

### CAROLINE COE'S LETTER TO A YOUNG HOUSEWIFE

EUNICE DEAR—

You will remember that you had two extra patty shells from your camping dinner. You can use the two extra shells for dinner the next night. Fill with mushrooms in a cream sauce. Use two even tablespoons of flour and one even tablespoon of butter or its substitute. Blend perfectly smooth. Heat one and one-half cups of milk in double boiler (if you haven't one use a little pan and set it in the skillet, putting two or three nails under the pan).

When the milk is warm put a little into the flour and butter and stir until the consistency of cream. Turn into hot milk and stir so as to keep from being lumpy. Allow to cook slowly at least half an hour. When ready to serve salt to taste. Put in the mushrooms and serve in the patty or pie shells. Try to make your work as easy as possible and don't fuss too much for Billie for he must know that lots to eat costs money, makes work and a whole lot of dishes to wash. Does he help with them? Make him—it will teach him to invite you out once in a while to dinner, so he won't have to wash the dishes. By the way: How do you wash your dishes?

Always have plenty of hot water. I like to wash my pots and kitchen things first, getting the worst out of the way. After that, washing the silver, glass and china dishes does not seem anything more than doing some dainty fancy work.

### Daily Hints For the Cook

Potato Rolls

Take cold, mashed potatoes, add a little salt, and make into balls with little flour. Flatten them and drop into hot lard or drippings and fry until they are a delicate brown on both sides.

Lemon Pudding

One cup of sugar, two heaping tablespoons of flour, one cup of milk, juice and rind of one lemon, yolks of two eggs, small piece of butter. Beat the yolks of two eggs stirred in last. Bake slowly for an hour or more.

Mixed Chicken With Cream Sauce

Put into a saucepan 1 tablespoon of butter, 1 gill of stock and 2 tablespoons of stale bread crumbs and stir until boiling. Then add 1 pint of cold chicken chopped fine, a teaspoon salt, a dash of pepper and a teaspoon of chopped parsley. Remove from the fire and add 2 well-beaten eggs. Fill into small greased molds, stand in hot water and cook in the oven 15 minutes. Serve hot with cream sauce made from rich milk, thickened to the consistency of cream.

### WOMAN STREET INSPECTOR

Philadelphia has a woman street inspector. Director Cooke of the department of public works has appointed Mrs. Edith W. Pierce, secretary of the Home and School League, to the place which was created recently. She began work on August 15, and will receive \$1,800 a year. Mrs. Pierce stood first on an eligible list of eight.

Mrs. Pierce's duty is somewhat different from that of the men inspectors. Instead of having a district, she will cover the whole city, and will pay particular attention to "the condition of schools and homes. Director Cooke says that she will organize sectional associations for keeping the streets, sidewalks, homes and schools clean and will visit them frequently, making addresses and instructing the people in the ways of municipal cleanliness.

ST. LUKE'S MISSION

Last night at St. Luke's Mission, Rev. F. G. Newton took as his subject the "Doctrine of Assurance," basing his remarks on a part of the 12th verse of 2 Timothy, chapter one. "I know whom I have believed, and am persuaded that He is able to keep that which I have committed unto him." This doctrine of assurance, he said, was set forth clearly in all the great hymns and if a man could not know that he was right with God and have full assurance of that fact, then most of these hymns were nonsense. Again the language of the liturgy was the language of absolute assurance, for example, "I believe in the forgiveness of sins." "Give us grace that we may cast away the works of darkness and put upon us the whole armor of light." These passages and many more like them from the prayer book, referred to an experience here and now, something of which people have definite knowledge. In the third place they had this assurance given in the Bible itself. The key word of the Epistle St. John was assurance. Paul's theology was full of this positive nite. "I know and am persuaded."

FOR HORSE EXPORTERS

The Department of Agriculture of Canada is in receipt of a new order issued by the Board of Agriculture in London, England, entitled "Horses, Importation and Transit Order of 1913." In Chapter 1 of this order it is provided that horses, asses and mules must be accompanied by a veterinary certificate of freedom from symptoms of glanders (including farcy), epizootic lymphangitis, ulcerative lymphangitis, dourine, horse-pox, sarcocystis, mange, influenza, ringworm or strangles, instead of, as at present, from symptoms of glanders (including farcy) only. The provisions of Chapter 1 of the horses (importation and transit) order of 1912, which in effect required horses, asses or mules brought from abroad to be either accompanied by a license of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries or to be examined at a place of detention at the port of landing, are entirely withdrawn. This order came into operation on October 1, 1913.

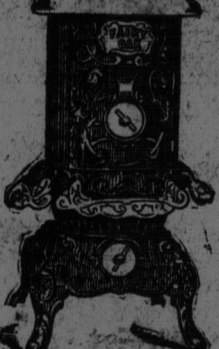

CLERICAL BLOWS AT HALL CAINE

Father Bernard Vaughan Latest To Rap Manxman

WRITER BROUGHT TO TASK

Assertion That They Approve His New Novel is Denied by Bishop of London and Rev. J. J. Campbell - English Literary Letter

(Times' Special Correspondence) London, Oct. 15.—Hall Caine must be feeling rather like an "Aunt Sally" at a fair just now, for he is being shied at from all sides, though perhaps he looks upon it all as just so much free advertising. Still one hardly thinks he can like being publicly repudiated—as he has been—by practically every one of the eminent divines whom he represented as being so awfully keen on "The Woman Thou Gavest Me."

These included the Bishop of London, who, according to the Manxman, really had more or less of a "writing" "The Woman Thou Gavest Me," the Rev. F. B. Meyer, pastor of Christ Church, Westminster Bridge Road, who was supposed to be red-hot with enthusiasm and the Rev. R. J. Campbell, who was said by Hall Caine to have invited him to speak on the subject of his book in the City Temple, the former church of the famous Dr. Joseph Parker. The first one of these clergymen to deny the soft impeachment was Rev. Mr. Meyer, to whom Mr. Caine issued an apology for having "inadvertently" included him in his list of clerical patrons. Then somebody inquired of the Bishop of London if it really were true that he had helped with "The Woman Thou Gavest Me," and received the illuminating reply from the bishops' secretary, that "Dr. Ingham" was in the habit of whatever of the contents of Mr. Caine's novel, having not yet read it." Then up spoke the Rev. R. J. Campbell to the effect that he certainly had not invited Mr. Hall Caine to talk about his much-puffed novel in the City Temple. It appears that there is a small literary circle in connection with Mr. Campbell's church and the latter, in response to a letter from Hall Caine on the subject of "banning" of his book by the libraries, told him that the members of this circle would be glad to listen to his views on the subject did he care to address them.

Father Vaughan Denounces It Hall Caine's reply to these denials, it must be confessed, consists mostly of shuffling. He asserts that he really did once have a talk with the Bishop of London more or less about the subject dealt with in "The Woman Thou Gavest Me," and as for the "writing" part, all a respectable mistake. Meanwhile the Manxman is assailed, and vigorously, by Bernard Vaughan, the modern Svanorola, rises in something like wrath to denounce with "the most eloquent and abundant" of Caine's novel from a Catholic point of view. It seems that "The Woman Thou Gavest Me" is wrong in Catholic doctrine, practice, character. Priests and nuns behave in its pages as they would never behave in life, and there is an Irish blasphe-my who has no single trait or characteristic of his kind, who is weak in theology and weaker still in sense.

Perhaps Father Vaughan's "roast" will increase the sales of "The Woman Thou Gavest Me." One forgets how many hundred thousand of it had gone off at last accounts. But one really thinks that its author must feel just a little uncomfortable.

Two mighty hunters of big game, both of whom have written fascinatingly about their adventures, got together this week in the person of F. C. Selous, a veteran rimrod and naturalist, and Jas. Sutherland, an ivory hunter with a record bag of tuskers to his credit, whose "Adventures of an Elephant Hunter" had to wide a sale, yet or to Selous, who is sixty-two, lives at Worpleston, in Surrey, now, and there Sutherland, who recently returned after his latest safari, went to pay his first visit to him. A wonderful palaver these two layers of elephants and lions and veterans of native wars must have had to be sure.

"I found Selous charming," said Sutherland, on his return from Worpleston, yesterday, "and he has a really wonderful collection of horns and mounted heads."

Sutherland has been elephant hunting for seventeen years and accounted for more than 600 tuskers, or 200 more than have been laid low by any one hunter. Edwin Pugh, who wrote "Tony Drum" and who has since maintained the reputation he made with that widely read novel, seems to be the most unfortunate of authors so far as his titles are concerned. They are such good titles that other authors are always duplicating them, (or almost duplicating them), quite unintentionally, of course, and at last a protest has been wrung from long-suffering Pugh.

"In fairness to myself," he writes to the "Times," I would like to point out that my book "The Spoilers," now on sale in a cheap edition, was published before Rex Beach's "Spoilers," also on sale in a cheap edition; and, to prevent further complications, that my book "The Stumbling Block" was published before Mr. Forman's "Stumbling Block." Of Bernard Cope's recently published story "Tony Drum"—my best-known book is entitled "Tony Drum"—I can only say that here is an instance of the long arm of coincidence being in danger of dislocation."

"Jimmy" Glover, a famous conductor of the orchestra at Drury Lane, who frequently raises his voice against the domination of the British public by American melodies, and who has known no end of theatrical and other celebrities, recently published a witty book of reminiscences under the title of "Jimmy Glover, His Book." This proves to be successful that its author has given it a successor, which he calls, "Jimmy Glover and His Friends," and which is full of good stories. Here is one of them.

"The most remarkable phenomenon I ever assisted at," says Glover, "was one at Birmingham where, in the middle of the performance, the Fish-burst his tank of several thousand gallons of water and flooded the orchestra and stalls. ### SUGGESTS REVIVING CURFEW IN MONTREAL

Troubled There, Too, With Conditions Which Obtain in St. John

(Montreal Telegraph)

"The parents must be blamed for the increasing crime among children in this city," said Chief Campeau this morning, discussing the question that has been attracting wide attention of late. "If the fathers and mothers would look after their children and keep them off the streets there would be fewer cases by far in the juvenile court. But too many parents do not seem to care where their boys and girls are, so long as they are not around the house. They let them run about the streets until midnight and later. No wonder they go by the wrong way home if they are not looked after. In my opinion every child should be in bed by eight o'clock."

Evidently the chief was speaking from more than a theoretical knowledge, for he has a family. "I don't know what I am talking about," he continued, "I know what I am talking about. I have a family. I don't want my boys to smoke and they don't. Other parents can surely control their children."

"But perhaps among the poorer classes—"

"You'll find lots of fine children among the poorer families," the chief interrupted, getting the idea before it was expressed. "And if one poor woman can bring up a family to be decent, respectable citizens, there is no reason why they all can't do it."

The whole trouble lies in the fact that the children are allowed to run the streets at night. You will see them after twelve o'clock playing around the corners. There are little boys and young girls all over the city, whose parents do not seem to object to their being out after midnight."

"Would you favor a curfew law by which the police could force children to go home early in the evening, he was asked."

"If the council would pass some sort of a by-law forbidding children to be on the street after nine or ten o'clock it would be enforced, and I think it would do a great deal to prevent children from going wrong."

WEIGHING OF BUTTER AND CHEESE  
FOR a considerable time persistent complaints were made to officers of the Department of Agriculture in Ottawa by producers and vendors of dairy produce in Eastern Ontario and Quebec regarding the unsatisfactory methods by which butter and cheese were weighed in Montreal. So numerous were the complaints that the government was obliged to investigate. Consequently in the summer of 1912 a royal commission was appointed. The investigation by this commission covered several months and involved the taking of evidence at many points and from many people.

The commission consisting of R. A. Pringle, chairman; A. J. Hodgson, and S. J. Macdonell, completed their work some time ago and presented their report to the honorable minister of agriculture. In this, the advisability of amending the act respecting the weigh-

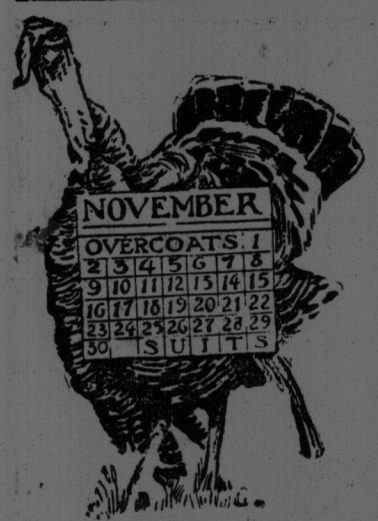

**A WARNING**

Police Magistrate Talks of Dangers of The Streets

**STOP THE NIGHTLY PARADE**

Waterloo to Princess and Back Again—Police Called on by Court to See That Seven O'clock Law is Observed

"There is a nightly parade of young girls and boys from Waterloo to Princess street and back again which should be stopped by the police," said Judge Ritchie this morning in the police court. "It is the cause of much immorality and waywardness and causes the downfall of many girls, whose mothers dress them most attractively to take part in the procession. Now I'm going to tell them that beginning today and during the months of November, December, January and February, the law says that no young people are allowed to wander about the streets without a proper escort after seven o'clock in the evening. In the summer months it is nine o'clock. I wish the policemen to take particular note of this and to put an end to this night-walking."

The parade is seen from Waterloo street, along Union, Charlotte to Princess or down Kings, and then back again. The young fellows can be seen standing in the doorways along the route, ready to prey upon the girls, most of whom are of tender years, and just waiting their chance to make a "pick-up." The police may stop this. They have the power to arrest in this case and when they should try to put an end to it. I shall do my part if they bring the night-walkers before me. The Catholic girls I will send to the Good Shepherd, the Protestant girls will go to jail because there is no special home provided.

Years ago one would never see such goings-on. It is only of late years that there has been growing this state of affairs. It is quite a common sight now for two or three young girls to be seen chatting and talking with young fellows about street corners, in the old burying ground or King Square until late in the evening, and I always have my opinion in such cases. When you see these girls starting out in the early evening on the ramparts without an escort, you can generally realize their motive—they're looking for a pick-up, they want someone to take them to the Nickel.

"Now this is a safe warning to both the girls and their mothers, to the former to stay in the house if they have not a proper escort, unless they wish to be arrested, and to the mothers to see that their daughters are not allowed to roam the streets as they like until late at night."

WILL ULSTER FIGHT?

Times Letter From Ireland Says No REVIEW OF SITUATION Little Corner of North East Part of Country and Its Provisional Government—The Lord Loreburn Letter—Business Men See That Carton Has Gone Too Far

(Times' Special Correspondence) Belfast, Oct. 28—Will Ulster fight? This is the question which has been agitating men of all parties in the United Kingdom for the last year and it has been brought to a head by Sir Edward Carson's tour of Ulster which has just been finished and during which he reviewed the "Ulster Volunteers" at several centres. The conclusion arrived at by responsible observers is that when the home rule bill is passed next year—passed it will be in all human probability—Ulster will not fight.

That is the fact boldly stated, but it is only fair to qualify the statement and to explain that the men who have joined the Ulster Volunteers and probably Sir Edward Carson himself are not bluffing. They believe that home rule would mean disaster to industrial Ulster and they are ready to resist it to the death. The men who are bluffing are the group of Tory aristocrats and Belfast business men who have been fomenting the movement in the hope of scaring the British government, and who are now becoming frightened at the results of their own work. These men, it is now apparent, will stand from under in time to avoid risking their lives and their property in what would be nothing less than a high pitched, but narrow, military expedition.

Probably never in history has there been such a spectacle as has been presented in Ulster during the last few months. To begin with, I must explain that I am using the term "Ulster" in the sense now popularly accepted, as meaning the whole province of that name, comprising nine counties, but as indicating the four counties of Antrim, Down, Armagh and Londonderry. The other five counties are overwhelmingly Nationalist, but they are not being claimed by the Unionists except return at least one Nationalist to parliament.

A Little Corner This little corner of the North-east of Ireland has been, with the greatest possible publicity, preparing for a year to set up what is called a "provisional government" of its own which is to take charge of the whole province on the day the home rule bill becomes law, and to do this. The climax came a few weeks ago when it was announced that the provisional government had been formed. The names of the members were announced and it was proclaimed that committees had been formed to administer the various departments of government, including law, police, finance, military affairs, etc. Sir Edward Carson is the chief of the movement, and General Sir George Richardson, a retired officer of the Indian army, was chosen as its chief.

SCIENTIFIC INVESTIGATION INTO CAUSE OF VICE

When Toronto appointed controllers O'Neill and McCarthy to the Civic Survey Commission, they gave official recognition to the scientific investigation that is to be made into the primary causes of vice in Toronto. The work will be pursued quietly and without sensationalism. Among those who have volunteered their services are some of the best known men and women of the city, of various religious affiliations. A great corrective and reformative movement may be a result of this investigation, and the movement is expected to spread to other cities in Canada.

EMIGRANTS FROM THE OLD COUNTRY

Economist Says More Are Returning From Canada NEW BRUNSWICK'S MAN A. Bowdler Says He Was Booked Few Years Ago as Emigrant to Work on Land—J. Obad. Smith Answers Criticism

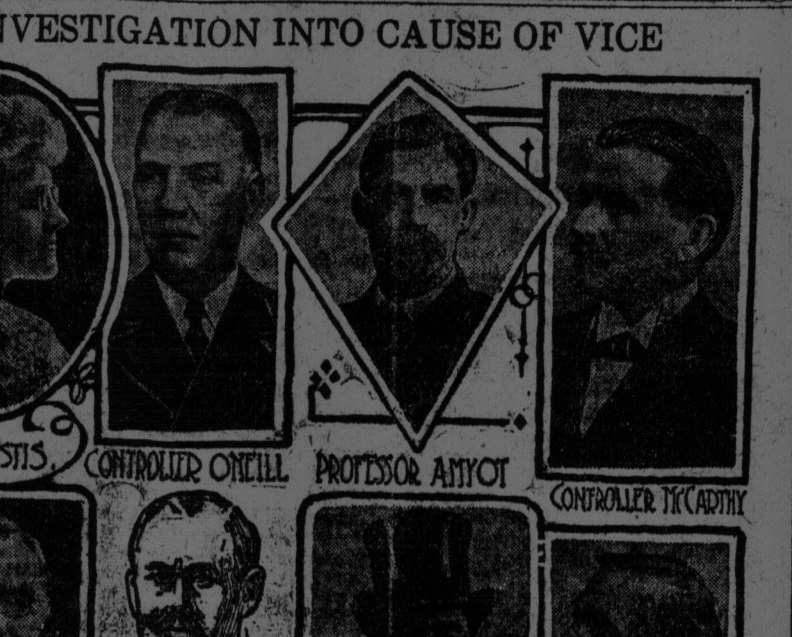
(Times' Special Correspondence) London, Oct. 28—L. G. Chloassa Money M. P., unofficial parliamentary statistician, who probably is the most consistent opponent of emigration, writes, "I feel relieved at the latest statistics dealing with this subject. For years he has preached that a too copious emigration spell ruin to Great Britain, and largely because of his efforts the Board of Trade has been compiling emigration statistics which have been changed to show the amount of man-power less than the country's supporting. Returns for August show that fewer people left Great Britain and more returned than in the same month of last year, the credit balance being nearly 9,000.

Smith, assistant superintendent of emigration, who is most active in tracing the authors of letters complaining about Canada, made short work of the unemployment question, in so far as it was said to be general in Canada. "By means of news agencies," said Mr. Smith, "each country would know that it is the wholesale distributing centre and the banking centre for the whole of Ireland, especially every pound of groceries, every yard of dry goods and all other supplies come from Dublin to Donegal and from Galway to Dublin. Wholesale trade is not like manufacturing requiring an extensive land plant which could not be easily moved. The four walls of a warehouse are all that is necessary."

CHAMBERLAIN'S SON 50 YEARS OLD Birthday Finds Him The Real Leader of Tories WAS BALFOUR'S CHOICE A Great Worker, a Brilliant Orator and a Mine of Knowledge is Noted Son of a Famous Father

(Times' Special Correspondence) London, Oct. 18.—To most people over here, it came as something of a shock to hear that the young Austen Chamberlain, a famous and brilliant son of a famous father, was engaged in celebrating his fiftieth birthday. With Joseph Chamberlain still alive, though to all intents and purposes already one of the "younger" men in the Unionist party and firm advocate of his father's policy of tariff reform had, long before this, been succeeded by his son, the late Colonel H. L. Dundas, been given up as a confirmed bachelor by the match-makers of Mayfair and Belgrave.

Today it is perhaps not too much to describe Joseph Chamberlain as the real leader of the Conservative party in Great Britain, although Bonar Law is its titular head. It is in fact, an open secret that Arthur James Balfour, when he resigned the leadership of the Conservatives, did so in the belief that the son of his old friend and political ally would succeed him, but the adherents of Walter Long, who are in the majority in the House of Commons, Austen Chamberlain is more or less pledged, proved too strong in the party caucus. RUSSIA IN THE GRIP OF BRIGANDAGE

Russia In The Grip Of Brigandage Gangs ABDOUC AND STEAL Fit of This Kind Seems to Abound in Country Every Three Years Uncommon Career of the Notorious Kerim

(Times' Special Correspondence) St. Petersburg, Oct. 20.—Russia is in the grip of its regular triennial year of brigandage. Minister of War Alexander Kuropatkin is engaged in a feud with the Minister of Interior Maklakov over a question of its suppression. He thinks it would best be checked by spreading civil institutions, while Kuropatkin wants universal martial law, as under civil government the police are not sufficient to cope with the lawless gangs. The gangs are said to be in the habit of robbing the railways.

Every three years there is a fit of this kind in Russia. The present fit began in 1913, and it is still merly going on. The most notorious of the brigands is a man named Kerim, who is said to have been carried off, and when a dozen guards went on their heels to rescue him, he was taken into Turkestan. A few weeks later in some Kurdy's hands he was taken into an Armenian's hands near Kozul. The puma killed, Kerim, who has been sought for by the police of two countries for two years.

Next a raid was made on a government sub-treasury of Kara. The treasurer escaped. His gravestones were recognized from descriptions of the brigands. This most dangerous and most educated, and most slippery bandit in Caucasus history, is supposed to be hidden near Mount Ararat, at 8000 Cossacks and "strashniks" are trying to find his trail.

Kerim's career as a bandit is inconceivable. He is a Russian, and he has rendered Russia services in the great war against Germany. He was in the school in the excellent gymnasium in the town of Yerevan, and when he was a man he spoke four Caucasian dialects, Turkish, Russian, French and German. He was a highly cultivated man, and when twenty-two he translated by whole regiments of soldiers. He is now in his thirtieth year, and he has been in the military governor of Kara, asked to be the governor, slapped his face, threatened to kill him, and made him apologise for having said in a report that Kerim had become a bandit because he was caught swindling at cards.

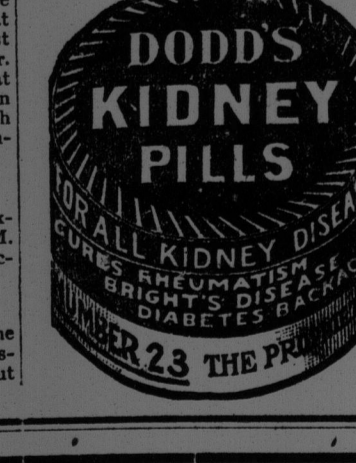

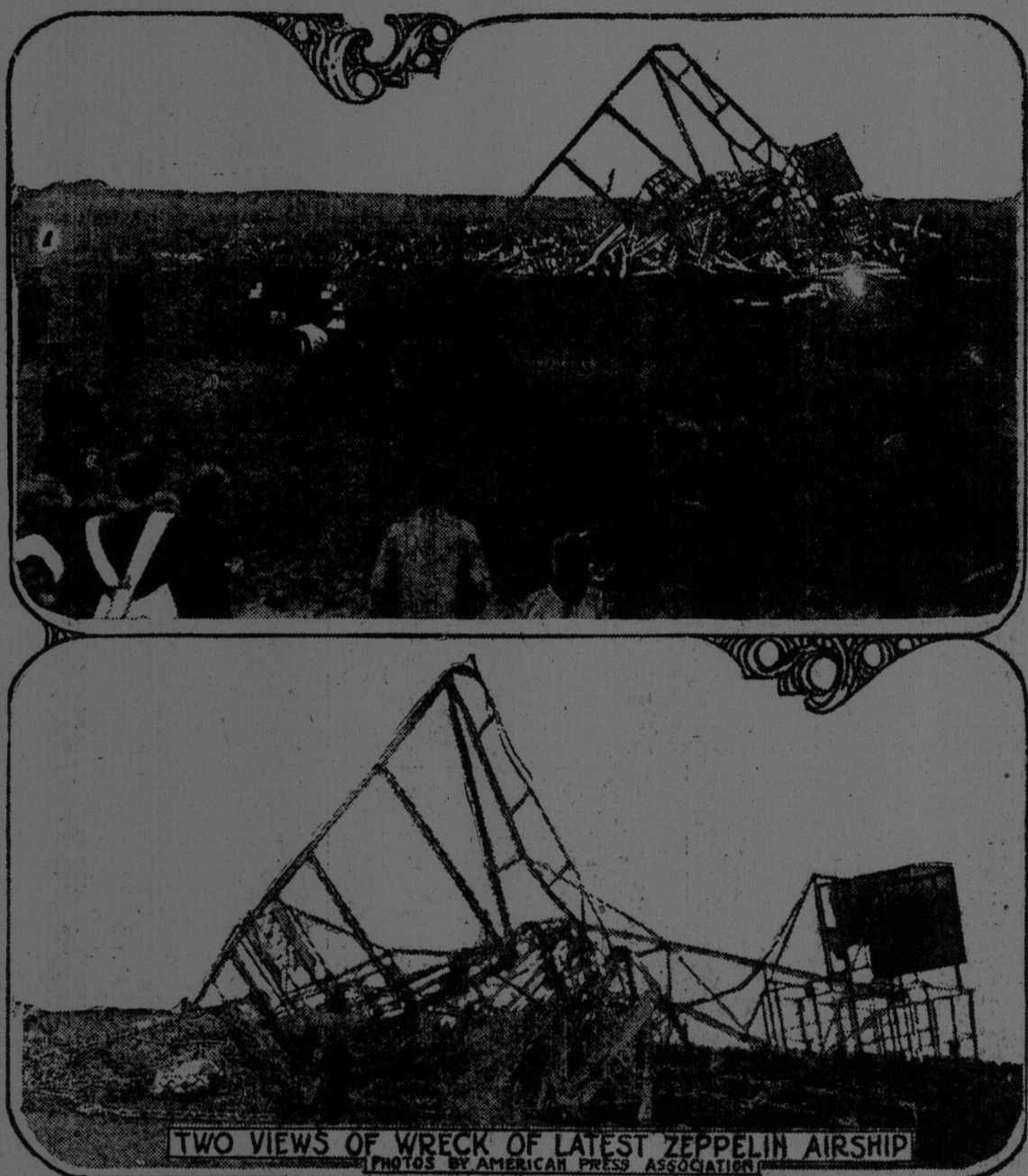

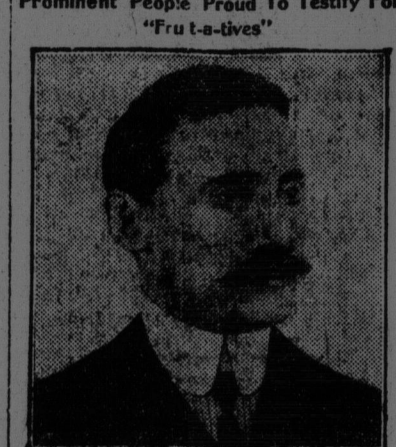
CANADIANIZED BRITISH CITY

BLAME SOCIALISM FOR LOWER BIRTH RATE

Record in France Reached in Departments Where Catholics Are Powerful

Paris, Nov. 1.—Now that France is unadvisedly, removing the question of the birth rate has assumed a tragic importance. It is believed that this year's contingent will number 185,000, a satisfactory total, and superior to the calculations of the French recruiting authorities.

The population was shown to be positively declining in 1911, when the excess of deaths over births was 84,889; the figures were 742,114 births, against 776,988 deaths.

The tables for 1912, which have now been published, show a slight improvement. The births have obtained a slight advance over the deaths. There were 750,651 births last year, against 692,740 deaths. The situation, therefore, is still disquieting.

Low in Wine Districts. A closer examination of the statistics shows a variation in the different departments. The lowest birth rate is in the basin of the Garonne, in the wine district of Bordeaux, reputed to be the most flourishing in France.

For eight departments in this region death overtakes birth. The total deficit is \$165, equivalent to the disappearance of 165,000 inhabitants.

Washington, Oct. 31.—Attorney-General McKeen today sent to Secretary McAdoo his written opinion as to the effect of the five per cent. preferential on goods brought to the United States in American ships, provided in the new tariff act.

Although the opinion was not made public, it was generally understood that Mr. McKeen did not differ from the ideas on the preferential clause held by state and treasury department officials.
