WAITED NEARLY 90 YEARS TO SEE A SUN'S ECLIPSE

William Bruce of Hamilton Is Skipper of the Good Ship "Observatory"-He Charts the Heavens

THERE is one man in Canada who has been waiting nearly 90 years for an eclipse of the sun. He is now in his 93rd year and his wish has at last been gratified.

Away back in 1833 he was born on the island of Uist in the Shetlands, christened William, and shortly afterwards brought out to Canada by his parents, who settled in Hamilton, Ontario. He seems to have been an astronomer from the day he could walk. To-day he is still carrying on, wearing his 92 years with a smile, a sprightliness and jauntiness that staggers.

Mr. Bruce has been awaiting the eclipse with the same keenness with which he watched 75 years ago when Mars swung past the earth, and he is one of the few remaining members of that early astronomical reception committee on hand last fall to bid Mars god-speed a second time as that planet passed once more.


He has erected in the middle of his eight-acre grounds in Hamilton a curious old ship which he calls "the observatory" and a giance at the logbook of this planetary vessel reveals the fact that thousands have visited him and enjoyed his famous tours of the heavens.

His pseudo-marine observatory is one of the finest in the dominion, fully equipped with small telescopes and lenses and a large five-inch one in the rotunda. "The observatory" has an adjustable roof, a reading-room, a flat deck and outside stairs leading to it with a glass tower from which storms and lightning may be viewed in complete safety and shelter.

At the bridge of this ship stands the old sky pilot, still steady of hand and head, directing his course through space while his passengers glimpse the wonders, not of Europe or Asia or any countries on that well-known itinerary of competitive tours, but of Mars with her snowcapped poles, reddish brown land, bluish water and canals fringed with vegetation. They survey Venus with its higher mountains. Jupiter with its great storms and terrific heat. Saturn and Mercury are also touched upon, and the trips are gratis.

While a glimpse of the inhabitants of these planets is not included, Mr. Bruce states that they will be habitable. "The time was," he remarks, "when life could not exist on earth, but after many years it became possible, and what is possible on earth is possible in other

Hamilton's nonagenarian astronomer was as enthusiastic as a boy at the prospect of this month's eclipse. Such enjoyment does he get out of life, loitering as he does near the 100-milestone, that he regrets that our day is one-half shorter than the one fashionable on Mars. Half an hour bulks large to one who rises at 5 a.m. in order to stretch out the day to his elastic demands. Quite recently he sold his sail boat, not because he no longer enjoyed sailing, but because he did not want to run the risk of cutting short a life which he enjoys to the uttermost, of health and moderation in all things-his slogans throughout life.



SAYS SOLDIERS HATE WAR

RULES ROYAL STABLES WITH A HAND OF IRON

Geo. Horrocks Drives the King's Horses and Bosses the King's Men-Dislikes Ex-Kaiser

T HERE are a lot of somewhat prominent personages on whom the spotlight of publicity rarely rests. They are people who are unusual because of the fact that they bask in an exceptionally great amount of reflected glory-and among these is George Horrocks.

Every few years or less when all pomp and ceremony of Britain is gathered together, when diplomats, politicians and statesmen all meet in London and Parliament is officially opened by His Majesty, the King, George Horrocks is the happiest of mortals.

For George Horrocks is the man who sits on the box of the royal carriage on state occasions and is responsible for seeing that there is no hitch or flaw in the resplendent pageantry that marks the traditional processions.

He is far from being a flunky. He rules a little realm of his own and reigns as almost supreme sovereign over the coachmen, the grooms, the stable boys and assistants of the royal stables who tip their caps respectfully to

him and speak humbly when they address him. He has an annual income of approximately \$4,000 as well as a free house in the palace grounds with light and fuel. He is responsible only to the Master of Horse, who rarely inter-

feres with his orders. He rehearses and prepares the procession for great state affairs after it has been formally planned by the Master of Horse and these plans approved by the king. When the actual day comes, he himself drives the glass coach drawn by six perfectly matched horses in which the King, the Queen and other members of the

royal family ride. When foreign monarchs arrive in England for the purpose of attending some ceremony such as a coronation, they usually ride to the Westminster Abbey or wherever it is to be held, on horseback. George Horrocks takes charge of their mounts and keeps them in readiness.

It was in this way he happened to bump into the Doorn wood-chopper at a time when he was still Germany's high and mighty ruler. The ex-kaiser had come to England for the coronation of King George and had sent four horses on a month ahead of time. All were carefully trained in Hyde Park.

But when the kaiser himself arrived, he could not decide which horse to ride and did not finally pick his mount till the moment the parade was about to start. As a result of this, it is said, Horrocks' first exclamation when he heard that war had been declared with Germany was, "Well, thank Heaven, we'll not have the kaiser in another procession here."

Horrocks ranks as chief outdoor servant and holds a social position which is on a par with that of the indoor chiefs in the palace. At the last servants' ball in Buckingham Palace, he led off with the Queen while King George piroueted around the floor with the palace housekeeper.

This, incidentally, is an indication of the rapid democratization of the royal household. The King and Queen have upset all precedent and all tradition by taking part in these festivities. Queen Victoria would have looked askance at the idea of dancing with her coachman. It was considered a very gracious act in those days for the reigning sovereign to even appear as








