

Washington to infuse a portion of his spirited notions into the President, that the line may be run before the first of next September, with the threat that if this counsel be disregarded, "Commodore Davies" will run it himself! Stop; it is a threat, and that must be done, "even if it should require the whole military force of the state to enforce it."

The people of Maine are generally well educated, and have numerous institutions where free discussion is held for the elucidation of truth. All are equally liable to the prejudices which they have imbibed, and most men are swayed by their opinions where their property is brought into question, or even what they think is their property; but we dare to hazard the opinion that in all well ordered communities in the state of Maine, any coercion or ultra measure affecting the national dispute about boundaries would not receive their sanction; and therefore we come to our first position respecting the law encouraging a surreptitious possession of the lands in dispute, and say, that such a measure is fraught with the seeds of ill advice, ill feeling, and dangerous results; conceived by reckless demagogues, unworthy of honest dealing, and utterly futile in its aim.

On Monday last, as PATRICK DANVER was in the act of showing out a slab from one of the pits at the Lower Falls of the Magalloway, the end of it was caught by the stream, and before he could extricate himself, the slab precipitated him into the water. He was fully over which he was hauled out by the water, and his body was not yet found. He was a native of Ireland, about twenty six years of age, and his home in an irreproachable character.

The brig St. Mungo, of St. Stephen, N. B. John W. Heney, master, sailed from West Point for Barbadoes, with a cargo of lumber, March 29, 1838. The first three days of her passage the weather was fine and pleasant. But about noon of the 29th of March, the weather changed, and became thick and hazy, with heavy showers and strong wind. But this being carried whole sail till three o'clock the afternoon. The wind increasing, she was put under easy sail. At six o'clock that evening, she was lost with her head S. S. W., lat. 39.42, long. 64.39 W. The wind continued to increase till about 8 o'clock of the morning of the 30th. At that hour it veered suddenly, and blew in tremendous squalls from the N. W. The brig labored and strained dreadfully, and shipped many and heavy seas. They swept the decks entirely clean, and finally upset her. When she went over, Capt. Heney, the first mate and three seamen, were on deck, and clung to the main chains and were saved. But the seamen, Edward Freeman and John McHenry, were in the fore aloft, and were drowned. Another seaman, Richard Thorne, who was in the main chains and near the captain, was also drowned. The brig remained thus up at about two hours, and until Capt. Heney cut away the leavards of the main rigging with his jack-knife. Soon after the leavards were cut, the mainmast went by the board, and the vessel righted. During all this time the wind blew a perfect hurricane, and raged furiously, and the rain came down in torrents. The survivors fastened themselves to the weather rail of the quarter deck, and continued three days without food and without drink and gave themselves up for lost. On the 3d of April, the storm began to abate, and the wind to blow from the S. W. and the sea to go down; and one of the crew hooked up a bag of rice powder, which "tasted good." About 11 o'clock of the forenoon, a brig was discovered on the fore-peak. Capt. Heney immediately put out a red shirt from his fore-topmast rigging, which was seen by the brig, as she immediately stood for the St. Mungo. She was then to be the Granville, of Halifax, bound for Jamaica. She took off the survivors, who were put on board nine days. They were put transferred to the schooner Dart, bound to Liverpool, N. B. On the 25th of April, when within about 30 miles of Halifax, they were put on board a coaster bound to Halifax, where they arrived safely. Capt. Heney states that he and his men were treated with great kindness on board the Granville, and on board the Dart, and he avails himself of the notice of the disaster to convey to Capt. Oxford of the Granville, and to Capt. Godfrey of the Dart, his sincere gratitude for their humane and considerate treatment.

On the 27th ultimo, at his residence in Woodstock, after one week's illness, John Bedell, Esquire, at the advanced age of 88.

On Saturday the 12th inst., at his residence in King's County, General John Corry, aged 87 years. General Corry commenced his military career as a Volunteer at the battle of Bunker's Hill, soon rose to the position of Captain in the Orange Rangers, from which he exchanged into the New York Volunteers, and with that corps went to Georgia in 1778. At the battle of Savannah, at that of Hobkirk's Hill, under Lord Rawdon, at the action of Cane Creek near Charleston, and on various other occasions, he conducted himself in the most gallant manner. On the 17th September, 1781, the battle of Eutaw was commenced by General Mifflin, who highly distinguished himself, and to such an extent as to draw forth the admiration of the American General Greene, in his despatches to Congress. "Brevet Major John Corry, of the New York Volunteers, having repeatedly received the public thanks of the principal Officers under whose command he has served, and on the 26th September, 1781, having distinguished himself very particularly, is for those services appointed Major of the King's American Regiment, vacant by the death of Major Grant."

At the Peace of 1783, Major Corry retired with his family to this Province, where he has resided ever since, and where he filled the situation of Representative to the House of Assembly, for King's County, and Chief Magistrate of the same. During the last American War, he raised a Regiment, which was disbanded again in 1815.

By nature and habit industrious, and possessing talents of great extent for public business, his life has been of much advantage to those around him, who have long been in the habit of consulting him on their various affairs, and the poor have ever found him a kind though unostentatious friend.

He has left a wife and large family to lament his departure, though his advanced period of life must have long prepared them for such an event.

At Elgin, Mrs. Bachan, at the advanced age of 107 years. This lady lived in Elgin, from her infancy. She was in the year of the rebellion, 1745, servant to Lady Ardscoil, who at that time resided in the house formerly belonging to the Earl of Sutherland, and lately called Bachan's Hall, a portion of the east wing of which still stands. Prince Charles Stuart, on his way to Culloden, slept in this house, and the subject of the present notice helped to make his bed. She used to relate that her mistress, Lady Ardscoil, (a staunch Jacobite) laid aside the sheets in which the Prince had lain, and gave strict orders that when she died, they might be used as her shroud.

At St. George's, on Saturday last, in the 25th year of his age, LIEUTENANT JAMES HENRY, of Her Majesty's 20th Regiment, after a severe illness, deeply and sincerely regretted by his brother Officers, and all who knew him. He has left a Widow—to whom he has been united for the brief period of only four months—to mourn her sad bereavement.

Ordered, That there be two Ferries from St. Andrews to the American shore, the first to commence at Indian Point and terminate at the brook at Chatty's Cove. The second to commence at the said Chatty's Cove and terminate one mile above Joe's Point.

Ordered, That the person leasing the Ferry at Joe's Point shall be compelled to keep one Gondolo and two good and sufficient Boats. That the person leasing the Ferry from Indian Point to Chatty's Cove shall in like manner be compelled to keep two good and sufficient Boats at all times in readiness for the accommodation of Passengers, and subject to the inspection and instructions of the Committee appointed to superintend and regulate the same; and in the event of any improper or careless conduct on the part of the said Ferryman, any three Magistrates belonging to the Parish may deprive them of the benefit of said Ferries.

By nature and habits industrious, and possessing talents of great extent for public business, his life has been of such advantage to those around him, who have long been in the habit of consulting him on the various subjects of business, that they have ever found him a kind though unostentatious friend.

He has left a wife and large family to lament his departure, though his advanced period of life must have long pre-occupied him for such an event.

At Elgin, N. B., on the 10th inst., at the advanced age of 107 years. This long liver died in Elgin for his servant. She was in the year of the rebellion 1747, infatuated by Lady Arradoul, who at that time presided in the house formerly belonging to the Earls of Sutherland, and lately called Balcarras, (a part) of the east wing of which still stands. Prince Charles Stuart, on his way of Calcutta, stopped on the various roads, and at the present notice she helped make his bed. She used to relate that her mistress, Lady Arradoul, (a staunch Jacobite), laid aside the sheets in which the Prince had lain, and gave them to her, when she died, they might be used as her shroud.

At St. George's, on Saturday last, in the 25th year of his age, LIEUTENANT JAMES BOWEN, of Her Majesty's 30th Regiment, after a severe illness, deeply and suddenly, regretted by his brothers Officers, and all who knew him.—He has left a widow—to whom he has been united for the brief period of only four months—to mourn her sad bereavement.—*Frederick Gazette.*
