





PAY FEARFUL TOLL TO DESIRE FOR GOLD

Loss of Mind And Loss of Life in Tramp Into The Yukon

Prince Rupert, B. C., Feb. 25—Of three prospectors who started a month ago from Atlin, a placer camp on the Yukon line in search of gold, one nearly starved to death, one lost both feet and one became insane from cold and died. The men headed for Silver Creek. They had to break their own trail and traveled light expecting to replenish their stores at a trading post near Jeslin lake.

The trading post was found abandoned. One man sent back for supplies lost his way and was rescued by Indians when nearly dead. The mind of one of the two remaining, a Swede, named Lindemann, became affected and in his desire for warmth jumped into a camp fire. Redmend pulled him out, but he died. Redmend buried Lindemann in the snow and turned the dogs loose, following them wherever they went. They finally led him to an Indian camp and the Indians took him to Atlin where both feet were amputated.
