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DRASTIC RULES TO SAFEGUARD FOOD SUPPLIES

Food Controller Has Regulations Promulgated to Restrict Public Diet.
FOR EATING PLACES
Order Prohibits Use of Wheat in Distillation of Alcohol.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 9.—Definite regulations to come into effect at once for restricting the use of beef, bacon and white bread in public eating places and for prohibiting the use of wheat in the distillation or manufacture of alcohol, have been promulgated by order-in-council at the instance of the food controller. The serving of beef and bacon is prohibited on Tuesdays and Fridays, and at more than one meal on any other day. Substitutes, such as corn bread, oat cake, potatoes, etc., must be provided at every meal at which white bread is served. Under the order, the expression "bacon" includes cured (either pickled or smoked) sides, backs, hams and any portions thereof which are served in the trade, including sides.

BRITISH MERCHANTMAN DESTROYS SUBMARINE

Authorities Withhold Name to Protect Sailors From Hun Vengeance.
London, Aug. 9.—Another unarmed merchantman has sunk a submarine, but, because of the fate of the Captain Charles Fry, of the steamer, Brussels, who was executed in July, 1916, by the Germans for attempting to ram a submarine, the names of the captain and crew of the steamer, Brussels, are being withheld from the public.

HUN CHANCELLOR SEEKS FOR PEACE

Dr. Michaelis Agrees With Pan-German League Aspirations.
Copenhagen, Aug. 9.—Dr. Michaelis, the German imperial chancellor, like Field Marshal Hindenburg, has taken to answering messages from the Pan-German League, which is conducting a mass meeting and telegram campaign to crystallize sentiment in favor of demanding annexations and indemnities in the peace conditions. Replying to the latest pronouncement from a Pan-German mass meeting in Hesse, Dr. Michaelis telegraphed: "I am firmly confident that the splendid military situation will help us to a peace which will guarantee permanently the German Empire's condition of existence on the continent and overseas."

POLITICAL LEADERS CONFER AT RIDEAU

Governor-General Discusses Grave Situation Arising From Disunion in Canada—Last Effort Made to Avoid General Election Unlikely to Succeed.

Ottawa, Aug. 9.—An important conference took place at Rideau Hall today, which may have a direct bearing on the political events of the immediate future. Sir Robert Borden, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir George Foster, Baron Shaughnessy, Sir Lomer Gouin, Sir Clifford Sifton, Archbishop Mathieu of Saskatchewan, formerly head of Laval, and Hon. George P. Graham had luncheon with the Duke of Devonshire, and the purpose of the gathering was to discuss the serious situation that faces the country as the result of the attitude of Quebec, not only towards conscription, but also towards the general question of participation in the war. There is a new danger in the situation. The new menace which is becoming apparent is the attitude of other parts of Canada towards Quebec. The attitude of Quebec towards the war is engendering a hostility towards that province elsewhere which may be difficult to curb, particularly after such an incident as the attempt to take the life of Lord Athelstan in Montreal this morning.

HOLDING COAL IN CARS WAITING HIGHER PRICES

Inspection of Railway Yards Shows Why Fuel Carriers Are Not Going Back to Mines for Other Badly-Needed Loads.

Following the receipt of a statement from the Grand Trunk Railway to the Dominion Railway Board in which 33 cars to 32 consignees were reported to be held in the Toronto yards of the G.T.R., awaiting placing orders, Inspector Clarke, the local officer of the board, and H. A. Harrington, secretary of the coal section of the Retail Merchants' Association, accompanied by a reporter for The World, made an investigation yesterday at Mimico.

BIG ARTILLERY BATTLE PREVAILS IN FLANDERS

French Troops Make Progress Against Germans in Region of Langemarck—Allies Continue Leveling of Hun Defences.

London, Aug. 9.—In Flanders the great artillery battle continues most violently, seemingly preparing the way for further heavy infantry activity. The only infantry engagement in Flanders has taken place on the line between Ypres and Dixmude, with the French troops the aggressors engaged in leveling the German defence positions. The German general staff reports the artillery fire in Flanders as very great, and says it has been especially heavy on the Belgian front from Bixchoote to Hollebeke. The latter sector takes in most of the important Ypres salient. Except for local raids by the French, there has been no infantry activity on the long line from St. Quentin to the Swiss border. The French and German guns, however, are hammering the opposing lines along the Aisne front, in Champagne, and on both banks of the Meuse in the Verdun region.

RUSSIANS GAIN BRIEF LINE TO MEND DAMAGE

German Advance Slows Up Owing to Ninety-Mile Progress.

London, Aug. 9.—Continuous rains and fog have made the past week one of little activity on the western front, said Major-General Frederick S. Maurice, chief director of military operations at the war office, in his weekly talk to the Associated Press today. "The German communications in their usual fashion," continued the general, "reported numerous British attacks repulsed with heavy loss. That shows the Germans are hungry and nervous. As a matter of fact there has been only one British attack that on St. Julien, which was an entire success. The German communications made a deal of an alleged British attack from Meuroort which was in fact only a minor raid."

FRENCH PROGRESS ON LANGEMARCK

Ally's Troops Take About Twenty Prisoners in Belgium.

Paris, Aug. 9.—The war office communication issued this evening says: "In Belgium we have made further progress south of Langemarck. We have taken about 20 prisoners. Both armies have been active in the sectors of Pantheon and Epine de Chevreigny, in the region of the Meuse and near Anvers and on both banks of the Meuse. On the eighth instant, despite the bad weather, which made work especially difficult, our escadrille made numerous sallies. The aviation grounds at Colmar and Habsheim arrived in this city in charge of the objectives were reached. Army of the East, August 8.—The enemy attempted a surprise attack on the night of the 7th, but was repulsed. Some prisoners remained in our hands. Rather spirited artillery fighting has taken place on both sides of the Vardar River and in the Cerna Bend. British aviators have successfully bombed the airfields at Elnasovo and the enemy's depots in the regions of Sere and Stojakovo."

MOUNTED POLICE END TWO YEARS' JOURNEY

Edmonton, Alta., Aug. 9.—The end of a 2000-mile journey over ice-covered rivers and snow-crusted plains, was reached late this evening, when a party of mounted police officers arrived in this city in charge of the two Eskimos, Sinutsiak and Wihusuk, who are said to be the murderers of Father Rouvier and Leroux, who met death by violence at Bloody Falls in the Arctic regions in 1915.

DEFER UNION GOVERNMENT PENDING FEDERAL ELECTION

Laurier Endorsed as Leader of Liberal Party in West.
SEEK NATIONAL UNITY
Resolution Pledging Support to Sir Wilfrid Enthusiastically Adopted.

Winnipeg, Aug. 9.—Amid scenes of wild enthusiasm the western Liberals in convention today acclaimed and endorsed Sir Wilfrid Laurier as the leader of the Liberal party and the greatest of Canadian statesmen. The resolution, which became a plank of the party platform, specifically endorsed Sir Wilfrid's attitude toward the war and expressed the hope that he might reunite the people of Canada. Premier Norris, in a ringing speech, said he had been trying for two years to bring about a national government, but he was now satisfied that the only man in Canada who would form a truly national government was Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Similar views were expressed by Premier Martin of Saskatchewan, Premier Sifton of Alberta, and Premier Bower of British Columbia. The committee on resolutions labored far into the night, and it was not until an early hour this morning that they agreed upon the philosophy which they would present to the convention. Western Liberals Declare for National Government to Follow Election.

FOR PUBLIC OWNERSHIP
Proposed Plan of Paying for C.N.R. Vigorously Opposed, However.

Winnipeg, August 9.—The Liberal convention of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, which has been in session here since Monday, was brought to a conclusion at 6 o'clock this afternoon, when a resolution was carried consolidating as the platform of the Liberal party of western Canada the resolutions on policy which had been adopted. The work of the afternoon session was important as resolutions were carried approving of the formation of a national government after the general election; approving of the principle of government ownership of railways, telegraphs and express systems; declaring indefensible the payment of an arbitrated price to Mackenzie & Mann for sixty million shares of common stock of the Canadian Northern, and suggesting that newspapers and other publications be required to publish an interval the names of all those financially interested in them, and of their responsible editors.

Offer Reward for Discovery of Criminals

Just before adjournment Hon. Frank Oliver read the following telegram which he had received from Sir Wilfrid Laurier and which referred to the proceedings in the convention on Wednesday: "Resolutions, as reported in morning papers, are quite satisfactory. Result is very cheering."

Dominion Police Investigate Dynamiting of Lord Athelstan's Country House.

PEAK CAP ONLY CLUE
Improper Packing of Charge Prevents Loss of Life.
Montreal, Aug. 9.—An attempt was made at dawn today to blow up the country residence of Lord Athelstan, at Cartierville, ten miles from Montreal. A charge of dynamite was placed under the lower balcony. The explosion shook the whole construction, wrecked the corner and smashed sixty panes of glass. The household at first thought a cement plant on the opposite side of the Back River had blown up. Lord Athelstan's room was on the second floor close to where the dynamite charge had been placed, while his daughter's room was directly above. The explosion occurred at 2.50 o'clock, a few minutes before servants were aroused by the barking of a collie dog, always loose on the lawn at night. The dog has not been seen since.

Reward of \$1000.

The place was guarded today by police while detectives from headquarters, a private agency and men from the provincial force worked on the case. The affair is also being investigated by the Dominion police. A reward of \$1000 has been offered for evidence that will lead to the conviction of perpetrators. It is believed that the dynamite used was some of that taken from Martineau's quarry a week ago, when the watchman was held up.

U-BOAT DROWNS STEAMER'S CREW

Commander Put Men on Deck, Without Lifebelts, Then Submerged.
Liverpool, Aug. 9.—William Snell, a negro, of Jacksonville, Florida, the only American survivor of the steamer Belgian Prince, which was sunk July 31 by a German submarine with the loss of 28 lives, today gave details of his experience to the Associated Press. He said:
"A torpedo hit the engine room. A submarine then quickly came to the surface about 200 yards to starboard and fired at our wireless apparatus. We left the Belgian Prince in three boats and had got fifty yards from the boat when the submarine came alongside and asked for our captain, who was then taken aboard and inside the U-boat.
"The members of the crew were ordered to hold up their hands and the Germans asked if there were any guns among us. Although there were two we said 'No.' The Germans then asked if we had any pocket arms.
"We were then ordered to the deck of the submarine, where we were told by the commander to remove our life belts and lie on the deck. This we did. Then the commander went into the boat, threw the oars into the sea and had his men remove the provisions. Then five plugs were taken out of holes in the boats, which were then cast adrift.
"The submarine went to the north-west for twelve miles, the commander taking the life belts to the top of the bombing tower and throwing them overboard. I hid mine under a raincoat and as the submarine began to submerge I tied it around my neck and jumped into the sea.
"The rest of the crew stayed on deck

CANADIAN GOVERNMENT GETS U. S. COAL CARS

Ohio Commission Investigates Alleged Sales—Reprehends Vendors.
Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 9.—Attorney-General McGhee and the state public utilities commission today were investigating reports that the Toledo and Ohio and Hocking Valley railroads have sold coal cars to the Canadian Government.
An agent of the Canadian Government here has admitted he has purchased 1,700 coal cars from the Ohio roads.
Inasmuch as the railroads, in their demands to the public utilities commission for increased freight rates, have used as an argument the freight rates increase was to get more money to purchase new freight cars, the action of the two roads is being viewed severely by the commission.
M. S. Connors, manager of the Hocking Valley, denied that his company has sold any cars recently and stated that the last sale of cars made by his company was four years ago.

ISLE OF MAN REVISITED

By Thos. T. Champion, Canadian Associated Press.
London, July 20.—My companion of that week is a big man in Canadian railway enterprise, and has traveled well-nigh every part of the earth's surface. From the landing stage he looked a trifle wistfully towards the broad shining mouth of the Mersey. His wife and boys are "on the other side."
"War business had brought us down from London. War business for three years had caused us to make many strenuous journeys in England, Northern France and Belgium. We were just wondering if the running lorries over Liverpool grandly was more harassing to the nerves than the throbbing of London motor-buses, and whether the streets of either city were not after all quite as grimy and as cluttered in their own way as the highways within the zone of the armies.
"Even the civilian war-worker must have 'leave' occasionally. We determined to resign cables and the handling of freight to others for a day or two, and I proclaimed my companion to take him on a voyage he had never yet attempted and over a rail system he had never seen.
"Derby Castle, My companion was deserted.
"It was some years since I had last visited the Isle of Man, but I had heard of the desolation of Douglas at the present day. We had a fair complement for such a little boat, mostly middle-aged folk. Prison Terms Given Two Counsellors of Military Commission.
Copenhagen, Aug. 9.—Several members of the Polish Radical Left have been tried by a German court-martial for attempting to incite the populace of Poland to disturbances, according to a despatch from Berlin. Among the Poles court-martialed were two counsellors of a military commission. They were given prison terms of three and five years respectively.

PACIFISTS DEMAND DRAFT LAW REPEAL

Meeting in Senate Committee Room Causes Indignation at Washington.
Washington, Aug. 9.—Some pacifists held a meeting under the dome of the capitol today, demanded that congress stay in session until it had repealed the draft law and voiced threats of an attempt to impeach President Wilson unless that was done. Senators and congressmen, invited to attend the meeting, under the auspices of the people's council of America for democracy and peace, dropped into the room and then dropped out again as the speeches proceeded.
The meeting was held in the senate military committee room, where a few weeks ago, the draft law was drawn and perfected. How the meeting came to be held there developed considerable feeling among senators. Chairman Chamberlain of the military committee said he had permitted the use of the room when Isaac McBride, formerly secretary to the late Senator Lane of Oregon, asked him for it, "to have some friends meet some congressmen."
Senator Chamberlain said he had no idea the place was to be used for an attack on the President.
Louis P. Lochner of New York, a member of the Ford peace party, presided. The burden of the speeches was that a majority of the people were opposed to the draft law and that it should be repealed.
PROF. LANOS ILL.

BRANT FARMERS PLEASED

Threshing Begins and Seventy Per Cent. Normal Yield is Expected of Crop.

Brantford, Aug. 9.—The farmers of the district are highly pleased with the prospects for the fall wheat returns this year, despite the trying times last spring, when the crop was threatened with ultimate failure. It is said that threshing operations will begin in certain parts of the county this afternoon, and exact returns will be anxiously awaited. In the meantime it is presumed that the same will average about 70 per cent. of the normal. Many acres of choice barley is already in the shock, and the horn of the binder is heard in every direction. Live hogs are now bringing \$17 per hundred, \$34 for a normal pig.

ITALIAN GOVERNMENT TO MANUFACTURE SHOES

Attempt Will Be Made to Provide People With Footwear.
Rome, Aug. 9.—In view of the great increase in the price of footwear the Italian Government has decided to manufacture a standard shoe of stout make and at a reasonable price. Three hundred thousand pairs will be turned out monthly in Italy, and another 200,000 pairs will be imported.

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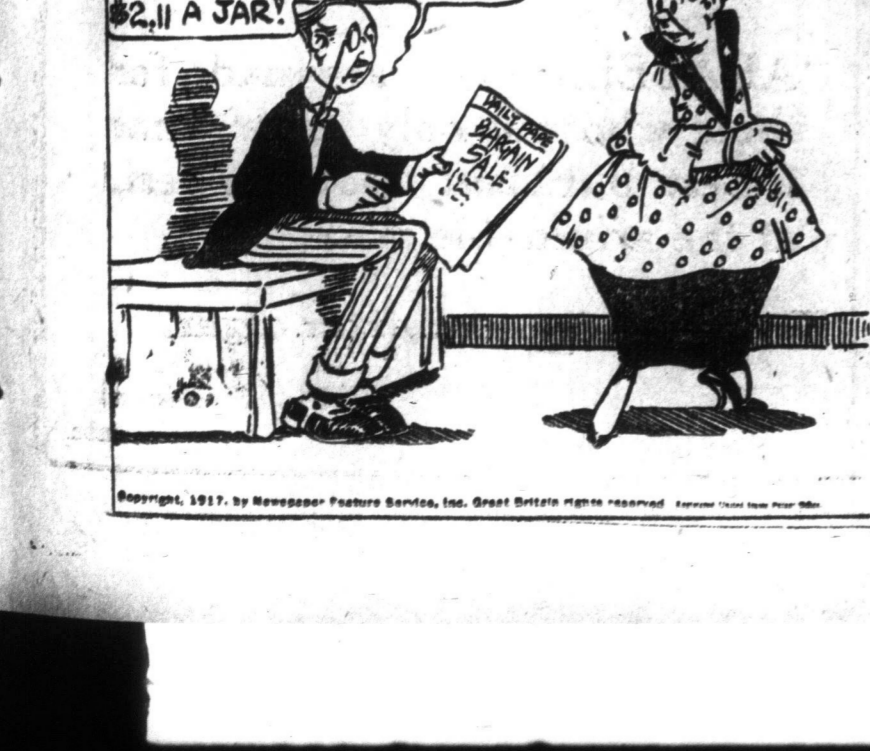

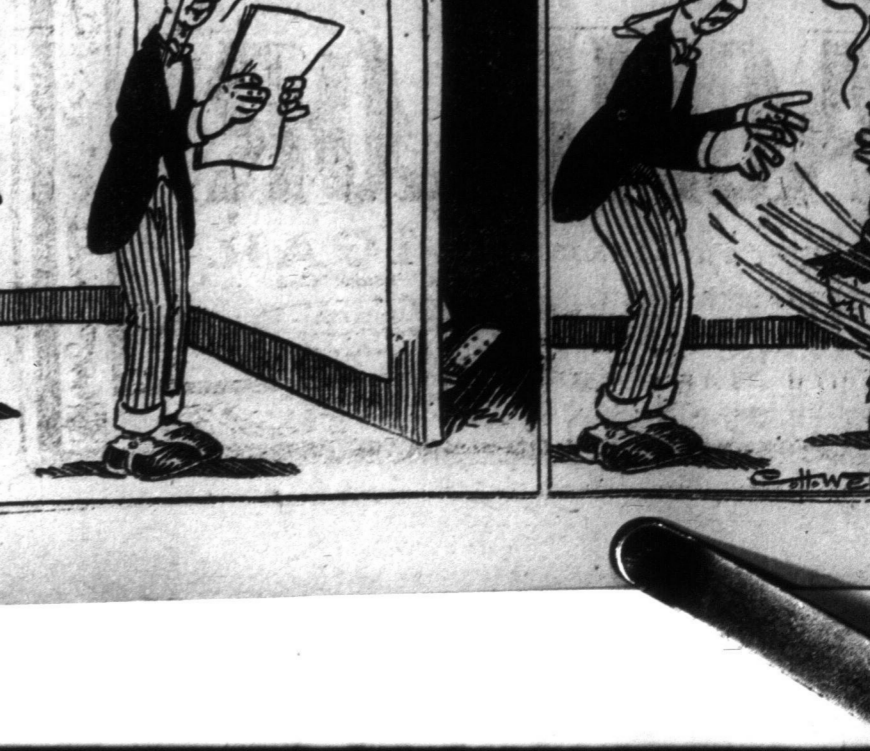

- Cabbage with Cheese Sauce. A young white cabbage should be boiled for a quarter of an hour in salted water. Pour off the water, and add fresh boiling water. When quite tender, remove and chop finely. Butter a pie dish, put in the cabbage, then prepare the sauce. To make it, melt a tablespoonful of butter in a saucepan, stir in a tablespoonful of flour. Add half a pint of milk and cayenne pepper and salt to taste. Stir in four ounces of grated cheese, and pour over the cabbage, then place in a quick oven and heat thoroughly.

Answers to Health Questions

H. E. R. Q.—Kindly advise something that will destroy superfluous hair. A.—Remember there are few, if any, methods to "kill the roots." Most expedients are, like cleansing the teeth or washing the face, to be frequently repeated. Take sodium sulphide, 1 dram; powdered quinine, 5 drams; crushed starch, 5/8 drams. Rub your body every day with this mixture. Wash your face with a fat stick to the growth of hair, but use it at intervals. As soon as the hair can be easily removed wash it off with soap and glycerine one part into the reddened spot for three minutes to lessen the irritation.
