ENGLAND WILL SEND OUT MORE VOLUNTEERS TO SOUTH AFRICA.

Force Will Be Called the "Imperial Yeomanry," to be Recruited From the Yeomanry, Volunteers and Civilians.

All News From General Buller's Camp is Severely Censored—No Full List of Casualties as Yet—Kitchener to Hurry to the Cape on the Cruiser Isis—Did Canadians Have a Brush With the Boers?

The Dominion Cabinet sat till 7 o'clock last evening discussing the details of the second contingent for South Africa. Dr. Borden, Minister of Militia, declined to make a statement, as the full arrangements had not yet been completed. He said, however, that there would be no difficulty in raising the contingent, which ought to be ready to sail within three weeks. The general belief is that the composition of the contingent will be three field batteries and the balance mounted infantry, making in all about 1000 men. Among the mounted infantry will be N. W. M. P. and ex-members of that force.

CABINET NOW ARRANGING THE NECESSARY DETAILS

Composition of the Second Canadian Contingent Will Likely Be Three Field Batteries and Mounted Infantry, Making in All 1000 Men—Enthusiasm Everywhere.

Ottawa, Dec. 19.—The Cabinet did not adjourn its session until after 7 o'clock this evening. The meeting was for the purpose of arranging the details of the second contingent. When the time for adjournment was reached, Dr. Borden told the press correspondents that he had nothing to say, as the full arrangements were not completed. Some matters of detail had to be arranged, and until that was done no official announcement would be made. "One thing is certain," said Dr. Borden, after refusing to say anything in respect to the composition of the contingent, "that merit and special fitness for the service will be the only passports to be appointed members of the contingent. No other consideration will prevail. Upon that point I have fully made up my mind. There will be no difficulty in raising the contingent. Indeed, I have the whole program mapped out in my own mind, and expect to be able to make it public some time today. The contingent ought to be ready to sail within three weeks.

Want to Go as Scouts

Captain Hudson of Chicago, formerly a scout in the Northwest rebellion, offers his services, as also does Joseph Brant, a descendant of Chief Brant, from Brantford, Ontario. The corps came from offers of services with the next force. Brantford here are talking over their minds that one of the batteries will be made up of men from Brantford in Kingston and the third in Quebec.

Volunteers in Hamilton.

A Large Number of the Local Corps Offer to Lend a Hand to Britain.

Hamilton, Dec. 19.—(Special.)—As soon as it was known here that the second Canadian contingent would be largely composed of artillery and cavalry, a large number of the members of the local corps came forward and offered their services. Among others who have volunteered to go to the front is Lieut. Miller. Several non-commissioned officers have also volunteered.

Does Not Approve or Disapprove of the Second Contingent From Canada.

Montreal, Dec. 19.—(Special.)—Tooe Mr. Tarte is having a hard row to hoe these days. This evening La Patrie has an article on the second contingent, but the Minister, who writes the leader, forgets to say whether he approves or opposes the idea of sending more troops to South Africa. "The electorate of the British Isles," says Mr. Tarte's paper, "will be able to judge later on the conduct of the Government, but the colonies who furnish men, and money to Great Britain will not have this privilege. They are neither directly nor indirectly represented in the Imperial Parliament, and war was declared without their participation. We do not know," continues poor Mr. Tarte's paper, "whether there are many clear-headed people who believe it to be the duty of the colonies to send aid to England under these circumstances."

REPORTS ALL CENSORED.

An Accurate Idea of the Battle of Tugela River Has Not Yet Been Received.

London, Dec. 20.—Special reports regarding the fighting at the Tugela River are still filtering through, but all the newspapers complain that these are severely censored, and it is still impossible to get an accurate idea of the battle. From the latest accounts, however, it appears that General Buller was in personal command. A Boer Excuse. A correspondent of the Associated Press at Buller's Camp says the Boers excuse themselves for firing on the stretcher-bearers by asserting that two squads of the Connaught Rangers, who were carrying the wounded, were firing at them, and that three being killed and several wounded.

CANADA CAN PRODUCE A WHOLE ARMY OF SCOUTS.

Premier Haultain Says That Within Twenty-four Hours Alberta Could Form a Corps of Mounted Men, 1000 Strong, All Good Marksman, Just Such as Are Needed.

Winnipeg, Dec. 19.—(Special.)—F. W. G. Haultain, Premier of the Northwest Territory, was seen by a reporter today, and in conversation about the second Transvaal contingent said: "It is apparently the intention of the Government to send more mounted troops, and it is evident that British forces are most in need of irregular cavalry such as Canada can well furnish to do scout work."

Mounted Police Anxious To Go to South Africa to Act as Scouts, and They Know Their Business.

Regina, N.W.T., Dec. 19.—(Special.)—Ready willingness has been expressed from the beginning of the war by members of the Northwest Mounted Police to enlist for service in South Africa. The reverses recently suffered there have but intensified this feeling. Our men are eminently fitted for scouting duties as they are plainly lacking in the campaign. Commissioner Herchmer has communicated with Ottawa, volunteering his own services and offering to raise a corps of 300 picked men, composed of police, ex-police and other picked men, at short notice. SHAW SAYS, NOTHING IN IT

Mayor Cannot Tell Who Puts Out the Story That He is to Retire From the Field

NOW PILING UP THE OVERDRAFTS

Council for 1899 Greatly Exceed the Amount of Taxation—Don't Like Mutrie's Bill.

Mayor Shaw, who was in his office for some time yesterday, repeated his declaration to all enquirers that, as far as he is concerned, the Mayoralty dance of 1900 will be a quadrille. He will not retire, whoever else may. At the same time, it is remarked on all sides that Mr. Shaw seems to be in no sort of a hurry with his preparations for the fray. This splendid inactivity has let loose many a speculative surmise. It is the general opinion that if His Worship should allow himself to go too far into the campaign before knocking himself out of action he would do E. F. Clarke more harm, indirectly, than any direct harm he could do by going right up to the poll. Clarke's friends are getting very anxious in consequence, for, whether Shaw stays in or goes out, there is an element of danger for Clarke in His Worship's position.

An Explanation From Ald. Hanlan. Editor World: Regarding my supposed opposition to the recent motion of Ald. Spence in the interests of the "one-hour movement," I desire to say I am not in any way antagonistic to the welfare of the workingmen, and that my record in the City Council has been one of consistent support of any measure tending towards their benefit. I will continue that support, and I may say that I am in favor of all workingmen, whether they are in the city or on contract labor, receiving not less than \$1.50 per day. I was opposed to the resolution in the hours of labor because I did not think the men could afford to lose the 15 cents per day under the conditions which exist in this city. During my career in the City Council I have endeavored to provide employment for all who were out of work for months by having useful and necessary improvements made for beautifying the Island Park and putting the lagoons in a sanitary condition. I wish it to be distinctly understood that in speaking against the motion of Ald. Spence I did so under misapprehension, not understanding its purpose. When the matter was thoroughly explained to me I recorded my vote in favor of the resolution. Edward Hanlan.

Mr. Thomas H. Mallon is running for alderman in Ward No. 6. Mr. Mallon is a young and energetic citizen—just the kind of stuff out of which good aldermen are made. His character has hitherto been above reproach, and should the electors of No. 6 see fit to elect him, they may be sure that his aldermanic career will be plain and above board. He is an honest, upright man, and that is what is wanted on the Council board just now.

In Ward 4. Stephen W. Burns, ex-chairman of the Public School Board, is a candidate for alderman in Ward No. 4. His record on the School Board as an aggressive worker is well known. He was born in No. 4 Ward, and has a grasp of public affairs which would be of service to his constituents and the city in the Council.

Mr. Charles Caldwell, well and favorably known in the East End, is seeking the support of Ward 3 electors as one of their aldermen for 1900.

Ward 5. Ald. John Dunn, the well-known estate expert, who has been an alderman for the past six years, is again in the field for Ward 5. He has been a member of the Executive Committee and chairman of the Property Committee for three years. Mr. Dunn belongs to the better class of aldermen, and he generally expresses his views freely.

CORPORATION INSURANCE

A Committee Met With Tyled Doors to Discuss the Matter of Renewals Yesterday. A meeting of the sub-committee of the Property Committee was called yesterday

From the fact that there are 2000 entries from all over the continent, the size of the show can be imagined. If one wants to hear the shrill notes of innumerable cockerels, the cackle of hens, the quack of ducks, the cooing of pigeons, the squeak of guinea pigs, the song of canaries, and the sight of cats worth \$1000 each, one should attend this show. In the window there is a fine collection of pheasants, while just inside the door is a cage full of those birds whose fellows brought relief to the hearts many times by the "All well!" from Ladysmith.

The collection of pigeons and canaries is a very valuable one, while in the cat department there are two valued at \$1000 each and two others at \$200. To-morrow two broods of little chickens, after 21 days in the incubators, will decide to make a move, and the incubator that brings the most out receives the prize. Most of the judging took place yesterday. To-day the Plymouth Rock, Leghorns, Minorcas and games will be judged. Additional prizes will be given to Mr. E. F. Clarke, M.P., and Mr. Charles Wick. To-day is school children's day, and to-morrow the annual meeting of the American White Plymouth Club will be held in the building.
