SIGNALMEN TO STAY AT POSTS PENDING CALL

Head of Brotherhood Promises To Maintain Status Quo For Present.

EXPECT SETTLEMENT SOON

2.500 Molders Employed On Railroads Authorized To Strike.

CHICAGO, July 6 .- A threatened extension of the strike of railway shopmen to include 12,000 signalmen was prevented today by members of the United States Railroad Labor Board, when D. W. Heit, head of the withhold strike orders, maintenance Brotherhood of Railroad Signalmen, which has been taking a strike vote, promised to maintain the status quo pending further conferences.

Meanwhile, railway circles ex pressed strong hopes of a quick setlement of the shopmen's strike. B. M. Jewell, head of the shopmen, to- Southern Pacific. One man was day reiterated former statements that the shopmen were willing to consider a settlement proposition submitted by any authoritative body.

The situation is improving, so far as the strike is concerned, Mr. Jewell asserted, saying that he had received reports from several points that what men who had remained at work last Saturday had now joined the

Mr. Jewell said he received a telegram from J. F. Valentine of Cin-cinnati, head of the International Molders' Union, authorizing a walkout of 2,500 molders employed on the wailroads.

WILLING TO CONFER.

CHICAGO, July 6.—The strike of railway shopmen assumed a more conciliatory aspect today, the sixth since the nation-wide walkout, and feeling became more general that the last 24 hours had shown a marked trend toward peace, despite increased

disorders at scattered points.

It was believed that yesterday's exchange of letters between Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the United States Railroad Labor Board, and Bert M. Jewell, head of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, probably opened the way for negotiations. Jewell's statement that the shop

crafts are willing to confer with anybody authorized by the railroads to bring peace proposals was accepted as a promising indication of a speedy return to normal conditions. Another harbinger of peace was that a number of railroads which had been farming out shop work to contractors are said by Mr. Hooper to be ready to abolish the contrac system, the main issue in the shop-men's strike, according to returns in the strike referendum. Although the vote to strike in protest against the \$50,000,000 wage reduction of July was declared to have been over whelming, Mr. Jewell announced that the question of protesting against the contracting of labor polled the heaviest strike vote of the three matters put up to the shopmen.



LAWN DEFECTS

Provincial Commissioner Williams Inspects Dwellings Claimed To Be Faulty.

Suggesting a solution to the defects in dwellings, erected on Pine Lawn by the London Housing Commission, the report of Provincial Housing Commissioner Williams of Toronto, who investigated these homes last week, was received by City Clerk S. Baker.

The report, which was made on request of the London Housing Commission, points out that a number of roofs of these dwellings leak in several places, and that the walls admit rain under the window sills. While he does not suggest that the roofs be re-shingled, Inspector Williams does advise that they be repaired by the contractors, and if satisfactory that the commission obtain a statement to this effect from

Cautions Owner.

In his report the inspector cautions the owners of these houses not to sign statements to the effect that the roofs have been repaired satisfactorily until they have stood the test of several "driving rains." government officer suggess "kalomining the ceilings to detect leaks in the roofs." He places the responsibility for the defects on Hayman & Willis, the contractors, who erected the dwellings.

As these men have promised make good the defects, members of the housing commission declare that all probability of trouble has been reduced to a minimum.

"There is no doubt that a number of roofs leak in different places,' says he report in part, which City Clerk Baker refused to divulge to the press "As leak stains are very pronounced on the interior plastering. I place responsibility on Mr. Arthur Mould, sub-contractor for the roofs through the contractors, Hayman & Willis."

W. Wood of the United Farmers of Alberta, in an address on the wheat board given before the members of the board of trade today.

"The price of wheat will never be stabilized unless such a board is es-tablished. Under the present system we are unable to control the flow of wheat to the market, and consequently we cannot hope to con-tro! the price," he said.

Strawberry Rice Meringue

THIS dessert can be made using any fruit canned or fresh, but is particularly good with fresh strawberries, raspberries or peaches. It being a hearty dessert the dinner preceding should be rather

Cook in a double boiler (or in a sauce pan set in another pan containing boiling water) one quart of milk, the grated rind of half a lemon and one cup of well washed rice. It will take from one to one and a half hours to cook the rice thoroughly.

Add one-half cup sugar, the yolks of three eggs and one-fourth teaspoon of salt. Cook five minutes and turn into a border mold. In 10 minutes turn out into dish or platter which can be placed in the oven. Have ready a box of strawberries, sweetened to taste, and a meringue made as follows:

Whites of three eggs beaten until stiff and one-half cup powdered sugar, added gradually while continuing the beating until the mixture will hold its shape. Add one-half teaspoon vanilla. Fill the center of the rice border with the berries, completely cover rice and berries with the meringue. Set in a moderate oven eight minutes, or until a light brown. Serve warm or cold. NOTE: If you have no border mold use any mold and surround







Those two letters, both written in April of that year 1789, had for only immediate effect to increase the activity with which Andre-Louis Moreau was being sought.

Yet Chapelier would have found Andre-Louis to urge upon him once again to take up a political career. The electors of Nantes would have found him—at least, they would have found Omnes Omnibus on each of the several occasions when a vacancy occurred in their body. And the Marquis de la Tour d'Azyr would have found him that they might send him to the gallows.

With a purpose no less vindictive was he being sought by M. Binet, now unhappily recovered from his wound to face completest ruin. His troupe had deserted him during his illness. M. le Marquis, prevented by the riot from expressing in person to Mile. Binet his purpose of making an end to their relations, had been constrained to write to her to that effect from Azyr a few days

Meanwhile the flercely-sought Andre-Louis Moreau had gone to earth com-pletely for the present. And the brisk police of Paris, urged on by the King's Lieutenant from Rennes, hunted for him in vain. Yet he might have been found in a house in the Rue du Hasard within a stone's throw of the Palais

He was destitute. So desperate was his case that, strolling one gusty April morning down the Rue du Hasard, with his nose in the wind, looking for what might be picked up, he stopped to read a notice outside the door of a house. The notice announced that a young man of good address, with some knowledge of swordsmanship, was required by M. Bertrand des Amis on the second floor. Above this notice was a black floor. Above this notice was a black oblong board, and on this shield, in letters of gold, ran the legend:

BERTRAND DES AMIS,

Maitre en fait d'Armes des Academies du Roi.

Ontario Workmen's Compensation Board Reveals Activities For Year.

45,191 Claims of Workmen Settled Without Redress To Courts.

TORONTO, July 6 .- According to the 1921 report of the workmen's compensation board for Ontario, handed to The London Advertiser today, the board during the year paid out \$6,189,263.49 in settlement of 45,-191 accident claims.

This shows a considerable decrease as compared with 1920, when compensations totalled \$7,780,145.25 paid on 54,851 accidents. Fatal accidents numbered 386 in 1921 and 452 in 1920. This large sum meant an outlay of \$20,637 per day, covered by 485 checks, while the reports of the accidents averaged 151 daily.

The workmen's compensation act during its seven years of operation has dealt with 271,807 claims, for which \$27,947,653.45 was awarded in compensation and medical aid bene-Employers pay the cost and the board merely distributes the money in a way that makes unneces-sary all the claims for damages through the courts, which were so frequent in the old days.

Now for every \$100 of payroll the

employer pays the board \$1.12, and out of the huge sum of two and three-quarter billion dollars of payroll in Ontario industrial concerns have paid the province money sufficient to meet nearly 28 millions in claims.

Those who benefit are not only the workmen crippled or injured in the industries covered by the act, but also widows, children and parents of workmen who have been killed. Ontario was the first to adopt this humane act to alleviate distress among the victims of accidents and their families, and five other provinces are following Ontario's ex-

Distinguishing features of the act are collective liability of the employers in each class of industry, and simplicity and inexpensiveness of pro-

It differs from the old law which it superseded by covering all accidents arising out of and in the course of the employment instead of merely hose which were caused by the negligence or breach of duty of the employers, and in substituting informal administration by a board for the technicality and stringency of court procedure.

It differs from the compensation laws of most of the United States in making the employers in the various classes of industry collectively, and not individually, liable for pay ment of the benefits, though certain employers, such as railway and navigation companies, municipalities, etc., included in what is known as schedule 2, are upon the individual liability basis.

TRY TO INTERDICT ADELARD DELORME

Brother-in-Law Wants Council of Family To Be Held in Court July 18.

MONTREAL, July 6.-Application made by Adelard Testreault, a brother-in-law, in superior court this morning before Mr. Justice Lafon-taine in chambers. The request asks also that a council of the family be called on July 18, in accordance with the legal practice. The court assented to this date.

An insane, furious or otherwise mentally unbalanced person may not, according to law, exercise any civil acts, such as the administration of an estate, or even his own property. In such an event as the present, a relative, if one exists, must present to the superior court a petition asking that the person thus afflicted be interdicted or prevented from acting in any administrative capacity.

Before, however, the courts will assent, there must be called a family council of seven relatives of the person, who are asked to submit evidence as to the mental capacity

of the insane one.



J. J. Morrison States New Section of Canadian Council of Agriculture Proposed.

MAY FORM BRANCH IN EAST

OTTAWA, July 6 .- J. J. Morrison, secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario, arrived in Ottawa during the morning for the purpose of attending the Eastern Ontario Live Stock Shippers' convention.

Mr. Morrison expressed himself as "extremely well satisfied with the progress of events," as a result of his visit to the Maritime Provinces. He intimated that it has been tentatively proposed to establish an eastern section of the Canadian Council of Agriculture to deal with mat-ters which affect solely the eastern part of the Dominion, with Fort William as the probable point of division. Since the league was created under the terms of the treaty of Versailles there has been criticism of the basis on which the smaller nations have had to contribute.

Under an amendment to the covenant, Canada now contributes about \$150,000 a year, having been reduced from \$200,000. There is, however, a stronger feeling that the contribution should be still further reduced


