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## CONSTITUTION.

1. That the Officers of this Society shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and seven ManaGERS, who shall be, hereafter, chosen, by ballot, annually, at a meeting to be held on the second Tuesday in January in each year, notice of which meeting shall be published in two of the City papers, at leastone week previously to the time of Election.
2. The Officers of the Society, witli the Managers, shall form a board for the government of the Society, five of whom shall be a quorum ; shall hold nieetings quarterly, or as often as they may deem expedient; shall appoint the time and place for holding Exhibitions ; make such rules and regulations respecting the same as may be deemed expedient; make and publish before the 15 th day of February in each year, a full and specific list of articles to be competed for and prizes to be awarded; encourage the introduction of new objects of Horticulture; and for the purpose of promoting the interests and objects of the Society, (subject to the instruction, supervision and control of the Society), shall keep a record of all their proceedings and make a report of the same to the Society, at its Annual Meeting.
3. Whenever any vacancy shal! occur in any of the offices of the Society, it may be filled by a specia! Election by the Board of Managers, at such time as they may deem expedient, of which one week's notice shall be given by the Secretary, in writing, to each member of the Board.
4. The duty of the President shall be to preside at all meetings of the Society, to maintain order, to state the business before the Snciety, in case of equal division upon any question, to give the casting vote, to call for Accounts and Reports of Committees, to call extra meetings of the Society, when requested, in writing, by five members, and generally to superintend the execution of such By-laws and Regulations as the Society shall from time to time enact, not otherwise provided for.
5. The Treasurer shall receive all sums of Money due or payable to the Society, and shall keep and disburse the same, as may
be directed by the Board of Management, of which he shall render a true account; no payment to be made without the written order of the President, or, in his absence, of any two members of the Board.
6. That the Managing Committee be empowered to make all the necessary arrangements for the Exhibitions, and elect three competent Judges who shall award the Premiums to the several successful Competitors and from whose award there shall be, no appeal.
7. Individuals may become Members of this Society by the annual payment of Ten Shillings, and shall be entitled to vote, shall be eligible to any office or appointment, receive a printed copy of the published transactions of the Society, a printed copy of the Constitution, and shall receive three Tickets to all the Exhibitions of the Society.
8. After the formation of the Society, applications for admission as members to be made to one of the Board of Management and to be balloted for at their next meeting.
9. The contribution of Fqve Pounds shall constitute a Life Membership and exempt the Member from all future contribution.
10. Any member who shall (after notice given) neglect, for the space of one year, to pay his Annual Subscription, shall cease to retain his connection with the Society, and the Treasurer shall have power to erase his name from the List of Members; and any member may withdraw from the Society by giving notice to the Treasurer or Secretary, and paying the amount due by him to the Society. If any member shall do anything to dishonor the Society, place on the Tables or in the Hall, for Exhibition or Premium, any Plant, Fruit or Specimen, hearing his name, not of his growth, manufacture or design, with an intention to deceive, or shall be gwilty of any breach of good faith towards the Society, he may be expelled therefrom-two-thirds of the members present voting for his expulsion - but no member shall be expelled without notice of the motion being served upon him, personally, or left at his usual place of abode, at least ten days before it is acted upon.
11. The Fiscal year shall commence on the First day of January, and all Annual Subscriptions shall be deemed and taken as due at that time.

Premiums and Gratuities may be awarded to such persons as shall have essentially advanced the objects of the Society, or for the exhibition of any Fruits, Plants, Flowers or Vegetables, of their own growth or cultivation, either new in their kind, or of uncommon excellence, or for any new and successful method of

13. No member shall be entilled to receive a Premium or Gratuity, without-having previously paid to the Treasurer his Annual Subscription.
14. As this Society is formed for the advancement of Horticulture in Canada, it is understond that no Plant shall be placed in competition for the regular prizes of the Society, except it shal! have been in the Province for the space of three months, and is bona fide the property of the member offering it. The Committee may offer, gratuities for the introduction of any Foreign production.
15. The Constitution and By-laws of the Sociely may be altered and amended at.any Regular Meeting of the Society; a notification of the interided alteration hating been made at a previous meeting, and two-thirds of those present voting for such alteration or amendnient.

The Annual Meeting took place at Young's Hotel, on Tuesday, the 14:h January, when the Managing Cummittee presented the following :-

## REPOR'T.

Your Committee beg to submit the following Report :-
The Society was formed last spring, under rather unfavorable prospects, a similar attempt having failed some time before, but your Committee are happy to say their exertions have exceeded their most sanguine expectations.
The number of members who have paid their subscriptions amount to 87 ; the ames of many others were on the original list, and there is every prospect, from the satisfaction given to the public at the two exhibitions, that a considerable increase may be expected during the present year.

The variety of Fruits, Flowers, and Vegetables sent in for competition at the two exhibitions in June and September, were far beyond any thing your Committee could have anticipated, and would not have disgraced the exhibitions of longer established Societies.
The total amount of subscriptions (and donations arising from
premiums awarded and given to the funds) for the past year was $£ 538 \mathrm{~s} .8 \mathrm{~d}$. Of this sum there was a warded for premiums £ 33 10s. ; expenses for printing, \&c., £8. 6s. 10d. ; leaving a balance on hand of $£ 1111 \mathrm{~s} .10 \mathrm{~d}$. , in the Savings' Bank.
Your Cormmittee are happy to state that they have reason to believe the competiors are perfectly satisfied with the premiums a warded, and as many of the practical members were very successful, they have every reason to expect a considerable increase of nuembers from thit c'ass of individuals-a class which it has ${ }^{2}$ been one of the principal objects of your Committee to enlist into your Societr.

On the whole, your Committee are of opinion that it only requires a little exertion on the part of your Members to make your Society one of the most successful of the kind in Canada.
