



EMPEROR WILLIAM OF GERMANY ON PATRIOT-ISM AND RELIGION.

The Emperor William, at a banquet to the high officials, and representative magnates of the province of Westphalia in the Munster Museum, recalled me best and before anybody else. Pro-

magnates of the province of Westphalia in the Munster Museum, recalled one of this solloque's when tempted to be angry.

"Religion, the Kaiser said," according to the London Times report, "not in the huntrow ecclesiastical sense, but as a practical element in everyday life, was the only means by which a union of all classes could be effected.

"The emperor then proceeded to liturate this contention by relating his personal experience in dealing with the manifold characters with which he had come into contact since his accession. During the course of my long reign," His Majesty said, 'I have had to dowith a great many people, and I have had to endure a great deal from them. Unwittingly and often, alias! wittingly and often, alias! wittingly they have caused me bitter pain. And when in moments like those my anger threaened to overcome me, and

they have caused me bitter pain. And when in moments like those my anger threaened to overcome me, and thoughts of retaliation came into my mind, I have asked myself by what means anger might best be mitigated and forbearance be strengthened.

TWO LIVES LOST IN

FIRE ON STEAMER

VIENNA, Sept. 21—Much excitement has been caused in Lower Austria by reports that during the present army manoeuvres a large number of men have been prostrated, and that numerous cases have ended fatally.

During a forced march in the mountains in great heat at the end of last week, in Carinthia, two regiments of the line, one militia regiment and a rifle battalion, have several hundred men on the sick list. They were mostly reservists. Seven are said to have died of heart disease, In a march over Radiberg a Bosnian soldier, who has not yet been discovered, fired a live cartridge, killing a lieutenant on the spot.

From Wiener Neustadt three cases of death are reuorted, and 200 men are sick. It is feared that the men who report themselves sick are accused of malingering and threatened with punishment. The officers in some cases refused to listen to the recommendations of the doctors and allow a rest.

Although it is officially stated that nothing is known of deaths among the men, there is every reason to believe that the main facts are correct. The official statement has by no means calmed the prevalent excitement.

The difficulty arose over the fact that in a few shops there were some men who received less than \$12 per wek, which sum the union demanded should be made the minimum wage. The employers were reluctant to make any concessions as they claimed that the men in question, who were receiving \$10 and \$11 per week, were worth no more and that they would be perfectly willing to pay a competent mechanic \$12. In the cases of many skilled workmen they pay more than \$12 per week, the sum in each case depending upon the man's ability. The pending upon the man's ability. 
