design. In this case 4 yards of 38-inch silk will be needed. In cutting the dress place pieces with edge marked by triple "TIT" perforations on a lengthwise fold, except belt which is placed on a crosswise fold and remaining pieces with line of large "O" perforations on a lengthwise thread of material.

CONSTRUCTION OF THE DRESS. For short sleeves, see cutting directions. Close seam as notched. Close cut seam as notched; saw to lower edge of short sleeve, double "O" perforations and seams even. Sew in armhole of outside as notched, easing in any fullness.

Arrange outside on lining, centers and under-arm seams even; stitch lower edges together. Sew standing collar to neck edge as notched.

FEARFUL DEATH OF CAPTAIN OF BARGE

Cut in Four Pieces and Carried Through 2000 Feet of Pipe

Newark, N. J., April 12—Captain John Hanson, master of a steam barge, was knocked into Newark Bay and drowned when a barge carrying a cargo of pipes was cut in four pieces.

The barge May Madison was being towed from Newark to New York. In passing through the draw of a railroad bridge the barge hit into a stone pier and the jolt threw Captain Hanson overboard.

An hour after he had fallen from the barge the four men at the further end of the pipe on the Meadows were surprised to see a man's body shoot out of the pipe with the flood of sand and water.

The sections formed a man's complete body. In a pocket were four papers identifying the body as that of Captain Hanson.

NEW ZEALAND HAS CUT THE INFANT DEATH RATE

Miss Julia Lathrop Writes Secretary Wilson of Advances Made Through Instruction.

Washington, April 14—What New Zealand has done in reducing the infant mortality rate is brought to the attention of Secretary of Labor Wilson in a letter by Miss Julia C. Lathrop, head of the federal children bureau with a view to stimulating interest in the work of baby saving in the United States.

According to Miss Lathrop New Zealand has the lowest infant mortality rate of any country in the world and this has been brought about mainly through the efforts of the New Zealand society for the health of women and children. She is confident that similar results could be accomplished in this country. In one city alone—Dunedin—the work of the society reduced the infant mortality 60 per cent in five years from 1907 to 1912.

Miss Lathrop urges that not only in cities but in country districts provision should be made for instructing mothers in the care of babies, teaching young girls all practical methods of home making, including baby hygiene and feeding and giving proper hospital care to sick babies. She also advocates co-operation between volunteer and public health authorities in reducing the infant mortality.

Miss Lathrop lauds the work of the New Zealand society and adds: "Because of the absence of adequate birth and death registration in the United States, the infant death rate of this country as a whole is unknown, but estimates tend to show that it is at least twice the rate in New Zealand, which the register general of that country reported in 1912 to be 61 per 1,000. New Zealand, like certain of our states, is a young and vigorous country with a scattered population and with no large cities and there is every reason to believe that similar volunteer effort in this country would produce similar results. In view of the marked and growing interest in the preservation of infant health in the smaller cities and rural communities of the United States I believe that the account of the methods of the New Zealand society is especially timely."

Berlin, April 12—The German Actors' Benevolent Association offers a prize of \$750 for the best novel depicting the unadorned truth of life on the stage.

The purpose of the novel is to show to parents and young persons the trials and tribulations of a theatrical career in its real colors, divested of the seductive romance which makes boys and girls stage-struck and which is overcrowding the profession in Germany, to the moral and economic detriment of all concerned.

THE CIVIC ELECTIONS

The result of the primary election yesterday will intensify public interest in the final election for mayor and commissioners two weeks later. With the exception of Commissioner Wigmore, who polled more than twice as many votes as any other candidate, and may therefore be regarded as sure of election, the result yesterday offers no sure ground for assumption regarding the candidates for the final ballot.

The outstanding feature of yesterday's vote was the enormous majority rolled up for Commissioner Wigmore. His election was universally conceded, but even his most sanguine friends did not anticipate that he would more than double the vote of any other candidate.

The announcement that the C. P. R. will, at once begin the erection of a greater summer hotel at St. Andrews will be good news not only to the people of that town, but to all who are in the habit of spending a portion of the summer season at that resort.

The provincial legislature will assemble again this evening, and tomorrow the people of the province will know what the government proposes to do in connection with the Dugal charges.

SPENDS EIGHT MONTHS IN MECCA UNDETECTED

Dutch Professor Penetrates To Walled City and Sees Rites

New York, April 14—The dangerous and unusual experience of penetrating the walled city of Mecca, living there for eight months in a Mohammedan household, performing all the rites and ceremonies which the 300,000 pilgrims perform every day and attending lectures which in the past have been heard only by Mohammedan ears, was accomplished successfully by Dr. C. Snouck Hurgronje Professor of the University of Leyden, and now in this country as exchange professor to several American universities.

Doctor Hurgronje is not only an adept in the Arabic language, but professed his sojourn in the sacred city by several years of research in Mohammedan theology. It was this complete familiarity with Mohammedanism which made it possible for him to preserve his disguise for the entire period of eight months. "I even fooled the 'tramp dogs,'" he explained. "They are not afraid of the Moslem, but they can smell a foreigner—an infidel, you know—and they reveal him to the Mohammedans by attacking him. 'Nothing could be more inconceivably remote than Mecca; it represents the island of centuries ago. The houses are impossible. All the conveniences to which we are accustomed—light, heat, and water—are as they were in the Dark Ages. But one who has been here in Mecca has not lived there in Mohammedan households and studied at the mosques cannot understand Islam."

MAY BE LAST EASTER TOGETHER, SAYS BROTHER OF THE POPE

Angelo Sarto, the brother of Pope Pius abandoned his duties as postman for two weeks in order to spend them with the Pontiff, Signor Sarto, after a visit to the Vatican on last Saturday said his brother was much pleased at seeing him and said cheerfully and resignedly, that this would be the last Easter they would spend together.

Signor Sarto, although he is well over seventy, has declined to give up his post office duties, declining that he be sent here in Italy. Up to a year or so ago he received a salary of about fifty cents a week for a long day's work and made no attempt to press on his relationship with the head of the Catholic church. He gets \$1 a week now.

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Indianapolis, April 13—Former United States Senator Albert J. Beveridge, as a result of a practical joke, is now the hero of a little district which might be billed to read: "Why a Man Leaves Home."

Fairly given out of their own houses by scores of persons desiring to gain social prestige by answering his inquiry calls from the former senator and his wife, the Beveridges have left the city. The beginning of this little joke dates from the time when the Beveridge were on their way downtown when the luncheon in which they were riding broke down and was abandoned to the care of automobile repairs. Calling cards of Mr. and Mrs. Beveridge were left in one of the vehicles and some wag in the auto repair corps conceived the idea of distributing them to the neighbors of the Beveridges in the northern part of the city.

Under cover of darkness this worthy slipped the cards into the mail boxes and under the doors of many homes. The result was that for several days there was a steady stream of callers at the Beveridge home, and it is hinted that to avoid putting in most of his time answering the door bell, the ex-senator rushed back to Washington to resume his research work on the life of John Marshall.

CAN BE KEPT SOBER AND COMFORTABLE

Earl Grey's Houses Give Practical Pointers to the Legislators.

London, April 13—The fact that the People's Refreshment Association in the formation of which Earl Grey took a prominent part, now owns more than 100 public houses and made a profit of \$5,000 last year, after paying the full dividend of 5 per cent, allowed by its articles of association, is attracting attention. The object of the organization is the provision of public houses where other than alcoholic refreshments may be obtained if required, under comfortable conditions.

LEFT MUCH TO MISSIONS

Warren, Penn., April 14—Home and foreign mission activities will profit by the will of the late Mrs. Eliza Henry, probated here and disposing of an estate valued at \$500,000. The home mission board of the Presbyterian church, the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions and the Woman's Board of Home Missions of the United States, are each given \$10,000 and \$25,000 is given to the Presbyterian board of ministerial relief. Park College at Parkville, Mo., is given \$10,000 and a pension of \$500 a year provided for Fanny Crosby, hymn composer. The Warren library will profit to the extent of \$5,000. Geo. Camp of Philadelphia was made one of the executors.

## MONCTON WANTS PARCEL POST ZONE ENLARGED

Premier Fleming Promises to Help—New Brunswick and Immigration

(Special to Times.)  
Moncton, April 15—In a communication to the Moncton Board of Trade, Premier Fleming said that he would do everything in his power to have the twenty-mile parcel post zone extended. While he had no desire to interfere with federal affairs, he thought the zone might reasonably be extended, especially in districts where the population is sparse. He said that he would bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster-general.

Hon. H. R. Emmerson, in a letter to the local Board of Trade, wrote that he intended to bring in parliament the extension of the zones.  
On motion of J. T. Hawke, seconded by J. Fred Edgett, the local board of trade decided to petition the postmaster-general for an extension of the zone to forty miles to coincide with the newspaper zone.

"Few people over here have ever heard of Moncton, and not many of New Brunswick, and it is only by advertising on this side that a condition can be changed," writes S. L. T. Harrison, of Moncton, formerly of St. John, who is now in London as a special representative of the province. Mr. Harrison, in a letter to the Moncton Board of Trade, told of the competition among the different parts of the empire in soliciting emigration from the British Isles.

"What we want is to interest capital to develop our natural resources, then we will get the immigrants," said J. F. Hawke, discussing the communication. "It is doubtful wisdom to spend large sums of money in trying to induce immigrants with no capital, or very limited capital, to come here. The trouble with New Brunswick is that we lack ordinary work for the ordinary immigrant. Every immigrant who makes good in New Brunswick, and goes back to visit, is a better ad. for the province than newspaper clippings by the bush."

## BODY OF DR. GREY HERE FROM ENGLAND TOMORROW

Will Be Brought To St. John On The Royal Edward

Burial Will Be at Sussex—Two Sisters of Noted Clergyman Live in St. John—He Had Planned Visit Here, When Death Came in England

J. W. Gray of Sussex arrived in the city yesterday to await the arrival, early tomorrow morning, of the steamer Royal Edward, to take charge of the body of his brother, Rev. Andrew Gray, D. D., who died in London in the afternoon of April 3. The body will be conveyed to Sussex for interment. Mr. Gray received the sad intelligence of his brother's death at his home, six miles from Sussex, at 4.45 p. m., on the afternoon on which Dr. Gray died in London. This shows how speedily the news is flashed across the ocean.

Doctor Gray was well known in St. John. He was a man of sterling worth, a brilliant speaker and of great scholastic attainments. As a debater and lecturer he attained high rank. He had but recently returned after a tour of the Holy Land, in splendid health, and had written to his brother saying that he looked forward to an early visit to New Brunswick, when he would tell them about his eastern tour. The news of his death, therefore, came as a very great shock to his relatives. In his death the church also has sustained a severe loss. Doctor Gray leaves two sisters in St. John—Mrs. Charles McCabe of Crown street, and Mrs. Fred L. Young of North End. The following letter, written by his brother, and which appears in the Moncton Transcript of yesterday, gives some very interesting facts about his early life.

Editor Transcript—In a recent issue of the Transcript, an item appears in the obituary column, giving some account of the death of my brother, the Rev. Dr. Andrew Gray, written by some one, no doubt, in good faith, and kindness, yet in many respects erroneous and misleading. As I have been asked by persons in reference to the above, I will write by way of explanation: First, Dr. Gray was not ordained by the late Bishop Binney of Nova Scotia; neither was he a native of Mechanic Settlement, he was however, born and brought up in King's County at the place then known as Upper Sussex, now Penobscot and he there received his early education, in the country schools at that place. (He has often shown the writer the building, where he and his brother Daniel first went to school.) His parents afterwards lived for years at Church Hill, Albert County, near Mechanic Settlement.

Doctor Gray's parents, from infancy, were brought up, and adhered to the Episcopal church, but when they came to Canada from their native land, as there was no service of their own church near where they lived, they joined in, and for a time worshipped with the "Wesleyan Methodists" as did also the older members of their family, but as soon as they had the opportunity afforded them the privilege they went back to the Episcopalian (the church of their first love), as did also all the members of their family. You can easily see that my brother, was for a time a Wesleyan, and preached for a short time as a licentiate for that society but soon after receiving his college education, went over to the Episcopal church and after studying for a time, after taking degrees at D. D. he was ordained by the late Bishop Binney of Nova Scotia. For a time he was stationed at Fort Medway, in that province, afterwards going to the United States, where he labored in Boston and vicinity for years. He also took the degrees of M. A. and D. D. in colleges in the United States, and Oxford, England.

## ANOTHER ONE FROM FREDERICTON THAT IS CAUSING COMMENT

Standard Says Premier Ordered and Was Given Leave of Absence on Last Thursday—Why Was it Kept Secret?

There is much comment in political circles around town today on the following despatch from Fredericton which appears in the Standard:

At a meeting of the provincial government held last Thursday, following the formulation of the charges of Mr. Dugal, Premier Fleming asked that he be granted leave of absence, pending an investigation of the charges made in the House. Accordingly an order-in-council was passed, appointing Hon. George Clarke acting premier, and Hon. J. A. Murray acting minister of lands and mines. When asked why public announcement of the action of Premier Fleming was not made last Thursday, the acting premier, Mr. Clarke, said he had supposed that the clerk of the executive council would make a report to the press, and had not noticed that nothing about the premier's action had appeared in the papers till his attention was called to the matter by another member of the government.

It is noted that almost a week has been permitted to elapse between the date of the alleged action of the cabinet and the announcement to the public. It is felt that Mr. Clarke's explanation does not fully explain. All the members of the cabinet must have known what occurred, and all of them knew how anxiously their own friends throughout the province, as well as the public generally, were awaiting news of the course to be taken by Mr. Fleming and the government in connection with the Dugal charges. It is therefore regarded as a most extraordinary thing that the action taken by the cabinet on Thursday of last week should be made public only on Wednesday of this week.

It is also pointed out that Mr. Fleming, after the first Dugal charges had been made, went to the house, and without applying to them rushed the two million dollar bond guarantee through its second reading. In view of all this the explanation given in the paragraph quoted in the Standard is very far from satisfying the people.

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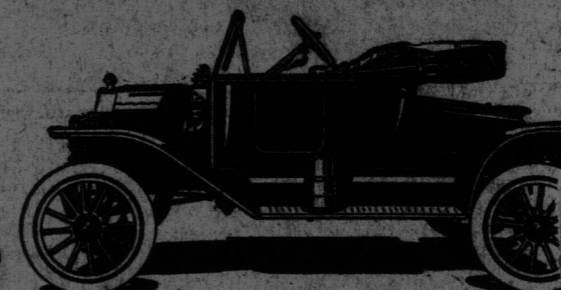
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
