Talk of Attack Upon Egypt German Bluff

Surprise There For Teutons if They Ever Attempt It—Russian Bombardment of Varna But an Incident in Big Campaign

New York, Dec. 23—The London correspondent of the New York Herald cables:

Reports that Germany is concentrating great armies to attack and conquer Egypt, and smash the allies on all the other fronts, are regarded here as sheer bluff. I am in a position to say, if the censor will permit it, that the Turco-German combination will receive the greatest surprise of the war if the Egyptian campaign is pursued. Moreover, I am able to tell you on unimpeachable authority that the descent on Varna is only a small part of the great campaign which Russia is almost ready to resume against the Austro-Germans.

Rome, Dec. 23—A Turco-German expedition against Egypt has already been initiated, according to information received by the Tribune from neutral sources. Vanguard actions already have occurred. The operations are being directed from Constantinople. The strength of the Egyptian expedition is estimated at 300,000 Turks and 100,000 Germans. Large bands of Arabs are expected to join the invading forces.

War material is being sent daily to Asia Minor. It includes numerous heavy German guns. It is reported that Turkish forces have already crossed into Egypt, south of El Ariah. They have been engaged by British outposts.

The invaders evidently propose to follow the caravan route, which strikes the Suez Canal near Osmailia. The British have constructed strong fortifications to bar this route. Most of the defenders are colonials.

VIENNA BAKERS ALLOWED TO

GREECE EXPECTED

Uneasiness Over Likelihood of Bulgar Invasion — Greatest Money Loss of War When Japanese Liner Sank-Greek Premier Wants to Retire

London, Dec. 23—Proclamation of martial law in Greece is reported unofficially to be imminent. Although no confirmation is available, there is evidence of growing uneasiness at Athens over the possibility that Bulgarian troops will cross the border.

Recrudesence of submarine activity in the Near East, is signalized in a startling manner, by the sinking of the Japanese liner Yasaka Maru. Apparently there was no loss of life, but according to marine insurance men the property losses were the heaviest incurred in any marine disaster of the war. The nature of the valuable cargo remains undisclosed.

The mystery of the bombardment of Varna, which was at first depicted as a formidable Russian attack on the chief Bulgarian port, has stirred London, but according to reports from both sides, at was nothing more than a minor naval action among torpedo boats, in which the shore batteries participated. However, a large Russian fleet is said to be in the vicinity of Varna, and the action may be merely preliminary to a serious Russian attack.

They met in Victoria, B. C., on Dec. 14, and discussed the whole question. A report of the meeting says:

"In the case of Alberta and Saskatchemen it was proposed that the deaf and the commander, Sir Archibald Murray, goes in New York:—"Canada, while hoping that events of the next twelve months will lead to an abiding peace, is fully determined to spare no effort, and shrink from no sacrifice to make triumphant the cause of the Allies—the free-dom of the world."
