THREE HUNDRED BELGIANS AND MANY HUN SOLDIERS KILLED IN ANTWERP RIOT

Call Upon Inhabitants for Work in Germany Starts Bloody Revolt, in Which Many Civilians and Soldiers Are Slain.

London, Dec. 4.—12:30 p.m.—Two Belgians who have arrived at Sluiskill, Holland, from Ghent, report that there was a revolt in Antwerp on November 30, in which between two or three hundred inhabitants and many German soldiers are said to have been killed, according to a Reuter Amsterdam dispatch today, quoting a Sluiskill correspondent.

Shake-Up in the Govt. Agreed To By King George Announced By Asquith

His Majesty Approves Plan of Reconstruction, and the Premier Declares There Will Be No Change in the Policy Pursued Since Beginning of War.

London, Dec. 4.-4:10 p.m.-Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that King George had approved of a reconstruction of the Government. Mr. Asquith suggested that after today's business had been concluded, the House adjourn until Thursday.

Premier Asquith stated that the reconstruction of the Government involved no departure in any shape or form from the policy pursued since the beginning of the war. He did not deny that the resignations of all the ministers were in his hands.

Petrograd, Dec. 4.-Via London, 2 p.m.-Fighting between Russian troops and Austro-German forces in the wooded Carpathians continues, says today's Russian official statement. One height southwest of Jablonitza, the announcement adds, was captured yesterday by the Russians. The text reads:

"Western front: An attempt by German scouts to approach our wire entanglements in the region of Shelvov was arrested by our fire.

"In the wooded Carpathians battles for individual heights continue. One of our detachments, after artillery preparation, captured 'a height three versts south of Jablonitza (on the Bialy-Cheremosh River, 35 miles south of Kolomea.)"
