THE PROHIBITION IDOL'S CLAY FEET

The World, having declared where it itself is on the question of prohibition, is in a position to aid the public in discovering where some others are in regard to it. This is a rather big undertaking, but we propose tackling it with vigor and persistence. We intend to do a little digging up.

PROVINCIAL PROHIBITION.

Globe Editorial, Nov. 26, 1901: There is a general opinion that the decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council makes the issue of provincial prohibition a practical one, and puts the question in a more definite way than it has ever been presented before. For many years the matter has been the subject of litigation, plebiscites and Parliamentary resolutions, and there is some justice in the criticism that there has been an indisposition to look it fairly in the face. This fault is laid at the door of the politicians, who are said to have been angling for prohibition votes without any real intention of granting prohibition. But it is doubtful whether that charge covers the whole ground. The country at large must share the blame. It is an easy thing to mark a ballot for prohibition in a plebiscite or a Scott Act contest, but a difficult one to enforce the law. There is no doubt that a large majority of the people of Ontario have declared by the marking of ballots that they regard prohibition as a desirable thing. In the last plebiscite, taken in 1898, the votes for prohibition were 154,498, and the votes against were 115,284, the proportion being nearly three to two. The full text of the judgment is not at hand, but the cabled report says that the Manitoba law is sustained. This law does not touch the question of manufacture and importation, which are Federal, but in regard to retail sale it is a pretty stiff measure.

Froceeding on the assumption that there are no legal difficulties in the way, the question of the wisdom of enacting protabilition will now have to be seriously faced. The prohibitionists claim that they have the pedge of the government for the enactment of such a law; that is a matter which the government will have to settle for itself. Either to give the law or to refuse it will involve consequences which will have a marked effect on the political consequences. It is a matter of far more importance than the profit or injury that may accrue to any political party. From this point of view, that is to say, on the merits of prohibition itself, we have 10 doubt of the advantage that would follow the enactment of such a law if adequately enforced. On the question of enforcement, we cannot profess to be free from doubt. Experience would indicate that such a law can be made reasonably effective in rural districts, but that in cities like Toronto enforcement is exceedingly difficult, and would require at the best extraordinary tigliance and treations. 

MORE MILK WENT INTO BUTTER

Montreal, But Corn Fell Off Considerably From Last Year.

In England.

No less than 406,000 packages of butter left the port of Montreal the past season, as compared with 253,000 a year age. Canadian butter was in good demand in England thruout the summer, and prices realized were very satisfactory.

In connection with the butter and cheese trade it is said that the quantity of misk converted into dairy products in Canada the past season was fully as large as in 1900, but that less went into cheese and more into butter.

The grain men appear pretty well pleased with the results of the season's business. The shipments of wheat from the port amounted to 13,645,000 bushels, as compared with 11,168,000 bushels a year ago. Wheat has ruled fairly high all summer, and if anyone has suffered it has been the steamship companies in the low freight rates which have been ruling.

The exports of corn from the port of Montreal the past summer ambunted to 4,050,000 bushels, as compared with 11,168,000 bushels last year. The reasons for this discrepancy have already been given.

SION-SUGGESTIONS FROM VAR-IOUS QUARTERS.

London Advertiser Editorial, Nov. 27:

It is rather interesting to observe that there are some people who loudly call upon the government of Ontario to state right off exactly what they propose to do about it; and we are bound to say more than one journal gives evidence of greater desire to embarrass the provinces, than to afford light on what is confessed in no simple problem, namely, how most effectively to promote the sobriety and well-being of the people, and how most lastingly, and, therefore, most expediently, to limit the evils of intemperance.

The statement that the question is complex, rather than simple, as it might at first appear, is indicated by the variety of methods and questions already raised in the judgment of the Privy Council, the people must rule: that is all of methods and questions already raised in the various provinces in connection with the judgment of the Privy Council, to which we have above alluded. For example, there is the Gothenburg system, under which the government takes over and conducts the sale of intoxicating liquors. It is claimed that this system would eliminate those private interests which are now concerned in promoting the traffic, and that, as it would practically shut the open bar, discouraging the treating habit, it would do much to reduce the evils of the traffic to a minimum. It is rather suggestive that there are those today advocating the Gothenburg system who ten years ago spoke only of prohibition.

"The Dominion Parliament has something to say about trade and commerce," and "it would be absurd to see the distilleries and breweries running in Ontario to supply people outside of this province." "But one thing the province can do-it can shut up all the bars and saloons and prevent the retail sale. To the great majority of people this would be going far enough. Is the Ross government sufficiently endorsed by public opinion to justify it in doing it?" And then The Banner goes on to say that if the prohibitionists cannot get their hearts' desire from Ross they'll never get it from Whitney! Here is the wind-up: "What could be done is this. No pro hibition bill could ever get thru the present Legislature, so many of the sitting members being opposed to it. But a bill could be prepared by the government and then submitted to the people at the general elections, the government pledging itself to its enforcement if returned to power."

The Haldimand Advocate of Cayuga has this luminous conclusion: "The problem is a ticklish one, and the country will anxiously await the Premier's announcement as to the course he has decided to follow."
