc.

In Seamanship.—He must give a satisfactory answer as to the rigging and unrigging of ships, crowding or uncrowding, and must understand the measurement of the log-line, and be able to give a correct account of the rule of the port, and of all the dangers and sailing vessels, and the lights and fog signals, made by them. He must pass a satisfactory examination in the International code of signals.

17. An only mate must be five years at sea, and have been five years at sea.

In Navigation.—In addition to the qualification required for a second mate, an only mate must be able to observe and calculate the amplitude of the sun, and deduce the variation of the compass.

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therefrom, and be able to find the longitude by chronometer by the usual methods. He must know how to lay off the place of the ship on the chart, both by bearings of known objects and by latitude and longitude. He must be able to determine the error of a sextant and to adjust it; also to find the time of high water from the known time of the full and change.

In Seamanship.—In addition to what is required for a second mate, he must know how to moor and unmoor, and to keep a clear anchor; to carry out an anchor; to stow a hold; and to make the requisite entries in ship's log.

He will also be questioned as to his knowledge of the use and management of the mortar and rocket lines in case of the stranding of a vessel.

18. A first mate must be nineteen years of age and have served five years at sea, of which one year must have been as either second or only mate.

In Navigation.—In addition to the qualifications required for an only mate, he must be able to observe azimuths and compute the variation; to compare chronometers and keep their rates, and find the longitude by them from an observation of the sun to work the latitude by single altitude of the sun off the meridian; and be able to use and adjust the sextant by the sun.

In Seamanship.—In addition to the qualifications required for an only mate, a more extensive knowledge of seamanship will be required as to shifting large spars and sails, managing a ship in stormy weather, taking in and making sail, shifting yards and masts, and getting heavy weights, anchors, &c., in and out; casting a ship on a lee shore; securing the masts in the event of accident to the bowsprits.

19. A master (ordinary) must be twenty-one years of age, and have been six years at sea, of which at least one year must have been as first or only mate, and one year as second mate.

In addition to the qualification for a first mate, he must be able to find the latitude by a star, &c. He must also be able to answer to a certain number of the questions on compass deviation contained in circular 547, issued by the Board of Trade, 1871. He will be examined in so much of the laws of the tides as is necessary to enable him to shape a course and to compare his soundings with the depth of water marked on the charts. He will be examined as to his competency to construct jury rudders and rafts; and as to his resources for the preservation of the ship's crew in the event of wreck. He must be able to heave a ship down to get lowermasts in and out, and to perform such other operations of like nature as the examiner may consider necessary.

He must possess a sufficient knowledge of what he is required to do by law, as to entry and discharge, and the management of his crew, and as to penalties and entries to be made in the official log; and a knowledge of the measures for preventing and checking the outbreak of fever on board ship.

He will be questioned as to his knowledge of invoices, charter-party, Lloyd's agent, and as to the nature of bottomry; and he must be acquainted with the leading lights of the channel or coast he has been accustomed to navigate or which he is going to use.

From the 1st of August, 1881, candidates for second, only, first mates' and masters' certificates of competency will, in addition to the present requirements for these grades, be required to pass an examination in the subjects specified below.

In Navigation.—A second mate will be required to find the time of high water at a given port; to observe and calculate the amplitude of the sun, and to find the error of the ship's compass therefrom, and also the deviation, the variation being given. He must also be able to find the daily rate of the chronometer from error observed, and to find the longitude by altitude of the sun by the usual methods.

An only mate will be required to find the true bearing of the sun, and the error of the ship's compass from an observed azimuth of the sun, both from an altitude and also from the "time azimuth tables," and with the variation given compute the deviation; to find the latitude from a single altitude of the sun off the meridian, and also to ascertain the true bearing of the sun and the ship's position by Sumner's method by projection. He must also be conversant with the use of Mercator's chart, and be able to find, on either a *true* or *magnetic* chart, the course to steer, and the distance from one given position to another; to find the ship's position on the chart from cross bearings of two objects; from two bearings of the same object, the course and distance between the bearings being given; and also to find the distance of the ship from the object at the time of taking the second bearings.

A master will also be required to find the true bearing of the sun from the "time azimuth tables," and with the variation given compute the deviation, and work out the same problems, on either a *true* or *magnetic* chart, as are required from the only or first mate. He will also be required to find the course to steer by compass, in order to counteract the effect of a given current, and to find the distance the ship will make good towards a given point in a certain time, and to *work out practically* the correction to apply to soundings taken at a given time and place to compare with the depth marked on the chart.
