NOTICES.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE will meet on the second Tuesday of February, May, August and November, at 4 o'clock, in the Synod office, University street.

Annual Sermons are appointed to be preached and collections taken up as follows:

In January, on the first Sunday after the Epiphany, for Foreign Missions.

In February, for the Mission Fund of this Diocese, by Envelopes which are distributed in the churches on the first Sunday in the month and handed in with the Offertory collection on the second Sunday in the month.

In March, for the Widows and Orphans Fund.

In May, for Theological Training, in aid of the Theological College at Montreal, or Bishop's College at Lennoxville.

In September, for the Mission Fund.

In November, for the Superannuation Fund.

An assessment is made towards the Bishopric of Algoma.

An assessment is made towards Expenses of Synod. (See page 787, Journal XVII.)

All Parochial Missionary collections should be made in each Parish or Mission, and forwarded to the Secretary or Treasurer with lists, by the 31st December, on which day the Synod Accounts for the year are closed. Sums received after this date cannot be printed in the Treasurer's yearly report.

It is not safe to send money through the post offices, except in the form of post office order, or by cheque or bank draft made payable to order.

The Secretary of the Executive Committee desires to call special attention to the fact that he acknowledges the receipt of all sums sent to him on the days on which they come to hand. If at any time such acknowledgment be not received in due course, the person who made the remittance is requested to notify him without delay, in order that inquiry may be made.



THIRTY-FOURTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY, 17TH JANUARY, 1893.

The Thirty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal was held on Tuesday, 17th January, 1893.

At half-past ten o'clock a.m., the Lord Bishop celebrated Holy Communion and delivered his charge to the Synod in Christ Church Cathedral. In the administration of the Holy Communion his Lordship was assisted by Archdeacon Lindsay, Revs. Dr. Norton, Canon Fulton, Rural Dean Longhurst.

The Bishop's charge was as follows:

HIS LORDSHIP'S CHARGE.

DEAR BRETHREN IN CHRIST,-We are met together, in solemn services of prayer and praise, to ask the blessing of the Almighty God on the acts and deliberations of the regular annual session of our Diocesan Synod. Our meeting of Synod is for business purposes, but the business which demands our attention differs from the ordinary business of the market-place and the exchange. Our affairs concern the Church of the Living God, that Church which Christ, the Head of the Church, dignifies with the names of "His body, His spouse, His spiritual temple." In certain aspects the business of the Church is a warfare, -a warfare against ignorance, vice, and all the evil which we find around us in a wicked world. In other aspects it is a building up of all that is strong and true; all that is lovely and of good report; the main business of the Church is to gain victory after victory over sin and evil, and to establish in Christ's name, and for Christ's sake, truth and righteousness in the world. It is, therefore, most important that we should understand our high calling, and enter upon our duties and responsibilities with minds accordant with the mind of Christ. What that mind is we learn quite plainly in Holy Scripture, and a brief review here of some points which we can, and ought, specially to imitate, will, I trust, be helpful to us on the present occasion. First, then, let me point to His " singleness of purpose." Christ sought no advantage for Himself in the whole course of His busy life. It was with Him, as it was with His apostle afterwards, and as it should be with all His ministers, the resolve, "This one thing I do."

Very attractive to all who heard Him preach, he was eagerly followed by poor and rich, many forsaking friends and home, all, that they might become His disciples. But the aim of His life was to glorify His Father, and to set forth the will of God. The aim of His life was to preach the gospel of repentance, and to set the example of a simple, pure, true, self-sacrificing life, to manifest the active principle of true faith in God. "Let this mind, therefore, be in you which was also in Christ Jesus, who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God; but made Himself of no reputation, and took upon Him the form of a servant and was made in the likeness of men, and being found in fashion as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." We may notice also for our own edification the strength and tenderness, combined, with which He rebuked sin. Observe His words as He condemned the ambition and intolerance of His disciples, even when their zeal was the expression of loyalty to His person. "Ye know not what manner of spirit ye are of." He said to James and John when they would have called down fire from Heaven to consume those who slighted Him: "the Son of Man is not come to destroy men's lives but to save them!" "Master," said John, "we saw one casting out devils in Thy name; and we forbade him, because he followeth not with us. And Jesus said unto him, forbid him not, for he that is not against us is for us." Again, we shall do well to notice the practical tendency of His life amongst men; how He recognized their bodily needs, how He remembered the limits to their power of suffering even when it was the result of conviction of sin. He never "broke the bruised reed, nor quenched the smoking flax." This was His tenderness. "Go and sin no more." "To whom little is forgiven, the same loveth little." He appeared first after His resurrection to Simon Peter, the disciple who denied Him in His hour of trouble and pain and danger. " He was seen of Cephas, then of the twelve." And these examples might be multiplied a hundred fold. We must not, however, so hasten our work that we fail to give ourselves ample time for consideration of the business on which we are set. We must be prepared to use our Lord's own words to any who would question our right to conscientious investigation or wise deliberation, "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" I regard a Synod of the Church of England as a meeting together of the brightest minds and wisest Christians within her pale. It should be so. The representatives of the Church should have experience, learning, and above all vital religion. They should come together to promote the best, the religious interests, and extend the noblest influence of that Church into which they have been baptised, and of which they are communicants. I do not forget that this Synod has no jurisdiction over things spiritual, that it is not called upon to formulate doctrines or revise ritual; I do not forget that its main purpose, its very

reason for existence, is that it may deal with the temporalities of the Church. I am quite aware that money, salaries, expenses, and all things summed in the expression, "The temporalities of the Church," must, and should, occupy the chief part of your time; but I ask you to bring to these neces. sary things the spirit of right dealing, self-forgetfulness, devotion of purpose, liberality, and honor-the spirit of Christ. Are not you, the laity in Synod assembled, the elect and chosen of your fellow churchmen, chosen to represent them in a great and holy cause? And of the clergy ought I to say less? Nay more, beloved brethren of the clergy, you are the guardians of the truth the teachers of sacred things. The affairs of the Church constitute the whole business of your lives; and nothing less than your whole attention to the immediate business of the session, including the advancement of the Church in things spiritual, so far as your opportunities and powers go, will satisfy the expectation of the Church. In this relation (the promotion of the influence of the Church for good) let me remind you of the missionary meeting, with the anticipation that you will do all you can to promote its interests and secure its success; that you will by your prayers, your words, by any and all of those talents which God has given you, forward the efficiency of the missionary work. We live in times when great freedom of thought and action are permitted on the part of religious people, a much greater freedom than was possible, or thought right, fifty years ago. An old man, therefore, like myself, finds it difficult always to reconcile the breadth of thought, the freedom of opinion and practice allowed by followers of Christ with the straightness of the narrow way in which the servants of God are called upon to walk. It distresses me personally to see so much time and thought given to mere pleasure on the part of religious people; and it distresses and troubles me still more when I find the clergy ministering to this passing whim for diversion and excitement, as though they were the providers of amusement for their people's leisure, instead of stewards of the mysteries of God, ministering to the sustenance and growth of souls. I recognize-we all are forced to recognize-the restlessness of the age; I mean the mental and moral re-tlessness which pervades and permeates modern society, and thoughtfu1 people naturally ask whence it comes. I do not pretend satisfactorily to answer the question, even to myself, but I cannot doubt that much of it arises from too sharp a distinction between the duties of life and its recreations. The common duties of life are full of pleasures if the mind be habituated to consider them in that light. Pleasure is most fully and purely derived from a consciousness of power, power to provide, power to accomplish, power to speak, power to withhold from speaking; in other words, self-control, self-culture, a sense of independence, coming from within, not from without. Let the common duties be performed in a spirit of independence, love, cheerfulness, and the spirit of a man will sing a continued psalm of content and happiness. His pleasures will go round with him and abide with him. Of

course I speak of the true Christian. There would be less sickness of mind and body, less craving after something not attained, if men and women could be satisfied and amused with simple duties. We live surrounded with pleasurable things, and disregard them as too matter of fact, too commonplace, to be thought of as pleasures. Pure air, quiet exercise for the body, are amongst the highest earthly pleasures human beings can enjoy. Yet young people, and old too, in pursuit of recreation, hasten to exchange them for crowded halls and heated theat: es, and, worse still, for the lounging places of self-indulgence, which end in vice and death. At the root of it all (as it seems to me) is the emptiness of the individual soul. It cannot satisfy itself. It cannot be satisfied with the frivolities and vanities of the passing moment. It cannot even satisfy itself with family, friends and duties, if it depends on them as a prop and maintenance, instead of being their prop and maintenance. A man must not go outside himself for satisfaction, until he has first looked well within, in order to be sure that he has done his duty to himself before he asks to be allowed to help and sympathize with others. In his own soul there must, first, be the indwelling spirit of God before he can hope to be a truly happy man. There must be a friend in the inner sanctuary of the human soul; a friend waiting to strengthen, advise and guide; a friend to go with us where we go, love what we love, teach us all we ought, all we want to know-our life while we live, our life when we die. Your soul is empty, if the Spirit of God dwell not in you. Your Church services are vain oblations if the Spirit of God be not with you at the feast. All is a vain show without the Spirit of God. Beloved, grieve not the Spirit of God, but cultivate those graces with which He can dwell; so shall you be prosperous without wealth and satisfied without change of circumstance "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God." I have found a good deal of this spirit to prevail in the diocese. As I have visited from parish to parish, confirming and ministering, I have perceived (in the midst of diversity of mind and circumstance) that the clergy in the main are singularly united in the great principles of the Church. This has greatly cheered and encouraged me in my somewhat anxious work. The appeal, where appeal is necessary (of course concerning practice), is invariably to the prayer book, and upon this reverend record of the wisdom and devoutness of the Church in past ages we are able to rest all our usages in Church service, with heartiness of feeling and harmony of Christian expression. And here I must record my personal feeling. The full respect and consideration with which I have been met, even when men have not been quite able to agree with their bishopthe disposition amongst the clergy to respect his wishes and aid him in maintaining order and unity is replete with strength and comfort, and this consideration has been manifested equally by the younger men and the more experienced. I hope and pray, as I must hope and pray while breath is left, that the Church in the diocese of Montreal will grow in holiness day by day.

The increase of the Church in worldly influence and prosperity is abundantly apparent. I beseech you, for Christ's sake, work heartily and pray earnestly that God will cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of His Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love Him, and worthily magnify His holy name.

I must now draw your attention for a brief space to the temporalities of the diocese. We have added to our Church buildings in the course of the year three city churches and two in the country, besides two parsonages, free from debt, with other churches and parsonages in course of building. Give God praise for this manifest and material progress. The legacy (\$10,000) from the Phillips estate has been paid into the Sustentation Fund. No available proceeds have been possible as yet from the Shelton bequest, and none may be expected at present "We must, therefore, appeal as heretofore to the members of the Church to aid the Mission Fund by their individual subscriptions, as upon this (under God) we have mainly to depend for our mission work. While many of our Church members, as usual, are liberal to the full extent of their means, I cannot fail to recognize that a still greater number keep back the giving hand. This is especially true in the country parts. "There is that scattereth and yet increaseth; there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty." With increased faith because of God's help in time past, I commend this appeal to your thoughtful liberality. I am bound in duty, moreover, to add that I have reached the point when I must most reluctantly refuse to make new appointments until the clergy now serving in the missions are better paid. In this month I have received the resignation of three of our most trustworthy men, because, in the case of two of them, the inadequacy of the stipend exposes them to the great evil of debt. I hope, therefore, a more devout spirit will arise, bearing fruit in this direction. Do not forget that the deficit of this year is \$2.000 more than last year.

I am pleased to inform you that the mortgage on the building at Dunham, which has so long been an anxiety to the churchmen of the Eastern Townships, and to myself, has been paid off. This good work has been accomplished by the zeal and energy and liberality of some of the clergy and laity of the Church, whose names, were it expedient, I would like gratefully to mention. It is proposed to hand the property over to the Synod. I hope you may see your way to accept it, and that effort will be made as soon as possible to open it again as a missionary Church school on a permanent and substantial basis. The Theological College is giving us steady and satisfactory work. Nothing is wanted in this department of the Church except more money. The endowment is sadly insufficient. The churchmen of the diocese should charge themselves with the support of this institution. Principal Henderson reports a larger number of students than at any former period; indeed,

more than can be accommodated within the college wans. In addition to their literary and theological studies, these young men devote considerable time to missionary work. The learned Principal tells us that of the five societies formed among the students, or with which they co operate, three are missionary and deal with Diocesan, Domestic and Foreign Missions. I hail this information with hope and gladness. In these days of travel and enterprise a missionary of the Church of England must not be a mere bookworm, however deep his studies and devout his nature. He must be prepared to come in touch everywhere with his fellow men, and although they may not always sympathize with his purpose and motives, he should be prepared to enter into theirs. We may expect much in the future from the Montreal Diocesan Theological College, which (the report informs us) already stands second as regards number of students among the six institutions for theological training authorized by the Provincial Synod. The Church Home has nothing new to report. I could wish it were otherwise. I should like to see some progress made in the way of general diocesan charity. The parochial charitable work is fairly well done—very well done in those churches which have a pretty equal distribution of rich and poor parishioners. But some of our churches are in the case of Laodicea. They are rich, and have need of nothing, but are poor, because they lack the natural outlet of Christian charity—they have no poor of their own. I suppose, in truth, we have no actually poor churches, that is churches entirely composed of laboring people, people who dress poorly and live scantily. There are such people in the city, but they are not formed into congregations, nor as a rule do they attend our regular services. This is true of free churches (so called) as well as those which exact pew rent. It is a difficulty not altogether arising on the part of the richer brethren. The poorest persons have their own pride and will not come where their poverty is marked and conspicuous. But church-going is not the whole of Christian duty, although its absence is to be warmly deprecated. Christian social life is as much to be cultivated as Christian church life. The gathering in the home may be a gathering around the person of Christ. And here our admirable district visitors come in and minister with excellent effect, but we have not yet found the secret of ministering to the waifs and strays of a great city, to the unknown men and women, strangers to the country, who creep into the cities in winter, seeking the shelter of our streets and refuges. The Salvation Army organization has succeeded here better than any other I know of in our generation, but I cannot yet think of it as a permanent society, and even if I could, it would not exonerate our Church from doing our duty at least to our own people. I wish we could be doing more within our own pale so as to leave no one baptized in the Church of England to be cared for, taught and comforted in Christ's name by any other body of persons, however good and righteous they might be. In this way it seems to me we should fulfil the

Apostolic injunction to "provoke one another unto love and to good works." The Young Men's Christian Associations and other guilds of young men in connection with the Church of England have done much excellent work during the past year in extending the worship and service of God. I trust they may see their way to do continued good service among the scattered poor of our Church. I would by no means be understood to restrain the limits of our Christian sympathy to the members of the Church of England. God forbid! Still as a first duty let us provide for our own, and if others have need let us give to them also. But that which I desire to impress on our minds is the shame and disgrace which must attach to any Christian congregation leaving to others the active charity and benevolence which properly belongs to themselves. There is danger lest we wait for others to render service to our own people, and to relieve ourselves of a troublesome and burdensome poor, to our own great loss. If we, as a Church, do not recognize our diocesan duties in this respect and provide diocesan relief and general Church of England provision for the spiritual and bodily wants of the poor, whether they be immigrants from the mother country or natives of Canada, we fall short of a full and true Christianity as laid down by our Lord Himself. It may appear to some that these remarks are applicable only to the city. Far from it. I repeat my strong language, it is a "shame and disgrace" to country congregations, and especially to parents, that the young men and women are permitted to come into this city and left uncared for to drift in many instances to ruin; notwithstanding continued entreaties from the clergy and myself that pastoral care be obtained on their behalf. It is impossible for a parochial system such as ours, with a shifting population of working people, unaided, to meet these obligations and to set up homes and asylums for the use of poorer brethren Such a work must be diocesan. There must be city missionaries, city readers, immigration chaplains, and all those whose duties are distinctly extra-parochial. I have had some talk with thoughtful churchmen, lay and clerical, from time to time, about emigrants, convalescents, sick children, etc., but nothing practical or tangible has yet been done. The Ladies' Home, on Guy street, is the only institution under the charter of the Church Home; while the charter is large enough to receive, administer and guard any amount of benevolent work, if only the benevolence of individuals moves in the direction of liberality and provision. The charity of the Church as exhibited in the Ladies' Home, the only diocesan charity we possess at present, is on no great scale. It is represented by a sum of about \$2,000 per annum in round numbers. The property is mortgaged over two-thirds of its value, and the ground, which is too small in extent for future need, is still unfenced. But of the Home itself (the interior I mean) I cannot say too much in its favor. The ladies of the committee, who take the chief management, spare themselves in nothing. It is a pleasure to visit the residents and perceive the order, rest and comfort which prevail. But we must not lose sight of the fact that in despair of raising funds sufficient to maintain this Home, entirely for ladies in reduced circumstances, according to the original intention, the committee asked and reasonably obtained permission to let the rooms for which the Church made no provision, that they might be enabled to utilize the small sum at their disposal for infirm, needy persons in their old age. It is quite evident that if the Church provides an income for this institution, rarely reaching \$2,000 per annum, it has no right to require a larger amount of charity than this meagre sum represents. The ladies inform me that they find it impossible, as matters stand at present, to do more than keep up the domestic part of the Home, that is, to board and lodge, tend and care for the inmates in sickness, and comfort them with personal kindness. Last year they could not make ends quite meet when the accounts were closed. This year I am glad to learn they have done so. Acquainted as I am with the details, I recognize this measure of success as the result of constant watchfulness and untiring energy. I shall rejoice when their patience and perseverance are rewarded by something more encouraging than the small subscriptions collected from house to house. They should be assisted to administer a full charity in house and grounds sufficient for their needs and unmortgaged.

The scheme for the consolidation of the Church of England in British North America was taken up in due course by the Provincial Synod at the session in September, 1892. In a resolution, the following opinion was expressed at length, that, while considering it expedient to unite and consolidate the various branches of the Church of England in British North America, it was advised that the question of retention of provinces under the General Synod be left open, to be dealt with as such provinces and the dioceses therein may deem proper. The report of the Committee, concerning the Constitution of such General Synod, contains the proposition that "a General Synod shall meet for the first time in the city of Toronto on the second Wednesday in September, 1893," for the formation of such General Synod. As matters stand at present it would be undesirable to occupy your time with the recital of resolutions, which will be within your reach shortly, in more convenient form, as part of the regular proceedings of the last session of the Previncial Synod. We may naturally expect the remodelling of many of these resolutions at the proposed meeting in Toronto, after which each Diocesan Synod will have an opportunity of dealing with all these important questions in a stage of advancement beyond that which the have, as yet, reached.

The year which has elapsed since we last met has seen the passing to their rest of three bishops of the Canadian Church, Dr. Oxenden, for nine years Bishop of Montreal and Metropolitan; Dr. Medley, Bishop of Fredericton and Metropolitan, and Dr. Williams, Bishop of Quebec. Bishop Oxenden died in the South of France in the spring of the year 1892, leaving an unblemished record of deep and, useful piety characterized by simplicity and sincerity.

In this new world history advances so swiftly that already the circumstances and detail of Bishop Oxenden's administration are being hidden from view by new men, new thoughts and new fequirements. But his good solid work on our behalf remains, and we value and respect, without always being able to discern, the thoughtful and conscientious mind from which it emanated. He found the Church in Montreal possessed of little endowment at a time when the S. P. G. was steadily and continuously withdrawing its support. To meet this difficulty of the future he set himself with energy and perseverance to build up the Sustentation Fund, and brought the claims of the Mission Fund to the front in a manner never seriously attempted before. He perceived also the necessity for a Canadian Diocesan trained clergy; and to meet the want founded the Theological College which opened under his auspices in a single room with one professor and two students. This institution is still in its infancy, but it will not be many years older before it justifies its own existence by its usefulness, popularity and educational success. It takes a long time to establish a college, without property or endowment, on a sure footing; but the elements of success are in our college, and even should it be allowed to languish for a while for want of funds it will not die. May it live to carry on the honored memory of its founder, and to cultivate as he did every Christian grace and virtue. Coming to this country in late middle life, Bishop Oxenden could not always appreciate his surroundings, but he adapted himself to our newer and, perhaps, rougher ways with a quickness and devotion born of a Christian disposition in which culture and Christianity together made themselves felt. When the weight of years warned him that he would not be able to bear the fatigue of constant travel in a climate, the extremes of which try even those inured to them from youth, he left us to return to the milder temperature of his native land-to our great loss and lasting regret. The next to follow Bishop Oxenden to the eternal rest was Dr Williams, Bishop of the Diocese of Quebec. First, as the head master of Lennoxville School, and afterwards as Bishop of Quebec he was one of the most widely known clergymen in Eastern Canada. Sympathizing and engaging in manner, wise and judicious in the exercise of office, he was universally beloved, and will be sorely missed, both as a personal friend and an overseer of the Church. The great and godly influence, he exercised so long, both within and without his diocese, survive him and bear fruit to the glory of God in generations yet to come. The last (and oldest) to obey the summons of the Great Master and leave his place and work in the vineyard of the Lord was Dr. Medley, Bishop of Fredericton and Metropolitan of Canada. Removed from us, geographically, we had not the opportunity for intimate acquaintance; but no churchman could fail to know Bishop Medley in his public life. He was generally recognized as a leader of men and an able bishop and divine. He commanded reverence and respect throughout the province by his great ability as a preacher and his courtly bearing as an administrator.

The three bishops whose loss we deplore were grand and good men, and we recognize it easily as one by one we endeavor to recall their life; but it is not so easy to do full justice to their merit in a few passing words. "Their works do follow them." They built on no unstable foundation, but rested their labors upon Jesus Christ, the chief corner stone. May it be given to us to work as faithfully, to believe as truly, and to die as much respected and beloved as these three men of God.

The work of the year by your Bishop may be briefly summed up, beginning from the Synod in January. The churches within the city have each been visited and confirmation held; 95 parishes and missions outside of the city have been visited; 897 persons have been confirmed (378 male and 519 female); ten gentlemen have been admitted to the diaconate and five to the priesthood; five new churches have been opened, three of them by the Bishop, one has been consecrated, the corner stone of another laid, and two others are in course of erection; two parsonages have been built free from debt, and several others are projected. The parsonage at Farnham is a very superior building, erected by funds carefully husbanded during seventeen years. The extension of the Church in the city of Montreal and suburbs is a cause for congratulation, but I strongly recommend that the various rectors meet, and with a map of the city before them, consider carefully the need for further church accommodation and the locality demanding immediate attention.

In reviewing the work of the year, I cannot recall one serious cause for discouragement, but abundant cause for praise, as we trust in the living God. Surely, as we consider all the way the Lord has led us and blessed us, we should trust with a firmer faith and anew consecrate ourselves, every power and energy, to the service of God and His Church. Beloved, let us devoutly unite as a Synod, in the prayer: "Father, show us what we ought to do, and give us grace and power faithfully to fulfil the same. Amen."

THE BUSINESS SESSION.

At two o'clock the Synod assembled in the Synod Hall, when the session was opened with prayer by the Bishop.

The rolls were then called.

It was moved by Very Rev. Dean CARMICHAEL, seconded by Rev. Canon Mills:—

That Rev. Canon Empson be re-elected Clerical Secretary.—Carried.

It was moved by Mr. CHARLES GARTH, seconded by Major Bond :-

That Mr. Richard White be re elected Lay Secretary .- Carried.

It was moved by Rev. Rural Dean Longhurst, seconded by Rev. Canon Ellegood:—

That Mr. Charles Garth be re-elected Treasurer .— Carried.

The Bishop stated that Mr. G. W. Simpson desired to be relieved from the duties of Auditor.

It was moved by Rev. Canon Ellegood, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Longhurst:—

That Messrs. Walter Drake and E. P. Hannaford be appointed Auditors. —Carried.

The minutes were taken as read, and were confirmed as printed in the 33rd Report.

It was decided that the offertory at the Synod service be given to the Mission Fund,

The Special Committee on the question of Rectories (page 76 of 33rd Report), Hon. Justice Tait, Hon. Justice Davidson, Chancellor Bethune Q.C., Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C., and Dr. T. P. Butler, Q.C., was reappointed.

The Bishop named the several Standing Committees. (See pp. 11-13.)

The Diocesan Board of Domestic Missions and the Committee on Mission Sunday were allowed to lapse.

The appointment of a Committee on Dunham Ladies' College was allowed to remain over.

The Clerical Secretary presented a resolution adopted by the Provincial Synod on the subject of consolidation of the Church of England in British North America.

It was resolved that this resolution be the first consideration after routine to-morrow.

Rev. W. P. CHAMBERS read the report of the Committee on Immigration, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

The CHANCELLOR read the report of the Committee on Canons, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. Canon Anderson read report of the Committee on the better Observance of the Lord's Day, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. F. CHARTERS read a report of the Committee on Dunham Ladies' College, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Ven. Archdeacon Evans read a report of the Committee on Superannuation Fund, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay read report of the Committee on Statistics, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. L. N. TUCKER read report of the Committee on French Work, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. Rural Dean RENAUD read report of the Committee on Foreign Missions, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. H. J. Evans read report of the Committee on Works of Mercy, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

The Revs. A. T. Brown, of Antigonish, N.S., and Henry Kitson, were, on motion by Rev. G. Abbott Smith, invited to a seat in the House.

Mr. RICHARD WHITE presented a report of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, and by permission of the House moved:—

That a Committee consisting of the mover, Rev. L. N. Tucker, Rev. Canon Ellegood and Dr. L. H. Davidson be appointed to suggest names for Trustees and Members of Council of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, from whom the Bishop may name five of each, as required by the Statute.—

Rev. J. F. Renaud read report of the Immigration Chaplain, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Dr. L. H. Davidson and Rev. F. H. Clayton gave notices of motion.

It was moved by Chancellor Bethune, seconded by Dr. L. H. Davidson:-

That the amendments sanctioned at the last meeting of Synod (pages 24 and 76 of the Journal of last session) to the rule of Synod regulating the status of parishes, be confirmed.—Carried.

It was moved by Mr. R. C. Thorneloe, seconded by Mr. Walter Drake:—

That the resolution of Canon Davidson, printed on page 32 of the Report of 1891, be re-considered.

Consideration deferred until after the report of the Executive Committee shall have been discussed.

Mr. Garth moved, seconded by Mr. Walter Drake, the adoption of the following recommendation:—

"The Committee on Investments beg to recommend to the Synod that in view of the fact that the funds in charge of the Synod have been for some time past invested at 5 per cent. per annum, and that in the opinion of the Committee no higher rate is likely again to be secured, the rate of five and a half per cent. presently paid by the Synod to the various parishes for their funds entrusted to the Synod for investment, be reduced to five per cent. from and after the first day of May next."

Moved in amendment by Rev. Rural Dean NyE, seconded by Rev. Canon Davidson:—

That the words "in the case of city parishes" be inserted between the words "per cent." and "from and after the first of May."

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C., seconded by Mr. Lansing Lewis:

That the further consideration of this question be postponed till next session, unless the resolution be withdrawn.

By request of the House the motion was withdrawn by the Treasurer.

Ven Archdeacon Evans moved the confirmation of the amendment sanctioned at the last meeting of the Synod (page 23 of the Journal of last session) to clause 10 on page 3 of the Constitution.—Carried.

By permission of the House, Mr. R. H. Buchanan read report of the Committee on Sunday Schools, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

The Chancellor then brought up for consideration the report of the Executive Committee.

He moved the adoption of the scale of grants for 1893.

Moved in amendment by Rev. W. P. Chambers, seconded by Rev. W. C. Bernard :-

That the report of the Executive Committee be not now received, but that it be referred back to that Committee, with instructions from the Synod to revise the suggested scale of grants for 1893 upon the basis of the require ments of the Canon providing for the stipends of the missionary clergy according to length of years of service, and that the amount from the Mission Fund available for this year be apportioned pro rata in accordance with the terms of the Canon, missionaries on active service having the first claim upon the consideration of the Committee.

Confirmed.

The Synod re-assembled on Wednesday at 10 o'clock.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the BISHOP.

The minutes of yesterday's meeting was read and confirmed.

The name of Mr. George Hague was added to the Committee on Foreign Missions.

The name of Mr. W. H. Robinson was added to the Committee on Library and Books and Tracts.

The name of Rev. F. H. Clayton was added to Committee on Education, as was also the name of Rev. E. I. Rexford.

The following Committee on Dunham Ladies' College was named: -- Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay (Convener), the Dean, Revs. Canons Mussen, Henderson, Davidson, Revs. W. H. Naylor, John Ker, W. P. Chambers, F. Charters (Secretary), Arthur French, W. Robinson, W. Windsor, J. H. Dixon, E. I. Rexford, Messrs. Charles Garth, Chancellor Bethune, Dr. Davidson, J. C. McKinnon, J. Baker, J. Bruce Payne, J. Forgraves.

The Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay presented the report of the Committee on Education, which was read by Rev. Arthur French, and gave notice that he would move its adoption.

Rev. Rural Dean NAYLOR read report of the Committee on Church Provision for the Lumber Districts, and gave notice of motion for its adoption.

Rev. A. B. GIVEN gave notice that he would move for the insertion of an additional question as to the amount guaranteed by parishes towards the stipend of the clergy, in the questions prepared for Rural Deanery statistics.

Dr. Davidson moved, seconded by Rev. J. G. BAYLIS:-

That such portions of the Rural Deans' reports to the Bishop, as may be desired by the Bishop, shall be read to the House to-morrow morning.-Carried.

Dr. Davidson moved the consideration of the resolution of Provincial Synod on the question of the Consolidation of the Church of England in British North America (see Appendix), and at the request of the Bishop he

Dr. Davidson then moved, seconded by the Dean of Montreal:-

That this Synod having taken communication of the resolution of the Synod of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada communicated to it in regard to the Consolidation of the Church in Canada, and the scheme therein contained, and upon which the first meeting of the General Assembly therein named is to be held, hereby declares that although it adheres to the position by it already taken that the retention of the Provincial Synod system is inadvisable and unnecessary, yet assents to and accepts the scheme and basis of union in said resolution contained, and upon acceptance thereof by the meeting to be held in Toronto in September next, consents to enter into and become a part of said General Assembly.

That as requested in said resolution the Synod assents to the appointment by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, under the limitations above mentioned, of delegates to said meeting to be held in Toronto in September next, further instructing said delegates to submit the present resolution at said meeting; and if such scheme as passed by the Provincial Synod and submitted to this Synod be accepted without change, authorizing said delegates to act fully and finally in its behalf.

Moved in amendment by Major Bond, seconded by Dr. T. P. BUTLER:-

That this Synod is of opinion that, if such an amendment can be passed without endangering the acceptance (as a whole) of the plan, it would be advisable to substitute Diocesan Synods in place of Provincial Synods in Article V., and otherwise preserve the autonomy of Diocesan Synods.—Lost.

Rev. Canon Mills moved, seconded by Rev. G. OSBORNE TROOP:

That the last clause of the resolution proposed by Dr. Davidson be omitted.

-Lost.

Dr. Davidson then closed the debate and his resolution was put and Carried.

It was resolved that the ballots for elections for Executive Committee, delegates to Provincial Synod, and the Diocesan Committee shall take place to-morrow morning immediately after routine.

At one o'clock the House adjourned.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

At half-past two o'clock the Synod re-assembled.

Rev. Canon Davidson moved, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Longhurst:-

That this Synod desires formally to approve the action of its representatives in the late Provincial Synod in regard to the great measure for the Consolidation of this Church of our love and historic inheritance in this great land open to our possession, and to record our admiration of the discretion and wise judgment exercised by them alike in spirit fulfilling the wishes of this Synod, and in fact i promoting the wide interests of the Church of England in the Dominion.—Carried.

Discussion on report of Executive Committee was resumed.

Rev. A. French moved in amendment to the amendment, seconded by Rev. F. Charters:

That no part of the Mission Fund shall be expended within the limit of the old Parish of Montreal, or to any lay reader, catechist or student, until the terms of the Canon have been complied with.—Lost.

The amendment of Rev. W. P. Chambers was then put to the House and —Lost.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean NAYLOR, seconded by Rev. F. R. Smith :-

That the grant made to Alleyne be remitted to the Executive Committee for re-consideration—Carried.

Moved by Rural Dean Sanders, seconded by Rev. W. HARRIS:-

That the grant to Mille Isles and Morin be referred back to the Executive Committee for consideration — Carried.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean Brown, seconded by Rev. Canon Davidson:—
That the limitation of the grant to Clar Setting.

That the limitation of the grant to Glen Sutton be referred to the Executive Committee for re-consideration.—Carried.

Moved by Rev. Canon Davidson, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Brown:—
That the subject of the proposed grant for the Immigration Chaplain's expenses to England be re-considered, and if possible withdrawn.—Lost.

Moved by Rev. W. P. CHAMBERS, seconded by Rev. Canon MILLS:— That the proposed grant of \$400 for Lay Visitor be not concurred in

At six o'clock the Bishop pronounced the benediction, and the House adjourned.

That the report of the Committee be received; but that the question of assistance to Missions stated to be doing French work be referred to the Executive Committee in order that there may be laid before it further particulars of such Mission work in answer to the following questions:

- (1) Has any new and distinctly French Mission work been opened or undertaken during the past year? and, if so, what?
- (2) What is the number and what the names of Parishes or Missions wherein distinctly *French* Mission work was carried on prior to or during the past year?
- (3) Has the Committee had any, and, if so, what direct application to undertake new work amongst our French Canadian brethren in the Diocese of Montreal?
- (4) Of the 97 scholars reported as in attendance at Sabrevois College, how many were:—(a) French-Canadian by birth? (b) French-Canadians and Romanists? (c) English-Canadians by birth? (d) English-Canadians and Protestants? (e) Of French-Canadian Romanists attending said College during the past two years, how many have been received into the Church of England?
- (5) In soliciting aid throughout Canada for French work in the Diocese, is it made known that English Canadians—Protestants—also are taken into and receive the benefits of Sabrevois College?

Rev. Mr. Tucker having intimated that he would accept the amendment, it was—Carried.

That, further, said Committee be authorized to communicate with the Executive Committee, or other authority of the several Dioceses in this Ecclesiastical Province, and ascertain whether, in view of the fact that all these Dioceses benefit through this immigration, and some to a greater extent even than the Diocese of Montreal, assistance may not be given by them in the establishment and maintenance of this Home until such time as it becomes self-supporting.— Carried.

MEETINGS.

Meetings were held on 21st January (when the various sub-committees were named), 9th February, 10th May, 13th September, 8th November, 1892, and on 3rd and 16th January, 1893.

GRANTS.

Aylwin.—\$400 were placed at the disposal of the Bishop, to be used in connection with the Mission of Aylwin.

Bristol-A special grant of \$50 to Revl S. A. Mills, of this Mission.

Leslie.—Separated from Thorne, and supplied with a clergyman, $$400\ \mathrm{per}$$

Portage du Fort.-Grant of \$350 renewed.

Aylwin—Grant of \$400 renewed.

North Wakefield.—An addition of \$40, restoring the grant to the old figure, without waiver of the condition that the congregation actually contribute \$250.

James Pyke, and referred to this Committee by resolution of the last Synod (page 24 of 33rd report), was carefully considered, and a special grant of \$125° per annum from the Superannuation Fund was made in recognition of his faithful service of upwards of fifty years.





REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE "BETTER OBSER-VANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY."

Your Committee beg to report to the Synod, as follows:-

In the burning questions of the day; in the ever-intensifying contests between labor and capital, between masses and classes, between employers and employees, resulting in those frequent strikes, which both in the old world and the new are ever and anon convulsing society, with ominous throes, to its deepest depths, the question of Sabbath Observance will be found to be more or less interwoven, as one chief factor in the case.

The Lord Jesus Christ Himself has laid it down, as a great primal law, that "the Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath." The Sabbath is not a mere Jewish ordinance, for it dates from the Creation;—and it was made for man;—for man, in the generic, not in any narrower sense;—and through all man's history, from the Creation downwards, it will be found to be indissolubly linked, as it is still, both nationally and individually, with man's highest well-being, temporal, spiritual and eternal.

The Nilometer, in Egypt, marking the rise or fall of Egypt's one great river, is not a more certain index of annual fertility or barrenness to that ancient land, than is the observance or the neglect of God's great law of the Sabbath; a sign in any and every land of that land's spiritual decadence or prosperity.

In your Committee's Retrospect of "the Lord's Day Observance" for the past year, they have to report a chequered experience, of mingled success and discouragement, which is best expressed in a short, single stanza from one of Gerald Massey's Poems:—

"We're beaten back in many a fray,
But newer strength we borrow;—
And where the vanguard camps to-day,
The rear shall rest to-morrow."

There is no such thing as ultimate defeat in life's great conflict between good and evil, or with the sacramental host of God's elect. The Lord Jesus Christ is "the Lord of the Sabbath," and He has written victory in the future, as He has already written forgiveness in all the past; and the blessed primeval Sabbath of Paradise lost shall yet become the great Millennial Sabbath of Paradise regained, in a world redeemed to God, by the precious blood of His own dear Son.

Foremost among the cheering signs connected with the observance of the Lord's day your Committee rank the fact that the Congress of the United States has placed the approving seal of that great and prosperous pation upon the sanctity of God's holy day, by their national decree that the World's Columbian Exposition, to be held at Chicago in 1893, shall not be open to the public on the Lord's Day.

This is an object lesson to hundreds of thousands the wide world over on the perpetuity of the 4th Commandment, the importance of which it would be difficult to overrate.

Coming nearer home, your Committee note with pleasure the persevering efforts of John Charlton, Esq., member of the Dominion Parliament, amidst much discouragement and opposition, to secure the support of our own Government to his "Sunday Observance Bill," and thereby to gain for his fellow-men throughout the Dominion the strong, protective arm of the law in the enjoyment of their undoubted privilege, of one rest day in seven.

Your Committee hail with satisfaction the continuous support, ably given by their Protestant brethren of other denominations, both by speech and resolution, at their various meetings, and also, as urgent occasion required, by deputation and direct personal appeals to the Government at Ottawa, to secure the inviolable sanctity of the Lord's Day.

It is a pleasure to observe the efforts of the "Citizens League," of Montreal, and of its manly, outspoken President, in the same direction; together with the powerful editorials and selections which from time to time have appeared upon this burning subject in the columns of Dr. L. H. Davidson's paper of this city.

These are facts and incidents in the retrospect of the year for which your Committee "thank God and take courage."

On the other hand, it is with much sorrow that they have still adversely to comment upon the pernicious example and notorious delinquency, in the matter of Sabbath Observance, of several of the great Railroad and River Corporations in our midst, in starting their trains or their boats from this city on the Lord's day.

These influential companies in their corporate capacity, and as large employers of labor, are thus setting an example of wrong-doing to their fellow-men, which individually, we would fain hope, they are incapable of committing.

By compelling their employees, in perfectly avoidable service, to perform their ordinary every day public work on God's holy day, they are at once robbing God of His glory, and their fellow-men of their God-given and every where needed Sabbath day rest.

Your Committee would therefore recommend, that the Lord Bishop of the Diocese be respectfully requested, in the name and on behalf of this Synod, to memorialize the Dominion Government to introduce or to facilitate, at the next session of Parliament, such legislation as will best secure to all Her Majesty's subjects in Canada the undisturbed observance of the Lord's Day.

Your Committee would only further, in conclusion, emphasize their report

with the ever memorable words of the great Evangelical Prophet:—"If thou turn away thy foot from the Sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day, and call the Sabbath a delight, the Holy of the Lord honorable, and shalt honor Him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words; Then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord, and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob, thy father, for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The Committee on Canons beg to report to the Synod that, in conformity with the resolution passed at the last session of Synod, they have prepared a revised edition of the Constitution, Rules of Order, By-laws, Rules and Canons, embodying therein all amendments and alterations made since the publication of the edition of 1883, which they now beg to submit to the Synod. And they beg to recommend, that six hundred copies of such revised edition, together with such further amendments as may be sanctioned during the present session of Synod, be printed, and a copy furnished to each member of Synod.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROVISION FOR THE LUMBER DISTRICTS.

1. The Rev. H. Plaisted reports having made his usual visits to the lumber camps on the Gatineau River and its tributaries during the winter of 1891-2. He visited three depots and four shanties, meeting at the latter with 110 men, of whom the majority were French-speaking and Roman Catholics. He experienced the utmost kindness, and had no difficulty in securing the attendance of the men at his services.

2. The Mission House and Chapel at River Desert is the centre of this work. The importance of maintaining this post cannot be over-estimated. The village is a growing one, and may at no distant time have direct railway communication with both Montreal and Ottawa. There are members of the Church of England scattered over the country around it, and the Church with her services, teaching and influence are needed there.

The Rev. R. C. Brewer has been appointed to take up the work carried on with great credit to the Church by the Rev. H. Plaisted for the last eight years.

3. Many gifts of illustrated papers and pictures have been received in the past, and distributed amongst the lumbermen. The Committee thank the donors, and bespeak a continuance of their kindness.

The work of the Christmas Letter Mission has been especially appreciated.

Parcels intended for this purpose should be addressed to the Rev. R. C. Brewer, River Desert, Que.; also to the Rev. J. M. Coffin, Thorne, Que., whose mission adjoins some of the lumbering camps.

4. Owing to the prevalence of La Grippe during the winter of 1891-2, no visits could be made by the clergy of the Rural Deanery of St. Andrews to the lumber camps on the River Rouge.

CONSOLIDATION OF THE CHURCH.

SYNOD OF THE ECCLESIASTICAL PROVINCE OF CANADA.

FIFTEENTH SESSION, SEPTEMBER 14-23, 1892.

The Lower House having before it the Report of the Committee on the Consolidation of the Church, it was Resolved that the report of the Committee be taken up clause by clause, upon which the following resolutions were adopted:—

Resolved, — That this House concurs in the first resolution reported by the Committee, viz:—

"That this Conference is of opinion that it is expedient to unite and consolidate the various branches of the Church of England in British North America."

Resolved, —" That, in lieu of the second resolution of the Report of the Committee, it be resolved that the Scheme of Union should not either affirm or disaffirm the necessity for the retention of Provinces under the General Synod; but on the contrary the retention or abolition of the various Provincial Synods should be left to be dealt with according to the requirements of the various Provinces, as to such Provinces and the Dioceses therein may seem proper."

The Report of the Committee as to the Constitution of such General Synod having been considered was adopted as follows:—

"Constitution: — $Article\ I$. — (1) There shall be a General Synod consisting of the Bishops of the Church of England in the Dominion of Canada and the Diocese of Newfoundland, and of the delegates chosen from the Clergy and Laity.

connada the (2) The delegates shall be chosen by the several Diocesan Synods according to such rules as they may adopt; or, in a Diocese which has no Synodical organization, may be appointed by the Bishop.

(3) The representation shall be as follows: — Dioceses having fewer than twenty-five licensed Clergymen, one delegate from each order; Dioceses having twenty-five and fewer than fifty licensed Clergymen, two of each order; Dioceses having one hundred licensed Clergymen and upwards, four of each order. That in order to avoid complication this House accepts the third paragraph of Article 1, but refers to the General Meeting at Toronto the question of the advisability of increasing the number of Diocesan representatives of each order.

Article II. — Time and Place of Meeting. — A general Synod shall meet for the first time in the city of Toronto on the second Wednesday in September, 1893, and shall be convened by the Metropolitan, senior by consecration. This Provincial Synod in assenting to this clause does not thereby surrender any powers or jurisdiction now possessed by it, nor does it intend thereby to take away from or interfere with any rights as to the acceptance of the said amended Scheme or Union possessed by the several Diocesan Synods in regard to the formation of such Central Synod.

Article III. — The Synod shall consist of two Houses: the Bishops constituting the Upper, and the Clergy and Laity together the Lower House. The Clergy and Laity shall vote by order if required.

Article IV. — The President of the General Synod, who shall be styled the Primate, shall be elected by the House of Bishops from among their own number.

The Primate shall hold office for life, or so long as he is Bishop of any Diocese of the General Synod; nevertheless, he may resign at any time.

Article V. — The General Synod shall have the power to deal with all matters affecting in any way the general interests and well-being of the Church within its jurisdiction.

Provided, — That no Canons or Resolutions of a coercive character, or involving penalties or disabilities, shall be operative in any Ecclesiastical Province, or in any Diocese not included in any Ecclesiastical Province, until accepted by the Synod of such Province or Diocese, and that the jurisdiction of the General Synod shall not withdraw from the Provincial Synod the right of passing upon any object falling within its jurisdiction at the time of the formation of the General Synod.

The following, or such-like objects, may be suggested as properly coming within the jurisdiction of the General Synod: —

(a) Matters of doctrine, worship and discipline.

(b) All agencies employed in the carrying on of the general work of the Church.

(c) The general missionary and educational work of the Church.

(d) The adjustment, with consent of the Dioceses, of the relations between Dioceses in respect of Clergy Widows and Orphans and Superannuation Funds.

- (e) Regulations affecting the transfer of Clergy from one Diocese to another.
 - (f) Education and training of Candidates for Holy Orders.

(g) Constitution and powers of an Appellate Tribunal.

(h) The erection, division, or re-arrangement of Provinces.

(i) To provide for the revision or disallowance by the Supreme Court of Appeal in addition to its other powers of the Acts or Canons of any Provincial or Diocesan Synod as being ultra vires on appeal of any Bishop, or of one-fourth of the delegates of any Provincial or Diocesan Synod.

(j) That nothing in the foregoing Scheme, or in the Constitution to be framed thereunder, shall affect any Canons and Enactments of this Provincial Synod in force at the time of the ratification of said Constitution by this Synod.

Article VI. — For the expenses of the Synod, including the necessary travelling expenses of the members, there shall be an annual assessment of the Dioceses, proportioned to their representation, exempting those which have not more than ten Clergymen.

Article VII. — The words Ecclesiastical Province heretofore used shall mean any group of Dioceses under the jurisdiction of a Provincial Synod.

It was also Resolved:—"That the General Conference be requested to incorporate in the Constitution of the General Synod a solemn Declaration corresponding to the Declaration issued by the Bishops and delegates of the Clergy and Laity assembled in the first Provincial Synod of this Ecclesiastical Province, reciting the intention of the General Synod to hold and maintain the Doctrine and Sacraments of Christ as the Lord hath commanded in His Holy Word, and as the Church of England hath received and explained the same in the Book of Common Prayer, and Administration of the Sacraments and other Rites and Ceremonies of the Church, according to the use of the Church of England, together with the Psalter or Psalms of David printed as they are to be sung or said in Churches, and the Form or Manner of making, ordaining and consecrating of Bishops, Priests and Deacons, and in the Thirty-Nine Articles of Religion."

Resolved,—" That the resolutions and the scheme now approved by this House as the basis upon which the General Synod may be formed, be communicated in due form to the several Diocesan Synods of this Ecclesiastical Province, with the expression of the earnest hope that the said several Synods may be able to accept thereof, and upon the basis so agreed on send delegates to the meeting to be held in Toronto in September, 1893; and that it should be a further instruction to the said Committee to take such steps as

B. Rented to School Commissioners:-

Chambly.—For \$72 paid to Church funds.

Knowlton.—(1) Fabric rented for 90 years, "Rector retaining certain privileges" from 1889. (2) \$800 invested, interest of which is used this year for singing and elocution. (See Synod Report, 1883, p. 582.)

Berthier.—Built on Glebe, rented to Mr. Liebich for \$296, proceeds applied to Rector's stipend. (See Synod Report, 1882, p. 451; 1883, p. 582.)

Wakefield.—Building at Low. Trustees appointed by Municipality. (See Stag Creek, Synod Report, 1886, p. 401.)

Sabrevois.—Brick Building owned by C. C. S. No rent.

St. Johns, P. Q.—Building and property valued at \$5,000, and rented for secular school purposes; rented in 1885 for \$320, and applied to Rector's Stipend. (See Synod Report, 1885, p. 237.)

Christieville—" Combined Church and Public school." Endowment, \$200. (See Synod Report, 1885, p. 238.)

C. Funds Accumulating.—Granby \$900, invested in mortgage and decentures.

D. Special.—Missisquoi High School, Cowansville. (See Synod Report, 1885, p. 236; 1886, p. 362.) The man put in charge by the Rev. Mr.

Brydge claims the right of occupation.

E. Property formerly used for school purposes, but now applied to other Church uses, Farnham. (see Synod Report, 1884, p. 80; 1885, p. 236; 1886.) Original expense borne by members of congregation. Sale authorised by Vestry. Consented to by Chancellor, and sanctioned by Bishop.

F. Properties apparently being lost sight of:

Your Committee also caused an examination to be made of the Reports on Education rendered to the Synod during the past ten years in order to see what changes have occurred in that interval in regard to Church Schools and Church Education, and the result will appear from the statements above submitted.

Your Committee regret to find a distinct and positive decadence in the number of Church Schools and Church Education, and it would seem that, notwithstanding distinct grants for religious education in connection with the Church of England, it has virtually withdrawn from the field except in the case of four instances.

A question arises in regard to the leasing of property given for distinct Church purposes to secular institutions and for secular purposes, and over which the Incumbent or Rector of the Parish and the Church authorities have ceased to have control, as to whether the terms of the deeds have been complied with, and whether the Church itself is keeping faith with the donors. But, apart altogether from these considerations, and notwithstanding that in some cases consent may have been given by the donors or their representatives to the diversion of the trust to other purposes than that for which it was created, it seems as if the interests of the Church at large in such donations and trusts had not been fully considered.

Whilst your Committee cannot but feel that the Common School Education of the Province, as now carried on, has improved in character within a certain number of years past, and is in many respects highly commendable; yet, it cannot but regard the maintenance of distinctly Church Day Schools, wherever possible in accordance with the regulations of Synod, and strict adherence to the terms of any deeds by which property is given for educational purposes, as of the highest importance. It would also emphasise the desirability of greater supervision on the part of the Clergy of the several Par-

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The world itself is the Scriptural limit of our Missionary charter, and twothirds of its population are still unreached by the Missionary. In our day the providence of God is especially apparent in foreign mission work; in the opening of doors great and effectual; in the removal of barriers; in the preparation of the field and the workman. Almost two hundred years ago in a widow's humble cottage was formed that noble Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in foreign lands. £13 2s. 6d. was the first offertory devoted to the spread of the Gospel among the heathen. In 1793 the first foreign missionary sailed from English shores; then the world was shut against all missionary enterprise; persecution both to the missionary and the converts was almost certain. To-day all is changed—there is scarcely a closed door or community where the Missionary may not go with the open Bible, or the convert may not profess his or her allegiance to Jesus, the Saviour of sinners. Activity if commerce and trade, tremendous zeal and personal risks run in seeking after the good things of this life by professing Christians, is characteristic of our day and age; but mark the slow and timid movement in the great duty of Foreign Missions! The prevailing ignorance and cold indifference manifested in the Church towards Missions surely prove that even nominal disciples are in danger of drifting into practical atheism. The watchword of the Christian life is obedience, and the Great Head of the Church has commanded us in these words: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." True religion in the soul must produce a consecrated life and purse, but the great defect of our age is that it does not respond as it should to the providence of God, and yet we are living in the grand missionary age of history. It is a matter of prophesy "That the earth is to be filled with a knowledge of the Lord as the waters cover the sea," but at this late hour we are informed that there are 800 millions of heathen who know nothing yet of the "unsearchable riches of Christ." Great efforts have been made by our own Canadian Bishops and clergy to arouse a "Spirit of Missions" in their several Dioceses, and with good results we believe. We notice with thankfulness a marked increase in the offertories for Foreign Missions, yet not a third of what might be given. In 1886 the first triennial report showed the sum of \$16,453 contributed by

THIRTY-FOURTH the Church of England in Canada to Foreign Missions; in 1889, \$35,740, and this year (1892) \$45,029. We thank God and take courage for this increase, but are grieved to notice so many Parishes in this our Diocese of Montreal that utterly fail to recognize their responsibility to Foreign Missions. Thirty-six Parishes or Missions are reported as not responding to the Epiphany Appeal, not contributing \$1.00 to assist in sending the Gospel of Jesus Christ to foreign shores. Is this the secret cause that our own Home Missions do not advance? Is this the cause that our own spiritual life is at such a low ebb? I should state that of the above-named Missions, six are reported as being vacant. The total amount raised for Foreign Mission work from this wealthy diocese with its own noble Diocesan Mission Funds, as reported by the Treasurer of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, was the small sum of \$1019. Surely we should feel humiliated that, having ourselves received so much, we give so little; that we should allow others to step in and do the work we are commanded by the Great Head of the Church

Through the instrumentality of the Woman's Auxiliary many in Montreal were much refreshed and quickened in spirit by the presence and addresses of the Hon. Miss W. Sugden, who for the last ten years has devoted her life and talents to the Mission work. Those in our Sunday-schools who heard her earnest appeals in behalf of "the little brown women in India" were deeply impressed. Of every six infants in the world, one is born in India; of every six orphan girls, one is wandering in India; of every six widows, one is mourning in India; of every six men who die, one is passing into eternity from India. Think of it and give India a place in your prayers and liberalities; the harvest is plenteous but the laborers are few; the need is undoubted, the opportunity is present, and the Christian dare not disregard the Divine command: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel,"

1. Your Committee would urge the importance of circulating in every congregation and Sunday-school missionary information. It is absolutely necessary to the intelligent interest and liberality of old and young to possess some of the incidents and facts of modern Mission work. It is suggested, therefore, that the Epiphany Appeal be circulated, besides other Missionary papers, among the several congregations of the diocese.

2. Your Committee would recommend that the several Sunday-schools be invited to interest themselves in the Missionary fields occupied by Bishop Reeve and the work of the Reverend J. A. Newnham and other Missionaries,

and that all children's offertories should be reported.

3. It was also suggested that request be made that all moneys forwarded to the Central Board be promptly acknowledged, and that appropriated moneys be forwarded to their destination without delay.

4. Your Committee also recommend that their meetings be held quarterly and that a list of questions be prepared so as to elicit from the several conSESSION.

COMMITTEE ON IMMIGRATION AND COLONIZATION.

The active work of promoting the objects of this Committee has not been prosecuted to any practical extent during the past year. The desirability of endeavoring to lay the advantages of the district covered by this Diocese before the class of possible immigrants from the Mother land who value the privileges of established Churchly ministrations, and the undegrading surroundings of an old settled civilization, is recognized. And the possibility of securing well-cleared farms at reasonable rates in nearly every section of this Province, because of the restlessness of the French-Canadians at the present time, and also because of the evident longing after city life on the part of the sons and grandsons of the original overworked settlers, might serve as an inducement to some intending immigrants to stay with us, instead of seek ing a home amid the "magnificent distances" of the newer Provinces. That your Committee have no means at present of laying our natural and estabished advantages before these people. Nor would it be possible, probably, to accomplish very much in the face of the energetic and intelligent propaganda of a great railway corporation assisted by the Government and directly interested in the growth and settlement of the Great North-West. Possibly a carefully prepared pamphlet, giving practical information in a definite form, circulated among the rural clergy in England, might accomplish something. And if good servants could be induced to apply through their clergymen to the Immigration Chaplain, he could probably place as many as would be well recommended in good situations.

In Montreal, the care of the immigrants landed from the ocean steamers, while detained here on their way to their destination, is thrown upon Government agents. No provision is made upon or near to the docks for their reception; there are no waiting or reception rooms, no offices of information supplied by disinterested parties. Promises have been at least partly made by those in power that this state of things should be remedied, but never fulfilled. For the future, we are told that immigrants will be landed by all of the steamship lines at Quebec instead of at Montreal; but this port will, from its position and railroad connections, always be an important point of distribution. Conveniently placed and proper offices, with telegraphic and postal connections, and rooms for consultation, are really needed to properly meet the needs of immigrants.

REPORT OF IMMIGRATION CHAPLAIN.

My LORD,-

I beg to report some of the year's work accomplished in connection with the office of Immigration Chaplain.

I have endeavored to devote the mornings to the office, 813 Craig street, when we meet many we would not otherwise see. A daily journal is kept, and an entry made of each immigrant personally interviewed. Not being in the office the whole day, a large percentage pass through without coming in contact with the Chaplain. Of these I enquire, and when I procure their names and addresses, write to the clergy, informing them of the new arrival in their parish, commending them to their special care.

To enable me to meet the steamers on their arrival, and yet do no injustice to my parish, through the generosity of a large-hearted churchman, I was enabled to invest in a horse and trap which has proved an invaluable assistance, so that with a telephone in my house and office I am equipped for my work—a work peculiarly interesting and important at any time, while, considering the late statistics, a most vital one to the Church of England. Indeed, the whole question of immigration requires at our hands the most careful consideration and hearty co-operation of every Diocese and individual churchman at home and abroad.

In our correspondence with the several English Societies we have pressed the point of not forwarding any to Canada who could not provide for the expense of the first month, or who had not some trade.

We are glad to report that the class of immigrants arrived this year is exceptionally good, and notwithstanding the drawbacks which might have been expected, through the fear of spreading diseases, to interfere with immigration during the past season, the number has been greater than last year. The demand for domestic servants is greatly in excess of the supply. A good servant can always command a good place and wages at home, so they do not care to emigrate; consequently, many of those who do come out are not the trained responsible servant so desirable in Canada.

I have carefully kept in mind your Lordship's injunction to be helpful to all, whether members of the Church of England or not. I have had the opportunity of being useful in assisting Presbyterians, Methodists, Congregationalists, Baptists, Germans, Swedes and Roman Catholics. I have gladly done what was in my power to make the new arrivals feel that, though in a strange land, they had speedily found those who were ready to help them in things spiritual and temporal.

At this season of the year we are especially indebted to the several National and Charitable Associations, notably St. George's Home and the House of Industry. Last year over 500 were sheltered in St. George's Home from one to five days, and several very needy cases for weeks. At Christmas-tide provisions for several days were given to 300 families (Eng-

I am impressed with the fact that up to the present, as far as the Church in Canada is concerned, the immigration problem has hardly been touched. Montreal is generally considered to be the natural distributing centre for the Townships as well as for Eastern and Western Ontario. For the lack of proper accommodation at Montreal, immigrants are transferred from the steamer at Quebec to the railways and forwarded to the North West.

We require in this city a commodious, cheerful place of reception for our immigrants, with its refreshment and sitting rooms, a stationer's stall where moneys could be exchanged, stamps procured, letters posted, telegrams transmitted, and all in the vicinity of the vessel lying at the wharf.

It is at Montreal and not Quebec that the stream of immigration naturally divides.

Montreal to-day is the only Agency East of Winnipeg, all others having this year been closed by the Government, thus endorsing Montreal as the head of ocean navigation and the chief distributing port for immigrants.

As far as the Church of England in Canada is concerned she has done little in comparison with what ought to be done in the matter of reception of immigrants. On their arrival here, there is no "Home" or Institution of her own, or where mothers and children can be cared for. The Women's Protective Immigration Society on Osborne Street does good work in caring for women, but it is not a Church Institution, not even a Protestant Society; though nearly all entering that charitable house are Church of England women. The Chaplain is accorded a courteous welcome, and given every opportunity of meeting and holding a short service of prayer and thanksgiving with the newly arrived.

The late Secretary, who also acted as agent for Hon. Mr. Joyce, was a member of the Church of England, and did her work in a most conscientious and effective manner, gaining the respect and affection of many of the girls for the personal interest she took in them individually.

Credit is due to this undenominational but philanthropic Society, especially as the Church has not in this populous and wealthy city an Institution of her own, where she can shelter and care for the bodily wants as well as the spiritual interests of her members.

St. George's Home is much used by the Chaplain in housing for the first three days English families and English boys. Single women are cared for by the Women's Protective Immigration Society, 84 Osborne Street.

Out of the 187 English women received at the Osborne Street House, 175 belonged to the Church of England, sent out under the auspices of Church Societies.

The receipts for the past year for carrying on of the Osborne Street

House were \$3,176, which includes \$654, a balance from the previous year, leaving about \$2,500 as the actual year's income. Considering the Church of England has no Institution of her own where she can send the newly arrived, we thank the Board of W. P. I. S. for their courtesy and the shelter provided and the care taken of the immigrants. We are placed at a terrible discount in our work for the want of such a place where we might feel we had a peculiar right to send our boys and girls, men and women.

The Boys' Home cannot be used in this way, close to our office. There has lately been erected on Craig Street a substantial and capacious building known as the Brewery Mission, where a clean and comfortable bed can be procured and a breakfast purchased, all for 15c. We have frequently sent old and young to this well conducted enterprise, and can bear personal testimony to the good work done. All honor to that Methodist body that conceived and carried into effect the much-needed Institute. But the Church of England has no such refuge for her weary and hungry, homeless and poverty stricken ones. No special place, where we feel we have a right to send our boys and girls. Surely the Church in Canada is able to bear the necessary expense for such institutions. Surely we are not doing our duty in allowing others to house and care for our people. Undenominational societies in the mother country are sending out their thousands, two-thirds of the whole (we believe a larger percentage) being nominally at least Church of England; yet the cases are exceptional when they come with a line of recommendation from their clergy or the Society that sends them to the Chaplain here, thus putting them in touch with the Church of their fathers on this side of the Atlantic. These Societies do not inquire what denomination the immigrant may be, but are satisfied with a sober and moral character, the efficient Provincial Agent of this city acting as their agent here. It is by chance or through courtesy that the Chaplain learns what Church these belong to or where they are placed, but when informed he communicates with the clergyman of the parish or district. If some measure could be suggested by which Church of England immigrants sent out by these Societies could be furnished with recommendations and letters to the Chaplain, we feel that an important point would be gained. Surely the Church could keep and hold her own. The Church Societies should assist and forward Church of England immigrants.

We have no bureau, office, institution or funds placed at the disposal of any Chaplain by the Church of England in Canada to look after this immigration work.

I have assisted with cash 15 needy and destitute to the amount of \$30.50; and given food and clothing to 35.

I have visited the Gaol, the Sheltering Home, the Maternity Hospital, the General Hospital, and Verdun Hospital in connection with the Immigration Chaplaincy. May our Heavenly Father bless and accept the work for Jesus Christ's sake.

We notice with sorrow the death of Mr. Daly, the late Dominion Immigration Agent. Always genial, helpful and kind, we shall miss his cheerful assistance and ready co-operation in anything that affected the well-being of the immigrant. The Dominion Government through A. M. Burges, Esq., Assistant Minister of the Interior, has greatly added to the comfort of the female immigrant by allowing us to incur the expense of telegraphing to the friends of their expected arrival.

We desire to acknowledge the courtesy of Mr. Marquette, the Provincial Agent, whose office we share—always bright, cheerful, and willing; we gladly bear our testimony to his good work and faithful service as Provincial Agent.

Our thanks are also due to the several newspapers for their assistance in making our work more effective. The Gazette, the Witness, the Star — each and all have been generous and helpful with the authorities. The C.P.R. and G.T.R. are the embodiment of courtesy. And I know, my Lord, you would not wish me to close my Report without thanking the several Shipping Companies to whose care are entrusted the thousands of our immigrants—who have so much in their power to make the voyage to Canada a happy and comfortable journey. No Companies could be more generous than the Beaver Line and Dominion, by which the major ity of our people come. The Allan Line also do their share of the transportation.

I desire to acknowledge the great assistance rendered by the Girls' Friendly Society in looking after the interests and well-being of those girls who, as members, come to Canada; also, the W.C.T.U., where I have had the pleasure of meeting and addressing many of our girls. Surely the Master is well pleased with those of whom the King will be enabled to say: "I was a stranger and ye took me in."

My brethren in the Ministry have made my work a pleasure by their prompt attention to letters commendatory, and by their assistance in severa cases.

I would recommend, my Lord, that a vote of thanks should be conveyed

by this Synod to the S. P. C. K. as an acknowledgment of the noble work THIRTY-FOURTH in which she is engaged, and of the great benefit which the Church of Eng land in Canada derives from her self-denying offorts in behalf of Immi

A Committee was appointed last year to interview members of the Government and induce them to erect some suitable lodging place for the newly. arrived families, at least equal to those at Quebec. Up to the present date we have not heard of the success of that deputation. If something is not done in this important matter, and that at once, I fear the large proportion of our immigrants will be obliged, as of old, to land at Quebec, greatly to their pecuniary disadvantage.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

In obedience to the request of the Synod your Committee have reconsidered their Report on Statistics, and would suggest that it be again referred back for reconsideration, and also that the Committee be empowered to act upon the results it may arrive at.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

1. Your Committee feel that something should be done to arouse a greater interest being taken in the further development of our Sunday Schools throughout the Diocese, and propose as a means towards this end that Thursday evening of each week of Synod (unless otherwise engaged) be set apart for the discussion of various questions of interest in the line of Sunday School work.

2. This Committee would recommend that each Rural Deanery should endeavor to hold annually, at the most central locality, a Sunday School Convention, for the purpose of helping and encouraging teachers in their work.

3. That the Montreal Diocesan Sunday School Association should have affiliated with its office bearers and Committee one or more delegates or representatives appointed by each Deanery, who would be deputed to attend the meetings held the third Monday of every month, reporting at the Annual meeting to be held in Synod week of their work done during the past year.

4. That a committee be named to see if it is not possible to hold a united gathering of all the City Sunday Schools once a year, in one of our largest churches; also of the Country Sunday Schools in certain districts where it is practicable.

5. That the appointment of an Agent or Vieting Inspector to visit the various Sunday Schools throughout the Diocese would prove of great advantage and benefit in many ways to the whole Diocese.

6. That a better and more complete record of the various Sunday Schools throughout the Diocese should be reported by the printing of further questions in the Annual report to Synod, such as to numbers, showing increase over previous year; libraries and number of books; whether the schools are supported by the church or by the children's offerings; total amount collected by the children during the year, and how the same is disposed of; scheme of lessons taught; also to state needs, if any,—this Committee urging upon all the advisability of having the Sunday School supported by the church, and the children's entire donations to be devoted to Missionary purposes.

7. This Committee would recommend in every school the use of some Missionary Paper for the purpose of diffusing Missionary intelligence among the children and their homes, which would do much to increase the Missionary spirit among our congregations.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:-

As shown by the lists attached hereto there are 21 clergymen entitled to rank upon the Fund, through having complied with all the requirements of the Canon. There are 6 who are so entitled through having availed themselves of the Canon as amended in 1884. There are 31 disqualified through being in arrears of subscriptions, and 24 disqualified through being in arrears both of subscriptions and collections.

In view of the very large proportion of the Diocesan Clergy who are not qualified to rank upon this Fund—more than two-thirds of the whole strength of the Diocese—your Committee would most earnestly call attention to clause added to the Canon on Superannuation by this Synod at its 28th Session (page 36), requiring that all clergymen before being licensed to the care of souls in this Diocese shall agree to become subscribers to this Fund.

The "Home" has been always well filled, and general satisfaction with the order and management prevails on all sides. As to our finances, we urge upon the Church the necessity of greater liberality towards the Charitable Fund. The Treasurer is obliged to make frequent advances towards the meeting of current expenses, and the Executive Committee would gladly be relieved from this obligation to the Treasurer. The weight of the mortgage still rests upon us, and there has been no effort at endowment.

GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY.

The Annual Report of the Montreal Diocesan Branch of the "Girls Friendly Society" presents very few new features, but the work has been carried on steadily, and in some of the branches with marked success. During the past year 25 girls have been commended to us from England. Ireland and Scotland; seven of these, however, did not remain in the city, Two of our English members, both belonging to St. George's Branch, have died in the Montreal General Hospital; one from typhoid and the other from pneumonia. Both received every care and attention possible, and although in one sense "strangers in a strange land," yet they were surrounded by kind friends to the very last. Letters have been received from the Asso ciates expressing the great satisfaction they had felt in hearing of the kindness shown to their late members. Very grateful letters have also been received from girls who have gone to distant places, expressive of the kindness shown to them whilst in this city. We cannot also help noticing that an improved tone is manifest in those members who have been the longest connected with the Society. It is a work, however, which needs patient toil and wise discretion, and the good seed often springs very slowly.

Our President, Mrs. Leslie Skelton, was obliged to resign her position in the autumn, owing to her intended absence from Montreal for a long period, greatly to our regret, as she has been a most efficient and faithful worker, but her place has been filled by the election of Mrs. G. S. Redpath, who has long taken a warm interest in the work of the G. F. S. The total number of associates and members is now about 240.

The annual meeting was held on the 27th of April, when the chair was taken by the Dean, in the absence of the Bishop, who, for the first time since

the G. F. S. was organized in this city, was unable to be present through indisposition.

The Cathedral Branch and also that of St. James the Apostle have not resumed their meetings this winter, but we hope that another year they may be started with renewed vigor. St. Jude's Branch has increased its members very largely, and, although one of the younger Branches, has now far outstripped some of its older sisters. On the 25th of October this Branch gave a Social, to which they invited all the members and associates of the Society. The result was a very large gathering, and a very pleasant evening. Short addresses were given by several of the city clergy, of whom quite a large number were present.

In conclusion, we would quote from an address given by Mrs. Herbert Percival before the Mayor of Birmingham, which places the aims and objects of the G. F. S. clearly before us:

"It is important to bear in mind that the G. F.S. is not a Benefit Society to provide funds in sickness, nor a Society to enable ladies to patronize girls in a different position from themselves, but a Society for the upholding of the virtue of womanhood in all classes of society, and the help derived by the associates was in a measure as great as that which they rendered to the members."

THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY.

The Montreal Diocesan Branch of the Women's Auxiliary beg to submit the following report:—

Seven monthly and four special meetings have been held up to date dur ing the past year. Connected with the M. D. W. A. are 39 senior and junior branches. From some of these encouraging letters are occasionally received and read at the monthly meetings. There are Branches in the missions of Aylmer, Cowansville, Cote St. Antoine, Clarenceville, Dunham, Grenville, Havelock, Hallerton, Huntingdon, Lachine, Noyan, Quyon, St. Andrews, St. Johns, Shawville, St. Lambert's, West Farnham and Waterloo. Papers on Missionary Work have been read at the monthly meetings The sum of \$200 is continued towards the support of the lady teacher in the Washakada Home; also the sum of \$100 per year towards the salary of the Lady Medical Missionary in Japan. In March an address was given by Archdeacon Phair at a meeting under the auspices of the Women's Auxiliary. The address gave his experience of 27 years spent among the Indians of the North-West. In June the W. A. convened to hear an address by Rev. J. A. Newnham on his work in Moosonee. In November the Hon. Miss Sugden addressed several meetings under the auspices of the Women's

Renaud, Rural Dean of Iberville, has been appointed as Rector of St. Thomas', and Immigration Chaplain in the place of the Rev. R. Acton, deceased. The Rev. E. McManus, City Missionary, has been appointed to the charge of St. Andrew's Church, Sault au Recollet. The Rev. J. W. Denis has been appointed to the Rectory of Berthier. The Rev. E. A. King, licensed to Lachine when last Report was given and since connected with Church of the Redeemer, Cote St. Paul, has resigned to enter on a charge in the Diocese of Quebec, and the Rev. W. N. Duthie has been appointed assistant minister to Christ's Church, Sorel. The Rev. E. I. Rexford, Principal of the High School, has received your Lordship's license, and tenders brotherly help to many of the city clergy. The Mission of Outremont has been placed under charge of the Principal of the College, Rev. Dr. Henderson.

INCREASED CHURCH ACCOMMODATION

Since my last report, the new church at Point St. Charles has been opened—a beautiful and commodious structure, in every way a credit to the Rector, Rev. J. Ker, and the congregation. It has far more than doubled the accommodation of the former church, and is already filled with an earnest and enthusiastic congregation. Too much credit cannot be given to Mr. Ker for the manner in which he has grappled with the problem of enabling a comparatively poor parish to meet the wants, not only of a congested district, but a district congested through emigration. Mr. Ker has not only maintained the position of the Church in Point St. Charles, but he has extended its influence remarkably, and although, no doubt, there is yet room for further Church extension in the parochial district, by division or otherwise, the work accomplished is in every way a credit to the Church of England in this diocese.

St. James' and St. George's have also erected churches, the former within the bounds of the large district under its charge, and the latter outside of its district, at St. Henri, the field of work being placed at the disposal of the Rector of St. George's by the Rev. J. H. Dixon, Rector of St. Jude's, who willingly resigned that portion of his parish for the general wellbeing and advancement of the Church.

The Church of the Advent, in connection with the Parish of St. James the Apostle, is not yet completed, and, therefore, the Treasurer's statement has not yet been made. The building, however, situated on the corner of Wood avenue and St. Luke street, has so far advanced as to have Divine Service held in it. It was opened for this purpose on Advent Sunday, 27th November, 1892. Rev. C. C. Waller being curate in charge, with Mr. George Hague as lay reader. Church wardens and lay delegates to Synod have been appointed.

St. Simon's Church, St. Henri, has been erected by St. George's Young Men's Christian Association, with money collected from the congregation of St. George's and the Church people in St. Henri for that purpose. The work of this Society in the district of St. Henri, previous to the erection of the church, has been wholly carried on by young laymen, foremost amongst whom I may name Messrs. Haycock, Dartnell, Cole, etc. I have handed the church over for one year to the Rev. S. Massey, under your Lordship's license, and if, at the end of the year, it promises independence, I will gladly resign it to your Lordship to make such appointment as to you seems fit. Mr. Massey's work so far has been pre-eminently successful, and I only hope will yet be so successful as to relieve St. George's young men of all responsibility in the matter, and enable them to turn their zeal and energy into other channels for the advancement of the Church in the city, as I am convinced that the true secret of Church advancement is for the wealthy churches either to create out of their own bounds, or within bounds placed at their disposal, new and independent churches. Church wardens and lay delegates to Synod have been appointed.

IMMIGRATION.

The question of immigration requires a united effort on the part of the whole Church in Canada to put it on a real business basis, and this will be needed whether Montreal remain as it now is, the distributing point, or whether distribution be transferred to Quebec. What we need is a distinctive Church of England office, to which emigrants can come and get into touch at once with the clerical representative of the Church of England, this office being sufficiently manned to open up regular correspondence with the dioceses of the North-West and the dioceses in older Canada.

Immigration is wholly on the side of the Church of England; the other churches, inclusive of the Roman Catholic, cannot compare with it in this source of addition; our weakness lies in lack of Dominion System for fol. lowing up the Church emigrant when he lands, and this can never be realized without a Central Bureau, supported by the whole Church over the Dominion. The Rev. Rural Dean Renaud has done first-class work as Immigration Chaplain under great disadvantages, and I can speak for my own parish when I say that he has added 63 Church families to my parish list during the year. I am very glad that the Executive Committee have seen the wisdom of sending him to England, at once, to visit the heads of the various Church of England and undenominational societies, in order to arrange that all Church of England emigrants should be sent direct to his charge, and that all moneys sent out for their benefit on landing should be placed in his hands for dis tribution. I am sure that his visit will be productive of much good, and that things will be in a better business shape next year. But we shall never be in a right shape with regard to Immigration until the whole Church unites to shoulder the great responsibility.

CITY MISSIONARY.

The return sent me by Rev. Mr. McManus, City Missionary, tabulates an amount of work that gives the clearest evidence that we may think ourselves fortunate in having such a faithful representative working for us in the various charitable institutions of the city, and amongst the poor.

NEW BUILDINGS AND IMPROVEMENTS.

The new church at Sweetsburg, the corner-stone of which was laid by your Lordship last summer, is nearly completed, and will soon be opened for Divine Service. It is a handsome well-constructed edifice, and will be thoroughly equipped with all the necessary accessories for the reverent performance of public worship.

A long-felt want has been supplied by the erection of a new and most commodious parsonage at Farnham, which is now occupied by the rector and his family. We believe that this house is inferior to no similar building in the diocese in solidity, compactness, and general adaptation to the use for which it was designed. We warmly congratulate Canon Mussen and his parishioners on the successful completion of an undertaking which has been the object of much thought and earnest effort for many years.

Three beautiful memorial windows have been placed in the church at Abbotsford, which has also been enriched by the gift of a handsome communion stool of carved oak.

EDUCATIONAL WORK.

The mortgage on the building occupied by the Dunham Ladies' College has been discharged by the payment to the mortgage of the full amount of the debt. This happy result is due in a great measure to the perseverance and tact of the clerical collectors, the Revs. W. Robinson, F. Charters and R. F. Taylor. The efforts of these gentlemen were ably seconded by other members of the Corporation, and notably by Mr. James Mackinnon, of Cowansville, whose unfaltering faith in the College, and unremitting exertions to save it from threatened extinction, merit the warm gratitude of every friend of Church education.

The Rectory school at Frelighsburg, under the able management of Canon Davidson and his accomplished daughter, is doing a good work in a quiet and uno stentatious way.

MISSIONARY MEETINGS.

It is the experience of the clergy of this Deanery that the annual Missionary Meetings have failed of late years to excite any great interest among our people, and it is a common complaint that the financial result of these meetings hardly compensates for the trouble of holding them. Under the present system, the frequent repetition of the oft-told tale by the same speakers year after year, is devoid of that freshness of presentation which is so essential to success. We respectfully submit that, if these gatherings are ever to regain their old-time popularity, a radical change must be made in the selection of speakers, and that they should be chosen from a much wider area than the narrow limits of most of our existing Deaneries.

CHURCH ATTENDANCE.

It is respectfully submitted that a column devoted to returns of church attendance might be well included in the annual parochial reports. In the absence of the definite and positive information which such returns would give, we can only express our sorrowful conviction, founded on our own observation, that the observance of this elementary duty of church-membership is sadly neglected. A fitful and irregular attendance on the Lord's service in the Lord's house has largely taken the place of the regular habit of church-going which distinguished the churchmen of a former generation. This is especially true of the congregations in our small towns and villages. It is a growing evil, and demands the most earnest consideration of every true-hearted servant of the Lord Jesus Christ.

CLERICAL CHANGES.

The Rev. William Robinson has been appointed to the rectory of Clarence-ville, vice the Rev. W. N. Duthie transferred to Sorel.

IN MEMORIAM.

I deem it my duty to record here the removal from the Church Militant to the Church Expectant of one who was for many years an active and esteemed member of this Deanery. Mr. Charles Watson of Mystic, in the Parish of Bedford, departed this life on the eleventh day of the present month, in the 84th year of his age. Mr. Watson repeatedly filled the offices of churchwarden and lay delegate to Synod, and during the whole of his long life, until disabled by sickness, he gave cheerfully and liberally of his time and means to the cause of Christ in his Church. He was a just and upright man, a devout and loyal Churchman. "The memory of the just is blessed."

RURAL DEANERY OF BROME.

MY LORD,

The Annual Chapter of the Rural Deanery of Brome was convened this year in the Parish of Mansonville, on the 4th of this month. Owing in part to the unusual severity of the weather, and also to the fact of the meeting of the Executive and other Diocesan Committees being convened in Montreal on the same date, the attendance of the clerical and lay members was not as full as it otherwise might have been.

The Statistics presented to the Chapter, and now laid before your Lordship and the Synod, being manifestly imperfect, and, as might be anticipated, somewhat obscure, arising from the want of accord (as to time covered) between the report required for the changed date of Synod and the fiscal year of the church heretofore in use. Under this change, our reports are required to cover only from Jan. 1st to Dec. 31st, while the church wardens reports can only be made from the Easter when they assume office. This want of accord our Chapter hopes may be remedied by proper and immediate legislation, i.e., if the Synod resolves to abide by its new change of date.

Taking into consideration the imperfect and rather confused character in some respects of the statistical returns, no drawing of conclusions or of making comparisons need be attempted.

NEW CHURCHES.

One only can be reported, but it is an important one from its character architecturally and ecclesiastically, and its place and its people. The new church is in style of the perpendicular Gothic, having a sitting capacity of 300, and altogether conveys a decisive impression of its being a house of worship. Too much praise cannot be given to the ladies for the part they took in its furnishing. The Young Ladies' Guild undertook the seating, which is all executed in oak, and at a cost of \$300. The Ladies Dorcas paid for the furniture of the chancel and sanctuary, costing \$200, and put in the furnaces at a cost of \$230. Memorial windows are being put in gradually.

CLERICAL CHANGES.

The Missions of Bolton and Glen Sntton, it is a satisfaction to report, are both now filled by gentlemen in holy orders; Messrs. Isaac Lackey and C. Gore Rollit having been admitted to the diaconate during the past year, with the prospect of being advanced in due time to the priesthood. Sutton has lost its estimable rector, and Brome its active and youthful incumbent, both of these gentlemen having accepted parishes in the diocese of New Hampshire, U.S. Their departure is very much to be regretted indeed, but, as they have only accepted their new positions after much deliberation, it remains for us, as this chapter of Brome put it by formal resolution, to bid them Godspeed in their new fields of duty, fields that will possibly be more productive for the harvest of souls, and with it, too, of more satisfaction and comfort to themselves and their families. From these removals and from other sources (as yet, perhaps, publicly unconfessed) it is emphatically manifested that, with the average stipend of \$600 per annum, it is not possible for clerical families to live. The two parishes thus vacated it is to be hoped may soon be filled with suitable men in holy orders. The people of Brome protest against being served by students.

CHURCH LIFE.

Under this caption I would refer to the many signs of interest and activity manifest in the parishes of this Deanery. The opening of the new church in

KNOWLTON

has been already referred to. This in itself is a large indication of activity; but in addition thereto we find an active congregation in Bondville, having its guilds, etc. In Knowlton, industrial and literary societies, guilds and Leagues for various classes, are in active existence. A Parish Monthly is published, and all these together help to promote the much needed recognition of brotherhood in the Church, and to make the Parish church not only a House of Prayer but a Spiritual House.

SUTTON.

From this parish is reported such a financial state of things as indicates in its way that an interest has been kept up. A debt of \$364 has been entirely, removed, and a balance in hand of \$160 is reported as kept for further improvements. In Abercorn the church has been reshingled at a cost of \$144.64, a new vestry has been added at a cost of \$20, and a balance of \$50 in hand for further use.

GLEN SUTTON.

In this mission, with its own special elements of missionary work, Mr. Lackey has taken up the work with earnestness of purpose. West Potton, which for some years past has been in a languishing condition (the field having been preoccupied by the Adventists, and having a resident minister

of that body) is now reviving. Some Church people having taken up their residence in the place, a congregation assembles from Sunday to Sunday interest is taken in the singing, and the liturgy is more generally participated in. A Ladies' Aid has been formed, and a useful and interesting future seems to be before it.

POTTON.

In this mission the Church element, regretfully we say it, is not growing. Indeed, we may say the English speaking people are attogether and rapidly decreasing. Nevertheless the Church's special work is carried on as of old. A Young People's Church Guild is doing its part to foster a spirit of Christian Endeavour. The youthful element, from which this Guild draws its membership, is a very small and ever lessening one.

BOLTON

In this Mission much active work is done. In addition to the services carried on in the three churches Rev. Mr. Rollit has opened a station at a place locally known as "China," toward the western limits of the parish. Here the School House is invariably filled, and a good church congregation rapidly being moulded, and for whom very soon a new church must be built.

The Chapter of this Deanery at its last session desired that your Lordship's attention be again directed to the question, "What is to be done with the Mines?" Geographically, and for all practical purposes, it can be worked better from some other centre than from that of Stukely, the incumbent of which by his claim upon it precludes any work there other than his own, and yet it is not worked. This Deanery desires to suggest to your Lordship the possibility of forming East Bolton, Eastman and the Mines into a new Mission; there being, it is said, along the lake shore and elsewhere around the places mentioned, a large number of families who receive no religious ministrations of our Church, and very little if any from any other. The matter it is thought lies entirely with the Bishop and the Executive Committee.

IRON HILL AND WEST BROME.

The work in this Mission is being carried on, as in the past, with commendable spirit, and with such utilization of men and means as all the circumstances permit. From Adamsville we have no report. That Mission has been vacant and but very recently filled.

If I have omitted anything of moment in this already lengthy report it is unintentional on my part.

QUIET DAY.

A Quiet Day for the clergy and students in the Rural Deanery was held at Shawville, conducted by the Rev. G. Osborne Troop, on the 15th of June. It was felt by all who were present to be very helpful.

Two meetings of the Rural Deanery have been held during the year. The first one followed the Quiet Day, and was held on the 16th of June.

It was the most largely attended meeting of the Deanery as yet held.—
There were present 10 clergymen and 12 laymen.

The following is an abstract of the Resolutions adopted:-

- 1. It being reported that W. R. Thistle, Esq., had bequeathed \$200.00 to the Parish of Aylmer, and that Mrs. Wadsworth had bequeathed \$100.00 to the Parish of Hull, it was resolved that this Rural Deanery hears with pleasure of the acts of these benefactors, and expresses the earnest hope that they may be the precursors of like benefactions to follow.
- 2. After discussion upon the insufficient mode of securing clerical stipends, the need of a more scriptural method of payment was urged.
- 3. The application for an addition of \$40.00 to the Mission Fund grant to the Mission of North Wakefield was approved.
- 4. The Rev. F. R. Smith read a report of collections for S. P. C. K. during the past year, stating the amount collected as \$32.69. This donation was acknowledged by a very pleasing letter from the Secretary of the Society to the Rev. Canon Empson.
- 5. The Rev. W. A. Fyles read a report of the S. S. Institute held at Hull, Nov. 4, 1891. It was decided to hold the Institute this year at Quyon.
- 6. The Rural Deanery also received an invitation which was accepted to join with the Rural Deaneries of Carleton and Prescott and Russell in the Diocese of Ontario, in a Sunday School Teachers Convention, to be held in Ottawa on the 13th and 14th of October.
- 7. The 3rd Sunday in August was recommended for collections for Parochial Endowments.

The second meeting of the Rural Deanery was, at the invitation of the Rev. A. A. Allen, held at Chelsea on the 12th of October. There were present 10 clergymen and one layman.

The following subjects/were discussed :-

1. Organization for Theological Reading. A committee was appointed to report at the next meeting of the Rural Deanery.

2. Church of England Sunday School Institute. Subscription from the Ruri-decanal Branch to the London Society was renewed.

3. Plan of a tabulated annual statement of Sunday School information based upon Report of Diocese of Huron was adopted.

4. The comparative claims upon the liberality of Churchmen of the "British and Foreign Bible Society" and of the "Society for Promoting Christian Knowedge" was discussed. To the latter Society the Church appeals for help in its works. The former through its agents and collectors secures the gifts of Churchmen.

5. Rural Deanery Magazine:—A committee was appointed to consider and report at the next meeting.

6. Baptism by Lay Reader when no emergency requires:—The following resolution was adopted:—

This Rural Deanery having heard of baptism being administered by a Lay Reader otherwise than in cases of emergency, places on record its disapproval of the same, and expresses the hope that there will be no recurrence of such breach of the Church's principle, vide Art. XXIII.

7. The heartiest thanks of the Rural Deanery were tendered to the Rev. A. A. Allen and Mrs. Allen for their hospitality.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

A very decided advance has been made in this branch of the Church's work. Institutes for S. S. Teachers have been held for three years in succession, at different points in the Rural Deanery. That of this year was held at Quyon on the 30th November.

After discussion upon the subject of Sunday School organisation the following resolution was adopted:—

"That this Institute urges upon the Diocesan S. S. Committee the employment of a Diocesan S. S. Agent.

"1. To visit the Sunday Schools and help in organising new Sunday "Schools, acting with the incumbents of parishes.

"2. To be a bond of connection between the S. S. Committee and the "Rural Deanery Institute.

"3. To encourage the development of the Book Depository."

The day was spent in discussion upon various points of Sunday Schoo work, and was a most profitable day.

It will be noticed that we have now 101 S. S. teachers and 962 scholars.

There are more children yet to be gathered in, and more members of the Church able to devote time and energy to this important work.

In conclusion, my Lord, speaking for my brethren, both lay and clerical, within the Rural Deanery, I wish to assure you of the pleasure and strengthening which your Lordship's annual visit always brings. We pray that the Divine hand may ever sustain and direct you.

As for the work before us it is full of difficulties and full of hope. We rejoice in the hope, and we will meet the difficulties in faith and courage, looking to the Divine Head of the Church to bless our efforts.

The Annual Meeting of the Deanery of Iberville was held for the general convenience of the brethren in the Committee Room of the Synod Hall on Monday afternoon at 2.30. There being so few present the meeting adjourned.

In the Deanery there are 7 Rectories and 5 Missions, comprising 11 cures, ministered to by 10 clergymen.

CHANGES.

The Rev. J. W. Dennis has resigned the Rectory of Lacolle, and the Rev. W. C. Bernard, M. A., was appointed by your Lordship as his successor. The Rev. H. Gomery having accepted the honorable position as agent for the Bible Society, the Rev. Canon Rollit succeeds him as Rector of Huntingdon.

We are thankful that the Church in this Diocese does not lose the service of these good men, but that they have only changed their field of labor.

INSURANCE.

All the Church property is reported as insured to the amount of \$39,900.

CHAMBLY.

We are glad to notice in the Rectory of Chambly an increase in most of the contributions, the offertory for the Mission Fund being double of that last reported; and a decided increase for that of Foreign Missions, while the communicants are a third more in number, and the attendance at the Sunday School larger.

In the midst of so much that is discouraging, this is a record for which we are thankful. There are 29 families reported as identified with this Parish.

CHRISTIEVILLE

Reports 3 additional families and 2 additional scholars in Sunday School.

The offertories for the Foreign Missions and for the Jews are slightly increased; the other collections are less.

Lacadie and Savanne is part of the Rectory of St. Johns, and has been for years faithfully ministered to by the Rev. B. P. Lewis, B.A., Rector of Christieville. There are 2 neat little churches where fortnighly service is held. There are 24 families reported — farmers generally in comfortable circumstances. \$100 is raised towards the clergyman's stipend, and is augmented by a grant of the same amount from the Mission Fund, all well earned by the clergyman. But we do not think the people appreciate their blessings, nor are they very grateful for the grant, else surely their offerings to the Mission Fund would be greater than \$2.67, though this sum is double that of last report. 87c was the offertory towards the Widows and Orphans, and \$1.00 towards the Superannuation Fund. There was nothing given towards Foreign or Domestic Missions, nothing for the Jews, \$140 being the total raised for all purposes. I know more could be done. I am glad to report the opening of a Sunday School.

EDWARDSTOWN.

For years past we have written or spoken so strongly concerning the unsatisfactory state of things here, and, as there is no very appreciable improvement, words fail us to express ourselves afresh. There are 36 families and 64 communicants reported, and all that "they have contributed to the maintenance of their venerable pastor is the sum of \$104, supplemented by a grant from the S. P. G. of \$292, making in all \$396, while \$140 was the munificent sum Edwardstown and adjacent parts raised for all purposes. We trust in the near future that your Lordship may have at your disposal the means to make such changes that may spiritually and financially benefit this district.

SABREVOIS.

Only 12 Church families and 28 confirmed persons are reported as belonging to the Mission, and a Sunday-school numbering 24 scholars.

A grant from the Mission Fund of \$200, and \$300 from the Colonial Church and School Society, supplemented by the sum of \$61 from the people, brings up the total stipend of this missionary, who for many years has proved faithful to his flock, to the starving sum of \$561.50. Can your Lordship suggest any plan for the relief of these clergy? How can the parishes of Edwardstown, Sabrevois, Franklin and Havelock be made to feel their imperative duty to remedy such a deplorable state. I frankly admit as Rural Dean I have brought facts and figures before the several vestries, but have failed in producing a more liberal and just contribution.

FRANKLIN AND HAVELOCK.

From holding for a short time the honorable position of a self-sustaining parish, Franklin and Havelock have reduced themselves to the status of a Mission. Forty-nine families are reported, a reduction of 11 families since last report by death and removal, a most serious loss in this parish. \$150 is due the incumbent to-day. \$750 was the total sum raised by this parish. There was no offertory made for Foreign Missions. There is a branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, but I have no report of their work; but I am sure they have not forgotten their first love, Havelock being one of the earliest in the field to take up this noble work. I am glad to report, notwith-standing the reduction in Church families, all the Funds, with the one exception already made, are materially increased—a matter for consideration. But what is to be done about the debt to the clerical stipend?

HALLERTON AND HEMMINGFORD.

There are 62 families in this parish, two Sunday schools with 27 scholars. At our last visitation we were pleased to notice marked improvements in the several churches outside and in, and thankful to hear expressions on all sides of great satisfaction at your Lordship's appointment of the present Incumbent, and we saw material evidence that the expression was sincere. Generous deeds of kindness are very grateful to the clergyman, cheering him on his path. We are pleased to see the Mission Fund increased by one half, \$25.25 being the offertory from both places. But there is no interest taken in Foreign Missions, no offertory made, and only an interest amounting to \$6 for Domestic Missions. The other offertories are all small. The parish is able to give and do more. This Mission of 62 families receives a grant of \$360, and only adds to the clerical stipend the sum of \$240. Why should Hemmingford and Hallerton only pay \$240, when Franklin and Havelock, with only 49 families, are called upon to pay \$500? 1 do not think there is any more ability in one parish or the other. All that is wanted is the willing mind, a consecrated truth, a proportionate giving as God has prospered.

HUNTINGDON AND HINCHINBROOK.

The present Rector, Rev. Canon Rollitt, has gone so recently to the parish, and the returns so incomplete, that we can make no just comparison with former years. But we heartily congratulate the people in the appointment. Already have they appreciated the wise choice by a generous gift of sleigh robes, etc., as a slight token of respect and good will. We earnestly pray that great spiritual blessings may attend the faithful services of the new Rector. There are 138 families in the parish; a Sunday school of 73. The offertories of such a number strikes one as being very small; only \$13 for the Mission Fund, nothing for Domestic Missions, nothing for the Jews.

Forty-three families are connected with the Church. A Sunday-school of 23 scholars.

We are glad to notice improvements, such as a new fence around the churchyard and other portions of the glebe; a newly-shingled roof—all good and encouraging signs. But with the exception of \$2 towards the Mission Fund all the other offertories are a shade less than last year, and no offertory made for Foreign Missions. This parish does not rise to her privilege. She does not give as she has received, and yet we are told that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

ST. JOHNS.

And what am I to say of the parish that is as dear to me to-day as when I left it.

God bless and prosper in spiritual and temporal things my dear people and their present worthy and much esteemed Rector; be as generous and helpful to him as you were to me, and he will have cause to say "My lines have fallen to me in pleasant places." Pray for him and his, that their presence and example may be as a light set on an hill. Uphold him right royally in all parish work and undertakings, especially in all missionary work, and you and he will receive a rich blessing beyond your expectation.

We were delighted to see all the needy repairs made in church and Baldwin Hall, and nothing could surpass the present condition of your beautiful Rectory, which the Ladies' Aid so thoughtfully caused to be painted and papered. May the present Rector and his family enjoy many a happy and unclouded year in St. John's Rectory. But to live in such a house the stipend should be as of old, \$1,200, and the parish is well able to afford that sum. I know whereof I speak. I know where the liberality lies and where the self-denial is exercised, and I know where there is ability to give but not the disposition. I do trust and pray that next year St. Johns may honor herself by honoring the servant of the Lord, for he is worthy of his hire. And now concerning the coffections, might they not all be increased? From the force of circumstanges it is not quite just to compare this year with last, but we do hope and believe that St. Johns will occupy her old place as regards the Diocesan Mission Fund and other missionary offertories. In the Deanery of Iberville we come \$100 short of what we gave last year to the Diocesan Mission Fund. I deeply deplore this fact. With 130 families and 160 confirmed persons, a Sunday-school of 90, all of which is reported this year, we do not think we go beyond our province in asking you to consider and pray over these things, to be up and doing for the day is far spent, the Master is at hand, and we have accomplished so little.

LACOLLE.

It is impossible to draw any comparison with last report, as the present Rector could find no returns or entries so as to make full returns. We heartily congratulate Lacolle upon the happy appointment, and pray that the Holy Spirit may guide and prosper all parochial affairs, and that the spirit of harmony may ever continue in the parish. The services in Lacolle are hearty and reverend, and the induction service held by your Lordship of the Reverend W. C. Bernard, M.A., and the earnest words of encouragement to the new Rector, and the loving appeal to the congregation for their prayers and loyal co-operation with him in all things affecting the spiritual and temporal interests of Lacolle, will long be remembered. We hope to see a great interest taken in Missions in this parish.

STATISTICS.

There are 14 Sunday schools in this Deanery, 201 males, 221 females; total of scholars 389, with 44 teachers, an increase of 16 pupils.

There are 588 Church families, an additional 20 in the Deanery, and an increase of 40 communicants, 76 taptisms and 60 confirmed.

All the above we report with thankfulness for the slight improvement, but with this increase we see a correspondent decrease in some of the parishes as regards their offerings. The Mission Fund has paid towards the augmentation of the stipend of the Missionaries \$700; the S. P. G., \$292; Colonial Church and School Society, \$300, making a total of \$1,292, while the several parishes in the Deanery have only contributed to the Mission Fund \$301, a decrease of \$100; W.& O. \$43, a deficit of \$8; Superannuation Fund \$37; Domestic Missions \$82, a decrease of \$91; Foreign Missions \$49, a decrease of \$13; Jews \$43, an increase of \$9, and a decrease of \$334 for other purposes, not named.

The annual meeting was held in Granby on the 5th of January, when there were present five clergy and ten laymen.

We have two rectories, one parish and five missions. Two of these missions are temporarily united under the pastoral care of one missionary, viz. N. Shefford and S. Roxton with Warden, and Milton, Canaan and Shefford Mt. is at present served only by a student, working under the supervision of the Rural Dean at Granby.

The number of churches has been increased by the erection of a model church in the Mission of Warden, erected at a cost of only \$1250, through the indefatigable efforts of Rev. R. F. Taylor, making the thirteenth Church edifice in our Deanery, - the number of mission stations remaining the same as in last report of the 32nd Syned, and being 4. Twenty-two additional Church families are reported, one hundred and twelve more communicants, twenty-nine more baptisms, 21 less confirmed, 1 more married, 15 more buried, 1 Sunday school less and 39 scholars; \$424 more of endowment, \$28 more though the Offertory, \$222 more paid by the Mission Fund, \$35 more paid by Endowment, \$329 less paid by Offertory (this being due to the absence of special donations given in this way to Lay Reader's services heretofore), \$10 less paid by the parishes for stipends, \$55 less of arrearages, \$222 more paid on the total stipends, \$7 more raised for the Mission Funds, \$106 more for the Widows and Orphans Fund, \$6 more for Superannutation, \$104 more for Domestic Missions, \$14 more for Foreign Missions, the same for Theological training, \$25 more for Women's Auxiliary, \$3 more for the Jews, \$3,285 for other purposes, \$3,185 more in the grand total, or an average for the eight parishes of \$1,107 apiece.

I have reason to think, my Lord, that, as a financial showing, this is a fairly commendable increase, and it gives us heart in the work of ministering to the dear souls committed to our care. I could wish that we were in a position to renounce all help from the Mission Fund for the benefit of the churches in the West; but the land about us is not yet all conquered for Christ, and if the Church's mission and message is to all men, she is bound to extend herself whenever she can get a hearing, and proclaim her safe and saving message to inquirers from Rome, to the disaffected from Dissent, and to those who know not if there be such a thing as the Holy Ghost. Some new work has, in spite of drawbacks, been undertaken during the year, and not without success; but we know the cry of being undermanned and therefore overworked, and we are afraid of losing our men, and that their noble efforts may not be followed up as they ought to be.

Once again, we do implore the Synod, though your Lordship, to give us a better businesslike plan of paying these veterans in the service the paltry salaries which they are taught to expect.

I can but reiterate the language of my last report on p. 133 Journal of 1891, and sue for a reintroduction, among the subjects of debate, of the Quebec plan of graded salaries.

We believe that there will be no satisfaction, no salvation for our faithful missionaries, unless some plan of this nature be adopted. Its failure cannot

land us into worse confusion than that which now prevails everywhere; and therefore we feel that the Synod ought if possible to come to our relief.

CHANGES.

In the old parish of West Shefford, the excellent work of Rev. W. Robinson (removed to Clarenceville) has been given into the hands of Rev. Seth A. Mills, a son in the faith of one of your Lordship's missions on the Gatineau, and who is seeking to extend his work still further South.

INSURANCE.

All the Church property is well and sufficiently insured. Very material improvements are reported in four parishes.

Rev. R. F. Taylor, to whom great and lasting credit is due for his untiring efforts to improve the temporalities of the charge committed to his care, reports a large sum of money raised and judiciously expended on improvements, the fabrique of that Mission being now in a complete condition, and he desires me to note that the several "Ladies Aid Societies in his charge deserve great credit for the excellent manner in which they laboured for the good of the Church since he and Mrs. Taylor came into their midst."

In West Shefford a benefaction has been made in the shape of an addition to the endowment of \$416.20 by Mr. Duke Roberts, and a promised gift of sufficient brick to finish the tower of St. John's church.

The little Mission of Warden has come out nobly, after many a year of anxious waiting, and given to the service of God a beautiful Gothic church entirely without encumbrance. We thank them for this object lesson, and only hope that before long a missionary may be stationed in their midst, speaking the two languages, and so equipped for pushing the work north-easterly over an area where it would be good for men to "hear the Church."

A relimitation of some or all of our missions ought always to be in order at once, should the Church be ready to re-map and revise her boundaries, which should be more imaginary than real, when they stand in the way of the fullest possible presentation of Christ to even a handful of souls here or there. The Church's rights consist in feeding the sheep and lambs of the Good Shepherd wherever and as soon as ever they can be reached.

The fluctuations of population and the facilities for reaching out in every direction ought to be even anticipated and promptly met. An accommodating, geographical elasticity should be a feature of our missionary work from one end of our diocese to the other; division and subdivision the order of a successful Episcopate as seen in the phenomenal growth of the missionary jurisdictions in the West; an apostolic presentation of the Christian ministry in its threefold divine order, and not the prevalent inverted system which the present financial distress renders necessary, and which only the generous response of our men of means can ameliorate and finally remove.

May the Giver of all good things bring about amongst us all a reformation in our style of supporting His work of Christianizing mankind, and willing gifts will then be made and grow contagious, mission machinery be found, and labourers find employment in the harvest field of the world.

A fund of nearly \$200 has been got together in Waterloo, to be applied to the cost of finishing the tower of St. Luke's church.

Improvements are reported from Boscobel and Ely, viz, a new fence round the churchyard and also a debt of \$300 nearly all removed.

Also gifts to the church have been made at Eastman, consisting of a piano lamp and communion set; also a pocket set to the incumbent, Rev. J. W. Garland, and lamps have been added to St. John's church at a cost of \$32.

While much has been done, much more yet remains to be accomplished. The Church is nothing if not missionary. For this alone she exists, and deserves to exist. May the Great Head of the Church guide us with His counsels, and after that receive us into the glory and rewards of those who have been put in trust of the Everlasting Gospel, and who, like the Master Himself, have been faithful in the presentation of it, jealous of anything that can bring a stain upon its brightness, fearless of the dangers and trials that are inseparable from the work of missions, and hopeful for the time when He will grant them His own measure of success.

RURAL DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS

My LORD,

I have the honour to submit my Annual Report.

It is very pleasing to be able to state that there is now no vacancy in the Deanery. There have been some changes during the year. Rev. Chs. Wright succeeds Rev. W. C. Difworth in Arundel; Rev. A. B. Given has been appointed to Lachute, and Rev. J. A. Elliott to Mille Isles and Morin.

Church property is reported fully insured, though for some reason Buckingham seems to have reduced its insurance from \$1,400 to \$1,000.

It is to be regretted that more of the members of the Deanery do not attend the Annual Meetings. It is important that all, both cleric and lay, should if possible attend when notified, and give the Church all the assistance they can in aiding the prosecution of her interests.

Reports have been received from all the parishes except Arundel (vacant till a week ago), but some of them were unnecessarily incomplete, and others were handed in long after they were due, thereby occasioning some inconvenience.

From the facts and figures received I beg to lay before your Lordship the following:--

Buckingham still affords ground for anxiety. It is a large Parish, and much travel is essential to reach the scattered members. It has apparently material for a strong Parish, but whether one clergyman can cover the ground thoroughly I question. Certainly there is a missionary work to be done within its limits, and I do wish the officials could see their way to adopt some effective means to do that work. The deputation appointed by the Executive Committee visited the Parish September, 1891, and found 140 families claiming to be Anglican, yet to-day in the Report only 80 are recognised as being even nominal Church people, while not nore than 30 of these contribute to the Church funds. There are loyal Churchmen who are working faithfully to promote the interests of the Church, and the existence of many not alive to their individual duties must be discouraging.

GRENVILLE deserves nothing but praise. Both the Rector and the people have worked well to advance the many interests of the Church at home and abroad. I may say some of their financial success is due they claim to the envelope system. Evidently the proper Christian spirit is actuating them when it is seen that \$960 out of a total of \$1070 were contributed through the offertory.

LACHUTE has done well. In spite of very many drawbacks and losses it has raised about \$1,000, of which \$600 came through the offertory. This latter point is but another illustration of what may be urged in favour of the scriptural mode of systematic weekly offerings to God. The debt on the parsonage is being reduced every year. It is proposed to build a small church this spring at Louisa, Wentworth Township, where up to the present time services have been conducted in a school-house quite unsuitable for such a purpose. This proposal will of course be brought before your Lordship in due time for consideration.

LAKEFIELD has marks of work and interest to show, but it is unfortunate that the wardens, who are responsible, do not urge all the members to be more liberal and more prompt in their contributions to the stipend. I think in spite of decrease in numbers and prosperity that the introduction of a little more business into Church finances would bring up the clergyman's income to \$650 without a great deal of sacrifice.

PAPINEAUVILLE under its faithful incumbent is progressing. Funds are being raised to build a parsonage at Montebello, where a suitable piece of land has been given by friends of the Church.

PORTLAND has completed its parsonage, and praise is due to the members who have with considerable self-denial done what they could to accomplish this most necessary work. It is hoped that the people and the missionary will continue to carry on and extend the good work maintained for the Church

during so many eventful years. The mission is truly a mission, and may humble faithful life be developed for the welfare of the cause.

Respecting Sr. Andrews I regret having to sadden those frithful workers there who are doing what they can; yet they will recognise the truth of what I am about to report. The Rectory is a Crown Rectory, highly favoured in the past, and enjoying many privileges to day. It has an endowment fund which brings in over \$60 towards the stipend of the Rector, who is promised \$600. This stipend is payable quarterly, but the second quarter is ever due before the first has been paid. Arrears have been on former occasions, but to-day the Rector has to admit that \$144 are overdue. Praise certainly cannot be given; and we may well criticise the benefit of conserving a system which leaves subscribers a latitude of twelve months in which to pay, and which coolly (to use no stronger expression) allows the Rector to exist as best he can. The result must be injurious to all concerned. No church can prosper where, judging by results, the members fail to realise their personal responsibility, and where great injustice is done to the Rector and to the church—and persisted in.

The members have worked, and worked well, during the year, seeing they have raised for all purposes \$1,175; but still they should bear in mind that the stipend ought to be the first charge on the Parish funds, and it is the imperative duty of the wardens to use such means, employ such a system as will ensure an early regular payment of the Rector's income. Some may object to the envelope system as being too much of an experiment; but it cannot surely be more disastrous to the Rector and the Church than the system now employed. I do hope the reproach will be removed, as it can be by proper effort; and by adherence to the Apostolic practice of the weekly offertory, it need not occur again.

The congregation have at considerable outlay enlarged and very much improved the parsonage, and they are to be commended for their labours in this respect.

We find the *Deanery Clerical Association* a valuable assistance in our work, and the hope is still entertained that every clergyman will be a regular, punctual attendant at the quarterly meetings.

STATEMENTS OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURE IN CONNECTION WITH THE PARSONAGE BUILT AT HUDSON.

At a meeting of Church members called by public notice, in accordance with the Church Temperalities Act, held in the Como school-house, Monday, 17th February, 1890, the Mayor of Cemo was called to the chair, and requested the Rev. L. G. A. Roberts to make the following statement:

1. As there is no house to which a clergyman can go in the whole parish, it is imperative upon the parishioners to provide a suitable residence for their minister.

2. Mrs. Whitlock having kindly made an offer of a valuable piece of ground (about six acres), subject to certain restrictions, and in doing so, nominated the Trustees to carry out her intentions.

3. That this meeting willingly accept the ground upon those terms, and pass an unanimous vote of confidence in the gentlemen entrusted with the gift of donation.

Notices of resolutions embracing each of these premises were then put forward and carried unanimously.

Resulting from this meeting, the following gentlemen are duly elected:

R. W. Shepherd, Esq., W, K. Robinson, Esq., George Hodgson, Esq., W. F. Halcro, Esq., and Rev. L. G. A. Roberts, Secretary and Treasurer.

Subscriptions were at once solicited, with the following results. The Rev. Mr. Roberts stipulated to pay \$200 every year from the date of his being in possession until balance of debt was paid off, and to advance \$1,000 on mortgage for three years. The fund to be named the Como Trust Fund.




