# PLUCKY GIRL SEEKS TREASURE

Margaret Naylor, Diver, Goes After Wealth of Sunken Galleon.

Scotland, May 5-Miss Margaret Naylor, the first woman deep-sea diver, has arrived at Tobermory, on the west coast of Scotland to renew the efforts

has arrived at Tobermory, on the west coast of Scotland to renew the efforts to salve the Spanish treasure ship Admiral of Florence, which was súnk there in November 1588.

Commander Young, an experienced naval diver, is assisting Miss Naylor, and both are confident that it will be possible soon to decide what machinery will be required to raise the vessel.

Miss Naylor has been specially trained for the work by Colonel Fose, who in 1919 succeeded in locating the wreck of the treasure ship after years of search. A subsequent injury, which he received in an accident rendered the colonel unable to continue diving work himself, so he determined to train Miss Naylor to take his place. She has already made several descents at Tobermory, and added much useful information as to the galleon's position.

"It ought to be a fairly simple job now," he said, "Miss Naylor has discovered that the vessel's poop lies under three feet of clay, and a couple of days will suffice to clear this away. It will then remain to get into the ship by sluicing the mud and sand out of her. When this has been done a better idea can be formed as to the best means of raising the ship to the súrface. Miss Naylor is a plucky girl, and I wish her every success in her treasure hunt."

Reputed to have 30,000,000 golden pieces of eight aboard, the sunken galleon has hitherto defied every attempt at salvage. In the early seventies of the last century a map was found in a forgotten corner of the Argyll library at Inverary, on which was a place specially marked "Spanish wreck." Since then many attempts have been made to salve the galleon, and in 1919 Colonel Foss succeeded in recovering from it pewter dishes, coins, cannon balls, and other relics.



Son of Prosperous Parents Shoots Taxi Man to Rob Him.

Paris, May 8.—A Paris taxi-cab driver named Delapierre had a narrow escape from being murdered on a lonely road near Versailles by a boy who, accompanied by a girl friend, chartered his cab with the object of stealing it as soon as they found themselves in a sufficiently lonely place.

Delapierre was hailed in the Rue de Rivoli at one a.m. by Lucien Chevrier, aged 17, who said he wished to be driven to Versailles. Chevrier was accompanied by a 19-year-old girl friend, Yvette Taitre. The car had just passed through a wood near Versailles when Chevrier signalled the driver to stop, and, saying that his companion was ill, asked for a glass of water. As this could not be obtained in such a place, the driver re-started, but had only gone a little way when the window behind him was lowered and Chevrier, leaning forward, fired two revolver shots into the back of his neck.

The driver staggered from his seat and collapsed into the roadside ditch,

The chauffeur pleaded with the boy not to kill him, but to be content with robbery, if that was his motive, whereupon the young bandit ordered him to make off before he was shot again.

When the police were called to the scene they found the cab abandoned, but a slip of paper dropped within a few yards of it put them on the bandit's track. It was a fragment of an old envelope bearing the names and addresses of the boy and his companion, which the girl had accidentally dropped from her purse.

The girl, who was found at her lodging in Paris, told the police that Chevrier fell short of money, and during their ride to Versailles he suddenly informed her that he had not a sou and intended to rob the chauffeur. On hearing this, she fainted, and did not recover until after, having been unable to re-start the cab, Chevrier told her they would have to walk back to Paris.




