THE CRIME. Sifton, the alleged murdered man, was between 60 and 70 years of age, and the possessor of 600 or 700 acres of land. He had twice been married; and a day or two before his death it became known that he was to enter the matrimonial field for the third time, and that Mary McFarlane, daughter of a neighboring farmer, was to be his bride. This reached the ears of Gerald Sitton, who was the ears of Gerald Sifton, who was the only direct heir of Joseph Sifton, and it is said that he became very angry. Sifton and Miss McFarlane went to a clergyman's on the night of June 29 to be married, but it is said that on account of the lateness of the hour the ceremony was postponed unfiled a colorly on the often on of the til 5 o'clock on the afternoon of the 30th. The following morning about 9 o'clock the old man, after donning his

wedding clothes, proceeded to the barn to oversee the erection of a hay car-rier by Gerald Sifton and Herbert, both of whom had come from the former's place on the 7th concession especially to do the work. A short time after-wards the old man was found uncons on the ground, with his head lying on an axe and some stones. His head was badly crushed, and Sifton

Sifton said he was standing lose by at the time, and that Herber was at the other end of the barn, and saw nothing whatever of the affair. The injured man died that evening, never having regained consciousness, and he was buried at Arva cemetery a couple of days later. Not the slight-est suspicion was aroused at the time, but some ugly rumors which began to circulate during the course of a week or ten days caused the crown authorities to begin an investigation.

Gerald Sifton then seized his father by the arm, he says, and while dragging him on to the barn floor struck him on the head two or three times. The unconscious form was then placed on the ground below, with his head lying on the axe and stones, and some of the neighbors were called. Herbert did not hesitate in telling the story, and he expressed his readiness to give it under oath. He then returned to Sifton's, where he slept during the night.

The Mayor Authorized to Consult the Solicitor With a View of Tearing up the New Lake Eite &pur.

It was just ten o'clock last night when the Mayor fitted himself to his headgear, hunted up and selected stalwart staff and left the civic offices at Harrison Hall in quest of the city

His worship was not on pleasure bent. He was acting on the earnest-not to say vehement-solicitations of his colleagues at the city council board, who desired to discover the rightful arbitrators of a certain thoroughfare within the precincts of this municipality. They will find out, they said so and said it just as though they meant it, and there will doubtless be no one who will complain that he

be no one who will complain that he hasn't had a run for his money.

The gathering was not a meeting of council. A special had been called, but there was only a quorum of members in the city and Ald. McKeough failed to show up— an omission which neglected to bring him many bouquets from his five collections, who awaited from his five colleagues, who awaited his arrival till a late hour. It was consequently translated into a civic caucus with the Mayor presiding, and Ald. Fleming, Sulman, Liddy and Mc-

Coig as vigorous side-lights.

Ald. Fleming, chairman of the property committee, produced a diagram and explained the cause of his request for the meeting. It was the laying of for the meeting. It was the laying of the Lake Erie railroad spur to the Manson Campbell factory, mentioned in Wednesday's Planet. A short time ago, the alderman pointed out, the council had by by-law, on the request of Mr. Campbell and the railroad com-pany, authorized the building of a switch from the track on Colborne St. to the factory wards. This permission to the factory yards. This permission was granted upon the distinct understanding that no other thoroughfare or property would be interfered with. or property would be interfered with. During the past two days Ald. Fleming had been besieged with angry property owners and tenants in the locality, who claimed the spur was being put in from and ran over Prince St. He visited the work, found the facts as stated, and the indirection of facts as stated, and the indignation of the property owners of the most right-eous order. He forthwith consulted Ald. Liddy. his colleague on the com-mittee, and they visited the scene together. They saw both, the railroad officials and Mr. Campbell and ordered

the work stopped. Both assured them this would be done and the matter righted. "and then," added the alderrighted, "and then," added the alder-men, "we had no more than turned our backs when the workmen were sent back to continue their task. It was a simple case of being lied to." Ald. Liddy corroborated the prop-erty chairman in fully as forceful lan-

guage, and expressed his shocked sur-prise at the perfidy of manufacturers and railroad corporations generally. EXPRESS THEIR WRATH. The Mayor said he had been appealed to on the matter. He consequently risited the spot and ordered the work

no attention had been paid to it.

Ald. Fleming said Thos. Stringer had complained to him that a tree had been cut down in front of his property on the corner of Prince and Colborne "that the Chief of Police did not interfere on account of misrepresentaions made to him by Messrs. Camp-

Sulman said, after hearing the facts, that he was heartily in account with Ald. Fleming's complaint. was the duty of the council to protect the property owners in question and would favor the immediate issuing an injunction to stop the work, d," he added, "I for one will fight through to the end with you, Dr.

Fleming."
Ald. McCoig said his views were entirely in the same direction.

Engineer Shackleton explained that was really too late to issue a mandamus, as the work was completed. The city clerk, on request, looked up the by-law, which enacted that the council had the right to repeal the same if the work was not carried out in the manner specified and satisfactors to them.

Ald. Liddy suggested the calling of a special council meeting to repeal the by-law and grant no switch at all. He felt this was the proper course to pursue after the treatment accorded the Mayor and chairman of the prop-

He advocated that the city so-licitor, who framed the by-law, be immediately consulted by the Mayor as to the rights of the council and, if found as they believed under the stat-ute, that his worship and the com-mittee he authorized to forthwith instruct corporation workmen to tear up and remove the switch, any at-tempt to relay the same to be followed by an injunction. A meeting of coun-cil will then be held and the by-law

cil will then be held and the by-law repealed, which will place the civic body in a position to dictate specific terms should the application be renewed.

His worship said he dreaded hasty plunging into law, but felt that the matter demanded attention.

The other aldermen present endorsed Ald. Sulman's proposition, which was thereupon adopted.
