#### **WOMEN IN FRANCE** DISDAIN POLITICS

Prefer Old-Fashioned Home Duties and Pre-War Status.

PARIS, Oct. 28.—In studying the women of the countries of Europe, those of France are a great contrast to all others. Nearly everywhere else the war accomplished something in educating them to their political responsibilities. In France, however, the women seem to have unprotestingly returned to their pre-war condition. Only a small group is interested in the suffrage question, and there is no real effort being made to secure the franchise.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26 .- Discussing a ondon cable that observation during London cable that observation during the recent eclipse showed the moon was about twelve miles ahead of its schedule, Dr. Ernest William Brown of Yale, said today that the moon has been off its course for at least 250 years. It makes a net gain of two seconds a century in the time of its seconds a century in the time of its revolutions around the earth.

ONDON, England, Oct. 27.-The century of perfect peace between the United States and Canada was cited as an example to the world by Viscount James Bryce, at a luncheon in his honor today by the English

speaking Union. The disarmament agreement, affecting three thousand miles of boundary between Canada and the United States, is an arrangement which should be made world-wide, he said.

Viscount Bryce was formally welcomed home after his recent lecture tour of the United States. He interpreted the recent presidential election in the United States as a non-acceptance of the Versailles treaty in its present form, but declared it did not mean aloofness and isolation on the part of the United States. He urged co-operation with the United States on the part of the British delegates to the Washington conference.



"the work has grown and rown beyond all belief since it was first aunched three years ago last February, and, with the public health side, for which there is quite adequate provision at the present time, another phase has presented itself, the social welfare. What is the use of a visiting nurse telling a mother her children should have meat every few when there is no have meat every day, when there is no money to buy meat, let alone other necessaries? Cases such as that are continually presenting themselves owing to unemployment and other causes, of families that need, not financial relief, but a real helping hand, some-body to stand by them and see that get on their feet, in a position help themselves. We want in London the kind of assistance that is given by

the Big Sisters and Big Brothers. "In our experience in London, we have found that the best relief results when a club or other organization 'adopts' a family and stands by it in a big brotherly or sisterly way. For example, the 'I Serve' Club of Crony Memorial Church has adopted one family: the Class 27 of Dundas Capter. Memorial Church has adopted one child; the Class 27 of Dundas Center Methodist Church another. We can supply families for any ciubs, classes other organizations willing to assum responsibility for them."

paid by the day, for weighing and measuring children brought to the measuring children brought to the clinics, assisting the mothers with the dressing of the little ones, seeing that the cases get to the doctor in right rotation and other routine, when this work could be done just as well by lay assistants?" is a question raised by Miss Smith.

"To be sure," she states, "some experience is necessary for accuracy and dispatch in weighing and measuring the children, but this can be acquired after a few times. I have been interested in the extent to which such volunteer assistance is regularly given in other cities, Hamilton, Toronto and New York, for example."







"While American valuation will be revolutionary in a sense, my conviction, born of a quarter of a century of experience in making, administrating and judicially interpreting our tariff laws, covinces me that a properly drawn American valuation tariff would not only increase our revenues without increasing our burdens, would form more ample protection to our producers and laborers, observe more strictly our treaty obligations, and, ultimately, be so satisfactory to both importers and manufacturers that all would acclaim its wisdom."

That the rehabilitation of Europe is necessary to a permanent return of rosperity to this country is still the fixed idea of practically every econo-mist. Investment of surplus United States funds in foreign enterprises has been urged as one remedial measure to the present slump in exports by sevral members of the American Manu-

facturers' Export Association.

Drastic taxation programs that would nsure the solvency of certain foreign governments has resulted in hesitation when it comes to exporting American capital abroad, for, despite the solvency of large European enterprises, there must be faith in the stability of the governments under which they operate. 





On a bed lay a loaded shotgun! A caretaker in charge made sure he knew the person accompanying the stranger before the door was unlocked. The "boss"—head of the ring—was in Lan-sing, the state capital, "on business!" There is an open space beside the house and usually one or two touring cars standing there. These machines bring the liquor from Ecorse, where it it landed from launches plying between there and Canada. These same cars deliver the liquor in case lots at

night to city patrons. Trunks are often used to ship smug-gled liquor from Detroit to other cities, large quatities going to Chicago. In shipping a trunk of bottled whisky the trunks sometimes are checked on dup-licate tickets. Then one is destroyed and the baggage checks are sent to the destination where the agent, to escape possible detection, sends an unsuspecting porter after the trunks.

Bad for Shipment. The drawback to any shipment of pottled liquor in small quantities is that no bottle is ever quite full, and no matter how well the bottles are packed in cotton or staw, the handlers of the trunk or box can always hear the peculiar, unmistakable sound of liquor as the bottles are shaken in transit.

Consequently much of it never reaches






