





Foresters say that there are approximately 1,000 kinds now unclassed. Of course, many of those are not merchantable, but about 150 kinds are in the market now. As lumbering operations have moved in America from Pennsylvania to the lake region, and thence to the Pacific coast, and as the maximum cut has been reached in the furtherest American west, the cld time slogan of the lumber kings "Wesward ho" should in time bring them to the Philippine forests. It will be necessary when that time arrives to administer the forests as to provide for their exploitation without destruction. In the meantime much valuable timber after having reached maturity is going to waste for want of cutting.

Nomadic agriculture has been one of the worst enemies of the forests in the Philippines. But for the fact that the forests are large and the population small, serious inroads upon the timber supply would have been made long ago. As matters stand the denudation of watersheds has increased flood damage, and millions of dollars worth of timber has been destroyed to make room for rice patches whose product might be counted in thousands of dollars. The established custom in parts of the islands is for a farmer to burn down \$10,000 or \$15,000 worth of timber to grow \$100 worth of "paddy."

### MADMAN ASTROLOGER AMASSES BIG FORTUNE

Makes Over \$500,000 in Two Years by Reading the "Future" to Credulous

His Partner and Secretary Has About \$100,000 to His Credit-Had 70 Branch Offices.

BERLIN, Sept. 25—Herr Heinrich Bettermann, a man of unsound mind, has succeeded in duping many thou-sands of educated men and women by telling their fortunes, and thereby amassing a great fortune for himself

Madgeburg.
At the Cologno District Court yesterday Heinrich Bettermann and Schmidt were indicted on a charge of fraud, and astonishing evidence was given. Bettermann established himself at—the village of Broich, near Muelheim, in west Germany, a little mcretten two years ago as a phrenoloheim, in west Germany, a little more than two years ago as a phrenologist, and subsequently as an astrologer, and by means of extensive advertising offered to fortell future events. Clients of every class and of all ages came from the first day in scores, and soon swelled into hundreds and thousands. It frequently happened that Bettermann's residence at Broich was besieged by credulous persons desirous of hearing his verdict with regard to their fortune.

extent that he was obliged to engage Schmidt as business manager. With Schmidt's assistance her established seventy branches in different parts of the continent, and he dealt with the clients of all these establishments by post. According to the evidence, it appears that Bettermann accumulated a fortune of more than \$500,000 within two years, while the substantial sum of approximately \$100,000 feil to the share of his partner, Schmidt.

In many cases disastrous results ensued from Bettermann's prophecies. One woman is said to have been influenced to such an extent by his prediction of her future that she deserted her husband and children and ranaway to a foreign country with another man. In other families equally unhappy consequences followed Bettermann's prophecies.

At the trial yestorday Professor Aschaffenburg appeared as medical expert, and testified that after thoroughly examining Bettermann he had come to the conclusion that he was a man of unsound man and not responsible for his actions. The professor held to his opinion, although it was shown by sworn evidence that Bettermann had declared after his arrest that "if people are so stupid, I do not understand why I should not exploit them."

In consequence of Professor Aschafferburg's testimony, the court acquited Bettermann, but his accomplice, Schmidt was sentenced to two months' imprisonment.

Southern Hurricane's Awful Larson and Kennedy Rounded

Scene Was One of Horror, Desolation | Seen at Woodside-Head Keeper Notified,

NEW ORLEANS, La., Sept. 26.—One week ago tonight the white-winged ea gulls, flying wildly inland from the gulf, gave warning with their screams of the approach of the muchdreamed West Indian hurricane was to closely follow. Along the entire coast were countless happy fisherfolk and sailormen, their thousands of trim craft and comfortable homes bearing token of the advent of a prosperous season. Today vast flocks of vultures hovered over the devastated lowlands of Southern Louisiana, strewn with innumerable carcasses of animals and men. The scene was one of terror, desolation and death. Stunned by the damage that was wrought by winds and waves, the work of relief did not give the people time to mourn. All energies were bent for the remainder of the week in the task of rescuing those in peril and succoring those who had suffered in the storm. Almost a hundred human bodies have been burned or buried in the marshes where they were drowned. Today Louisiana found time to weep. Remaining from all forms of mirth, the people of the state, irrespecttive of creed, adhered closely to an injunction from Archolshop Blenk to make it pessible for him to "give prompt and substantial aid to the crushed sufferers." The number of those definitely known to have lost their lives is approximately 2000, and there are possibly more undiscovered bodies in the Louisiana marshes.



A tragedy as unexplainable as it was sad occurred recently in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lorne Kyle of Vancouver, .B C., who have been in St. John on a visit to Rev. Dr. Wilson and family. The death of their daughter took place recently under most peculiar circumstances and although evidently the result of foul play, all efforts to solve the identity of the perpetrator and his motives for the crime have been unavailing. He is accompanied on his trip by Mr. John Hendrie, of Vancouver, the recently elected president of the Manufacturers' Association.

At the time this event took place the young lady had been indisposed slightly and had been confined to the house. One evening when all the other members of the family were out she answered a ring of the door bell and going to the door found a package containing a bottle of medicine on the doorstep. There was no one in sight and thinking the messenger had been in a hurry, Miss Kyle took the package in. A few minutes later the telephone bell rang and when she answered, the young lady was informed that it was the druggist speaking. He told her that the medicine had been ordered for her and gave directions as to how to take it. Suspecting nothing wrong, the unfortunate girl took a dose from the bottle. She soon began to feel worse instead of better and when the other members of the family returned she was suffering intensely. Medical assistance was summoned, but it was found impossible to do anything It is not often that persons enter the City Hall seeking to have their names added to the assessors' list in order that they may be allowed the privilege of paying taxes.
