Railway News

Montreal.—On August 23rd, George H. Ham, "the Grand Old Man of the Canadian Pacific," celebrated his seventy-fifth birthday.

Vancouver.—Railways in Canada are in an excellent position to handle the bumper grain crop of the prairie provinces.

Toronto.—American tourists last year spent \$75,000,000 in Canada, according to an estimate made in an official report of the Dominion Government's Parks Department.

Winnipeg.—After a careful survey of reports received from C.P.R. agents throughout the West, it is estimated that this year's crop will approximate 317,000,000 bushels.

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





ECHOES OF THE BIG CELEBRATION

That there was no accident and no disturbance in spite of the tremendous crowd reflects not only upon the crowd but upon Chief of Police Savage and his corps of police.

The services of St. Paul's church the Sunday before the last morning and evening were unusually well attended, due to the fact that so many visitors were in town. The minister at the evening service took as his text "Hendeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace", having especial reference to the fact that the ideals and aspirations of the United States and Canada were largely identical, and that joint celebrations of the nature of the bridge opening emphasized the things which bound two branches of the same race together.

On the hotel registers on Monday last were to be found the names of visitors from a dozen different states and provinces. Some of them from far different points, all here to help us celebrate. Probably a great many of these were touring through this part of the country and stopped over to see what was doing.

The arrangements at the horse races in view of the fact of the great crowds were admirable. The greatest praise is due to President J. Frank Rice, Secretary J. W. Hall and Track Secretary T. M. Richards, jr.

It was found out afterwards, after all the danger was past, that so many people should not have been allowed on the bridge at one time, as there was on one occasion during the day. One of the engineers said that the bridge was built for ordinary traffic, not to hold a great mass of humanity as there was at that time.

The horses in the parade were especially good looking animals, and added greatly to the appearance of things.

Captain Lawson mounted on his white horse led the parade in truly military fashion.

Here, there, and everywhere, wherever he was needed, having in mind it would seem almost very detail, Martin Theriault, to whom is due the success of the celebration, kept at it from early morning until late at night. Martin has a great memory, a well poised mind, an ideal way of getting along with others, a fine faculty for organization and with it all his head is of the usual size. The town could not have chosen a better man for the stupendous task of organizing and carrying through the joint celebration. Here's to you old scout.

His Worship the Mayor, Max D. Cormier, Plus Michaud, M. P., Hon. Remi Daigle and Hon. J. E. Michaud, local men on the program, Hon. Remi Daigle coming from across the bridge, all did themselves and their respective towns proud in their speeches at Levite Cyr's field, at the Court House, and in the evening at the banquet. Governor Baxter captivated his audience in his brief speeches that night too.

It was a Good banquet, at a Good hotel, and the proprietor is a Good man.

The dances held on platforms at Levite Cyr's field in the evening were run by some of the men in the Fraser Companies employ. Two orchestras were in attendance—"Mikes Merry Musicians" and the local band from the Indian reservation. The net receipts were small. It was intended that the proceeds should be used as a nucleus for a sick benefit fund. Altho' the receipts were small it is intended that the fund shall be added to at the earliest possible moment.

The boys of the Alert Club won the second prize for the most comical exhibition. The Kazoo Band was funny. The two drug stores in town are now selling faster than they ever sold before, their patent hair growers, as they are not able to use the safety razor yet. They are watching daily for signs of growth, however.

The miniature bridges in the Four-ier Ladies' Tailor Shop on Canada Road and the one in Joseph David's store on the same street have attracted a great deal of attention.

The arch made of evergreens on the Madawaska side of the river erected by the townspeople there, was a fine piece of work, and has been the subject of mention by hundreds of people both of Edmundston and elsewhere.

It was very much regretted that the Lieutenant Governor, the Hon. William Pugsley, and Premier Foster were not able to be present at the celebration.

The car decorated and labelled Edmundston Fire Department, got up by the Fraser Company staff, Stewart White in charge, was such a good imitation that scores of people really thought that it belonged to the fire department of the town.

To hear he crowd sing "Allodette" at the banquet was a treat. Governor

Baxter looked as if he hugely enjoyed it.

Everybody remarks about the high order of the speaking at the banquet and the poem recited by J. M. Stevens, K. C., in which the fact that all along our border between Canada and the United States there are no forts or soldiers was so fitting that you could have heard a pin drop.

REV. J. J. GRAHAME DIES SUDDENLY

Word was received on Sunday afternoon by the Rev. John Hardwick that the Rev. J. J. Grahame, minister of the Presbyterian church at Grand Falls, had passed away quite suddenly on Sunday afternoon. The deceased gentleman had been in his usual health up to the time of his death. In the afternoon he complained of not feeling well and of a pain in his arm. Mrs. Grahame applied hot pads to the arm, but before anyone realized that the illness was serious he passed away.

Mr. Grahame had been minister of the Grand Falls church for about two years, and was very greatly beloved by his people. Before coming to Grand Falls he was minister of the combined charge of Hampton and Rotheray. He was about forty-six years of age, and a graduate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal. He was attending college part of the time that Mr. Hardwick was there, and was present at the induction of Mr. Hardwick when he was installed as pastor of St. Paul's congregation a few months ago. A son living in Montreal arrived home on the train on Monday. The funeral service was held on Tuesday. The sympathy of a devoted congregation goes out to his widow and children. THE OBSERVER MAN OBSERVES

That Reverend Dr. F. W. Patterson of Winnipeg is "spoken of" as the new President of Acadia University. If the Observer mistakes not Dr. Patterson is a Carleton County boy who attended Normal School in the days of Dr. W. L. Tracey and Reverend A. A. Rideout. Some years ago he attended a Baptist Association in Hartland speaking to a large audience on western missions. Some members of Acadia will probably remember his witty description of Canada as a country "where railroads run from ocean to ocean and telephone wires from pole to pole."

That the school trustees according to their recent communication with the Observer are busily engaged. "Plans for the new school house are being made and will hold a public meeting to discuss the matter in the near future." It is certainly good news and shows up greatly these two salient points. First, it means the taking of the public into your confidence and putting all the cards on the table. If this had been done before and the rate payers had been given information to which they were entitled without going after the Trustees with a club, the public would certainly have been better satisfied and the reputation of the Trustees would have remained unimpaired.

Secondly, power of the press was most manifest from two little editorials in the Observer, and lo! the Trustees came across with the desired information and told the taxpayers how they proposed spending their money.

That the Trustees in their recent letter to the Observer in regard to the school affairs used the following words: "The crime of being absolute failures and mentally dead which has with such vehemence been charged upon us the trustees of Hartland School District we shall neither attempt to palliate or deny, but content ourselves with hoping that we may be among that number whose follies have ceased with the passing years and not of those who in spite of accumulated wisdom build without first counting the cost."

That in the British Parliament in 1741, in his report to Walpole, William Pitt used the following familiar sentence: "The atrocious crime of being a young man, which the Honorable gentleman has with such spirit and decency charged against me I shall attempt neither to palliate nor deny but content myself with the thought that I may be one of those whose follies cease with their youth and not of that number who are ignorant in spite of experience." It is really remarkable how great minds run in the same channel.







AROOSTOOK POTATO OUTLOOK

The potato outlook in Aroostook is very far from rosy. Not much digging or marketing is just now going on, partly owing to the earliness of the season and largely to the fact that the fairs have not yet got over their business-destroying and work-destroying course. About a dollar is the standard price in Fort Fairfield. Some three or four shippers are buying, but many have not yet begun. A good many fields will not pay for the fertilizer used. When we couple this fact with the fact that we are now undergoing the second hard season, we are led to inquire where the growers of such potatoes will get off? It does not take much of a genius to figure out where. Of course many fields are better than the 80 or 40 barrels to the acre just referred to, and a few are good, but whether any fields are good enough to allow the growers to make even a small profit at the prices they will probably have to take is indeed a question. If Aroostook had only held her seed potato trade, as she could easily have done by industry, great care and absolute fairness and squareness, she would be all right, but she is likely to find over and over again that, considering the terrible freight rates she has to pay, she can not always successfully compete in market stock with states of New York and Pennsylvania, Michigan and Wisconsin.


