



London, March 6. - A deputation numbering over 200 gentlemen, .representing 87 agricultural societies, today visited Westminster Hall in the House tion of only \$85,000 on the previous of Commons, and interviewed the president of the board of agriculture. with the object of raving maintained the present restrictions on the importation of Canadian cattle.

Several speakers, among whom were the presidents of the Royal Agricultural Society, the British Dairy Farmers' Association, the Royal Dublin Society, and other prominent agriculturists, spoke strongly against the removal of the restrictions. Others laid stress on the great difficulty of patroling the Canadian frontier and preventing American cattle coming in. Lord Carrington, replying, said: "My colleagues desire me to say that they are not in any way blind to the existence of a very strong feeling of apprehension, which they are told exists, and which undoubtedly exist in the minds of a very large proportion, that change in the law would mean a serious danger to the community at large."

Lord Carrington, referring to Hon. Sidney Fisher's resolution in the Canadian Commons that the embargo was an unfriendly act, said Mr. Fisher was a typical Canadian, and one whose opinion was worthy of all attention; but English cattle, arriving in Canada, were kept two months in quarantine, and at the owner's risk. That was the kind of preference that is no good for this country.






