

CANADA'S COTTON TRADE.

Although this innovation was started by the two largest holders of cotton stock, the first orders were divided amongst the various factories and the new trade has been generally taken. The goods made for the Chinese market are known as "shirting," but instead of being 3½ pounds for 37½ yards, which is the standard weight in England for the Chinese market they weigh about 10 to gymnatics of St. Joseph's college and about 12,000 bales. Although this inno-Chinese market they weigh about 10 to 12 pounds, being 2 to 3½ yards to the pound. They are shipped per Canadian Pacific railway and steamers to Shanghia, at lower rates than American manufacturers can obtain, consequently the Canadian makers reap an additional advantage. Official data of cotton goods exports from United States for the past fiscal year, in comparison with the years preceding show that during the fiscal year 1887 more then 12,000,500 yards of ncolored cottons were reported from the port of San Francisco. During the fiscal year 1888 not one yard of this class of exports by the way of San Francisco is reported. There can be but one explanation. The large movements of uncolored cottons to/Chicago was diverted fo Canadian roads and the Vancouver route during the fiscal year."
