

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Trinity College School.

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The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened on the first of May, 1865, under the Head-mastership of the Rev. C. H. Badgley, M.A. During the summer of 1868, the School was removed to Port Hope. In January, 1872, the first portion of the new buildings was completed and occupied. The School premises now consist of over twenty acres of land, affording ample space for large Cricket, Tennis and Football grounds, situated on high land outside the town of Port Hope; the large and handsome building, including a beautiful Chapel, presents a south front of about three hundred feet in length, and a west front of eighty feet; it is capable of containing a School of upwards of 150 boys. A large and handsome building, fitted up as a Gymnasium and winter play-room, has recently been erected.

The new Gymnasium is a large and handsome brick and stone building, designed by Messrs. Darling & Curry, Architects, Toronto. Its dimensions are about eighty feet by fifty, and it consists of two storeys. The ground floor forms a play room for use in bad weather, with Cricket, Football and Photographic rooms, etc., and heating apparatus; while the upper floor, which forms a lofty and spacious apartment, is devoted to the Gymnasium, and is fitted up with all the necessary apparatus.

The Gymnasium faces the playground, and makes a very striking addition to the group of school buildings, with its flanking round towers of massive stone (shingled wood-work above) at the north and south angles, and the long balcony, with overhanging roof, between them.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the Session of 1871-2, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor, the Provost and the Professors in Arts of the University of Trinity College, the Head Master of the School, and such other persons as may, from time to time, be appointed by the Governing Body.

Course of Instruction.

The course of instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French. Scripture History, Catechism, Natural Sciences, Bookkeeping, Drawing, Vocal Music and Military Drill.

Pupils are prepared for the Matriculation Examinations of the Universities, and the Entrance Examinations of the Law and Medical Schools, the Royal Military College, the Army, Navy, etc. In the Modern Department special attention is directed to preparation for commercial pursuits. Instruction can also be obtained, if desired, in Shorthand writing.

The discipline and general management of the School are based upon the English Public School System. Out-of-school Government is, accordingly, to a large extent vested in the hands of the Prefects, who are selected from the senior boys by the Head Master.

fees.

The Fees for board and tuition are \$267 per annum, or \$89 per term for boarders, and \$67.50 per annum, or \$22.50 per term for day-boys, and are payable at the beginning of each term in advance; if, however, payment of the Fees, together with any school account of the previous term, is made during the first fortnight of term, a discount of ten per cent. off the Fees is allowed, thus reducing the charges to \$240 per annum, or \$80 per term, for boarders, and to \$60 per annum, or \$20 per term, for day-boys.

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Each new boy, on admission to the School, is required to pay an entrance Fee of \$4, which is devoted to the maintenance and improvement of the Boys' Library* and Readingroom, and a Fee of \$12 in lieu of bedding, etc., which are now supplied by the School instead of, as formerly, by the Pupils.

The above Fees are inclusive of all School expenses, except books, stationery, drawing materials, etc., and medical attendance.

A Half-term's notice must be given in writing before the removal of a Pupil. If such notice is not given, a Half-term's Fee will be collected.

The following rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on August 18th, 1870:—

"The Fee for Board and Tuition in each Term, and any balance which may remain for books or otherwise, from the previous Term, must be paid within a fortnight after a boy presents himself at the School. If this be not done, the Bursar is required to drawn on the parent or guardian for the amount (with bank charges) at ten days, and should this draft be returned dishonoured, the boy must be sent home by the Head Master."

Books and stationery are supplied in the School at the ordinary prices.

Boys over twelve years of age will be admitted to the School only on the production of such testimonials of previous good conduct and diligence, as shall perfectly satisfy the Warden and the Governing Body. Boys are not received under ten years of age.

To secure admission a deposit of \$10 must be made on application, which will be accounted for when the boy finally leaves the School.

Forms of application can be obtained from the Warden.

Exhibitions.

THE LATE VENERABLE JOHN WILSON, M.A., Archdeacon of Peterborough, bequeathed \$1500 to the School for the purpose of founding two Exhibitions of the annual value of \$50 each, for the Sons of the Clergy, in the province of Ontario. These Exhibitions are tenable, from year to year, during the whole period of the recipient's residence at the School; provided that his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The nomination to these Exhibitions rests in the hands of the Warden, subject to the approval of the Head Master, to whom a letter testimonial of previous good conduct must be presented by the applicant.

THE REV. HENRY WILSON, D.D., New York, offers an Exhibition (to be known as "The Montie Exhibition") of the annual value of \$25, to the Son of a Clergyman, in the Diocese of Ontario, upon the same terms, mutatis mutandis, as the "Wilson Exhibitions."

Bursaries.

The Corporation of the School offers to the Sons of the Clergy in the Dominion of Canada, TWENTY BURSARIES of the annual value of \$120 each, tenable from year to year, during the whole period of a boy's residence at the School, so long as his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The son of any clergyman who is, or was at the time of his death, actually engaged in Parochial or Missionary work, or in a Church School or College in the Dominion, shall be eligible for a Bursary. Written application must be made to the Warden by the parent or guardian of the boy, certifying that, without the aid thus afforded, the educational advantages of the School cannot be obtained for him. Ceteris paribus preference will be given to the Sons of the Clergy in the Dioceses of Toronto, Ontario, Niagara, Algoma, and Huron.

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Scholarship.

A Scholarship of the annual value of \$60 has been founded in memory of the late Rev. F. A. Bethune, M.A., who died on the 20th of January, 1877, at Cannes, in France, and who had been for nine years a most efficient and zealous Assistant Master in the School.

The Scholarship (to be known as "THE REY. F. A. BETHUNE SCHOLARSHIP") will be awarded annually to the boy who obtains the highest number of marks for General Proficiency in the Fifth Form Examination in July, on condition that the holder continues for another year to pursue his studies in the Sixth Form of the School. The Scholarship will not be awarded unless at least two-thirds of the total number of marks be obtained.

Boarding.

Boarders are received into the School House, a building warmed with steam and hot air systems, and ventilated on the most approved system, lighted with gas and the incandescent electric light, and furnished with bathrooms and other appliances to promote the comfort and health of the boys. A new bathroom and lavatory have recently been added. The School House is under the personal supervision of the Warden and Head Master, assisted by six Resident Masters, who direct the boys' evening work. The household arrangements are attended to by experienced Lady Matrons.

It is particularly requested that parents should send their boys to school with all their clothing, linen, and other requisites, carefully and clearly marked with the name in full.

It is desired that no eatables should be sent to the boys during Term, with the exception of fruit.

Pupils from a distance are allowed, upon application, to remain in residence during the Christmas and Easter Vaca-

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tions at a charge of \$5 per week for board. No pupils are permitted to remain during the summer holidays.

It is recommended that pocket money should be supplied to the younger boys only through the Warden, instead of directly from home. A small sum furnished weekly is more beneficial than an occasional larger amount.

Wednesdays, Saturdays and Saints' Days, are half-holidays.

The Chapel.

During Term, prayers are said in the Chape! on week-days at 8.45 in the morning, and immediately before study in the evening. On Sundays there are full services at 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. The Holy Communion is celebrated every Sunday morning at 7.30. The Lord Bishop of Toronto holds an Annual Confirmation in the Chapel on the Sunday before Easter.

Terms.

The School Year is divided into three Terms of about thirteen weeks each:—

Michaelmas Term, 1892: From September 13 to December 20.

Lent Term, 1893: From January 10 to March 29.

Trinity Term, 1893: From April 12 to July 6.

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Warations.

Two weeks at Easter; two months at midsummer; three weeks at Christmas. Return tickets are issued for the shorter holidays by the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railways for one fare and a third.

Examinations and Brizes.

Examinations are held at the end of Michaelmas and Trinity Terms; the latter is conducted by the Professors of Trinity College, and other gentlemen unconnected with the School. A General Proficiency Prize is given at Christmas and Midsummer to the head boy of each Form. A report of the progress and general conduct of each pupil is sent by the Head Master to parents or guardians at the end of each half-term, and at the close of each Examination.

The Bronze Medal presented by His Excellency the Governor-General, is awarded to the boy who obtains the highest place in Mathematics at the July Examination.

The Chancellor's Prize is awarded to the head boy of the School, according to the result of the Midsummer Examination.

A Bronze Medal, presented by Mrs. Perram and Mrs. Gaviller, is awarded annually, by vote of the Masters, to the boy who has chiefly distinguished himself by "Steady Perseverance in Industry, Courtesy and Integrity."

A Prize for Botany is offered by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College.

A Prize offered by the Warden for the best Collection in any department of Natural Science, made by any boy during the course of the School year, is awarded at the end of the Summer Vacation.

A friend of the School, as a token of his gratitude for the benefits that his sons have received there, offers Three Prizes annually, one to be awarded to the boy in each Form who obtains the Second Place in General Proficiency at the Midsummer Examination, on condition that his marks amount to at least sixty per cent. of the total number, and that he is not more than five per cent. of the marks behind the winner of the first place, the object being to reward very diligent boys who come very close to the winners of the First Prizes. No Second Prize will be given in any Form which does not contain at least ten competitors. Should there be more than three boys entitled to these Prizes, the Head Master shall award them to those who, in his judgment, have proved themselves most deserving by their steady work during the year.

E. Martin, Esq., Q.C., of Hamilton, offers a Prize for Classics to be awarded to the boy in the Fifth Form who

obtains, at the Midsummer Examination, the highest total number of marks in Latin and Greek Grammar, Authors, and Composition, on condition that his marks amount to two-thirds of the whole.

The Head Master offers a Prize for Classics to the Fourth Form on the same terms.

S. G. Wood, Esq., of Toronto, offers a Prize for the best English Prose Translation in Latin to the highest Form in the School. Accuracy of translation, combined with good idiomatic English, is to be the chief element of merit to be considered in awarding the prize; but none is to be given unless spelling and handwriting are creditable and satisfactory.

Barlow Cumberland, Esq., offers two Prizes for General Proficiency at the Midsummer Examination.

Edwin Rogers, Esq., offers the Prize for General Proficiency in the highest Form at the Christmas Examination.
