TURKS RETREAT IN MESOPOTAMIA

Russians Start Big Drive in Caucasus and Repulse Turks

BRITISH ADVANCE 25 MILES

GREAT BARRIER BEFORE VERDUN NOT BREAKABLE

Crown Prince Can Never Realize Ambition to Take French Stronghold.

STRENGTH IS IMMENSE

French Heavy Guns Can Hurl Projectiles to Outworks of Metz.

VERDUN, via Paris, Jan. 14.—(De-lyed)—Metz is visible thru field tele-

scopes from this great French stronghold and its outworks can be reached by the heaviest French guns. The defensive barrier between the two places, after a four-days' examination of the lines in the Argonne, the Woëvre and the Vosges, shows a strength unsuspected by the average civilian.

It is along this front that Crown Prince Frederick William's forces are being held back and positions already seemingly impregnable, are being strengthened every day. The French are sure of their ground and that should the crown prince decide upon another effort to pierce the French line, it will end as it ended before.

DESTROYING OF BRIDGES HARD BLOW TO GREECE

Storage in Supply of Food for Troops is the Result.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The Greek Government faces the serious problem of supplying its troops at Serres with food as the result of the blowing up of railroad bridges by the allies in northern Greece, and may be compelled either to withdraw or disband certain portions of these troops, according to a Reuter Telegram Company despatch from Saloniki under date of Jan. 15.

WAR SUMMARY: Today's Events Reviewed

GENERAL AYLMER has defeated the Turks at Oorah, 25 miles south of Kut-el-Amara, in Mesopotamia, and is driving them in flight upstream. The enemy occupied positions on both sides of the Tigris, and he was attacked by the Anglo-Indian forces on Friday. By nightfall the Turks had begun to retreat, and they are continuing their retrograde.

Also outnumbered, the British force was capable of developing a superiority of fire that the Turks could not face. It is improbable that the Turks have any good defensive positions south of Kut-el-Amara. The Turks have been beaten so often in this theatre in the past year that the British now hold a great moral ascendancy over them.

The Italians have renewed their terrific bombardment of the third and last line of defence of Gorizia. They demolished Saturday about 400 yards of trenches on Mount St. Michael, one of the key positions of this stronghold.

If the war continues much longer, the Germans will have to go about as much as the natives of Central Africa are clad. By the end of this month their stock of cotton will be exhausted, according to Prof. Ashley, who writes of the cotton situation in The Atlantic Monthly for January. Practically every person in this, and the woolen industry, or nearly 3,000,000 hands, including those serving in the German army, were employed in these two industries, which are now idle.

The Russians have won a victory in Persia and they have occupied Kanganver, half way between Hamadan and Kermanshah. They took many prisoners and they report that the enemy left many dead on the battlefield. Russian losses were insignificant. A detachment of Turks and Germans was driven back by the Russians southwest of Hamadan. It is

CANADIANS WERE NOT IN BIG ENGAGEMENT

Cable Received at Ottawa on Saturday Proved to Be Misleading.

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—Gen. Hughes has received a cable from London stating that the Canadian losses on Jan. 13 were seven killed and 15 wounded, and on Jan. 14 four killed and 13 wounded.

The alarming report cabled from England Saturday was an important engagement on the western front.

Recently the same correspondent cabled a story that the first battalion had been nearly wiped out and as a result of the reports causing such alarm and widespread inquiry, Gen. Hughes is taking steps to see that there can be no recurrence of such a situation of this nature unless they are borne out by the facts.

ATHENS, via Paris, Jan. 15, 10.30 p.m.—King Peter of Serbia left Saloniki this morning aboard a French warship for Aedeos, on the island of Euboea, in the Aegean Sea, where he will take the cure for gonorrhoea, a disease for which he is famous.

RUSSIANS BEGIN BIG OFFENSIVE AGAINST TURKS

Start Active Operations on Hundred Mile Front in Caucasus.

KANGAVER OCCUPIED

Persian Rebels, Turks and Germans Defeated on Road to Bagdad.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The Russians have won a victory in Persia and have occupied Kanganver, and it is learned from Constantinople they have brought up reinforcements and started a new general offensive on a front of 100 miles between Karadach-south of the Arasa River, and Icham, south of Milo.

The Turks claim that the engagement is developing favorably for them and that two Russian attacks near Karadach were repulsed on Friday, with the loss of 300 dead in four days' fighting.

Concerning this engagement, the Russians report that they captured on Friday 20 Turkish officers, and more than 400 men with a quantity of war and engineering material and provisions, besides one heavy gun, seven lighter guns and eight machine guns.

The fighting in this range apparently is only in its opening stage.

ITALY WILL AID BALKAN ALLIES

Adequate Assistance Will Be Given to Montenegro and Serbia.

TO LEAVE ALBANIA

Serbian Will Have to Withdraw to Reorganize Fighting Forces.

PARIS, Jan. 16.—Information received from Rome indicates that the Italian cabinet has taken steps to give adequate assistance to Serbia and Montenegro.

The following official statement from general headquarters was issued today: "The artillery activity yesterday was weak along the Trentino and Carnia fronts, somewhat lively on the Isontina, and particularly violent on the heights to the northwest of Gorizia. Here the fire of the enemy's batteries was effectively answered by ours, the action continuing until late in the evening in the Osavia position."

"On the Carso, our artillery actively shelled the enemy trenches in the zone of Monte San Michele, destroying them for a length of 400 yards. One of our air squadrons made an extensive raid in the region of the enemy camp at Asevizzo, the aviation camp at Chiapovano and Borsberg and the railway stations at Longonata, Preganina and Lubiana. The squadron was violently commended for its courageous anti-aircraft batteries, returned safely."

BRITISH SHELL LILLE'S FORTS

Heavy Bombardment of German Positions Continued at Many Points.

DAMAGE AT HETSAS

Several Munition Depots of Enemy Exploded at Divers Places.

Special Cable to The Toronto World.—LONDON, Jan. 16.—The allies in France and Belgium continued today their artillery preparations for the coming offensive in the spring and effective work was done by shells at various parts of the German line. British artillery severely bombarded the positions of the enemy north of Ypres and some of their shells even showed directed on Lille, for the German official statement, speaking of a British bombardment of the defences of that town, says that the British fire did little damage.

German trenches in the region of Hetsas were greatly damaged by French artillery, acting in concert with British artillery today. Two powerful explosions were caused in the German lines in this vicinity.

The approaches to the road of Lille were bombarded by the French gunners, who directed their fire on a point south of Thelus, where they blew up a German munition depot.

A German post was destroyed at Hill 119, northeast of Neuville St. Vaast, by a mine.

An energetic engagement with bombs and grenades was fought in the Valenciennes region in the Argonne. German troops who were assembling at Breinville in Lorraine, near Badonvillers were caught under French fire and dispersed.

LOSS OF LIFE CAUSED BY FLOODS IN HOLLAND

Queen Wilhelmina Opens Royal Palace to Give Shelter to Refugees.

AMSTERDAM, via London, Jan. 16.—Many persons have been drowned by the flood in northern Holland. On the Marken Islands the death list has reached sixteen, including seven children.

Queen Wilhelmina has opened the royal palace at Amsterdam to shelter the refugees.

NORTH HOLLAND FLOODS CONTINUE DEVASTATION

Town of Purmerend, Less Than Ten Miles From Amsterdam, Inundated.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—A despatch to the Central News from Amsterdam says: "The floods in north Holland continue their devastation. The town of Purmerend, which is less than ten miles from Amsterdam, is under water, and at many points the flood is three feet higher than yesterday. Everywhere in the flooded section bodies of cattle drowned can be seen floating. Only trees and farmhouses are above the surface of the water."

"The bodies of 12 persons drowned in Marken were washed ashore today at Volendam."

PROHIBITION IS FEDERAL ISSUE

Big Propaganda to Make Canada Liquorless Makes Stir at Ottawa.

LONG DEBATE CERTAIN

Government May Take Stand That Provinces Should Take Action.

By a Staff Reporter.—OTTAWA, Jan. 16.—What effect will the propaganda for nation-wide prohibition during the war have upon the present session of parliament?

This question is being asked by the members spending Sunday at the capital. The evening papers yesterday contained the call for nation-wide prohibition as a measure of economic conservation during the war, issued by J. R. Booth, Senator Edwards and the principal employers of labor in this part of the country. Tomorrow every member of parliament will receive a written invitation to declare himself, and petitions from every polling subdivision in Canada, will soon be on their way to Ottawa.

There is no indication as yet that the government intends to bring down the desired legislation, although Sir George Foster has intimated that if an overwhelming majority of the Canadian people desire prohibition they will not be balked by their representatives in parliament. That the subject will come up for a prolonged debate in the house of commons is evident.

It is quite possible that the government may answer the demand for nation-wide prohibition by saying that action should be taken in the first place by the provinces. The federal government has a great deal of money to raise, and prohibition would reduce the receipts of the inland revenue department by about \$15,000,000 a year, but it is not believed that the loss of revenue would prevent prohibitory legislation if public sentiment earnestly and overwhelmingly demanded the same.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT LIKELY TO PREVENT NICKEL EXPORTS

Refining of Nickel in Canada and Nationalization of Industry May Be Ultimate Result of Legislation.

By a Staff Reporter.—OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 16.—It is rumored that some progressive legislation may be brought down by the government at the present session to regulate the export of nickel ore and nickel matte. The legislation will probably be modeled upon the act respecting the exportation of electric power and natural gas.

The measure will not be so much a war measure to prevent nickel finding its way to the enemy as a first step in a legislative program for the benefit of the refining of nickel in Canada. Quite possibly the nationalization of the industry may become necessary. It is well known that the imperial government is anxious to have foreign ownership in many minerals found within the empire curtailed or done away with altogether, and there is no doubt that the Canadian nickel situation is regarded as most unfortunate from an imperial standpoint.

At the last session of parliament W. F. Maclean, M.P. for South York, gave notice of a bill to regulate the export of nickel, nickel ore, nickel matte and all compounds of nickel. Such exportation was by its terms limited to licensees of the Dominion government and the governor-in-council was authorized to prohibit the export altogether. Upon objection by the prime minister to the introduction of the bill, Mr. Speaker Sprules ruled that it was legislation affecting trade and commerce, and, therefore, could not be introduced unless and until a resolution embodying the same was adopted by the house of commons. Of course, it is now brought forward as a government measure, it will have the right-of-way and the necessary resolution authorizing the same can be presented to a vote of the house at an early date.

Turks Are Retiring From Positions Occupied After Last Defeat.

GEN. AYLMER WINNING

British Forces Are Closely Pressing the Enemy on the Tigris.

LONDON, Jan. 16, 12.23 p.m.—Turkish forces occupying positions on both banks of the River Tigris, 25 miles south of Kut-el-Amara, in Mesopotamia, are retreating, according to an announcement made today by the official press bureau. The war office adds that after hard fighting the Turks began to withdraw on Jan. 13 and Jan. 14, and that they are being closely pressed by British troops under command of Gen. Aylmer.

The text of the statement follows: "After their defeat on Jan. 8-9 the Turks opposing Gen. Aylmer retired to a position astride the Tigris at Oorah, 25 miles downstream from Kut-el-Amara."

"Gen. Aylmer attacked the position Jan. 13, hard fighting continuing till nightfall. "During the evening of Jan. 13 and Jan. 14 the enemy began to retire and is being closely pressed on the past night by the north by the British forces."

CAN KAISER WILHELM ESCAPE FAMILY BANE?

Specialist Considers German Emperor is Likely to Develop Cancer.

PARIS, Jan. 16.—Le Journal prints an interview with an English doctor, Mark Howell, who, the newspaper says, acted as assistant to Sir Morell Mackenzie when the latter performed an operation on the father of Emperor William for cancer of the throat at San Remo, in 1888.

Dr. Howell is quoted as saying that while it is impossible to make any diagnosis in the case of Emperor William, there is one outstanding fact of the importance of which should not be overlooked. It is that several of the German emperor's ascendants, both on his father's and mother's side, have died of cancer. If the emperor is really suffering from cancer in the throat, Dr. Howell contends, he might live under the most favorable conditions 18 months or two years. An operation, even the wholly successful, he adds, could prolong the emperor's life a few months only.

HOW TO MAKE THE SOX FOR THE WORLD'S DAY

Read the Instructions Given in the Article Which is Printed Today.

DO NOT SEND IN MONEY

If You Can't Knit, Buy a Pair of Sox or Some Wool.

Many enquiries have been received during the last few days at the "Sox Day" department of The World regarding the correct and most simplified instructions for knitting.

For the convenience of those who are not able to visit The World, the following instructions and useful particulars, copied from the official booklet on "War Work," issued by the National Relief Committee, are given:

1. "Sox" should measure as follows: Length from top of sock to bottom of heel, 14 1/2 inches. Length of foot, 11 1/2 inches. Length of ribbing, 4 1/2 inches. Length of leg to commencement of heel, 12 inches.

Knit the 84 stitches of the front needles (on to one needle). Pick up and knit the 18 stitches at the heel stitches on to the two side needles, and knit right round again to within 3 stitches of the front end of side needle, 2 together, knit 1.

Knit plain until the foot from the back of the heel, 9 1/2 inches. Toe—Divide the 65 stitches between the 3 needles, 23 on each.

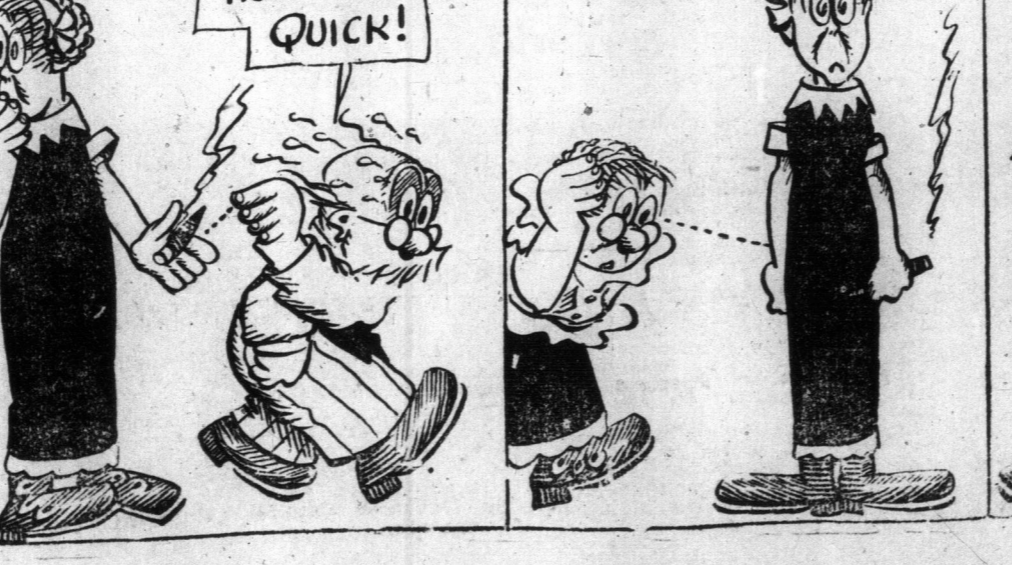

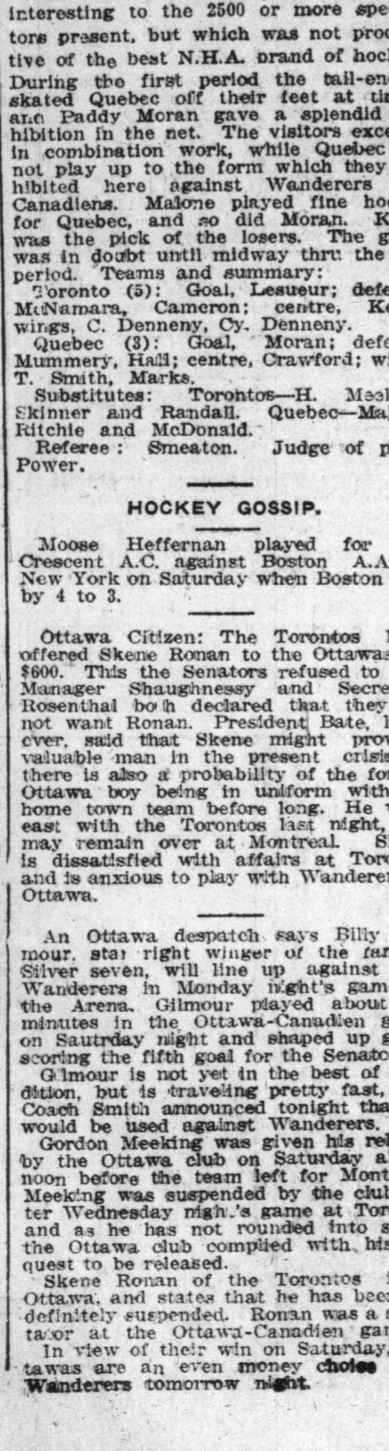

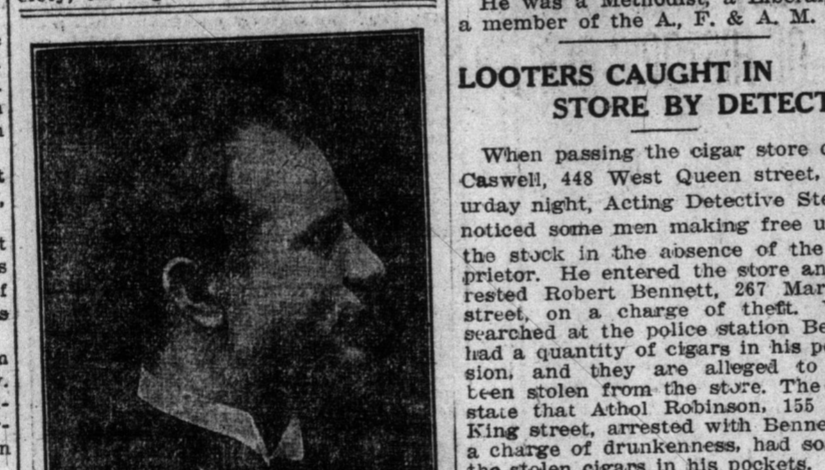
