Toronto, May 13.-According to individual statements made today, 80 per cent of the U. F. O. members of the Ontario Legislature refused to abide by the recall plank of their platform, or were requested not to do so by their constituents.

During the course of the canvass some of the members, after they had stated whether they had or had not signed the declaration, decided not to comment on the grounds as in their constituencies this might become known and might cause dissatisfaction among those who are under the impression that the recall was generally signed.





OTTAWA, May 12.—Again in the House today the franchise bill held the stage. During practically the whole afternoon and evening one clause was under discussion in committee—the clause providing for the preparation of voters' lists. Discussion ranged chiefly around a suggestion by Hon. W. S. Flelding that in Nova Scotia provincial lists would be used. The suggestion was combatted by the solicitor-general. He did not think that Nova Scotia lists would be satisfactory. For one reason, appeals in Nova Scotia went to a sheriff, who generally had no legal training, and was not qualified to give an opinion on a legal point.

A rather prosaic day was interspersed with lively incidents. Early in the sitting R. H. Butts of Cape Breton attacked Hon. W. S. Fielding. When prime minister of Nova Scotia, Mr. Butts declared, Mr. Fielding had disfranchised British subjects. Now Mr. Fielding was leading the cause of the alien. "In '90," shouted Mr. Butts, "you were taken by some freak of fortune into the Laurier cabinet." The chairman intervened, but banging his desk, Mr. Butts demanded an answer. "No." Mr. Butts called out, "don't answer me! If you do, I will drag you across to the library and show you Hansard of the debate." But Mr. Fielding payed no attention to the attack.







In the United States 535 vessels were built during the periold, holding a tonnage of 2,537,000, or a decrease of 112 vessels and 393,000 tons. It will thus be seen that while in Britain there is still an increase in the turn-out of shipping, there is a decrease in both the United States and Canada

There was none of the cheering which in times gone by has welcomed an absent leader back, none of the spontaneity of acclaim which in other days has rocked the roof. It was a studied effort and not prolonged. The premier received the welcome with a smile, remained in the chamber in a pre-occu-pled attitude for a little space, talked to a few of his next-door desk mates, crossed the floor and shook Hon. W. crossed the floor and shook Hon. W.
L. Mackenzie King and other members of the Opposition by the hand,
and went out.







COMMITTEE INQUIRES

New York Chamber of Commerce Is Looking Into Feasibility of Scheme.

New York, May 12.—An investigation of the "one big union of citizens" idea and its feasibility in protecting American communities from possible fuel or food famines during strikes, is now In a resolution the veterans approved the actions of Cols. AERIAL ROUTE FROM PACIFIC TO AMAZON TO SURMOUNT ANDES

poses Plan.

London, April 28.—(Associated Press),
—Establishment of an aerial route from

One of the Andes ridges can be negotiated at a height of 7,000 feet, but there is another rising to 15,600 feet.

"Peru," he continued, "is peculiarly suitable for aerial traffic. Aerial high-ways will undoubtedly play a large part in the future development of that country. It is of importance that ranid try. 

This morning (May 12) we noted four new arrivals, the Tennessee Warbler, the Magnolia Warbler, the Blue-Headed Vireo and the Olive-Backed Thrush. 

OF FREIGHT ENTAILS **ENORMOUS CLAIMS**

Railways During Past Year Paid More Than \$105 .-000,000.

The total amount paid last year by railways of the United States and Canada in claims for loss and damage of freight was over \$105,000,000, E. Arnold, Grand Trunk freight claims agent, told an audience of shippers and manufac-turers in the Chamber of Commerce board room Wednesday afternoon. John M. Dillon presided.

The claims bill met last year by the Grand Trunk Canadian lines alone was \$1,490,000, or 2.34 per cent of its total freight earnings.

Included in this amount were the following items: Unlocated damage, \$341,000; unlocated loss of entire packages, \$288,000; loss from packages, \$183,000; straight robberies, \$161,000. Wrecks also provided a considerable item.

Because fewer claims are made on goods shipped in strong containers and strapped packages, Mr. Arnold stated that Canadian and American roads were contemplating fixing two different freight rates, one on strapped and the other, higher rate, on unstrapped pack ages.


