Q. 8:—What is the sprittial state of the Connexion?

A.—There is ground to hope that many of our friends see more clearly their duty in supporting the cause of God, and it is expected with improve-ment of times we shall be in fewer difficulties. Greater attention is being given to our Sunday Schools, and we hope our friends will still, in greater given to our Sunday Schools, and we hope our friends will still, in greater numbers, take hold of this department of the work. Eight stations report as increase in the membership of two hundred and sixty-two. Thirteen report a decrease of two hundred and eighteen, which leaves but a small not increase. This is rather a gloomy aspect at first sight, and forces the enquiry, What is the cause of this state of things? Worldly circumstances have required the removal of several of our members to situations beyond the bounds of the Bible Christian connexion; this and the deaths partly account for the losses sustained; but we fear instability and coldness must Account for many more. To remedy this state of things we urge the necessity of seeking a deeper work of grace, and more regular visiting by both Preachers and Leaders. Let all units to labour for the conversion of souls, and also strive to keep them when they join with us. If we do these things, trust in God, and live by faith, we shall doubtless see better days.

A.—We are thankful that on most of the stations the regular quarterly receipts have increased, as have also the Missionary Receipts, consequently, though we are able to diminish the debt on the Missionary Society but very little, we are thankful that it is not increased, and hope by the united efforts of our friends, we shall be able ultimately to discharge it.

Special and an audicinated to ARTICLE I. NAME. &c.

Section 1. This School shall be called the Bible Christian Sabbath School at You yarre at bus to

Section 2. Any child may become a pupil in this school by making a request either in person or through his or her parents to the Superintendent.

ARTICLE IL-OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTY.

Section 1. The officers of this school shall be a Superintendent, who may have an assistant, Secretary, Treasurer, Librarian, and one or more Teachers for each class.

Section 2. No Teacher shall in future be admitted to this school unless he or she is a member of Society, except in cases where none such can be obtained, and all such exceptional cases shall be laid before the Elders' Meeting for ratification.

Section 3. The Superintendent and his Assistant, if any, the Secretary Treasurer, and Librarian, shall be elected at the January Teachers Meeting, and shall hold office for one year.

N.B. It is suggested that Teachers shall make a rule of visiting absent scholars at their residence.

Section 4. The Teachers shall be elected at any regular Teachers' Meeting, by a two-thirds vote of the Teachers present. New Teachers shall be placed in charge of any class the Teachers' Meeting may see fit.

Section 5. The duties of the Superintendent shall be to preside at the Teachers' Meetings, keep order and see that the Constitution is properly observed, take charge of the Sabbath School, open and close the same with singing and prayer; see that all the teachers and officers discharge their duty aright; and in all cases act as may seem best for the good of the cause. He must be an approved member of the Church, and shall, by virtue of his office be a member of the Elders' Meeting. He shall be a member,

of all committees, ex officio, and shall sign all orders on the Treasurer, as voted by the Teachers' Meeting.

Section 6. The Secretary's duty shall be to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the Teachers' Meeting, and keep the Roll Books for the purpose of entering the attendance of the teachers and pupils. He shall also yearly prepare a report of the progress and standing of the school to be read at the annual meeting. He shall also fill up a blank schedule, (see Appendix A.) and forward the same to the Secretary of the Teachers'

Conference, and the Pastor of the Circuit, not later than the 12th of December in each year.

Section 7. The duties of the Librarian shall be to take charge of the

Library, and deliver and receive the books.

Section 8. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to receive all moneys which may come into the funds of the School, and pay out the same on the

order of the Superintendent,

Section 9. The duties of the Teachers shall be to attend regularly and punctually to their classes, either weekly or fortnightly, as the Teachers' Meeting may agree—it being always preferable to attend weekly—maintain decorum in his or her class; avoid conversation with any other Teacher during school hours, to attend regularly the Teachers' Meetings, and perform any other duty that body may wish; and in every way endeavour to act with circumspection.

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ARTICLE III.—TEACHERS MEETINGS.

Section 1. In order properly to carry on the business of the School a Teachers' Meeting shall be held monthly if possible, at any rate one a quarter, of which Meeting the Superintendent shall be the presiding officer.

Section 2. The following order of business shall be observed:—

1. Opening with singing and prayer, except when the meeting is subse-

quent to another meeting.

2. Reading Minutes of last meeting.
3. Examining the Teachers' Roll Book.

4. Examining Childrens' Roll Book, and changing pupils from one class to another.

5. General Business.

6. Closing.

Section 8. The Peathers' Meeeting shall decide on all business matters of the school; on the reception and expulsion of Teachers; on the expenditure of moneys, &c., and in no case shall the Superintendent grant an

order for any funds without the vote of this Meeting.

Section 4. The Superintendent shall regularly lay before the Eldera Meeting the Minutes of the Teachers Meeting, and that body may, by vote, advise the altering or erasing of any portion, in which case the the Superintendent shall lay said regulation before the next Teachers Meeting, when it shall be adopted.

Section 5. The Travelling Preachers on the circuit are ex officion members of the Teachers Meeting, and should attend whenever practicable.

ARTICLE IV.—MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

Section 1. The Hymn Book to be used in this School shall be that published for Sabbath Schools by the Bible Christian connexion.

Section 2. Whenever a suitable person can be obtained to officiate, an address shall be delivered quarterly to the children instead of their regular lessons.

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Section 3. It is recommended that no recitations shall take place in connection with the Anniversaries, when such are held on the Sabbath Day, and whenever practicable, examinations on portions of Scripture shall take the place of recitations on week days.

Section 4. When practicable a Bible Class for the senior pupils shall

be formed in connection with this School.

Section 5. It is recommended in Schools where there are no Bible Classes that after the lesson has been read; all the Bible and Testament Classes be thrown together and examined by the Superintendent or some other suitable person. the sight on talk of the problem there is deep at

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

Through the mercies of the Most High, we have been preserved through another ecclesiastical year, while many have been taken from our ranks to their reward, to prove the realities of the spirit world. Let it be our chief concern to answer the end for which our lives are prolonged, that we might be fully given up to God through Jesus Christ our Lord, and be more fully the partakers of the Holy Spirit. He will guide us into the way of all truth, and support us under all our trials while passing through this world of bustle and care. We are under great obligations to the God of all our mercies, and therefore should use our influence for the advancement of the cause of the blessed Redeemer, who hath shed his blood freely and

fully for us, yea for all the fallen sons and daughters of Adam.

Sin reigns rampant; God is dishonoured, and souls exposed to His wrath. And shall we be indifferent respecting these things while we have it in our power to better the world? Oh! let us lay these things at heart and be more fully consecrated to the Lord, and given to the work of saving Souls. Thirty-five have been taken from our societies by death during the past year, and we believe have departed in the triumphs of redeeming love. Many have been brought to a saving knowledge of the truth

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on several stations, but we are sorry to state that through death, the removals beyond our field of labour of many others, and the unfaithfulness of not a few our increase is but small. These things call for great humiliation on the part of the Church, and more devout and fathful prayer. The last year has been crowned with many earthly blessings, for which we are brought under renewed obligations to our great benefactor; and while things look promising this year also, let us have grace, that a right application may be made of all committed to our care, as stewards of the manifold favours of God. Let us stir up the gift within us, and prove by blessed experience, that Godliness is profitable to all things,?? and be enabled to say at last, with the great Apostle, "I have fought the fight, I have kept the faith, and henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of life," and may we all ultimately go home to possess it forever, Amen. ner klin hope to known rations mercal of trages on bein division from or

An arrangement has been made at this conference, to direct and assist the young brethren by furnishing them with a course of study for their future guidance, which will, we hope, contribute towards making them efficient

ministers of Christ.

And now, dear fathers and brethren, though some of us have never seen you in the flesh, and never may have the pleasure of doing so, we feel our spirits drawing to yours in kind christian affection, and hope we shall be still drawn closer and closer together in the Lord, till we join the vast seembly of the Saints in our Father's house.
